## INTRODUCTION

The scenario of the 1980's for the Janesville Public Schools was **CHANGE**.

The most challenging aspect of this period was justifying increasing budgets with decreasing enrollments.

In the school year 1978-79, the enrollment for the Janesville Public School system was 12,193 students. By the 1986-87 school year, this figure had declined to 9,137 students.

The Janesville Public Schools budget in the 1980-81 school year was 26.4 millions of dollars, by the 1986-87 school year the budget had increased to 38.7 millions of dollars.

To meet this challenge long-range planning committees were formed to look at school space and enrollment projections.

What to teach fostered curriculum revision, where to teach closed schools and reorganized grade placement, and how to teach found the staff studying strategies for instructional improvement.

Throughout the period, policies were created to improve discipline and policies were updated regarding drug



and alcohol abuse, regulating attendance and examining the structure of the junior and senior high schools.

The school system assumed priorities which included dropout prevention, developmental reading, gifted and talented education, improvement of internal and external communication, long range planning of curriculum, and management studies.

In July 1982 the Janesville School District became a unified district which established it as a fiscally independent body to finance public education.

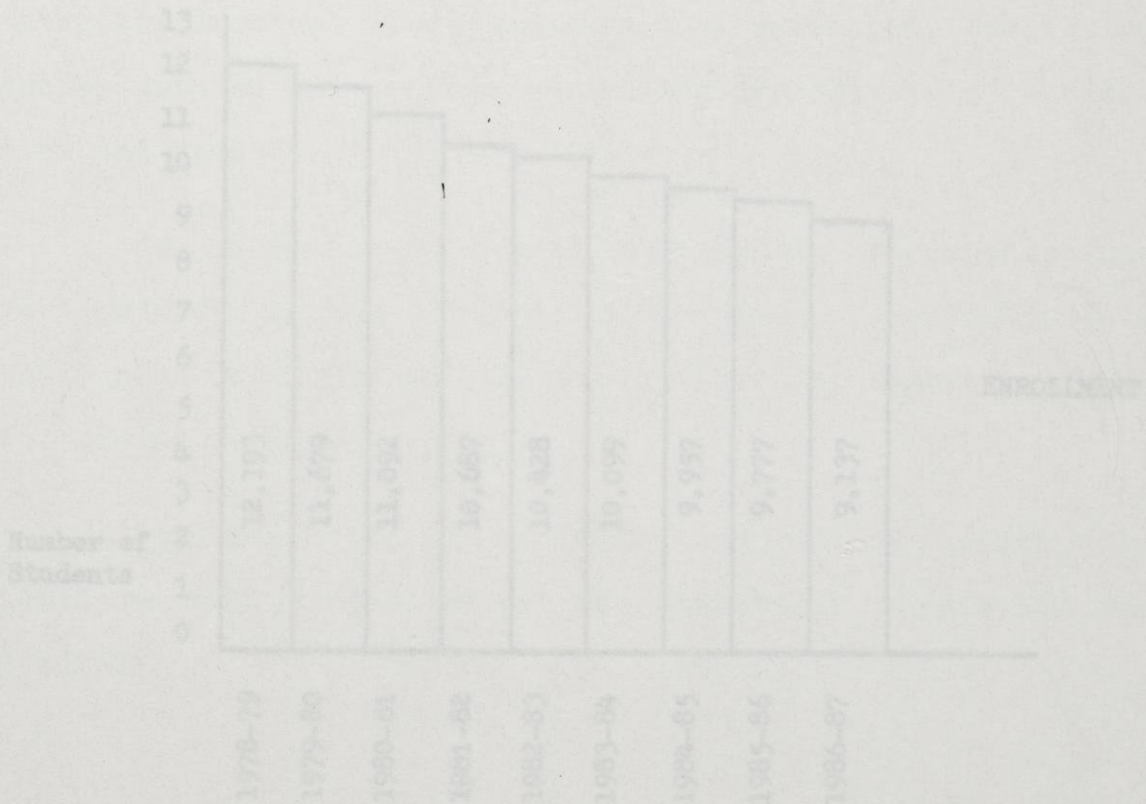
In 1983 the Janesville Education Foundation, Inc. was chartered to aid academics in funding programs and studies which could not be provided by public funds.

