

Len Tyacke (left) and Frank Hurley, chairmen of the yard drive to buy playing cards for the Yanks Overseas are shown here with two of the WACS who will be on hand next Wednesday morning to take up a collection among our workers.

The city-wide campaign is to raise \$10,000 which sum will purchase 100,000 decks of cards. These cards are sorely needed by our fighting service men to keep their minds occupied.

The need for these cards is evidenced by reports which have come back from fighting fronts that playing cards are at such a premium that many decks are being cut in half to distribute the playing facilities.

The 40 and 8, which is sponsoring the fund, will have its locomotive outside the yard.

Al Robb beamed Tuesday when Pussy, his favorite cat in the Corkers Loft gave birth to quintuplets.


It would seem that something more than cigars are in order. The line forms on the left.
