AND ITS

History from its First Settlement up to the Present Time, including Schools, Churches, Societies. Fire Department, &c..

It is not to be presumed that the few following pages, will contain the history of Green Bay, the oldest town in the State, one whose history runs back nearly one hundred and fifty years, demands a much larger space than the part of a Directory, and a worthier pen than ours when its history is to be written. We certainly have not the presumption to name ourselves as its historian. What we propose now to attempt, is a simple narration of the more prominent facts that have occurred in the gradual development of the city's growth, and to state as concisely as possible, the present condition as a basis of comparison for the future.

Going back, therefore, not to its first occupation by the white man, but to the first actual and permanent settlement by men that came to make it their home. We place as our first date the year 1745. When Augustine DeLanglade, with his son Charles, accompained by a few others some eighth in all, left Mackinaw and took up their abode on the present site of Green Bay. DeLanglade although

born of a noble family in France, had been impelled by his love of adventure to come to America, and there marrying the daughter of an Indian Chief, he had long lived among the Indians, and was much respected by them. His son Charles rose to great distinction as an Indian Officer during the French and Indian war, that broke out soon after their settlement at Green Bay. He will perhaps be best remembered, from the fact of his having command of the Indian forces in the celebrated defeat of Braddock. DeLanglade, occupying about the same position in the French army, as Washington did in the English. That is to say inferior in command, but practically head. Throughout all that war Chas. DeLanglade seemed to be present wherever there was a battle. When peace was declared, he returned to his home at Green Bay, for by the terms of the treaty, while the forts and unoccupied land, passed into the possession of the British Government, the settlers were allowed to hold the claims that they had received from the French Government. The little coloney remained for many years in statu quo. This was naturally the case from the character of the colonists, they were not men of business enterprise, nor were they eager to amass riches, they loved the wild life of the woods, and the indolent freedom of the Indian. Charles DeLanglade was a half-breed, and nearly all the settlers had Indian wives. They were bold, courageous, and adventurous, as befitted their peculiar positions, but used no boat larger than a canoe, and raised no more grain than was needed for their own consumption. For many years they were content to grind their flour from a hand mill, turned by two persons, then a horse-power increased their milling facilities, so that they were able to grind fourteen bushels of wheat in a day.

In 1785, forty years from its first settlement, the colony could boast of but seven families, and fifty-six souls. Sixteen out of these fifty-six, lived on the west side of the river, the remainder of the population and the two stores, that were then in operation were on the east side.

These early settlers living so far away from all civilized

life, and to all appearances, free from any nationality, were nevertheless compelled from time to time, to be considered the citizens of three different Nations. Originally owing allegiance to the French Government, they were transfered to the power of the British, then at the close of the American Revolution, they found themselves citizens of the United States. This citizenship, however, they did not at that time acknowledge, and in the war of 1812 considered themselves upon the side of Great Brittan, and took arms against the United States. At the close of that war, however, no rescourse was left them but to submit to the laws of the United States. So slowly, however, had the settlement grown in numbers, that up to 1812, nearly 80 years from its beginning, there were not more than 250 souls living there. These were almost all of French or Indian extraction.

At a very early day the French had built a fort here, as a protection against the Indians. This fort afterwards fell into the hands of the English, together with the Post, and was by them abandoned in 1763. After the war of 1812, Col. Miller, with a detachment of United States troops on board of three schooners, sailed into the Fox River to the astonishment of the villagers, as never before had a vessel of that size been seen on those waters. These troops immediately set about the work of building a fort. This fort was erected on the west side of the river, and named Fort Howard, afterwards giving its name to the city, which grew up about it. Up to this time the general character of the settlement had remained unchanged. The manners and customs of the inhabitants are thus described by Col. Childs, who came here to live in 1820. He says: "There were quite a number of respectable French families residing at the Bay when I arrived. They were all engaged in the Indian trade under the American Fur Company, each cultivating a small quantity of land. Their manners and customs were of the most primitive character, they never used the yoke for their oxen; but, instead, fastened sicks across the oxen's horns to draw by, and mostly used fortugs, rope made out of bark. Their plows were very uncouth, the plow shares being about as large as a

smoothing iron, while the beam was about twelve feet long, with a pair of wheels near the fore end to keep it sufficiently elevated from the ground. They could not plow within fifteen feet of their fences. Their principal food was game, fish, and hulled corn. They caught large quantities of sturgeon and trout, and they made immense quantities of maple sugar. At the proper season in the Spring, the entire settlement would remove to their sugar camps; after remaining two months, each family making from eighth to ten hundred pounds."

From the building of the fort, may be dated the actual growth of the settlement. The advent of the first purely American settler, speedily wrought a change in the entire community. Thrift and energy took the place of the half-dead, half-civilized life that had heretofore characterized the village. Law and order were enforced, where before, the the rule of savage life alone prevailed. One of the first orders of the first judge was, that the inhabitants should be properly married, and nearly one-half of the inhabitants thereupon for the first time entered into a legal marriage contract, not however, without sore complaints against what they considered an unnecessary imposition.

The year 1825 marks an era in the history of the city, as during that year, the first newspaper published west of Lake Michigan, was issued from Green Bay under the name of The Intelligencer. A. G. Ellis and J. V. Suydam, being the editors. In this same year the first framed house, erected in Wisconsin, was built here for Judge Doty, the man who had compelled the inhabitants to get married. The village slowly increased in population, and in 1830, the present north ward of the city was laid out under the name of Navarino, and in 1835, the present south ward was laid out under the name of Astor, after the principal proprietor, John Jacob Astor, who was at the head of what was known as "The American Fur Company," a very powerful corporation that endeavored to monopolize all the Fur trade of the northwest. Navarino and Astor remained as rivals for the increasing trade of the settlement, until 1839, when the feeling of

rivalry was put aside, and the two villages became one corporation under the name of Green Bay. The total population of the combined settlements at this time, did not exceed 300 souls. From this time the population increased much more rapidly. All the boats that came up the lake stopped at Green Bay, bringing with them many permanent settlers. And in 1854 the city charter was obtained from the legislature. But at this time, its increasing prosperity received a check by the diversion of trade into new channels. The rapidly rising cities of Milwaukee and Chicago absorbed nearly all of the traffic, and for some years the tide of Green Bay's prosperity ran low. But with the opening of new routes of transportation, new life was infused into the business prospects of the city. The first railroad that reached Green Bay, was the Chicago and Northwestern, which having been pushed gradually north, arrived at Fort Howard in the fall of 1860. Up to this date, the long winter had almost isolated the citizens of the Bay from the rest of the world. The advent of this first railroad was, on this account, hailed with great joy, and a great impetus was given to trade. About this same time, a company which had been formed under a grant from the United States Government, commenced operations for the purpose of improving the navigation of the Fox and Wisconsin rivers, endeavoring to open a water communication between Green Bay and the Mississippi river. The great importance of this work was apparent to all, who have ever taken it into consideration.

