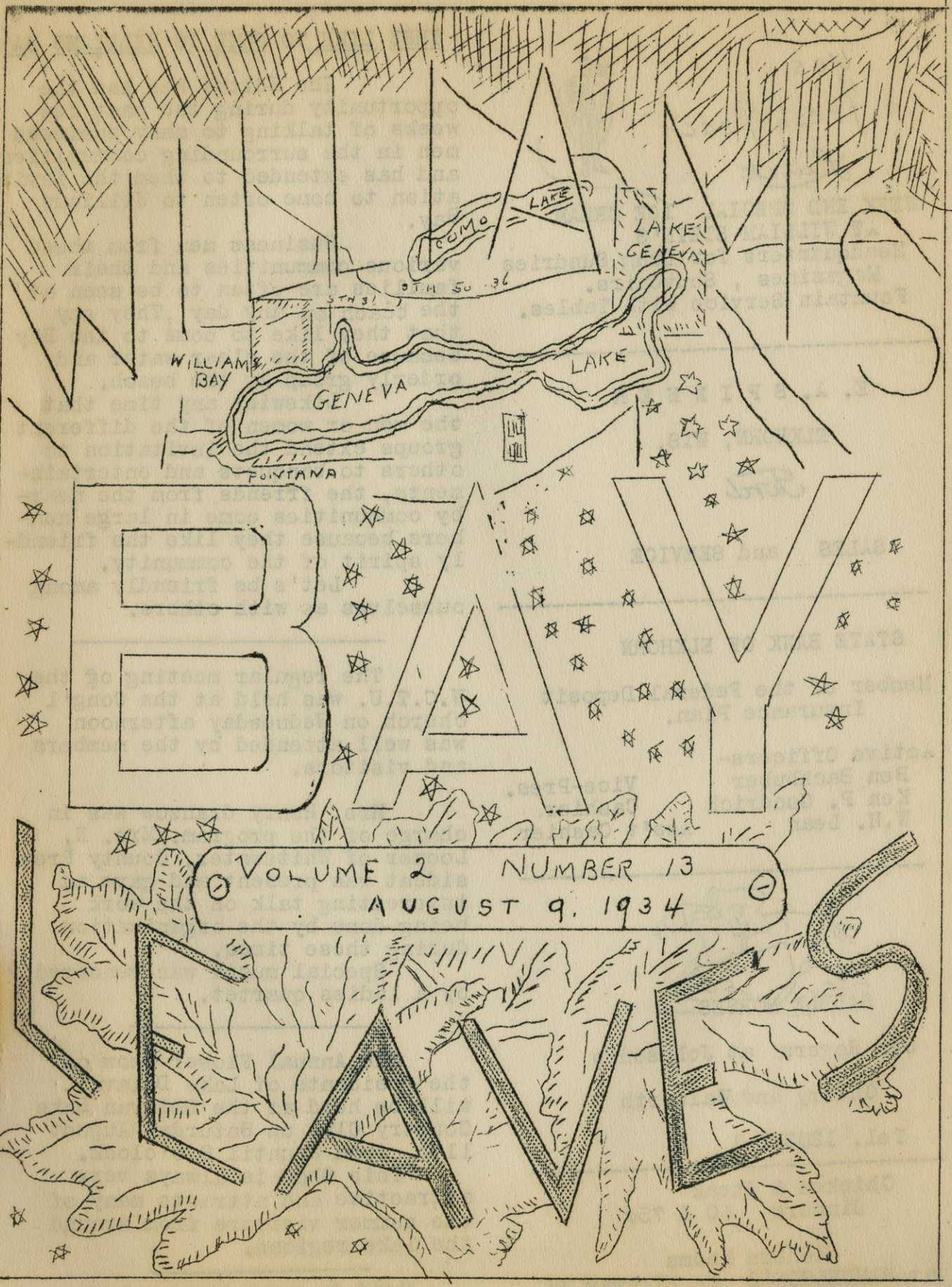

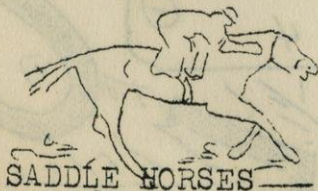

Program. A splendid musical pro-

Miss Edith Blair to the delight of
all present, Trumpet solo by Miss
Ann Elwell of Eleanor Camp and
solos and chorus by a group of
Hyde Park Boys Dep't. Y.M.C.A.,
were thoroughly enjoyed.

