

COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS: All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING: A limited number parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Player interviews will be held in the "W" Club Annex following practice as prearranged with the Sports Information Office. There will be no player interviews allowed on Thursdays and Fridays.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

The Media Interview Room on game days is the Wisconsin Weight Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach McClain is from 2:30–3:15 Thursdays, or 2:00 to 3:00 Fridays before home games, or after practice each day.

YOUR HOSTS in Camp Randall Stadium and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are Jim Mott, Sports Information Director, and Bob Leu, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife Dorothy are the parents of three sons - William 19, David 16, and Eric 14.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob handles radio and television contracts for the athletic department and is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films. He has also done color commentary on Wisconsin's hockey broadcasts, and has served in past years as producer-host of Badger Football on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife Janis are the parents of daughters Dawn 22, Amie 19, and son Adam 10.

Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

THE HEAD COACH—DAVE McCLAIN

Dave McClain begins his fourth season as head coach at Wisconsin after being named Wisconsin's 24th head coach on December 16, 1977. He replaced John Jardine.

The 42-year-old McClain, a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio and a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, came to Wisconsin from a highly successful coaching stint at Ball State, where he posted an overall 46-25-3 record in seven seasons.

In his first season with the Badgers, he became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a winning mark as a rookie coach. He led the Badgers to a 5-4-2 season, including 3-4-2 Big Ten mark—good for sixth place in the final league standings.

McClain played football at Upper Sandusky High School and Bowling Green University, where his teams went 45-5-4. Mc-Clain played both quarterback and safety while at Bowling Green.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshman offensive coach and earned his master's degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler 1963–66; at the University of Kansas under Pepper Rodgers in 1967–68; and at Ohio State University under W.W. "Woody" Hayes in 1969 and 1970 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State. He coached seven seasons at Ball State, with only his first one a loser at 4-5-1. He was named Mid American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 after a 9-2 season. His three year MAC record of 13-4 included the 1976 conference title.

His first Badger squad opened with four straight wins and finished 5-4-2—good for the team's first winning record since 1974. His 1979 and 1980 squads posted identical 4-7-0 overall and 3-5-0 Big Ten records. The 1979 squad tied for seventh in the Big Ten and the team tied for sixth in 1980.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children—son Tom 15, and daughters Mindy 13 and Marcy 10.

1981 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Wisconsin's defense came of age in 1980!

In preparing for the 1980 football season Wisconsin head coach **Dave McClain** concentrated on the Badgers defense.

In 1979, opponents had averaged 393 yards and tallied 28.3 points per game against the Badgers.

In 1980, a young Wisconsin defensive unit came together to allow 327.5 yards and 19.2 points per game.

The defense against the rush showed remarkable improvement — from 216.5 yards per game in 1979 to a yield of 117.6 yards per game in 1980 — and ranked 11th nationally in that category of play.


Not since the famed 1951 "Hard Rocks" – just 56.6 rushing yards allowed being ranked third in total defense at the end of 1980 conference play.

Wisconsin's defense should prove to be sturdy in 1981 with six starters with a wealth of experience returning.


They include senior inside linebacker Dave Levenick, a four-time letter-winner; senior outside linebacker Guy Boliaux, a three year veteran; junior middle guard Tim Krumrie, a starter since his first game as a freshman and a sophomore all-Big Ten selection last year; junior tackle Mark Shumate and junior defensive backs Dave Greenwood and Clint Sims, each with two years of experience.

Von Mansfield came on strong in 1980 to start ten games as the wide side cornerback, — he and Greenwood each had a pair of pass

and second nationally — has a Wisconsin football team finished that high in the nation. The "Hard Rocks" paced the nation in total defense on a yield of 154.8 yards per game.

The improvement against the rush in Big Ten play was also exceptional — from 241.6 yards per game and ninth overall in 1979 to 121.9 yards per game and fourth overall last year — and was instrumental in the Badgers interceptions — while seniors Matt Vanden Boom and Ron Steverson both had excellent spring showings to move into the starting defensive backfield.

Additionally, Larry Spurlin, an inside linebacker who missed much of last year after leading the Badgers in tackles in 1979, and Dan Messenger, a junior defensive back who was a starter in 1979 are available.

Jim Melka, the 1979 Wisconsin All-state

fullback who suffered a pair of injuries last year that led to his being red-shirted, was switched to an inside linebacker position in the spring and showed good progress.

In preparing for 1981, **Coach McClain** concentrated on the offense, which generated an average of 284 yards per game and scored just 138 points — suffering four shutouts in 1980.

Two experienced quarterbacks, junior John Josten and sophomore Jess Cole, are available for the Badgers to build their running and passing game around. Neither one has the starting assignment locked up. Transfer Randy Wright from Notre Dame, via St. Charles, IL, also figures in the battle at quarterback after a good spring of workouts.