The Fox and Wisconsin rivers afforded a natural channel, the divide separating the two streams, was but a mile and a half in width, and consisted of a sandy prairie, through which a canal could be easily made. The main obstacle, was the great length of the route which required improvement. The company went boldy to work and pushed their improvements to a completion, and in a few years, Green Bay was put into direct communication with the Mississippi. Boats drawing not more than three feet of water could run the whole length of the route at all stages of water. This was soon found to be insufficient to compete with the railroads,

and many efforts were made to increase the facilities for navigation. At last the general Government was prevailed upon to assume the work. The old company was bought out in 1872, and the work of improvement was begun immediately, and in all probability will be continued, until a constant depth of five feet is obtained. The value of such a canal can hardly be estimated. The Lower Fox with its immense waterpower, would soon rival the Merrimac in its manufacture of cotton fabrics, and far surpass it in the variety and number of other manufactories.

The following table of the power now available on this river, will give a good idea of its manufacturing capacities:

This immense power is perfectly inexhaustable, and contained within a distance of 36 miles. Green Bay is the natural depot for the reception and distrubution of all the goods here manufactured. For Green Bay is not only a commercial center by means of its water ways, but the events of the last few years have also made it a railroad center. In 1872 the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad was extended from Fort Howard to Escanaba, forming the connecting link between Chicago and Lake Superior—a railroad from Escanaba to Marquette having been constructed some years previously. The opening of this road gave to Green Bay he whole of the northern mining and lumbering country for a market.

But what the citizens most keenly felt the necessity of, was a railroad to the west, which should connect them with the great grain producing States, and enable them to compete with Milwaukee and Chicago for the transportation of grain. In 1866 a charter was obtained for the Lake Pepin Railway Company, but it was not until 1871 that active work was put upon its construction. When the work was once fairly begun, however, it was rapidly pushed to a completion, and the road was opened to the Mississippi and in running order in 1873. Already the city has felt the great benefit of this new route, a benefit that will without doubt increase in direct ratio with its years.


In 1871, a railroad under the name of the Milwaukee and Northern Railway, began to push its way from Milwaukee in an air line towards the north. This road reached Green Bay in 1873, shortening the distance to Milwaukee 37 miles, and to Chicago 51 miles, besides opening a competing route to those points. Thus it will be seen, that Green Bay has now all that can be desired in the way of carrying facilities. Her iron arms of commerce radiate to all points of the compass. The broad lakes with their tributaries lie at her door. The 275 miles of natural and artificial channel that connect her with the Mississippi gives to her free access to that mighty stream and its vast system of tributaries.


What she now needs is men of means and enterprise, men with clear heads to plan, and bold hearts to execute. And the wealth of east and west would here meet in a common market, enriching the people, and building up the greatest commercial center of the north.

A few of the citizens have perceived these golden opportunities, and with what limited means they could command, have endeavored to divert hither some of the vast stream of trade that is constantly passing by to other less favorable localities. Their success will undoubtedly induce others to follow them, and when once the tide fairly sets in, Green Bay will rapidly rise to her proper station among the cities of the republic. The traditions of the old sleepy existence which she experienced for a hundred years have clung to her, and kept her back in the race, but each year finds her a little more free from their deadening influence, and more awake to her own best interests. When once she has freed herself

from all these lazy habits, and is fully awake, then will come the vigorous bounds that will soon bring her even with her now more prosperous sisters.

It remains for us now to give in conclusion, a brief description of the city as it now is, situated upon a peninsular, formed by the Fox and East rivers, it presents the appearance of a compact and beautiful city. Its business streets are well paved with the Nicholson pavement, and many fine blocks of stores indicate the thrift and prosperity of the merchants. Its hotels are well kept, and are a source of comfort and satisfaction to many tourists and traveling men who visit the city. Socially, Green Bay has long ago made its reputation. It is renowned as one of the most hospitable cities of the north. This is the most valuable legacy left to her by the old-ease loving, good natured, and hospitable settlers. The very dwellings tell of the comfort and true sociability that pervades the city, and wear an air of hospitality that invites one to enter and assures him of a hearty welcome. The numerous churches speak clearly of the morals of the city, and their full attendance on the Lord's day, gives a proof of the citizens, faith that cannot be denied. The schools are well conducted and an honor to the city. We defer speaking of them here, as a full description of them will be found elsewhere.





ST. JOHN'S CATHOLIC CHURCH.

The early history of the Roman Catholic Church in the city of Green Bay, and that of the city proper, are so closely blended as to almost entirely forbid any elimination in treating of either the one or the other. In truth that of the church, is the history of the northwest in early ages, and presents a field of investigation rich in resources, and we who now see it as it is, can scarcely in imagination carry ourselves back to those primeval times, when the only human voice that broke the stillness of the forest, was the war-whoop of the Indian. And as we read the written history of the early pioneers of the Catholic faith in this territory, we pause in silent admiration of the zeal which prompted them to brave the hardships and dangers of those times. Supported by no human sympathy for their toil and suffering, with no eye to pity, no arm to save, they looked not to human praise for their reward. Filled with zeal for their cause, with love for their fellow man, and trusting entirely upon the all sustaining arm of Him whom they served, they literally gave their dust to dust, and ashes to ashes.

The earliest advent of the Jesuit Missionaries, into the country west of Detroit, seems to have been that of Nicolet, in the year 1640, who then visited what was known as the "Sea Tribe," supposed to be the Winnebagoes of Green Bay, and with whom he seems to have concluded a treaty in the name of France. Other missions were quickly established in diffrent parts of the territory, but it was not until the year 1669, that any permanent mission was organized in Green Bay. In December of that year, Father Alloues having left Father Marquette in charge of the mission at Lapoint, came to Green Bay, and celebrating his first mass on the festival of St. Francies Xavier called the mission by his name. In 1671, owing to the war which broke out

between the Sioux on the one hand, and the Ottawas and Hurons on the other, the Dacotas sent back to Marquette his books and pictures and declared war. Further progress by Lake Superior being now closed by this war, Green Bay became the chief hope of the missionaries, since through it, by the Fox River, they hoped to reach new nations. In 1672, the mission house during the absence of its missionary Andre, was destroyed by fire, but soon rebuilt upon the ruins of the old, and in the year 1678, we find him directing his little church of 500 christians, which slowly but gradually increased. A fine church had been erected by the Rapide des-Peres, partly it would seem by the aid of wester traders. among whom was Nicholas Perrot, one of the early western explorers. The present parish has now in its possession a silver remonstrance, which bears the following inscription upon the base, evidently made with a knife.

