THE ORIGIN OF GENEVA LAKE

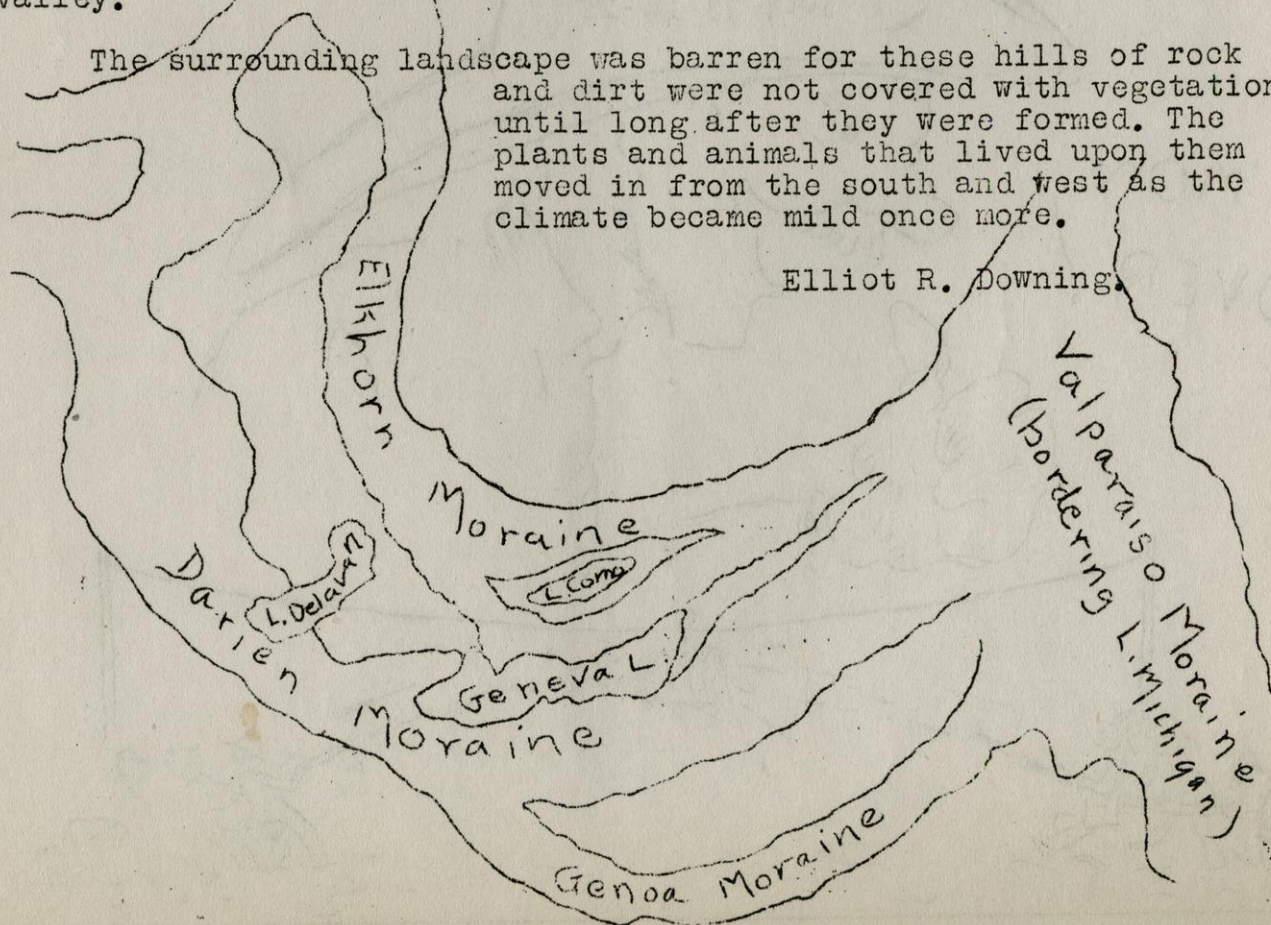
Some twelve thousand years ago the northern portion of NORTH AMERICA (as well as Eurasia) was covered by huge glaciers as Greenland and Antarctica are now. It was but one of many glacial periods that had preceded it. A tongue of the great ice cap, a mile or more thick, was slowly flowing south in the depression now occupied by Lake Michigan and spilling over its sides. A branch of this Lake Michigan glacier was crawling down Green Bay. Between these two was a relatively small projecting mass of ice now known as the Delavan Lobe.

For a great many years the front of this lobe stood just south of where Geneva Lake now is and extended, a wall of ice, east and west, curving north. It was then warm enough in this region so the mass of ice melted along its front as fast as it was pushed down from the north. It brought, on its surface and imbedded in it, dirt, stones and boulders that it had scraped from the rocky hills over which it rode, grinding them down. All this material it dumped, unsorted, as its front melted, forming the semi-circular line of hills now known as the Darien Moraine, south and west of Geneva Lake. Such a deposit at the end of a glacier is known as a terminal moraine.

