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

The members hold regular meetings on the second Monday of the month and have drills and inspection and see to it that everything is in readiness in case there should be a call.





Saturday's Children to be Presented by the Belfry Players.

The Belfry Theatre Players are presenting "Saturday's Children" by Maxwell Anderson as the second play in their summer series., July 31, August 1, 2, 3, have been selected as the dates., and the performances will be given in the Belfry Theatre located one block south of highway 50 on the Williams Bay-Elkhorn Rd.

In Maxwell Anderson's "Saturday's Children" the group has chosen one of the finest examples of contemporary American playwriting to appear in the last ten years. It was selected by Burns Mantle as one of the ten best plays of the New York season of 1926-27. Of it he has said: "This comedy is another of those intimate studies of home life among the native middle class; an amusing exposure of human and familiar weaknesses touched with an individuality in characterization that sets it apart from the common run of plays of its type."

The playwright, Maxwell Anderson is one of the foremost living American dramatists. As author of "Saturday's Children", "Elizabeth the Queen", and "Mary of Scotland", and co-author of "What Price Glory" and "Gods of the Lightning", he has demonstrated an all around ability almost unique among contemporary playwrights. Although "Saturday's Children" has been classified as a comedy, it is in a more serious mood than most and has ironic implications underlying it all.

MORE HISTORY OF THIS REGION

In comparing the map last issue and this week you will notice that in the nine years from 1873 to 1882 the influx of Summer residents was well under way.


It is not possible to give the History of Geneva Lake, but attention is called to the Whiting House which was built in 1873, and by 1882 its capacity of 200 guests was taxed. At Pishcotaqua Park, now Cisco Beach, there was a four story hotel with verandas on all floors. It was built in 1881 and was at the time the largest of its kind in the North-west.

The Village of Geneva had a railroad as early as 1856, but by 1860 the track was in such condition that the service was abandoned, not to resume for thirteen years. However, the daily trains, from 1873 on raised Geneva from a country town to a Summer colony. Prosperous and wealthy citizens of Chicago soon began to make their homes on the beautiful lake. Private yachts began to appear. Back in 1873 the Lady of the Lake plied the lake to the delight of the visitors on the day's outing. In '82 the Commodore is shown in pictures as carrying crowds on its decks. The Lucius Newberry served well in its day.

By 1882 Camp Collie, now Conference Point, was widely known for its assemblies. In 1868 a group of members of the Congregational Church at Delavan met on the shore at the head of the Lake together with their pastor, James Collie, for recreation. In 1874 the group moved to the Point. Its principles were declared as follows: "That vital Christianity sweetens and adorns all right relations among men, and is everywhere the crowning joy and glory of life, of recreation as well as work and worship. That the simplest pleasures are the best, and that neither pleasure seeking nor dissipation are recreation. That there are places of recreation needed, not only to serve as a retreat from business, but also from the formalities of society"

Dr. Collie advertised that he has
" cottages, furnished rooms, and
boats to rent. Board by the day or
week- single meals. Milk furnished-
ice and excellent water. A laundry
department, with reasonable charges.
Stabling for horses. Cook stoves,
and wood fitted to them, for those
who do their own cooking. Fishing
tackle, etc. "

The Congress Club, a pleasure
club of young married people mostly
living on Congress Street in Chicago
purchased the ten acre wood lot where
it is now located in 1881 and by July
1st of 1882 the members had a club
house and several cottages ready for
use.

George Williams, a son of Royal J.
Williams, who was born in 1841 in the
old homestead, delighted in telling
of his hike to the Centennial at
Philadelphia in 1876. He got very
few lifts and often slept in hay
stacks. The trip took him all Summer
and his life which came to an end in
1824 was greatly enriched by the trip.

The Centennial made its impressio
on this region as well as the whole
country for it showed man how much
easier many things could be done thro
inventions. Thus the industrial era
commenced and with the resultant
fortunes Geneva Lake became the
Summer recreational center of the
Chicago region.