"This remonstrance was presented by Mr. Nicholas Perrot, to the Mission of St. Francis Xavier, in the Bay de puants 1686."

In 1680 Father Enjalran was in charge of the mission in Green Bay, which he seemed to have retained until 1688. From here all trace is lost, and nothing is placed upon record to tell its fate. In 1700, we find that Father Enjalran then at Quebec, was sent to induce the western tribes to appear at the great congress of 1701.

At that epoch we learn, that several missionaries were still on the Ottawa mission, among whom were Father J. Marest, but of their respective stations we have no tidings, and in 1706, missionaries at Mackinaw, finding it useless to continue their efforts, burned their house and chapel, and returned to Quebec. Soon after, Father J. J. Marest was induced to return, and in 1711, we find him superior of the Ottawa and Illinois missions.

In 1721, but two missionaries seem to have been engaged in the Ottawa mission, one at the Sault, and the other Father Chardon at Green Bay. Subsequently, the Indian wars plunged the west into disorder, and little is known of the Ottawa mission, until the time of the last Jesuite missionaries among the western tribes, and the whole mission devolved upon Marin Louis Lefrance, and Peter Janny, who were stationed at Mackinaw until 1765. Thus closed for the time, the labors of these truly great and good men—men whohad endured almost any hardship, feeling themselves well repaid for their labor, if they succeeded in the baptism of a single savage. Nor was their work useless; as late as the year 1820, aged men among the Indians were wont to breathe benedictions upon their heads, and point out the spot where they were accustomed to say their breviary.

After the close of the American revolution, attention was again called to these Indian missions, and in 1821, Gabriel Richard then stationed at Detroit, visited the missions upon the shore of Michigan, and also visited the posts of Drummond Island, Mackinaw, Sault St. Mary's and Green Bay.

In 1827, Dejean arrived in Mackinaw, and he soon had the satisfaction of seeing his efforts crowned with success. In 1830 Rev. Frederic Reze, reached Green Bay, and baptized a number of the Menomonees who had been previously instructed, and soon under the management of Mazzuchelli & Vendenbroeck, became the mother parish to many in the vicinity. Thus was permanently established what now forms the Parish of St. John. A small woden shanty was procured, and in it for sometime were held the services of the church. This stood on grounds in what is now termed "shanty-town", and being destroyed by fire, a building which then stood on the lot adjoining that on which the church now stands, was purchased of the Methodist Society, and having been enlarged, became the home of the parish.

From that time its growth has been rapid and permanent, and about the year 1848, the German portion of the parish, organized their present church of St. Mary's, and is now in a flourishing condition, it being the home of the Bishop, as also the cathedral. About the year 1860, the Irish portion of the church organized their society, and established themselves as such in Fort Howard; and about three years later, the Holland and Flemish portion erected their present church edifice, and now worship there, leaving the present St.

John's, as a French Catholic Church. In 1871 the old house, belonging to the society, was destroyed by fire. The erection of the present structure was commenced immediately thereafter, and completed in 1872. It is a handsome brick structure 132 feet in length, by 58 in width, on either corner of the south end are located square towers rising high in the air, rendering the church a conspicuous one from any portion of the city. It has a seating capacity, including gallery, nearly 1500, and was erected at a cost of about \$20,000. The parish now has a membership of 340 families, giving a congregation of about 1300, and is under the pastoral care of its very efficient Pastor, P. Crude, is in a flourishing condition.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH.

As has before been stated, this church was organized about twenty-five years since, by the German portion of St. John's Church, since which time they have been an independent organization. Commencing with but a few members, its growth has been rapid, and in 1868 the Bishop made it a cathedral, and here has his home. In connection herewith is also the St. Mary's Parochial School. The Bishop's house is a very neat and appropriate building, located on corner of Madison and Doty streets. The see, vacated by the death of the late Bishop, in September 1873, is yet unsupplied, and hence, the duties pertaining to that office, so far as they may be, are performed by the Rev. E. Daems as administrator of the Diocese. The cathedral proper, is under the pastoral care of Rev. A. N. Bushnell, with Rev. J. O'Brien assistant, and although having recently become the mother parish of the Polish Catholic Church, now numbers about 1500. The limited capacity of the cathedral building has necessitated a division of the congregation, and services are held a follows:

Private mass at 8 A. M., at 9 A. M. with sermon, High Mass with sermon at 10 A. M., and vespers at 2:30 P. M.

ST. WILLEBRORD'S HOLLAND CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Located on southeast corner of Adams and Doty streets. Parsonage one door south of church.

Services—First Mass 8 A. M. in Winter, and 7 A. M. in Summer, High Mass 10 A. M. in Winter, and 9 A. M. in Summer, Vespers 3 P. M., Sunday School 2. P. M.

The congregation of this church formerly belonged to to that of St. Mary's German Church, but in 1864, the congregation had become so large as to require either its division, or the erection of a larger building. It was decided by the Holland portion of the church to separate from St. Mary's, which they did in the same year with the approbation of Bishop Henni of Milwaukee. They purchased the old Court House of Green Bay for \$300, and the lot the church now occupies for \$1200. In 1865 an addition was made to the church building, costing \$900, but it not yet being of sufficient capacity, another addition was made, and vestryroom built, costing \$1200, in 1869, so that at the present time the edifice is large enough to accommodate those who worship there. In the same year that the last addition was made to the church, a parsonage was built of brick, costing \$3,200, and the lot which it occupies purchased at\$1,500.

The church is built of wood, und is 95 feet in length, by 30 in width, with a capacity for seating 400.

When this congregation separated from St. Mary's Church, it numbered 45 families; now it has increased to nearly 120.

St. Willebrord's is under the pastoral care of the Rev. Father Hoffen.

CHRIST CHURCH, (P. EPISCOPAL)

Located on northwest corner of Cherry and Madison sts. Rev. M. V. Averill, Rector. Rectory, No. 101 Cherry. Services Sunday at 10:30 A. M., and 7:30 P. M.

