POSTPONED REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Friday, October 14, 1938, 10 A.M.
(Scheduled date October 12, 1938)

President Wilkie was delayed at his office and upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That Regent Backus take the chair.

Upon motion of Regent Kelly, seconded by Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the last meeting of the Board held on June 17, 1938, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

An application of WHA for improved facilities was presented to the Regents.
(Copy on file.)

Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Hones, it was VOTED, That the application of the State Highway Commission to relocate

the highway at the Ashland Branch Station, involving the use of about 2.3 acres of land and the rearrangement of farm buildings, orchards, experimental plots, drives and other facilities, be approved with the understanding that this will be done without expense to the University.

The matter of the establishment of an eight-week summer session was discussed. Upon motion of Regent Kolly, seconded by Regent Baker, it was

VOTED, That the matter be laid over to another meeting of the Regents for further consideration.

The following resolution of the Wisconsin State Employees Association, requesting evening courses at the University, was presented:

"WHEREAS, there are living in the City of Madison several thousand state employees selected from every section of the state, many of whom are eager to continue their education by means of evening classes, and

WHEREAS, experience in Minneapolis-St. Paul and in Washington, D. C., where a college education is available to all in evening classes, has shown that those employees who want to continue their education and do continue their education on a part-time basis while they are working, make the best and most conscientious employees, and

WHEREAS, there is at present little or no opportunity to continue such education on a part-time basis, notwithstanding the State University is located in Madison.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Wisconsin State Employees Association urge the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin to provide for a complete schedule of undergraduate work in the evening, and to transfer as many as possible of its graduate classes, and of its professional classes, including Law and Engineering, to evening hours.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution shall be sent to the Governor, to the President of the University of Wisconsin, to the President of the Board of Regents, to the Dean of the Extension Division of the University, to the State Director of Personnel, and to the Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the Wisconsin State Employees Association.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in case the Board of Regents of the University does not have adequate funds to carry out this recommendation before the next legislative session, the Legislative Committee of the Wisconsin State Employees Association is hereby directed to endeavor to secure the introduction of legislation to require the establishment of undergraduate, graduate and professional courses in the University during evening hours."

Upon motion of Regent Hones, seconded by Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That the matter be referred to the Educational Committee.

At 3:20 P.M. President Wilkie arrived and took the chair.

The President discussed at some length the needs for additional funds for the coming biennium. Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Kelly, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to prepare the biennial budget in accordance with the discussion just had, and present it to the State Budget Director. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "aye".

A petition from the students of the School of Commerce requesting a new building to adequately house the School of Commerce was presented and was referred to the Business Committee.

A communication was presented from Victor E. Albright of Madison, tendering a gift of \$5000 to establish a perpetual endowment, the income to be used for scholarships. Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Hones, it was

VOTED, That the gift be accepted in accordance with the terms outlined in his letter.

A communication was presented from the students residing in Unit "C" of the new men's dormitories requesting that one of the dormitories be named in honor of D. L. Halverson, present director of the dormitories. Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Glover, it was

VOTED, That this matter be referred to the Committee on Student Life and General Welfare.
