A communication was received from Regent Sensenbrenner explaining the necessity of his being in Toronto for a conference with government officials and regretting his inability to be present.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the last meeting of the Board held on September 27, 1941, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

1. That the Comptroller be authorized to sign a modification of the renewal of Memorandum Agreement for cooperative studies of state, county, township and municipal taxes for highways and the relationship between roads and general property taxes in the various states with the Public Roads Administration, Federal Works Agency, which was approved by the Executive Committee on August 26, 1941, to extend the renewal agreement an additional month to October 31, 1941.

3. That upon the recommendation of the faculty and in accordance with the approval given by the student body at the general referendum held October 11 to 21, 1941, the Student Court of the University of Wisconsin be approved subject to the rules and regulations established by the faculty and with the understanding that expenditures shall be limited to a budget approved by the Student Financial Adviser. To this extent, the provisions of Article 8, Finance, in the plan for the Student Court approved by the faculty and students are interpreted by the Regents as follows: Receipts from traffic fines imposed on students are student organization receipts, not University receipts, and, further, the total budget of receipts and expenditures of the Student Court is subject to approval by the Student Financial Adviser.

Carl Runge, President of the Student Board, was present and again discussed the matter with the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, recommendation No. 3 under Administration and General was adopted.

4. That the rule relating to auditors be changed to read: Adults may audit one course per semester at \$2.50 per credit, with the consent of the Dean of the particular School or College. (This removes the requirement for payment of non-resident tuition.)

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Vergeront, recommendation No. 4 under Administration and General was adopted.

5. That an additional fee of \$3.25 be charged students in the Home Management Course (Home Economics) for room and board during additional residence in the Home Management House (length of practice period in course increased from twelve to sixteen days).

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 5 under Administration and General was adopted.

6. That a fee of \$35 a semester be established for children admitted to the Nursery School, with the provision that the fee for the first semester of 1941-42 be placed at \$25 due to delays in remodeling the house this year. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the actions taken by the President since the September 27, 1941, meeting of the Board be approved and made a part of the records of this meeting.

President Dykstra made a statement with reference to the present status of the plans for the short course dormitories and Comptroller Peterson reported verbally on priorities and the status of the arrangements for the Radio Towers. Regent Werner moved that the proper officer make a report at the next meeting as to his recommendations for any additional precaution that could be taken for safeguarding against any damage or loss by fire. It was explained, however, that there is a night watchman on constant duty at the short course dormitories.

The President stated that he had a letter from Blanche Trilling, Director of Physical Education for Women, requesting the tract of land known as the "corn patch", and the site that was first considered for the short course dormitories, for a recreation field for women. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the matter be referred to the Campus Development Committee. (Regents Hodgkins, Werner, and Ekern)

The President brought up the matter of selling or razing the house at 408 North Charter Street, formerly used as an office for the Dean of the Medical School. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That authority be granted to sell or raze this building.

The Comptroller explained that Mrs. Cape had taken up with the Governor's office the matter of the University acquiring her property on Orchard Street, stating that property across the street could be purchased for \$8500 and exchanged for the Cape property. Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That this matter be laid on the table.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That an appropriation of \$500 be made from Regents' Unassigned to the School of Music for the employment of a carillonneur.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That George Hanson be appointed carillonneur for the current year, salary at the rate of \$500; charged to Regents' Unassigned.

President Dykstra made verbal report on the defense activities at the University stating that one hundred and sixty members of the University staff were thus engaged, either on or off the campus.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Vergeront, it was VOTED, That the following appropriations be made from Regents' Unassigned:

- (a) \$ 300.00 - School for Workers in Industry, on account of expanded program. Covered by receipts. (1-E)
- (b) 1,460.00 - College of Agriculture - Supplies and Expense - instruction (food and supplies for operation of the Home Management and Nursery School houses). Covered by additional fee receipts. (1-E)
- (c) 600.00 - for Business Administration (Purchasing Department) (1-E)

Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That item (a) in recommendation No. 3 on page 2 of the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents held on April 25, 1939, be amended by deleting the words "of Wisconsin" in the first line and "Employees Benefit" in the second line. When so amended the action will read as follows:

3. That the following actions of the faculty be approved:

- (a) That application for membership in the University Faculty Association and participation in the attached plan of group life insurance be made a condition of employment of all new appointees to full-time teaching, research, or administrative positions whose compensation is \$1200 or more per annum and whose attained age at time of appointment is fifty years or less.
- (b) That the Comptroller of the University deduct the premiums equally from each of the total number of payments received by the individual per year.

At 10:35 A.M. the meeting adjourned.