In 1823 the Rev. Eleazer Williams, then a missionary, visited Green Bay and performed the first services of the Church, in a log school house, which then stood on or near the grounds, now known as the farm of L. Grignon. In September of 1829, was organized the Parish of Christ Church, which was duly incorporated by the Legislature of Michigan, in October following, with the Rev. R. F. Cadle as Rector, Daniel Whitney and Albert G. Ellis, Wardens; Jas. D. Doty, William Dickensen. John Lawe, A. J. Irwin, J. P. Arndt, S. W. Beale, R. Irwin, Jr., and H. S. Baird as Vestry-men. This was the first Parish organized in the Diocese, and to her must we accord the proud distinction "The Mother Parish."

In 1830, the Rev. R. F. Cadle, acquired the title to a piece of land lying on the Fox River, between Green Bay and Depere, in the name of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and erected, as agent of that society, buildings, and established a school and mission. This then became the home of the infant parish, and so remained until 1832, when a school building having been fitted up for the purpose, in what was then the town of Navarino, was used as a church. This building is still standing, and forms a portion of a business block, located on south side of Cherry, between Washington and Adams street.

In 1848 was erected the present church edifice, and is now among the oldest in the city.

In 1866, the ladies of the parish organized a society, which was called the "Society of the Woman of Christ Church, and had for its object the establishment of a home for friendless and destitute persons, an account of which will be seen under the head of Cadle Home; and in 1872 was organized, by a portion of the members of this parish, the present parish of St. James.

The church now under the fostering care of the Rev. M. V. Averill, is in a flourishing condition, has about 106 communicants, a congregation of 375, and property valued at \$20,000.

ST. JAMES CHURCH (EPISCOPAL.)

As has been previously stated, this parish was organized in 1872, by a portion of the parish of Christ Church. Services were held in Whites Hall until a few weeks ago, since which time they have been held in the first ward school house.

They have now in process of erection, a beautiful church edifice, at a cost of about \$15,000, which, when completed, will be an ornament to the city, as well as a credit to the society. It is located on Monroe street near the south limits of the city, on an elevated plateau of ground, overlooking the greater part of the city; a more beautiful location could scarcely have been selected.

The parish is in a very flourishing condition, with communicants numbering about 40, and a congregation of about 100. It is under the Rectorship of Rev. R. F. Haff, whose residence is west side of Quincy, second north of Crooks.

Services Sunday at 10:30 A. M.

THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN GREEN BAY.

Pastor, Rev. William Crawford. Residence corner of Adams and Crooks street. Hours of service, 10:30 A. M., and 7:30 P. M., Sabbath School 12 M., Prayer meeting, Wednesday 7:30 P. M. Young people's meeting, Monday 7:30 P. M.

This church was organized January 9th, 1836, with twelve members. Its present membership is 164. Its property consists of one-fourth of a block, with house of worship and parsonage, at the corner of Adams and Crooks streets. The house of worship will seat about 350, and measures have been taken to enlarge it by 120 sittings.

During the past year 296 have been enrolled in the Sabbath School. Superintendent, Mr. L. W. Briggs. The S.

S. Library contains 525 volumes, and is under the charge of Messrs. J. M. Norris and C. W. Vroman. A branch school under the superintendence of Mr. W. S. Butler, is held at Oak Grove at 3 P. M.

For the year ending August 1st, 1874, the amount raised for the support of the Gospel in Green Bay, was \$2,847.43, and for charities, \$422.33.

FRENCH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Located on north side of Doty, between Adams and Jefferson streets.

Services every Sunday, 10:30 and 7:30.

Rev. L. Levasseur, Pastor. As has before been stated, this society recently purchased their present church building of the German Methodist Society, and although yet an infant organization having but about 40 members, it presents a vigorous growth.

CENTRAL, (BAPTIST) CHURCH.

The Central Baptist Church of Green Bay, is located on the southwest corner of Madison and Moravian streets; was organized in 1867 with ten members; it was without a permanent place of worship until September 1873, when its present chapel was dedicated. In November 1873, Rev. J G. Henshall, M. D. was called to pastorate, and is still laboring in that capacity, his residence is 526 Main street.

The present membership is thirty-three. Cost of Chapel \$3,500.

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GREEN BAY, WISCONSING

Hours of worship on Sunday, 10:30 A. M., 7:30 P. M., Sunday School at 12 M.

Communion on the first Sunday in every month. Prayer and Conference meeting every Wednesday evening, at 71/2 o'clock.

METHODIST CHURCH.

Madison Street Methodist Episcopal Church, located on the corner of Madison and School streets. Rev. James M. Walker, Pastor, residence 200 Madison street.

Services Sunday 10:30 A. M., and 7:30 P. M.

The first services of this church, were held in the city of Green Bay about the year 1832, by the Rev. J. M. Clark, who was sent here as a missionary from New York. Its prosperity has never been very marked, and although they have property valued at about \$10,000, and are financially well situated, they have a membership of only about 27. This number, however, under the pastoral care of the present minister, will no doubt be greatly increased in the near future.

GERMAN METHODIST SOCIETY.

This society was first organized as a mission in 1860, when subsequently a small house of worship was erected on north side of Doty, between Adams and Jefferson streets. This has recently been sold to the French Presbyterian Congregation, and the society have in contemplation the erection of a church building, on the corner of Doty and Clay street, contiguous to their parsonage.

This society is now in a flourishing condition, with about 60 members, under the care of the Rev. Wm. Hoekle.

Services every Sunday at 10:30 A. M. and 7:30 P. M.

ST. MARY'S PAROCHIAL SCHOOL.

Corner of Monroe and Doty streets.

This school was organized in December 1872, by the Rev. Father F. X. Pfaller, then in charge of St. Mary's Church, by procuring the aid of teachers from the Mother Superior at Milwaukee. Its object is that of teaching the children of both sexes of all religious belief, the common branches of education, although a restriction is made against boys over 12 years of age. Needle work is also taught twice during the week, while the price of tuition is merely nominal. Commencing with only 35 scholars, it has now over 300 in attendance, and is under the immediate management of Sisters of Notre Dame, and relatively that of St. Mary's Parish, the efficiency of which can be seen by increase of attendance.

URSALINE ACADEMY.

A school for girls, south east corner of Webster and Crooks street. This is in all respects similar to that of St. Mary's Parochial School, except it is for girls only, and under the management of Sisters of Order of St. Ursaline. It has an attendance of about 30 scholars, which number is constantly increasing.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The schools of the City are under the management and direction of a Board of Seven Commissioners, elected by the City Council. The board yearly elect one of their number President, and such other person Superintendent as they may deem qualified, who acts as Secretary.

In each of the three wards of the city is a school, accomodating the Primary and Intermediate Departments. Centrally located is the High School, with the Grammar Department. With but one exception, (Principal of High School,) all the departments are in charge of female teachers.

