Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on November 10, 1956, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Jensen, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in EXHIBIT A and EXHIBIT A-1, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Actions by the President, since the November 10, 1956, meeting of the Board of Regents, covering resignations and terminations, appointments, leaves of absence, changes in status or salary of personnel, and resignations to accept other U.W. appointments (EXHIBIT B attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

President Fred requested Professor Cutlip to report on behalf of the Special Committee, which had been appointed to consider what to do regarding replacing the "sifting and winnowing" plaque which had been taken from the front of Bascom Hall by vandals.

Professor Cutlip stated that the shock and dismay which went through the University family, when the "sifting and winnowing" plaque was stolen from the front of Bascom Hall, turned to anger and resentment; and, that finally, these emotions gave way to inquiries by people asking what they could do to replace the plaque. The Board of Visitors was the first group to come forward and offer to replace it.

The students, through their representatives, voted to authorize a fund-raising drive. The Class of 1910, which gave this symbol to the University, represented by Judge F. Ryan Duffy, offered to replace it. Private individuals offered to anonymously provice the funds for its replacement.

Professor Cutlip reported that the question was raised as to who should have the honor to replace this plaque. He stated that President Fred, realizing that the plaque belonged to everyone who loved and cared for the University (the students, the faculty, the staff, the alumni, the Board of Visitors, the Board of Regents, and the people throughout the state) should have the democratic opportunity of participating in not only replacing the plaque but in re-dedicating it and perpetuating the ideals for which it stands. From this came the idea of a Freedom Plaque Fund, with everyone having an opportunity to voluntarily share in replacing and re-dedicating the plaque, in dramatizing the story it tells, and in informing a new generation what the plaque means. He stated that if the Regents approve such an idea, they will have done a good thing in the cause of freedom of learning.

Regent Werner, to carry out the ideas of Professor Cutlip, moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

Sixty-two years ago, upon an occasion of sharp controversy, the Regents of the University declared: "it is of the utmost importance that the investigator should be absolutely free to follow the indications of truth wherever they may lead," and, that "the great state University of Wisconsin should ever encourage that continual and fearless sifting and winnowing by which alone the truth can be found."

The search for truth is the central duty of the University, but truth will not be found if the scholar is not free, it will not be understood if the student is not free, it will not be used if the citizen is not free. At a time when both truth and freedom are under attack, the University of Wisconsin must seek the one and defend the other. It must employ with utmost energy the power of truth and freedom for the benefit of mankind.

To symbolize these principles the Class of 1910 conceived and gave to the University for all time the tablet which for forty one years graced Bascom's walls.

An act of vandalism has removed from the walls of Bascom Hall a plaque which proclaimed our faith and which had become a symbol of the spirit of Wisconsin. Its meaning cannot be taken from the hearts and minds of those who cherish learning.

The numerous offers to aid us in replacing this plaque tell us of the many who share our faith. In order that all may join in this endeavor we believe that we should establish a Freedom Flaque Fund. It should be used not alone for the re-casting of this symbol of our ideals but also for the perpetuation of the principles for which it stands.

(Coni.)

The University will ever be dedicated to the truth and to the freedom that gives it life.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board of Regents go on record in support of establishing a Freedom Plaque Fund.

The motion to adopt the above resolution was seconded by Regent Jensen, and it was voted unanimously.

Regent Jensen suggested that, if sufficient funds were obtained, the Faculty Committee might consider placing a similar plaque at The University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee and at the Extension Centers throughout the state. Regent Rennebohm suggested that the committee should consider encouraging the people in the areas of various branches and centers of the University to provide the funds for plaques in those locations. Professor Cutlip stated that the committee would consider these suggestions for the use of funds obtained in excess of those required to replace the plaque on Bascom Hall. He stated that many other suggestions had been received, such as reprinting the booklet "Sifting and Winnowing" by Theodore Herfurth, and the establishment of a "freedom book shelf" in the library.

Vice President Peterson presented the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Reports of Actions Taken numbered I. and II., listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Vice President Peterson presented the Report of Status of Applications for Construction Loans from Housing and Home Finance Agency (see Item III. listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached). He reported that the loans for the New Chadbourne Hall project and the first 100 units of Married Student Housing would be at the rate of 2-3/4% per annum, and that the loans for the Men's Dormitories south of Kronshage and the second 100 units of Married Student Housing would probably be at the rate of 2-7/8%.

