SHERMAN HALL

On Sunday, April 15, 1965 the Post Crescent ran an article announcing the start of a 2.6 million dollar project which would begin at Winnebago State Hospital. That was the first public statement of a proposed Sherman Hall. On September 3, 1966 the Northwestern stated that the project was 99% completed.

When the structure, which was named for Adin Sherman, superintendent from June 10, 1910 to March 31, 1930, was finished it had two hundred beds and cost \$2,550,000.

On April 21, 1967, the Dedication of the new building was held with Gov. Warren Knowles as a guest speaker, but the first patients were moved into the new site on March 15, 1967.

In the lobby of Sherman is an American flag posted which was given to the Staff by Congressman Wm. A. Steiger. The flag has been flown over the Capitol in Washington D.C.

Mr. Paul Kilp of Berners, Schobers & Kilp was the architect for the modern building. He was also on the speakers roster for the day of Dedication.

In 1973, Winnebago State Hospital will be celebrating the one-hundredth

Chaplain's Message

Happy Birthday

It is difficult to endure a trying situation, put up with harassing problems and suffering, but when these predicaments drag on and on, with no foreseeable cessation, even the best among us are strongly tempted to give up, back out, retreat, capitulate.

We have documented evidence that these temptations were no less prevalent among the earliest of Christians than it is among us - even though ours isn't essentially a religious persecution.

Among the first in Jerusalem to embrace faith in the Lord Jesus were a number of Jewish priests steeped in the sacred traditions of the chosen people, and constantly participating in the splendid liturgical services with the great temple. Upon joining the swelling ranks of believers in Jesus, these men became targets of ridicule, slander, imprisonment, beatings and murder. Loyal to their baptismal promises, they proved courageous in withstanding these dreadful onslaughts for their own people. Finally, under overwhelming pressures, they elected to leave the Sacred City so dear to them and find refuge in one of their Christian convictions in greater peace.

Nonetheless, living in exile and still longing for the magnificence of the temple courts and the religious ceremonies, and the comfort of their way of life before they had come to know Christ, these same men, who had earlier endured persecution, now were sorely tempted to give up all, abandon their commitment to Christianity and return to their original life.

At this juncture the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews sent them a stirring letter, entreating them to be faithful, long-suffering, persistent and courageous, and reminding them that their new faith was really the fulfillment of the Old Law, and alone offered them the sharing in the Kingdom of Heaven. HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When cleaning fish that are caught from slimy water, put a few tablespoons of vinegar in a sinkful of water and soak the fish for about a half hour in the solution. The vinegar will not distort the flavor in anyway; and the solution will cut the slime on the fish's scales.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When preparing to wax hard surfaced floors such as linoleum, vinyl or tile, so over the entire floor with a mop or sponge wrung out in vinegar water, after using your usual cleaning agent and before applying the wax. The vinegar will neutralize the alkali.

Use one-fourth cup of vinegar to a gallon of lukewarm or cold water. The wax lasts weeks longer.

KITCHEN FACIAL TREATMENT

An egg facial is recommended to cleanse the pores and tighten the skin. It should be used only on skin tough enough to withstand its drawing power.

The white of an egg lightly beaten is spread on the face and allowed to dry, 3 to 5 minutes. Honey has drawing power and may be added, using one teaspoon to the beaten egg white. Remove with warm water. Apply lotion and dry face. Apply make-up.

LEMON SPONGE

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
 1/2 cup sugar
 1 tablespoon liquid non-caloric sweetener
 1/8 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
 3/4 cup lemon juice
 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
 Low calorie dessert topping (optional)

Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water. Dissolve in 1 cup boiling water. Then add sugar, sweetener and salt and stir until sugar is dissolved. Stir in lemon rind and juice and 1 3/4 cups cold water. Chill until gelatin begins to thicken. Beat with rotary beater until frothy, then fold in egg whites. Pour into bowl and chill until firm. Serve plain or with low-calorie topping, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Children, all children, are very precious people. Troubled and wayward children sadden me. Family unity, and family harmony and love can prevent emotional problems in children. In 1957 I was doing a fine job of destroying myself, my husband and my children thru my alcoholic drinking. Family unity and love went right out the window.