The school buildings will compare favorably with any in the State, being well built, conveniently arranged, seated

with single desks and kept in good condition.

The Board of Education holds monthly meetings, at which usually every member is present, giving careful attention to all matters brought up, pertaining to the interests of the schools.

A clearly defined course of study has been adopted, and the Primary and Intermediate Departments are thoroughly graded.

In the High School, a comprehensive course of study is followed as closely as is practicable.

CADLE HOME.

In the year 1866, the ladies of Christ Church, formed a society, for the purpose of procuring a home for orphans and for the friendless and the destitute. With so noble an object in view, it could not prove other than successful. It is true difficulties had to be overcome, and trials endured but they had their recompense in the relief afforded the suffering and destitute. Beginning with no available means, and relying wholly upon the benevolence of its members, and the charitable offerings of others, its first year showed an income of nearly one thousand dollars, which was immediately disbursed in the needs of the society.

In this manner it continued until the year 1870, when the late Bishop Armitage, succeeded in procuring a deed from the "Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society," of what is now known as the mission farm, in favor of the "Trustees of Funds and Property of the Diocese of Wisconsin," to be held by them for the benefit of the Church Home in Green Bay. In addition to this, in the following year, the surplus of money remaining in the hands of Bishop Armitage, and the Rev. R. W. Blow, then rector of Christ Church, and which had been donated in aid of the sufferers, by the fire in Northern Wisconsin, was with the consent of the donors, transferred to the society, and was the first pecuniary aid they received in of establishing the Home. In 1872 the "Cadle Home" was duly organized in accordance with the General Laws of the State.

Its objects were briefly stated to be, "for the purpose of

erecting, establishing and maintaining a home and hospital for the education and maintenance of orphan children, for the care and relief of sick, infirm, needy, destitute or homeless persons, for the care and support of aged and infirm clergymen, or for any or all of these, or such other charitable purposes as this corposation may from time to time undertake to carry into execution."

In January 1874, the society completed their present building upon the grounds procured for that purpose. Eventually this will be used for an asylum, while buildings for hospital purposes will be erected on the mission farm.

The Home is not a local organization, nor are its benefits to be confined to the Protestant Episcopal Church, while it will be under its management, it intends to furnish relief to the homeless and destitute irrespective of any creed.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.

We regret that the limits of our work, prevent us giving a lengthy account of this society.

Organized with the laudable purpose of cultivating the most beautiful of all arts, music, its success can be foretold with almost unerring certainty. In truth it is an art which brings its own reward, for who that has feeling, ever listened to its ravishing strains unmoved? and when aided by that energetic perseverence, and laudable desire to excel, so characteristic of the members of this society, its perfect rendition is only a question of time. We have not had the pleasure of listening to the society's rendition of any of its Oratorias or Cantatas, but judging from what we have seen and heard at its recent rehearsals, are convinced that it has a fore most place among the similar societies of the northwest. Its examples should be followed by the organization of societies in many other cities, and thus call into more active being, the sweet concord

of soul and purpose, making life purer and better by its ennobling and soothing influence. Let us hope its harmony may always be as perfect as that of its music, and no discordant sounds, ever break its sweetly swelling strains. Great credit is due Mr. G. L. North, its efficient conductor for the high standard the society has attained, and to those who have so nobly sustained him in his efforts in its behalf. We should be glad to particularize in favor of many of its members, but space forbids, and herewith give the report of the society, which conveys in language, far stronger than ours, the estimation in which it is held.

PHILHARMONIC ANNIVERSARY.—" August the third" is a notable day in history. It was on that memorable day that "Ah Sin" the "heathen Chinee" achieved his wonderful success at Euchre, "the game he did not understand." It was also on "August the third" 1872, that the Philharmonic Society of this city had its birth, and the success achieved by the society in the past two years, is quite as remarkable as the wonderful advancement of Ah Sin.

The society on last Monday entered upon its third year, and a condensed statement of its condition, taken from the more detailed accounts, rendered by the Secretary and Treasurer, may not be uninteresting.

The Treasurer reports that the society has received since the organization in August 1872, the sum of \$1,594.59. As this has nearly all come from our own people, and those living in neighboring places, we append a list of the sources from which it came:

From the Esther Concerts, four nights, \$716.73
From the First Miscellaneous concert, \$225.75.
From the First Belshazzar concert, four nights, \$834.90
From the Concert by Bach's Orchestra, \$237.18.

From Honorary Members two years, \$730.

The balance of the amount as given above has been received from the initiations and dues of Active Members.

The Secretary reports that there are now on the rolls of the society, the names of one-hundred and twenty-five *live* Active Members. This does not include those who have withdrawn from the society.

The statement of the Treasurer showed, that although the expenses of the society have been enormous, there remains on hand and due from active members, nearly one-hundred dollars; and that all accounts against the society, from whatever source, have been paid. This, considering the fact that the society is the possessor of a fine eight-hundred-dollar Chickering piano, and music and books which cost them about two-hundred dollars, is a very flattering exhibit.

It was decided to resume the weekly rehearsals, which will be held in Turners' Hall, every Tuesday evening.

GREEN BAY LODGE, NO. 19, I. O. O. F.

This Lodge was instituted July 14th, 1847, by Special Deputy, Herman L. Page, then Grand Marshal, under a Dis-

pensation issued by Grand Master John D. Kinsman. It is an interesting incident of its history that Hope No. 17, Friendship No. 18, and Green Bay No. 19, were the first three Lodges instituted by authority of the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin, and these three were authorized by one, and the same resolution, adopted on the 10th day of June, 1847, the very next day after the institution of the Grand Lodge itself. Thus was Green Bay Lodge coupled, in the very hour of her conception, with her lovely twin sisters, Hope and Friendship, and the triplet became the first born daughters of our now prominent and powerful Grand Jurisdiction.

Its charter members were Timothy O. Howe, Henry O. Scholtz, Henry S. Baird, Daniel W. King, John Day, and Charles L. Wheelock, the last one of whom still retains his active membership in the Lodge. The institution took place in the building now known as the Bay City House, on the corner of Walnut and Washington streets. The first officers installed were H. S. Baird, N. G.; H. O. Scholtz, V. G.; J. V. Suydam, Secretary; G. S. Armstrong, Treasurer; T. C. Morgan, W.; T. O. Howe, C.; E. S. Disbrow, R. S. N. G.; D. W. King, L. S. N. G.; C. L. Wheelock, R. S. V. G.; John Day, L. S. V. G.: E. Hart, I. G.; T. Bennett, O. G.; A. C. Robinson, R. S. S.; J. W. Arndt, L. S. S.