Josten, who has been hampered by injuries during his career, started nine games last year, while Cole came on strong near season's entirely in four of them.

The Badgers had a running attack spearheaded by John Williams (526), Dave Mohapp (506), Troy King (425), and Gerald Green (264) — that averaged close to 200 yards per game — fourth best in the Big Ten — but the passing game was able to net just 87.3 yards per game.

The running game appears strong again as the top five rushers from 1980 — including Jess Cole — return.

Fullback **Dave Mohapp** ranks 11th in career rushing yardage (1,267 yards) and the senior Academic all-American (2nd team 1980) is looking for a top-notch season.

Behind him is junior Gerald Green, who has accounted for 578 yards in two varsity seasons.

At tailback, juniors John Williams – the top Badger rusher last year – and Troy King,



end to start two of the last three games and did an exceptional job in the season-ending 25-7 win over Minnesota. He ran for 92 yards, completed 5 of 7 passes for 57 yards, and scored four rushing touchdowns, one on a 52 yard option play.

The offense was inconsistent in 1980, not scoring a TD in six games, and being blanked

Adding depth to the running attack are seniors **Curtis Richardson** and **Paul Hughes** and sophomore **Marck Harrison**. An added bonus is the return of **Chucky Davis**, Wisconsin's second leading rusher with 407 yards in 1979, after a year's absence via ineligibility.

CLIFF KNOX—Fullbacks and Tailbacks

Cliff Knox, 45, has served with coach Dave McClain since 1972. He served as coach of the offensive backs on McClain's Ball State staff, which he joined in 1972, and has coached the Badger fullbacks and tailbacks since coming to Wisconsin.

Born in Edgewater, Alabama, he graduated from high school in Kimball, West Virginia, in 1954. Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" **Hirsch** is in his 13th year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

Wisconsin's men's and women's athletic programs have consistently ranked in the Big Ten's first division during his tenure over the past twelve years.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 national ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director — slated to end in 1979 — was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor **Irving Shain** upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten — our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

Hirsch responded, "I'm extremely pleased with the decision. It's just wonderful.

He said his major objectives for the decade ahead are "coping with inflation and acquiring proper funding for women's athletics. My other ambition is to have Wisconsin in a football bowl game."

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as a triple threat halfback on **Harry Stuhldreher**'s 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only 'a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus nine touchdowns, five by rushing and four by passing.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track, and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete

ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season Hirsch caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by Don Hutson of the Packers in 1942. He (Continued on Page 19)

ATHLETIC OFFICIALS

PROF. FRANK J. REMINGTON

Frank has served as Wisconsin's Big Ten Faculty Representative and a member of the school's athletic board since 1959, except for the 1970–71 school year. He chaired the athletic board in 1966 and 1967.

The lawyer-educator, who has been a member of the law faculty since 1949, is one of the nation's foremost authorities on criminal justice and administration.

also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Elroy compiled a total of 343 passes caught for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdown catches during his career with the Rams before retiring from active NFL play following the 1957 season.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965); to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968); to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974); and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker during his nine year career with the Los Angeles Rams.

Mohapp, Green, Williams, and King have accounted for 2,948 yards rushing for the Badgers over the past three seasons — 2,790 of them in the past two years.

There's also a good corps of receivers for the quarterbacks to throw to, led by senior split end **Tim Stracka**. **Stracka**, an all-Big Ten first team all-academic selection and honorable mention nationally, has 57 career receptions for 819 yards as a primary receiver. He accounted for almost half of Wisconsin's receiving yardage and over onethird of the passes caught by the Badgers last season.

The development of tight end Craig Fredrick, flankers Thad McFadden and Marvin Neal, and the availability of Jeff Nault, hurt and red-shirted last year, at tight end, should add depth and versatility to the Wisconsin passing game.

McFadden can be an exceptional talent for the Badgers. He totalled 315 all-purpose running yards in 1980 while touching the ball just 20 times — 76 on 5 rushes, 134 on ten receptions, 82 on two kickoff returns and 23 vards on three punt returns.

Help from a good corps of freshmen receivers — Rich Baxter, Gary Ellerson, Kirk Abernathy, Michael Jones, Dave Timmer and Al Toon at the split end and flanker position, plus Mike Hines and Bill Schick at tight end — is expected to strengthen these positions in 1981.

The interior offensive line has experience with Jerry Doerger and Bob Wincklermoved from guard-setting the pace at tackles; Leo Joyce and Mark Subach appear set at the guards; and Ron Versnik moves in at center after playing both the right and left tackle position in 1980.

Wisconsin's specialty teams performed well in 1980 and on several occasions came up with the big play — McFadden's 76 yard kickoff return and Kyle Borland's 52 yard run off punt formation — while defending the punt in an exceptional manner.