C.M. Bjorge, Pres. of the Club
introduced M.T. Peterson, as
toast-master who enlivened his
remarks with Scandinavian stories.

Mr. Hunter spoke in words of
praise for Harry Hopkins, head of
the F.E.R.A. who is a trained
social worker, having held many
important positions in the Red
Cross. He is administering the work
without regard to politics or
politicians. There are about eleven
million unemployed at present and
not much chance of reducing the
number for some time. Mr. Hunter

He is recovering nicely from the accident.

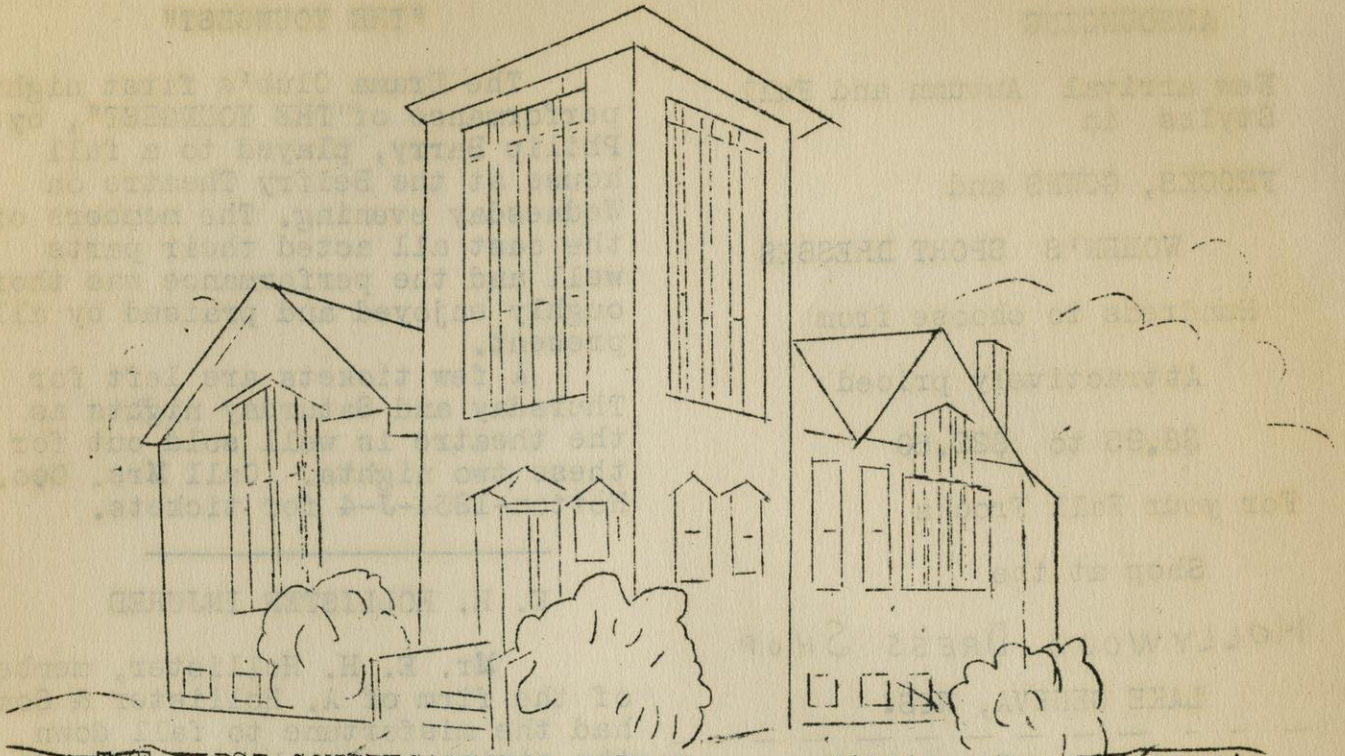