Vice President Peterson reported that the Regents had requested that a recommendation be prepared authorizing the preparation of plans for additional dormitories to house 1,000 students, and he presented the following recommendation:

That the administrative officers of the University and Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized and directed to have prepared preliminary plans and specifications for dormitories to house approximately 1,000 students, in addition to the dormitories previously authorized, which include, in addition to those now under constructive

tion, 600 units east of Tripp and Van Hise Halls, 500 men's units south of Kronshage, 100 additional Married Student Apartments, and the replacement of Chadbourne Hall; and that Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to negotiate terms and conditions for borrowing the necessary funds for the student housing authorized by the Regents.

Regent Renk moved the adoption of the above recommendation, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger. In reply to a question, Vice President Peterson reported that additional dormitory spaces authorized by this recommendation, together with existing dormitories and additional dormitories previously authorized by the Regents, would provide University housing for over 5,000 students.

Regent Jensen suggested that, because of the difficulty of attracting good graduate students due to lack of housing, a study be made to determine whether some of the additional 1000 units to be provided under this recommendation should be allocated to married students. Vice President Peterson reported that such a study would be made; and that recommendations will subsequently be presented to the Regents regarding the locations of these 1000 additional units and their distribution between types of students.

The question was put on the motion and it was voted.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That the Report of Actions Taken numbered IV., listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for November, 1956, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit D appended to EXHIBIT C attached)

The Secretary reported that the next meeting of the Regents and the next meeting of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education are both scheduled for 10 A.M. on Saturday, January 12, 1957. Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That the By-Laws be suspended; and that the time of the January 12, 1957, Regent meeting be changed from 10 A.M. to 8 A.M.

President Gelatt reported that the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education is getting its work organized so that it will probably have to meet only quarterly beginning with the January meeting.

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That the resignation of Erwin H. Ackerknecht, professor of the history of medicine, Medical School, be accepted to take effect January 31, 1957.
- 2. That the retirement of Harry Steenbock, professor of biochemistry, be approved; to take effect December 15, 1956; and that he be granted emeritys status.
- 3. That Arthur W. Mansfield, professor of physical education men and intercollegiate athletics, be granted leave of absence, with pay, from February 9 to March 7 or 8, 1957.
- 4. That W. D. Knight, Professor of Commerce and Director of the Bureau of Business Research, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from December 1, 1956 through June 30, 1957.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the appointment of Donald M. Anderson, associate professor of art and art education, be reduced from full-time to one-third time for the second semester of 1956-57; and that his salary be reduced accordingly from \$3,087.50 to \$1,029.17 for the semester.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Vice President of Student Affairs, Jerold Johnson be granted full refund of the incidental fee paid for the fall term 1956-57.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED:--That this institution hereby agrees with the NATIONAL ACADEMY OF DESIGN and with the NATIONAL COLLECTION OF FINE ARTS at Washington, administered by the SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION, to receive from the NATIONAL ACADEMY OF DESIGN the painting "Self-portrait" by Gerald Mofchum purchased from the Henry W. Ranger Fund and hereby

agrees to hold same subject to and abide by the terms stated in the Will of the late Henry W. Ranger which reads as follows:

"All pictures so purchased are to be given by the Council to Art institutions in America, or to any library or other institutions in America maintaining a gallery open to the public, all such gifts to be upon the express condition that the National Collection of Fine Arts at Washington, administered by the Smithsonian Institute (Institution) shall have the option and right, without cost, to take, reclaim and own any picture for their collection, provided they exercise such option and right at any time during the five year period beginning ten years after the artist's death and ending fifteen years after his death, and if such option and right is not exercised during such period, the picture shall remain and be the property of the institution to which it was first given. The words 'America' and 'American' shall be construed as equivalent to 'North America' and 'North American' respectively."

RESOLVED: --That the President and Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to execute such instrument on behalf of this institution as may be necessary or desirable to carry the foregoing resolution into effect.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Regent Jones presented the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee:

That the attached resolution, EXHIBIT E attached, relating to the Village of Shorewood Hills, be adopted.

At the request of Regent Jones, Vice President Peterson explained the purpose of the proposed resolution, which had been requested by the Village of Shorewood Hills. He recalled terms of the present agreement with the Village of Shorewood Hills relating to the providing of various services by the Village of Shorewood Hills in connection with the construction and operation of the University Houses project on the Eagle Heights site. The relationships which have existed with the Village of Shorewood Hills in connection with that agreement have been entirely satisfactory. The proposed resolution was requested by the Village of Shorewood Hills in connection with the agreement between the Village and the Wisconsin University Building Corporation covering the furnishing of services by the Village for the Married Students Apartments projects, which are being constructed by the University on the former Pharmaceutical Gardens site. Vice President Peterson stated that the proposed resolution merely indicates the good neighbor policy of the Regents with respect to their intentions to cooperate with the Village in improving University Bay Drive, and in making the University elementary and high school facilities available to the residents of Shorewood Hills. He pointed out that this resolution does

not commit the Regents to take care of residents of the Village of Shorewood Hills in University schools to any extent other than the availability of facilities permits. The proposed improvement of University Bay Drive will benefit both University Houses and the Married Students Apartments projects.

