Dear Sir

Presuming you would like to see a copy of the official canvass I have taken pains to draw it off and send it to ^{you} our candidates are all elected by overwhelming majorities. It would have accorded more with my personal feelings to have another name on one of the tickets, but the convention it seems thought otherwise; ~~so~~ we must bow in submission to the majority of the people. The majority in this town is greater than was anticipated, the opposition are very much cut down and get in a rage as soon as a word is mentioned about the election. Huntington & C. Hampton have given smaller majorities than we expected; if we continue to gain for the next 2 years in this town as we have for the last 2, we shall give a larger majority than C. H. After the election was over I went to N. Y and returned Saturday, 22 counties had then been heard from. All giving a majority for Marcy (except Richmond) amounting to nearly 16,000. The west will go against him but his majority will be about 20,000. I hope the Bank Tories will be satisfied with the experiment upon N. Y, and be convinced that the honest yeomanry are not to be alienated, frightened nor bribed from their Democratic principles. In the 22 counties heard from the Bank Tories have elected but one member of assembly & one congressman. Job Pierson of Rensselaer lost his election by 31 votes. I must conclude. yours respectfully,