During the 1980's every area of the curriculum was studied utilizing a five year plan. This plan for curriculum and program improvement utilized the format of **EVALUATION-DEVELOPMENT-IMPLEMENTATION-EVALUATION**. This resulted in a new and revised curriculum for the Janesville Public Schools.

The Board of Education, on January 5, 1984, approved the reorganization of the central office staff to provide necessary support to building level supervision and create greater coordination of all aspects of instruction throughout the school system.

LEXINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS BUDGET - ENROLLMENT

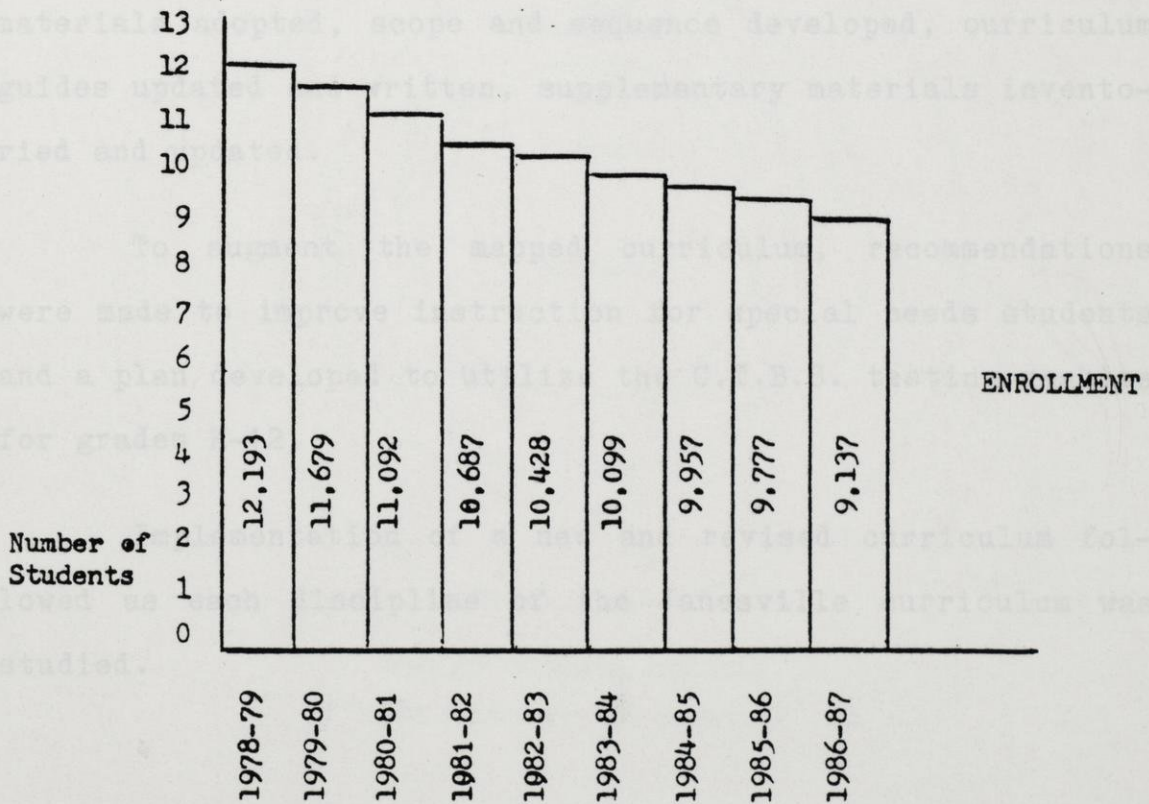
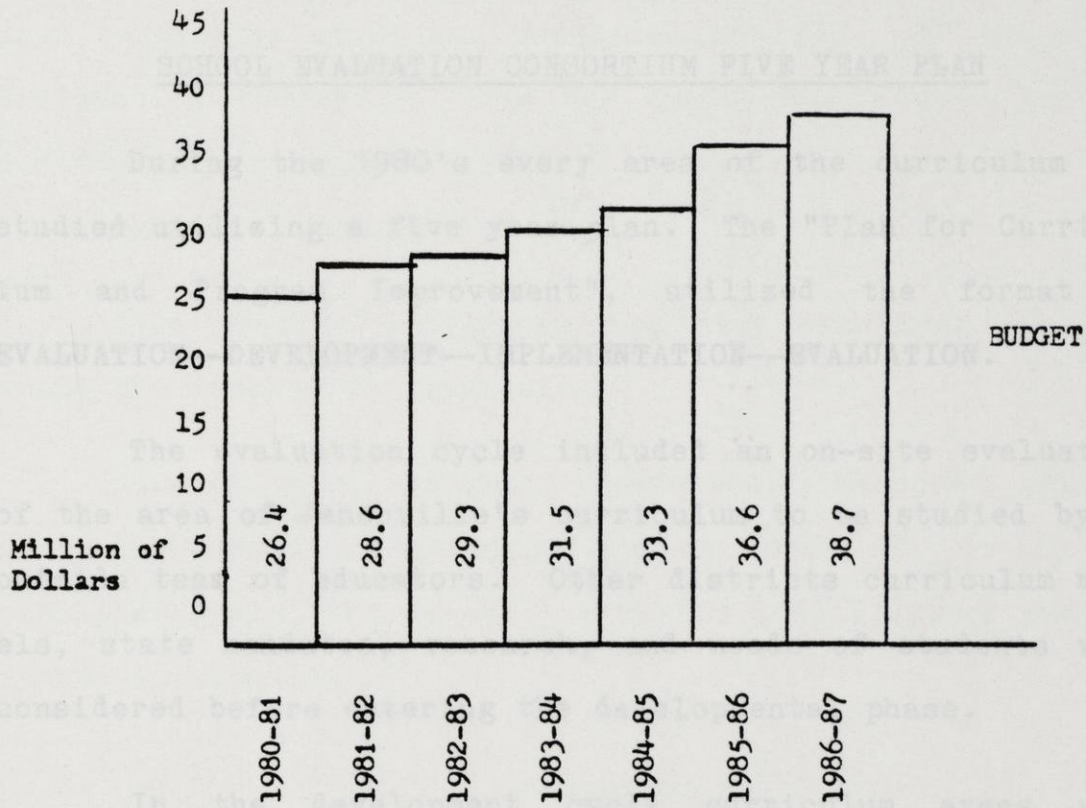

## CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

### SCHOOL EVALUATION CONSORTIUM FIVE YEAR PLAN

During the 1980's every area of the curriculum was studied utilizing a five year plan. The "Plan for Curriculum and Program Improvement", utilized the format of **EVALUATION--DEVELOPMENT--IMPLEMENTATION--EVALUATION.**

The evaluation cycle included an on-site evaluation of the area of Janesville's curriculum to be studied by an outside team of educators. Other districts curriculum models, state mandates, research, and needs of students were considered before entering the developmental phase.

In the development cycle curriculum areas were mapped, desired learning outcomes revised, new textbooks and materials adopted, scope and sequence developed, curriculum guides updated and written, supplementary materials inventoried and updated.

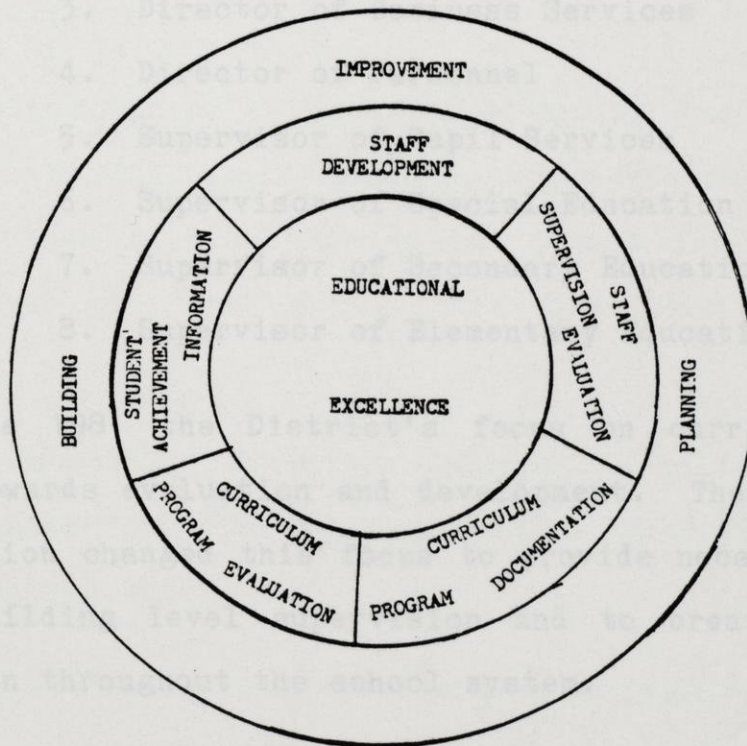
To augment the mapped curriculum, recommendations were made to improve instruction for special needs students and a plan developed to utilize the C.T.B.S. testing results for grades K-12.