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the above recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger.

In answer to questions by Regent Watson, Regent Jones and Vice President Peterson stated that the proposed resolution does not grant any priority, nor does it presume any priority, for the admission of children from the Village of Shorewood Hills to the University operated schools; and that this Board of Regents cannot bind any future Board of Regents regarding the matters covered by this resolution. gent Jones reported on the previous meeting of the Business and Finance Committee with representatives of the Village of Shorewood Hills, who he commended for their fine attitude in working out arrangements in connection with the proposed Married Student Housing project. He pointed out that the University administration and the Village of Shorewood Hills would have to work out the details from time to time as they arise in connection with problems relating to these projects.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the final plans and specifications for the Observatory in the Pine Bluff area be approved and authority be granted to advertise for bids.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That \$5,850 be allotted, from the appropriation of \$100,000 made by the State Building Commission on October 19, 1955, for miscellaneous remodelling, to the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for remodelling work in the Mining and Metallurgy Building.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Director of Residence Halls, the following schedule of rates (per person) for room and board in the University Residence Halls be approved, effective with the 1956 eight-week Summer Session:

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendations of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger:

- l. That, in order to comply with the Housing and Home Finance Agency loan requirements in connection with this project, The Regents of The University of Wisconsin hereby resolve that maximum occupancy of New Chadbourne Hall and Barnard Hall, which comprise Project No. Wis. 47-CH-15(DS), shall be maintained over occupancy of subsequent University housing projects for single women students and over existing University housing projects for single women students, in connection with which there are no presently existing commitments for maintenance of maximum occupancy; and, further, that this regulation shall be maintained during the term that any Wisconsin University Building Corporation Dormitory Bonds of 1956 are outstanding for the financing of this project, and shall be included as a provision in the sublease on this project between Wisconsin University Building Corporation and The Regents.
- 2. That, in order to comply with the Housing and Home Finance Agency loan requirements in connection with this project, The Regents of The University of Wisconsin hereby resolve that maximum occupancy of the first one hundred units of Married Student Apartments, which comprise Project No. Wis. 47-CH-17(D), shall be maintained

over occupancy of subsequent University housing projects for married students and over existing University housing projects for married students, in connection with which there are no presently existing commitments for maintenance of maximum occupancy; and, further, that this regulation shall be maintained during the term that any Wisconsin University Building Corporation Student Apartments Bonds of 1956 are outstanding for the financing of this project, and shall be included as a provision in the sublease on this project between Wisconsin University Building Corporation and The Regents.

Vice President Peterson reported that these recommendations were necessary in connection with the financing of these student housing projects through the Housing and Home Finance Agency. The effect of these resolutions is to require the maintenance of full occupancy in the housing projects specified before maintaining full occupancy in subsequently constructed student housing projects of a similar type. He stated that similar parietal rules would have to be adopted by the Regents with respect to future student housing projects constructed under the Housing and Home Finance Agency program.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted.

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Steiger:

That the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board be authorized and empowered to sign leases, subleases and other documents, and to do all things necessary to complete arrangements with Wisconsin University Building Corporation to refinance the present indebtedness on the Memorial Union Building and to finance the cost of alterations and improvements to the Memorial Union Building, principally to the kitchen and cafeteria, which it is estimated will require a total new loan or loans of approximately \$1,100,000 to be repaid from income of the Wisconsin Union.

Regent Jones reported that the original estimated cost of this alteration project was \$700,000, which was based on estimates made by a competent architect and a competent builder. He stated that it now appears that the cost will be about \$400,000 more than originally estimated; and that a loan will be required in approximately the amount set forth in the recommendation. There was considerable discussion of whether there should be a censure of those who had made the original estimates, and whether the architect and the contractor, who had made the estimates, should be asked to appear before the Regents to explain the difference between the original estimates and the present estimates. It was explained that part of the reason for the difference was due to the fact that, after work was started, it was found that additional work was required in connection with alterations in the existing building to meet building code requirements with respect to the existing electrical and plumbing facilities. Also part of the additional cost was probably due

to starting the work before detailed plans and specifications had been completed. However, it was pointed out that, if the start of the project had been deferred until detailed plans and specifications had been completed, the final cost would probably be a great deal more. The work on this project is on a cost basis, plus a fixed fee, so that the contractor does not make more on the project because of additional costs. The difficulty of determining in advance the actual cost of a remodelling project, such as this, was fully discussed; and it was explained that a cost-plus contract had been found to be most feasible for this type of project.