On the evening of institution, and previously thereto, nine applicants were initiated into the Order under Dispensation, among whom were H. S. Baird, H. O. Scholtz, D. W. King and C. L. Wheelock.

Of the first 16 years of its existence, nothing is on record pertaining to Green Bay Lodge, save the statistical items, and other occasional references to it in the proceedings of the Grand Lodge. During this interval the Lodge suffered some serious misfortunes. Once it was burned out; and at another time it lost all the funds in its treasury \$800 by theft.

On the 11th of November 1863, every vestige of the the Lodge, except its living members, was again swept away by the destructive conflagration that annihilated so much of the business portion of the city.

This last and greatest disaster, instead of disheartening the

Brothers, served rather to rouse their energies, and give new impetus to their associated endeavors. Not a single session of the Lodge was omitted, but on the 17th, six days after the fire, the regular meeting was held in the Masonic Hall, generously tendered them, "for such a period as their necessities might require." Go on was the prompt, unhesitating and unanimous voice of the Lodge—and it has gone on, from that day to this, multiplying in numbers, increasing in power and influence, and doing its appropriate works of beneficence, till now it ranks among the first Lodges of the Jurisdiction, numbering 130 active members, and possessing in common with Hermann Lodge No 111, the handsomely furnished hall, corner of Adams and Cherry streets, together with cash funds and other property, entirely its own, to the value of about \$2,500.

Green Bay Lodge, besides contributing "more than its share of members," on the institution of the Lodges at Fonddu Lac, Oshkosh and Waupun, has regularly "swarmed" three times, the "hived" results being Hermann No. 111, Oconto No. 190, and DePere No. 222.

This Lodge has the honor of having supplied to the Grand Lodge one Grand Master and Grand Representative, the Hon. M. P. Lindsley, and to the Grand Encampment one Grand Patriarch, Prof. Werden Reynolds, the latter gentleman being also the compiler of the Wisconsin Digest.

The Lodge holds its regular meetings on Tuesday of each week.

HERMANN LODGE, I. O. O. F.

Hermann Lodge No. 111. I. O. O. F., was instituted March 7th, 1866, by D. D. Grand Master B. C. Gardner. Charter members Louis Scheller, Robert Graner, Joseph Nick, F. Charles Jansen, Ernest Straubel, August Strauhel.

First elective officers, Louis Scheller, N. G.; Robert Graner, V. G.; F. Charles Jansen, Secretary; Earnest Straubel Treasurer. The Lodge has enjoyed an uninterrupted course of harmony and prosperity from the first, and embraces among its members, some of the worthiest and most intelligent of our German citizens. It numbers about 80 members, owns equal interest with Green Bay Lodge in Odd Fellows Hall on Cherry street, and has in cash funds at the present date, about \$2,400, with \$225 worth of regalia and fixtures.

The present officers are Charles Hartung, N. G.; Hillmar Danz, V. G.; F. Charles Jansen, Secretary, Edward Kittner, Treasurer.

Its regular meetings are held on Wednesday evening of each week.

SARAH LODGE, No. 16, I. O. O. F.

Of the Rebekah Degree was chartered January 19th, 1871, with nine Brothers and ten Sisters. It works in the German Language, and holds monthly meetings on the second Friday of each month, in Odd Fellows Hall.

GOLDEN RULE ENCAMPMENT, No. 18, I. O. O. F.

Was instituted April 25th, 1867, by M. W. Grand Patriarch D. S, Morse, assisted by Grand Scribe, L. B. Hills, D. D., Grand Patriarch Sam Ryan, Jr., and other distinguished Brethern of the Order.

Its Charter members were M. P. Lindsley, H. Martin, J. A. Pinto, O. B. Graves, C. C. Lovett, B. C. Gardner, Werden

Reynolds, E. C. Keeler, and T. J. Bailey. The first elective officers installed were J. A. Pinto, C. P.; M. P. Lindsley, H. P.; B. C. Gardner, S. W.; Werden Reynolds, *Scribe*; H. Martin *Treasurer*; C. C. Lovett, J. W.

Five applicants from Green Bay Lodge were admitted, and all the Degrees were conferred upon them immediately upon the organization of the Encampment. Its present membership is about 50.

BOHEMIAN AID AND EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

This society was organized June 16th, 1862, and as its name indicates, is a benevolent one. Its object being mutual improvement in the common branches of the English and Bo-

hemian Languages, and the relief of sick and indigent members. It is not a secret society, and is open to all Bohemians who may choose to enter. In case of sickness a weekly compensation of four dollars is paid out of the society fund, and in case more is needed, it is paid by contribution, its Treasury being supplied by annual dues. They now have a mebership of 23.

Its officers are John Safranek, President; Anton Cech, Secretary; W. Peck, Treasurer.

POST OFFICE.

The Post Office is located on the west side of Adams, between Pine and Cherry streets, convenient to the business portion of the city. Few if any, that we have seen, are so completely arranged for the accommodation of the public, and the rapid transaction of its increasing business as this Nearly thirteen hundred boxes and drawers are arranged for the convenience of its patrons, and the extent of its business may be approximated, when we consider the fact that nearly 65,000 letters are transmitted through it during each month, in addition to several tons of printed matter.

The Money Order Department showed receipts and payments for the month of June, of \$9,026.89, and is constantly on the increase.

Too much praise cannot be accorded to Mr. W. C. E. Thomas the present P. M., for his able management, and the thanks of the community are due Messrs. W. E. Thomas, Chas. H. Briot, and the remainder of the force, for their gentlemanly and courteous attention.

Few cities, if any, of like size can boast of a better Fire Department than Green Bay. During our stay we had the privilege of seeing its practical working, and are free to say, that it seems to be ably and efficiently managed. The water supply for the principal business thoroughfare is the Fox River, while the residence portion is provided with seven reservoirs, fed by springs, giving in most sections, an ample supply for at least ordinary fires. The Fire Department consists of two steamers and two hand engines, and are manned by four companies.

ASTOR NO. I, (HAND ENGINE,)

Has about 35 members, with John Jacob, Jr., Foreman; Anton Masse, Secretary.

GERMANIA NO. 2, (STEAMER ENTERPRISE.)

The engine is an "Amoskeag," of second class and in fine working order. It is manned by about 25 members, with Aug. Brauns as Foreman; G. Bong as Secretary. J. F. Berttes the Engineer, is eminently qualified for his position, and has in addition to his immediate duties as engineer of the Enterprise, the superintendency of the mechanical portion of the department. The perfect working of the apparatus, speak in strong language of his ability for this important trust.

GUARDIAN NO. 2, (STEAMER GUARDIAN.)