Then due to a succession of warmer years the front of the glacier retreated. As it went it deposited its debris irregularly, filling more or less an old valley that existed before the glacier came, a valley that opened westward, one whose rock floor is 220 feet below the level of Geneva Lake. The front of the Delavan Lobe then remained stationary for a while and piled up another terminal moraine known as the Elkhorn Moraine. It is the line of hills up which Highway H. climbs as it goes north from Williams Bay. Between these moraines, the Darien and the Elkhorn Moraine, its waters held by the north-curving west end of the former, Geneva Lake formed in the partially filled old valley.

The surrounding landscape was barren for these hills of rock and dirt were not covered with vegetation until long after they were formed. The plants and animals that lived upon them moved in from the south and west as the climate became mild once more.

Dr. and Mrs. Morrell have two other children: Doris (14) who excels at the piano and Roger (8) who has not written poems as yet.

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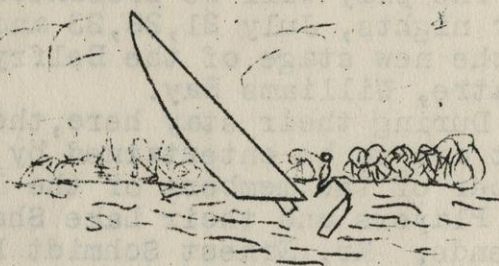

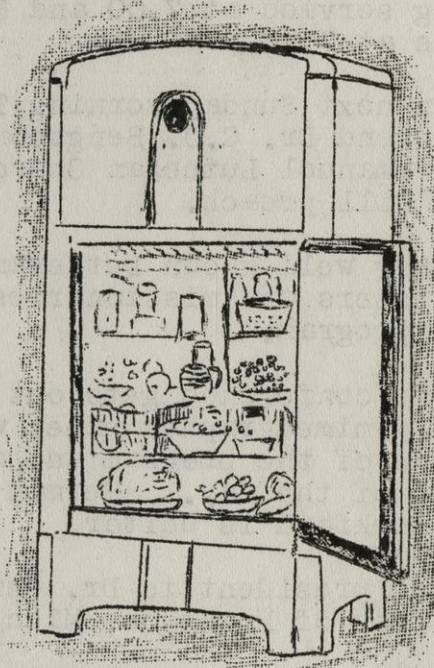

At Cisco Beach which is located on STH 50 and 36 between Williams Bay and Lake Geneva there is being held this week the 30th Annual Assembly of the Illinois Conference Luther League.

The Cisco Beach has besides the Camp grounds along the highway where are located the office, dining room and assembly hall, which overlook Lake Como, a plot of land on Lake Geneva for swimming and boating.

This conference came on the 19th and leaves on the 25th. There are 350 delegates from the states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa, or at least parts of these 5 states. They represent 8,000 young people in their organization.

The motto of the conference is "Build for Eternity". The day starts at 7 a.m. with Sunrise Devotionals, then breakfast, a Bible Study hour, a practical hour, inspirational hour. After noons are devoted to recreation. Song service at 7.00 and Evening Mass at 7.30.

On next Sunday morning, The Reverend Dr. C.O. Bengtson, Pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, Chicago will preach.

Many well known Lutheran ministers and missionaries are on the program.

The conference gets out a daily mimeographed paper which tells of the program and activities of the day. Herman Nelson of Rockford is editor.

The president is Dr. Herbert Swanson of Muskegon, Mich.

Some of the other officers are: Vice-P., Rev. J.A. Parkander, Chicago; Miss Evelyn Stark, Rec. Sec'y, Chicago. Ernest Swanberg, Geneva, Ill., Treasurer.

Rev. Everett Norling, Tustin, Mich. is Life Guard.

Camp Aurora, the new Bible Conference grounds, nestles among the beautiful trees on the shores of Lake Geneva between Fontana and the Harvard Club on the spot where the old Hotel Minier used to be.

It is owned and operated by the Presbyterian Bible Conference Association of Aurora, Illinois, and is directed by the Reverend Dr. James E. Congdon, Jr, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Aurora. 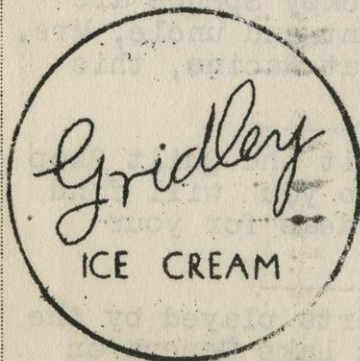

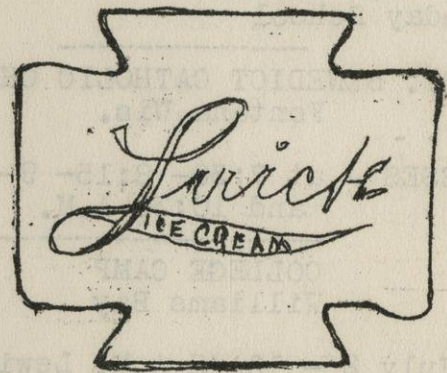