My oldest son, John, was thirteen, a big boy, an excellent student, an athlete, handsome and healthy.

After several years of protecting me and never faltering in his loyalty to me, John reached a point when he could no longer endure my drunkenness. We were out doors and I was making a fool of myself in front of my friends. Suddenly he grabbed me, picked me up and literally threw me in the house. "Mom," he said, "you're nothing but a drunken bum." Those words cut deep; deep enough to start me thinking about my future and our future. Not long after that day, I came into A.A. And with God's help the help of A.A. friends and the help of an understanding family, I have had continuous happy sobriety.

When John came home from college after his Junior year, I thanked him with all my heart for all he had done for me during my drinking days and during my recovery. To "break the ice" a bit I added, "But you're such a fine capable person, and you have such a good father, you probably would have done well even if I hadn't stopped drinking. He looked up, looked me straight in the eye and said, "Mother, I don't think I would have had the incentive.

So with this as with booze, it is a matter of taking the 12 steps on a day to day basis, particularly the 1 and 2 steps. This means admitting and accepting the fact that "I am an Alcoholic." Many people will admit to this to gain something (Eg) boss off my back, wife off my back, out of a jam of one sort or another; but never really accept it.

To the Editorial Staff of the CUE.

In regard to your article and survey about the staffs availability and willingness to assist the patient in a concerned and understanding manner, with problems as they arise.

First of all, I think there are some things the patients should consider and think about. Are you on an admission ward? If you are, the aides are probably very busy with routine duties -- transfers, admissions, trips to Dentist, Xray, Lab, etc. And performing other what may seem small but are multiple duties (cigarettes, candy, fruit and money) that are not so necessary on the other wards where the patients have proven themselves. In general, those who can be trusted with personal hygiene, take care of their own belongings and need less supervision.

After doing all these things the aides have a minute to sit down. They watch TV. Is that so terrible? I know for a fact that if you approach them in a decent and respectful manner most all are willing to get up from a chair and meet your need. You might have to wait a few minutes but patience is a virtue. There are probably 30 or 40 other people in the room who have needs also.

The reason I mention the above is because I have worked as a nurse and the demands placed on any member of a hospital staff -- doctors, RN's and aides alike -- are great. This is true no matter what type of hospital it is and personnel are always limited to some degree as far as number goes.

As for "listening to problems goes", how would you like to sit down every day and have only five persons approach you with problems? Expecting to have them solved or just listened to -- each for say only 10 minutes a day? That's an hour for one aide and chances are if he is a good listener it would be more like a half-hour or hour with each patient. Remember, the aide is not a Psychiatrist. It takes years for a Psychiatrist to just learn how to help you realize (not solve) your problems and simply accept and face up to them. These

aides are not trained for that. Even the RN's and LPN's are not. I do think many of the patients are under the illusion that the aides are suppose to be our "Soul Confessors," and comforters. This is just not so. And even at that, many of them are, cut of the goodness of their hearts.

So let us appreciate that much and approach each day of our hospitalization with a more positive attitude. If we can do this much it will make our stay here that much easier.

1. K.H. liberty is in effect from 9:00 A.M. - 7:00 P.M. where as the other units liberty hours are from 7:00 A.M. - 8:00 P.M.
2. Many patients being denied going on walks and going to the Canteen after 6:00 P.M. (If they do manage to go to the Canteen, they are only allowed to remain there for approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ hour after 7:00 P.M with liberty patients excluded.
3. K.H. patients are denied the privilege of attending Mass or Church other than on Sunday, unless they wish to subtract an hour of their liberty to participate in the service

What are the reasons behind these actions? May it be that the patients are not capable or do not have self-control, that K.H. does not allow its patients the same privileges as H.H., G.H., S.H., etc. Or possibly the personnel are afraid to miss a coffee break.
