he educational committee of the State Medical society.
There has been a marked increase in life expectancy as based on the verage age at death within recent
years. Within the last 50 years it has increased probably nearly 20 years in this country, says the bulletin. For he industrial population it increased nine years between 1912 and 1924, acinsurance company dealing with industrial life insurance. For the general population it increased about four ears in the same period.
The greatest single factor in increasing the average length of life, ac-
cording to the bulletin, has come from the control of infectious diseases through public health officials and from the better medical care furnished tion of advances in medical knowlede-