The Badgers' punt defense unit gave up just 57 yards on 26 punt returns by the opponents last year — an average of 2.19 yards per return. Only five schools in the nation allowed fewer yards on punt returns and only two schools had better yards per return averages.

The kicking game figures to be improved in 1981. Dave Greenwood slumped to a 36.3 average on 70 punts after a 40.5 yard average as a freshman in 1979, while Mark Doran came on late in the season to pace the Badgers in kick scoring by converting 13 of 14 extra point tries and adding four of six field goal tries for 25 points. His lone punt sailed 64 yards at UCLA.

Marvin Neal, Thad McFadden and Jerry Vance all figure to be in the battle to gain punt and kickoff return assignments. Neal has gained 711 yards returning kicks his first two years at Wisconsin, including 494 as a freshman.

The 1981 schedule for Wisconsin is as rugged as ever, with the Badgers facing six teams that had .500 seasons or better, including four teams that had a combined 37-10 record.

All nine Big Ten opponents are on the slate of games with Michigan (10-2), Purdue (9-3) and Ohio State (9-3) all appearing in Madison during the first five weeks of the season. Each of them played a bowl game following the 1980 season.

UCLA (9-2) of the Pac-Ten and Western Michigan (7-4) of the Mid-American Conference round out the string of five home games in succession to open the schedule.

Northwestern and Iowa are set for lateseason appearances in Camp Randall Stadium.

The Badgers play at Michigan State and Illinois on successive weekends after their long home stand, then visit Indiana and Minnesota in November games.

WISCONSIN'S ALL-TIME FOOTBALL TEAM

Six All-American football players were picked on Wisconsin's all-time football team by fans during the 1969 centennial season of collegiate football.

Fullback Alan 'The Horse' Ameche, 1953 and 1954 All-American and 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest football player in the poll.

In the backfield with Ameche are quarterback **Ron VanderKelen** (1962); and **Marlin 'Pat' Harder** and **Elroy 'Crazylegs' Hirsch**, members of the famed 1942 Wisconsin team that posted an 8-1-1 record and a No. 3 national ranking.

The ends named are All-Americans Dave Schreiner (1941 and 1942) and Pat Richter (1961 and 1962).

Linemen honored included **Robert 'Red' Wilson** (1946–49); **Howard 'Cub' Buck** (1915); **Arlie Mucks, Sr.** (1914); **Dan Lanphear** (1959); and **Ken Bowman** (1961–63).

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end **Dave Schreiner** when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback **Allan J. Shafer** in 1944.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. Shafer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall stadium, November 11, 1944.







Tim can join two other Wisconsin players who have achieved Big Ten All-Academic honors three years in a row — Pat Levenhagen in 1954, 1955, and 1956, and Tom Stauss in 1977, 1978, and 1979 — with another fine year in 1981. Tim received honorable mention in 1980 for the Academic All-American team.

Both **Tim** and **Dave** maintain a B or better average in the classroom with **Tim** majoring in Business and **Dave** in Physical Education.

CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 88 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural Society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the 1966 addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.


There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime viewing seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the fifth largest college owned stadium in the United States—exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State and Tennessee.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.




CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin – Madison was established in the same constitutional document which proclaimed Wisconsin's statehood in 1848.

Today, the University of Wisconsin—Madison ranks among the great universities of the world in size, scope, and academic excellence.

Three faculty members have won Nobel Prizes, the most recent being Professor Howard M. Temin, oncologist, who won the 1975 award in medicine. Dr. Joshua Lederberg won the 1958 prize for his studies of the genetic material in bacteria, and Dr. Har Ghobind Khorana was recognized in 1968 for his pioneering work in the field of nucleic acid chemistry.

Among the University's accomplishments in recent years:

Ranking "distinguished" or strong in 26 of the 29 academic disciplines surveyed by the American Council on Education, with particular praise on the departments of chemical engineering, geography, Spanish, botany, history, bacteriology, and biochemistry.

Second nationally in number of doctorates awarded in the past four decades.

Third in providing federal executives holding doctorates, in total gifts received by state universities, and in contributions from business and corporations.

Fifth in number of full-time students, and seventh among alma maters of presidents serving the nation's largest corporations.

A recent national faculty survey ranked six University of Wisconsin-Madison departments among the top five in the nation and overall, ranked Wisconsin 8th nationally.

The survey, by the Chronicle on Higher Education, asked more than 4,000 faculty members of America's four-year colleges and universities to "name the five departments nationally in your discipline that have the most distinguished faculties."

Eighteen per cent of the faculty members responding said a UW-Madison department was among the top five in their field.

Six UW-Madison departments – Agriculture, Biological Sciences, Education, Foreign Languages, History, and Sociology – ranked among the top five nationally, while Chemistry, Economics, Engineering, Mathematics, and Statistics, Political Science, and Psychology were listed among the top ten nationally.
