The Mini Course program has been offering opportunities for Union members to meet people and learn new skills for almost twenty years now. The program has come a long way since it began in the summer of 1972 with 121 participants and 22 courses. During the heyday of the disco era, a single term in the spring of 1978 set an all-time enrollment record with over 2,400 participants. Thirty-five percent of those participants were taking disco!

Currently the program enrolls over 7,300 people annually making it one of the five largest Union-sponsored, non-credit programs in the country. This year a new record was set for summer term enrollment with over 2,000 people registered for more than 250 courses.

Participation by Union members has been increasing steadily for the past five years. Members now account for more than forty percent of the total Mini Course enrollment.




Gloria Anzaldua is a Chicana teiana lesbian-feminist poet, fiction writer and cultural theorist from the Rio Grande Valley of south Texas, now living in Santa Cruz. She is co-editor of "This Bridge Called My Back: Writings by Radical Women of Color," winner of the Before Columbus Foundation American Book Award. Her book "Borderlands/La Frontera: The New Mestiza" was picked as one of the 38 best books of 1987 by the Library Journal. She is editor of the recently published "Making Face, Making Soul/Haciendo caras: Creative and Critical Perspectives by Feminists of Color." Anzaldua will be at UW-Madison in conjunction with the "Preparing a Response to the Columbus Quincentennial." Her lecture is being co-sponsored by Native American Studies and Chicano Studies.

DENNIS BARRIE

As director of the Contemporary
Arts Center (CAC) of Cincinnati,
Dennis Barrie was at the center of the
storm surrounding the controversial
Robert Maplethorpe exhibition, "The
Perfect Moment." Barrie and the CAC
were indicted on two counts each of
"pandering obscenity" and "the illegal
use of a minor in nudity-oriented
materials." Barrie served as the Midwest
director of the Smithsonian Institution
Archives of American Art before becoming the director of the CAC, one of the
nation's largest institutions dedicated
to contemporary programming.

Renovation Update

According to Memorial Union Operations
Manager Dick Pierce, the new air condioning system for Great Hall and Tripp
Commons is being installed right on
schedule. It should be functioning by
the end of September.

An unexpected benefit has resulted from the project. "There were spaces left in the walls from the removal of the old air conditioning unit," said Pierce. "We will be able to use these alcoves for catering purposes such as keeping warm coffee right in Great Hall."

"The new air conditioning system will be the first and messiest part of a general facelift," Pierce continued. "Once the dust clears we will begin painting, and replacing drapes and carpets." The entire project should be completed by early October.

A second renovation project, the upgrading of the Commons Desk/Lobby Area in Memorial Union is currently out to bid. Construction will begin in the middle of fall, with much of the work being completed during the slow periods around the winter holidays. This is a change from the original plans which called for construction to begin in mid-July. "Doing the project this way will inconvenience as few people as possible, with no major construction being done during critical use periods," said Pierce.

Tudor Dinner Concerts

Enjoy an evening of feasting and merrymaking just like in the days of old at the Union during the annual Tudor Dinner Concerts, December 4 - 8, 10 and 11. Great Hall will be transformed into an ld English banquet room with a feast to please the most gluttonous. The Madison Philharmonic Chorus, under the direction of Professor Samuel Jones, will provide traditional English carols. "Greetynges," "proclamaciounes," "presentaciounes" and "ceremoniales" will round out the evening. (Not to mention "carousynge" and general "merryemakynge" which shall be left up to the guests.) The festivities will begin at 6:15 p.m. each night.

Tickets go on sale October 28, 1991. Orders received early will not be processed. Ticket orders, including walk-ins, must be accompanied by a stamped, self-addressed envelope. Be sure to order your tickets early as the Tudor Dinners are extremely popular and have sold out in the past.

Is there a special someone with whom you would like to share your Union privileges? Now there are three options from which to choose:

■ AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP

Union members may purchase one \$10 affiliate membership for a friend or relative each year.* Affiliate memberships must be purchased by the member and are valid for one year or until the end of the corresponding member's term, whichever is shorter. Affiliate members have all of the privileges of Union membership with the following exceptions:

- Affiliate members do not receive Union mailings.
- Affiliate membership fees do not accumulate toward life membership.
- Affiliates may not have temporary guest privilege cards issued to their friends.

■ IOINT LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Life members of the Wisconsin Union may purchase joint life memberships for their spouses for \$45. A joint life membership entitles the spouse to all of the privileges of Union membership.

SPOUSE CARD

The spouse card program was replaced by the affiliate program in September, 1990. However, if you became a Union member before September, 1990, you are still eligible to receive a free spouse card, entitling your spouse to all of the privileges of Union membership. This original benefit of your membership has not be taken away.

* Members with active spouse privilege cards may not purchase affiliate memberships.
