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## NEW TRAVEL SERVICE OPENS AT MEMORIAL

We know that Union members are very mobile people so on or around April 1, the Union will begin to provide more services to those globe-trotters among us.

At that time what has been the barbershop for 52 years will be transformed into a full-service travel agency operated as a branch of the Sager-Wilson Travel Agency. The barbershop, and barber Buss Topp by the way, will continue in business in other space near the Trophy Room.

Called Sager-Wilson at the Memorial Union, the travel agency will lease the space from the Union and the resulting rent will be used to support an expanded educational travel program under the existing Union Travel Center. Until 1979, the Union Travel Center was able to provide ticketing services but because of airline regulations, it was forced to terminate that function.

The educational program will be supervised by Jane Johnson, who has been the Union Travel Center director since 1978. She will concentrate on developing a resource center for travelers and will advise students and Union members on their travel problems. The center will also continue to handle Eurail and other rail passes, American Youth Hostel passes, Europe Handbooks and International Student Identity cards. Passport and visa information will also be available.

Special programs like the recent International Travel Fair at Union South, bag lunch seminars and speakers, as well as some special tours like last summer's Canadian canoe trip will be offered by the educational program in conjunction with the travel subcommittee of the Wisconsin Union Directorate's Campus Community Services.

Union members are encouraged to use the services of the Travel Center, and to order airline tickets from our newest service — Sager-Wilson at the Memorial Union. The telephone numbers of the two offices are: Sager-Wilson, 255-4450; and Travel Center, 262-6200. Watch the next *Quarterly* for more information about the Union's travel services.


#### RING IN SPRING FEAST AND SING


#### TOP AMERICAN DANCE ENSEMBLES STAR IN UNION THEATER PROGRAM

Offering lively demonstration of the American contribution to the kinetic art, two of this country's most exciting dance ensembles will perform at the Union Theater in April.

The Minnesota Dance Theatre, one of the largest and most respected of the regional professional companies, will make its Madison debut with a lecture-demonstration at 8 p.m., Friday, April 3, and a concert at 8 p.m., Saturday, April 4. Founded by Loyce Houlton, the company has won acclaim for a "dual" aesthetic that blends classical technique with the unique extensions, the designs and dissonances of the 20th century. The April 4 program will feature "Allegro Brillante" by George Balanchine and "Wingborne", "Knoxville: Summer of 1915", "293.6", and "Premonitions", all by Houlton, who is considered one of today's most talented and innovative choreographers.

The Dance Theatre of Harlem, which began as a ghetto company 12 years ago and has since developed into a prestigious and internationally-acclaimed ensemble, will present a lecture-demonstration at 8 p.m., Tuesday, April 28, with performances at 8 p.m., Wednesday and Thursday, April 29 and 30. Arthur Mitchell, the first great black classical male dancer, founded the company and remains its co-director, with Karrel Shook. The ensemble has traveled all over the world, consistently breaking box office records and winning rave reviews. With a repertoire that includes classical, modern and ethnic works, Mitchell has achieved his dream, creating new black traditions in dance.

## UNION SOUTH PASSES

Union South passed another milestone in February with the celebration of its tenth birthday. In addition to a cake, which is basic to birthdays, the occasion was marked with the official renaming of what has been called the Snack Bar since the building opened in 1971.

The new name, "Union Station", was picked by a panel from over 300 entries in a contest called "Food For Thought", which was held in November and December. The winner, Gary Giulian, suggested "Union Station" the very first day of the contest. He was rewarded with \$100 in food coupons. But the name was a popular one. Five other students and staff also suggested "Union Station", and they received honorable mention in the contest.

However, Union South is not just getting older. It's also getting busier every year. Evidence that Union South is growing up are statistics showing that the building is now being used by 8,000 people every day. That's exactly double the average daily count five years ago. In addition, South is serving approximately 3,000 meals daily and the average number of people using the building daily for organized group events such as meetings and conferences is 716.