Implementation of a new and revised curriculum followed as each discipline of the Janesville curriculum was studied.

Cited as a significant achievement the first five year curriculum study was completed in 1983. Of this, Dr. Mrdjenovich commented, "Now the cycle starts over because continuous curriculum evaluation is the only way to meet the changing needs of society."

The on-site evaluators had many excellent comments about the Janesville curriculum.

One on-site evaluator commented, "Measured against state and national standards and in terms of locally established goals, the Janesville Public School System must be judged as excellent."

## CENTRAL OFFICE STAFF REORGANIZATION

The Board of Education on January 5, 1984 approved the reorganization of the Central Office Staff. Many of the approved changes were made to adjust to the Department of Public Instruction's requirements and the evaluation study, in 1982, by the management firm of Peat, Marwick and Mitchell.

The staffing, as approved by the Board of Education, was as follows:

1. Director of Instructional Services
2. Director of Special Services
3. Director of Business Services
4. Director of Personnel
5. Supervisor of Pupil Services
6. Supervisor of Special Education
7. Supervisor of Secondary Education
8. Supervisor of Elementary Education

Since 1981 the District's focus on curriculum was directed towards evaluation and development. The new staff reorganization changed this focus to provide necessary support to building level supervision and to create greater coordination throughout the school system.



## STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

Two major components necessary to provide students with a high quality education are:

1 - a solid curriculum

2 - effective teaching

Thus, the school year 1984-85 brought to the Janesville Public Schools a "Staff Development Long Range Plan".

The first Teacher Leadership Seminar was held at the Yahara Center, Madison, Wisconsin in August of 1984. Thirty teachers were accepted into a week long workshop to motivate teachers. The theme for the first seminar was "Teaching and Learning for Tomorrow."

Madeline Hunter's lesson plan design was introduced and studied by all staff members. Supervisors and principals used her clinical evaluation format for visitation reports. Both were used by the staff to monitor and improve instruction.

The Janesville Education Association held one of the first workshops for effective teaching in April 1985. Three general purposes were:

1 - Increase student learning through well planned and delivered lessons.

2 - Increase teaching efficiency.

3 - Increase effectiveness of administrative supervision in the areas of:

- a) Instructional improvement
- b) Re-orient focus of staff evaluation.

T.E.S.A. (Teacher Expectations and Student Achievement) paired teachers for self-evaluation. The focus was: students can attain higher achievement if teacher expectations are greater.

Intensive supervision, as a support system to improve teaching, was adopted in 1984.

E.A.P. (Employee Assistance Program) was implemented in 1980 to provide assistance in early identification of problems followed by appropriate referral to professional resources. The first year of the program forty staff members used this service.

The Wellness Program, which was introduced in 1985, was a physical health program done in conjunction with the Y.M.C.A.

During the '80's a radio program called "Learning Time" (formerly known as "School News and Views") was presented on radio station WOLQ.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Janesville School District continued an active public relations program throughout the 1980's. Subjects of concern in education were discussed and presented to the public via all phases of the media.

Beginning with the 1980-81 school year, attention focused on the quality of education in the Janesville school system by featuring a "School of the Month". Each school or one of its departments planned a program to make known their particular expertise.

In 1981 the first edition of the staff newsletter of and about the Janesville Public Schools, Reflections, was published.

A newspaper column, "The Report Card", first appeared in 1983 and was published weekly in the Janesville Gazette. The column included current school news and a special feature to give students recognition for outstanding achievement in its special feature called "Student of the Week".

During the 1980's a radio program called "Learning Time" (formerly known as "School News and Views") was presented on radio station WCLO.

Jones Intercable, TV Channel 32, promoted special programs in the Janesville Schools by showing tapes to home



audiences of activities from around the school system during the half-time of sports events.

In January 1981 a program called "Brown Bag It" was started. Superintendent Donald Mrdjenovich met with parents and interested citizens to discuss education at different school sites. This was later renamed PACE (Parents and Citizens in Education).

These activities were coordinated by Howard Gage, Public Information Coordinator.
