RENOVATION/ REMODELLING UPDATE

Upcoming projects scheduled for Memorial Union and Union South include:

- * renaming Union South's Carousel Cafeteria the Sports Cafe, decorating it with photographs of UW varsity, club, recreational and intramural athletic events and upgrading its menu. The Sports Cafe, located on second floor, is scheduled to reopen with its new look in September.
- * replacing tables and chairs in the Trophy Room, Memorial Union this fall
- * refurbishing the Memorial Union corridor from the Park Street entrance to the Rathskeller over winter break
- * remodeling the Union South Games Room during summer 1994.

THE EVENTS LOOK GREAT BUT WHERE DO I PARK?

Parking near Memorial Union and Union South can be a bit challenging. With the opening of the Grainger Hall parking ramp September 1, 1993, your parking trouble should be eased.

GRAINGER HALL RAMP is situated within easy walking distance of Memorial Union and Union South, between University Ave. and Johnson St. at the intersection of Park St. Limited visitor parking is available during weekdays, however during evening and weekend hours (excluding football games and other campus wide events) most of the 300 space ramp is available for University visitors for \$2 per day. The entrance to the ramp is at the west end of the building just off Brooks St.

PARKING NEAR MEMORIAL UNION

LOT 1, adjacent to Memorial Union and the Armory (Red Gym), offers daily to visitors 78 stalls of 2-hour metered parking.

LOT 6 (HELEN C. WHITE LIBRARY PARKING GARAGE), on Park St. west of Memorial Union, offers a total of 163 metered parking spaces. The upper level is available to visitors daily (meter limits are 2 hours) and the lower level is available to

visitors evenings and weekends (meter limits are 8 hours.)

LAKE STREET RAMP provides 1200 parking spaces to visitors and is located between State St. and University Ave., less than three blocks from Memorial Union.

LOT 46 is located between University Ave. and Johnson St., adjacent to Lake St.. More than 125 visitor spaces are available daily.

PARKING NEAR UNION SOUTH

LOT 17 is located less than 2 blocks west of Union South. Visitor parking is available most evenings and weekends.

LOT 18, adjacent to the Fieldhouse, offers 20 2-hour meters to University visitors.

Additional visitor parking near Union South is under construction.

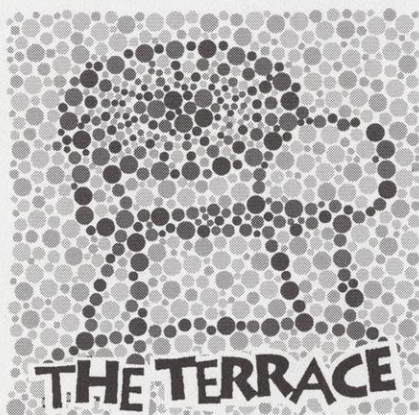
