sia as advanced by Raymond Bassia as advanced by Raymond Bas-
sett 225 in a series of articles writen for The Cardinal, recently, Professor Rostoytzeff talked on educaion in Russia, politics, and made a -okine and Bassett yesterday,
"Education is teaching men to
think for themselves. It is not to impose any doctrine upon them whatsoever. The Bolsheviki are suppressing all free thought. Len-
ine died no teach the Russians to long for education. They have always longed for education. The new system of education makes it

"Figures from the budget of the Bolsheviki regime show that little

The message that she brings from our fellow students there has come home to Wisconsin as nothing else has for several years. The message is one of hope for permanent peace. If peace is not guaranteed for them they feel that there can be no progress in Europe for years to co

Under the face of these difficulties, which we
think insurmountable, the university people of Europe are standing by their countries because they behands. They do not trust nineteenth century Eurohands. Thean diplomacy; they want their own voice to be heard. Such courage in the face of all obstacles is bound to accomplish its ends.