This is a "Clapp & Jones" engine of third class, and is also manned by a company of 25 members. With L. Dennis as Engineer is always on hand, always ready to perform its full share of the duties, and is under Foremanship of C. W. Tracy, while Secretaryship is held by F. W. Basche.

FRANKLIN CO., NO. 3, (HAND ENGINE.)

This company numbers 35 members, although compelled to draw their engine by hand, are generally among the first to reach the scene of action. They are a fine body of men, and in excellent drill. John Nic, Foreman.

WARD BOUNDARIES.

The First Ward comprises all that portion of the city of Green Bay, bounded on the south by city limits, west by Fox River, north by a line drawn equidistant between Chicago and Crooks streets, and east by East River.

Second Ward constitutes that portion, bounded on the south by line equidistant between Chicago and Crooks sts., west by Fox River, north by a line midway between Pine

and Cherry streets, to intersection of Eleventh, thence north and east to East River, east by Newburry Tract and East River.

Third Ward, bounded south by above described north line of Second Ward, west by Fox River, north by city limits, being south line of Harvey street, and east by Pleasant street.

STREET DIRECTORY.

Fox River on the west of the city, is taken as a guide for streets running north and south, and all streets are numbered from it as they intersect Main and Crooks streets. Walnut street being that upon which is located the north bridge of the Fox River, is taken as a guide for the streets intersecting it, and are numbered north and south from it.

Adams street, 2d east of Fox River, extends from River north, to Polier south.

Baird street, 13th north of Fox River, extends from north to south limits.

Cass street, 6th south of Walnut, and 6th north of south limits, extends from Fox River west to East River east.

Cedar street, 4th north of Walnut, extends from Fox Rive west to Quincy east, thence follows bend of river to Clayr thence across River to east limits.

Cherry street, 1st north of Walnut, extends from Fox River on the west, to city limits east.

Chicago street, 4th south of Walnut extends from Fox River to city limits, and is intercepted between Jefferson and Madison by Calhoun square.

Clay street, 10th east of Fox River.

Congress street, short street, south side of Webster square Crooks street, 3d south of Walnut, extends from Fox River to city limits, between Madison and Monroe. Doty street, 1st south of Walnut, from Fox River to city limits east.



City of Fort Howard,

WISCONSIN.

The history of Green Bay is necessarily, to a very great extent, the history of Fort Howard. Their settlement was simultaneous, and to all intents and purposes they always have been and always will be one city. Separated only by the Fox river they are united by Bridge and Ferry so completely that access from one to the other is at all times easy.

The Depots of the Chicago and Northwestern and the Green Bay and Minnesota Railroad lines are situated here. The trade of the place has thereby been much stimulated, and the population increased so rapidly, that it was thought best in furtherance of its prosperity, that a seperate city charter should be obtained, and in 1872 Fort Howard became a chartered city. Whether the two places shall always remain under different organizations or not is immaterial. In the eyes of the country at large they will always be considered as one. The population of Fort Howard is now about one-half that of Green Bay, and is rapidly increasing. The buildings of the old Fort which gave its name to the city, and for many years were objects of curiosity to the tourists have now disappeared, and the name of the city alone remains to perpetuate their memory.

The history of Fort Howard would not be at all complete with out a description of the warehouse, docks and elevator of Messrs. Elmore & Kelley, to whose enterprise very much of the prosperity of Green Bay and Fort Howard is due. The elevator is a most substnatial structure, costing \$80,000. and is 60x128 feet in size and 100 feet high. It has a capacity of 25,000 bushels of wheat, and can elevate 30,000 bushels of wheat per hour. The largest propellors find plenty of water beside it, and the railroad track runs up to it. The docks of Messrs Elmore & Kelley are 800 ft. long, and a good depth of water is obtained for the entire length, while the rail road track runs beside it, making it one of the most convenient and extensive docks in the State. A line of first class propellors runs between these docks and Buffalo, leaving Fort Howard twice each week.

Another of the important enterprises of Fort Howard, and second to none in adding to the growth of the city, is the Monitor Iron Works, employing one hundred workmen, and turning out such work as will but add to its daily growing reputation.

We must not fail in this connection to speak of the Ft. Howard boiler shops, where the style of workmanship is fully up to the necessaries of the case, that is, to make secure, what is so deadly in its results when of bad material or of poor workmanship. These gentlemen can be relied upon in both these respects.

The manufacturing establishment of C. Schwarz & Co. is also entitled to more than a passing notice. The employment it funishes to the many who are engaged in its operation add to the material welfare of the city, while the gentlemanly proprietors justly deserve the liberal patronage they receive. All kinds of work done in their line is performed by them in a neat and durable manner, and speaks in glowing terms of their efficiency in their line of business.

The firm of J. P. Laird & Co. have done much also in improving the southern portion of the city. Their mills for the manufacture of shingles, part of which are located here, give employment to many, while their manner of doing business is such as to win them hosts of friends.

ST. ANDREWS SOCIETY OF GREEN BAY.

Prompted by a sense of duty and filial affection for their countrymen, a few of the patriotic sons of Auld Scotland met and resolved, in the fall of 1867, to form and organize a society of Scotchmen, and further agreed that it should be named the "St. Andrews Society of Green Bay." A Constitution was accordingly framed and adopted by a duly organized body, and officers also duly elected to hold office for one year, and perform their respective duties imposed upon them as prescribed in their constitution; the officers to consist of President, 1st and 2d Vice Presidents. Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Chaplain, Physician, and a Board of Managers to look after the interest of subjects that were entitled to the aid and counsel of said society, conditioned in the constitution, and to report from time to time their proceedings at the quarterly or yearly meetings in accordance with their code of By-Laws. Said conditions empowered said board to aid and counse! all Scotchmen, wives, sons and daughters of Scotchmen, that might arrive on this great continent from other shores seeking homes and employment, but more especially in this section of country, to the relief necessary, whatever their circumstances might be, and in view of the foregoing facts, about 30 of his most loyal sons rallied around the standard of their newly born existence as a society, and pledged themselves in good faith to each other by ascribing their respective names, and contributing of their means to the Constitution, and to the charitable principles therein involved.