The question was put on the motion to approve the above recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee and it was voted.

The discussion was then resumed on whether the architect and the contractor should be requested to appear before the Regents to explain their estimates for
this project. Regent Rennebohm stated that, although he realized that nothing further could be done regarding this project, he thought the Board of Regents was entitled to written statements by the architect and the contractor giving the reasons
and explanation of what had happened, in order that steps might be taken to prevent
the re-occurence of such a situation. Regent Rennebohm then moved that it was the
sense of the Regents that no more projects be started until plans are finished.
There was no second to this motion.

After further discussion of cost-plus contracts for remodelling projects, and, after having agreed that there was no intention to cast reflections on the architect or the contractor, both of which are reputable firms, it was agreed that the Business and Finance Committee should obtain a written statement regarding the items on this project which threw off the estimates so far, in order that the same mistake is not made again; and that this written statement should be sent to the Regents with the agenda for the January meeting.

Regent Rennebohm reported, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands, that faster progress will be made on planning for the development of the proposed shopping center now that the zoning has been approved; that the lots in the Midvale Terrace Plat have been moving rapidly; and that the general slump in real estate sales throughout the country is reflected in the slowing down, at the moment, of the sale of other residential lots in the University Hill Farms development.

Regent Steiger, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Acquisition of Land in Milwaukee, reported that the committee had met, but that the Chairman was absent and the committee was not ready to make a report.

Regent Rennebohm stated that he was aware that he was not present at the June meeting of the Regents, at which they had approved the development of the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee in its present location. He questioned the wisdom

of trying to develop a University for fifteen thousand students in the area of the present Kenwood Campus because of the lack of sufficient space. This would require the use of other facilities at different locations for the athletic programs. He also questioned the Kenwood Campus as being the proper location for the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee with respect to the changing center of population of the Milwaukee metropolitan area. He stated that he believed the Regents should at least explore the possibilities of the acquisition of land in a more central location, which would provide sufficient space for building a new university.

There was discussion of whether the action of the Regents in June, regarding the site for the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, should be reconsidered. It was pointed out that that action had been taken after careful consideration by the faculty in Milwaukee and at Madison, and by the Regents. Regent Renk stated that, although he had voted in June in favor of the action which was taken, he was not certain now that that was the proper action. He suggested that the Special Regent Committee consider other available sites. It was pointed out that this committee was presently charged only with considering available sites in the area of the Kenwood Campus and reporting back to the Regents. Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That the Special Regent Committee on Acquisition of Land in Milwau-kee report to the Regents on the availability of land in other areas as well as

around the Kenwood Campus.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:40 A.M.

Resolution

Whereas, the Regents are planning to have constructed by Wisconsin University Building Corporation a sizeable housing project for married students on a site adjacent to the Village of Shorewood Hills at the westerly edge of the University campus and within the common school district of the Village, and

Whereas, this site and the improvements to be constructed thereon are presently exempt from taxation, and

Whereas, the State Legislature has provided for the payment of school taxes on certain residential properties of the University which are not contiguous to the main campus and on agricultural lands owned by the University, and

Whereas, the Regents have authorized Wisconsin University Building Corporation to enter into an agreement with the Village of Shorewood Hills for the payment to the Village of charges on a negotiated basis for certain services to be provided by the Village to the housing project, the intent of the said agreement being that the taxpayers of the Village shall neither gain nor lose financially by reason of the presence of the University's said housing project, and

Whereas, there is a long history of cooperation between the University and the Village, which the Regents desire to continue and strengthen especially in view of the benefits of such cooperation to the residents of the said housing project for married students, and

Whereas, the Village Board has requested the Regents specifically to cooperate with the Village (a) in widening and improving University Bay Drive, which will be used by the residents of the said housing project and of the Eagle Heights faculty housing units as a main thoroughfare between the housing projects and University Avenue, when and if such widening and improving is undertaken by the Village, and (b) in providing additional opportunities for children from the Village to attend elementary and high schools operated by the University;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin as follows:

- (1) That it is the intention of the Regents to cooperate with the Village of Shorewood Hills in the improvement of University Bay Drive, when such improvement is undertaken by the Village, by dedicating for highway purposes some of the land needed for widening the Drive and by requesting the State Highway Commission for funds for improving University Bay Drive to the extent that funds may legally be used and are available for that purpose, and
- (2) That it is the intent of the Regents to continue to admit pupils from the Village to any elementary or high schools operated by the University to the extent that facilities and programs of such schools permit.