In the fall of 1873 the society held its 6th anniversary, and in honor due to it it has enjoyed through these years of unusual trial very refreshing seasons of unalloyed joy in the quarterly and more particularly in the yearly reunion of its members and friends, which is one of the leading features in the organization, where they may have time and opportunity to meet together at least once in the year to to encourage, to sympathise, and to cultivate and extend to each other that brotherly love so necessary (in this world and in the world to come) in the protection and fostering of all true happiness. And although at periods during the lapse of time its

members have been greatly augmented by accessions that it rejoiced over, and diminished by removals and deaths that it mourned over, nevertheless the standing of its membership has been remarkably uniform and tranquil, and at the present day it has on its roll about 40 good and faithful members, and would here extend a cordial invitation to all their loyal and sympathizing countrymen to come forward and join in in their ranks, and cooperate with them in their good work of mercy. Relief has been extended to the needy in several instances, with humility and fullness of heart from donor and receiver, aid and counsel to to others in varied forms, which was invariably received with gratitude, and in every instance where needed assistance or charity has come under the observation of the Managers, or even the members, they have come to the rescue; and may God speed the designs and philanthropic principals of this society.

The present Secretary, William Hood, was chosen its first President, and the present Mayor of the City of Fort Howard, Hon. David Burns, is its present President.

MORAVIAN CHURCH.

Located on corner of Fourth Street and Fifth Avenue.

Services Sunday 10:30 A. M. and 2:30 P. M. Sunday School
3:30 P. M.

Rev. A. M. Iverson, Pastor. Residence south-east corner Fourth Street and Fifth Avenue.

This society was organized Sept. 21st, 1866. by the present pastor, with but seven communicants and about twenty non-communicants. Its services were at first held in a school building, where this infant congregation was wont to assemble. In a short time they had the misfortune to loose the faithful services of their worthy pastor, and were more or less scattered until he was again induced to return to his former home and the charge of that flock of which he was the moving spirit in its organization. Gladly was his advent among them received, and with redoubled energy and faith, they set about the work of calling together again the wandering portion of their fold. And how well they labored is seen when we take into consideration the fact that at the expiration of only a few years they were enabled to dedicate their own beautiful little church, entirely free from incumbrance, an honor to themselves and a fitting tribute of devotion to their Master. Since that time their growth has been steady and permanent, and they now have a membership of forty-nine communicants and twenty non-communicants, with a property valued at \$5,000.

NORWEGIAN EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH.

Located on Broadway.

Services Sunday at 10:30 A. M. and 7:30 P. M. Rev. T. H. Dahl, Pastor.

The society was organized January 6th, 1867, with a membership of thirty-seven communicants, under the pastoral care of Rev. S. M. Kregnaes, who continued his services until July of the same year. The Rev. J. Olsen then assumed the duties of pastorate, and the following month commenced the erection of a church edifice, which was completed in the same year. In Jan. 1873, the present pastor accepted the pastorate, and in the fall of the same year commenced the enlargement of the church, and added thereto a spire, all of which was completed in May of 1874. The whole cost of structure being now about \$3,500.

The prosperity of the society since its organization has been very flattering, and speaks well for those in charge as also the society. Organized with a membership, as previously stated, of but thirty-six, it has now increased to one hundred and seventy, and is in a fair way to increase its membership.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

Located on north-east corner Broadway and Hubbard Streets. Services Sunday 10:30 A. M. and 7:30 P. M.

Rev. Mathew Evans, Pastor. Residence west side of Cedar, between Hubbard and Dousman Streets.

This society was organized October 16th, 1869, with thirty-five members, and has increased in growth and prosperity until it now numbers eighty members, and has a property valued at about \$2,200.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

Located on south west corner Fourth Avenue and Third Streets.

Services Sunday 10:30 A. M. and 7:30 P. M.

D. C. Curtis, Pastor.

The Congregational Church in Fort Howard was organized January 6th, 1855, with membership of seven. The first minister was Rev. Charles W. Monroe, who served the church from its origen to May_1st, 1856, 16 months Under his supervision a house of worship was built. The second minister was J. T. Marsh, who commencing labor Sept. 1857, served one year. From Sept. 1855 to Nov. 1863 all public services were suspended. They were then resumed under the ministry of the present acting pastor Rev. D. C. Curtis, the church consisting of ten members. The whole number which has been added to the church is ninety. Present membership sixty-one.

BAPTIST CHURCH.

The Baptist Church in Fort Howard is situated near the North East corner of Chestnut and Main Streets. The Pastor is Rev. F. S. Witter, whose residence is at the parsonage North of and adjoining the church.

The Sabbath morning service is at 10:30 o'clock, to which strangers are most cordially invited. The evening service is at 7 P. M. The Sabbath School is at 12 M., the Superintendent of which is Mr. O. Gray. Prayer meeting Wednesday-eve in the session room of the church at 7:30 P. M. Young Folks' devotional meeting Thursday-eve at the same hour and place.

The church was organized in Green Bay in September. 1851. It began with seven members and now has one hundred and seven. It was afterward transplanted to the western shore of the River in Fort Howard. Under the pastorate of Rev. S. Adams the first church edifice was built. The present pastor, Rev. F. S. Witter, waa called from Iowa, and preached his first sermon in Fort Howard October 13th, 1872. He was educated in the state of New York for the law, and was ordained in 1871. One of the most remarkable revivals that ever visited a City occurred under his pastorate. The pastor baptized ten from his Bible class of young men and women. The whole City was stirred, and the membership of his church more than doubled in nine weeks. Under his pastotate the present new and elegant church edifice, the finest in the City, and one of the best in the State, was built, The architect is J. 'AcDonnell of Green Bay. The style is decorated Gothic. It is 34x58, chancel 10x13, pastor's library and study each 9x14, session room 43x12. The main spire on the corner is 115 high. The whole church is furnished with stained windows, and of beautiful octagon glass made by Misch & Bro., 217 East Water street, Chicago. Clark & Brown of Appleton, Wis., builders. The stranger can find a free seat in this elegant House of Worship and a hospitable reception.

POST OFFICE

The Post Office is under the management of J. Taylor, with J. H. Taylor assistant.

The amount of business transacted at this office may be seen at a glance, by examining the following:

The boxes, about 400 in number, are conveniently arranged, and no pains are spared on the part of P. M. and assistant to accomodate the public. Office hours, 6:30 A. M. to 7:30 P. M. Sunday 9 to 10 A. M.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Fire Department of Fort Howard, although limited in extent, is an important auxiliary in protection of property against the fire fiend. The engine is of the Button & Son manufacture, of third class, and thus far has proved itself a first class Engine. It is a matter of credit to the different Fire companies of Green Bay and Fort Howard, that they mutually assist each other and in this manner increase the efficiency of each.

Such good feeling and unity of purpose cannot but prove pleasant to their members, as also beneficial to the Cities.

The water supply has heretofore been the Fox River, but drains are now being laid from it to supply reservoirs in different parts of the city, which cannot but prove valuable in time of need.
