

Badgers Return Home to Face NIU

The Wisconsin football team (5-2, 2-2 Big Ten) takes on Northern Illinois (1-6, 0-4 MAC) today at 11 a.m. This is the Badgers' final non-conference game of the season. The contest will be televised by the Big Ten Network with Wayne Larrivee, Charles Davis and Charissa Thompson handling the commentary.

UW is currently receiving votes in both the Associated Press poll and the *USA Today*/Coaches' Poll. Northern Illinois is not ranked.

The Badgers have dropped consecutive games for the first time in nearly two years, losing on the road to Illinois and Penn State. NIU is in the midst of a three-game losing streak, having dropped the last two by a combined five points.

THE SERIES

This will be the 11th meeting between the two teams with Wisconsin leading the series 9-1 ... all 10 previous games have taken place in Madison ... in the last meeting, on Sept. 14, 2002, the 22nd-ranked Badgers needed a fourthquarter comeback to defeat NIU 24-21 with quarterback Brooks Bollinger scoring the game-winning TD on a two-yard run with 1:21 left in the fourth quarter ... Wisconsin needed a twopoint conversion with 2:09 left to beat the Huskies, 18-17, in 1992 ... the last three meetings between the Badgers and Huskies have been decided by a total of six points ... the Badgers will travel to NIU for the first time on Oct. 24, 2009





Today's Game at Camp Randall



Junior Travis Beckum leads all tight ends in the country in receptions (46) and receiving yards (555). He needs two yards to move into the top 10 on UW's career receiving yards list.

Key Notes to Consider

- ♦ The Badgers have won 11 straight games (and 22 of the last 23) at Camp Randall Stadium, tied for the fourth-longest home winning streak in school history. It is also the fifth-longest current streak in the country. Wisconsin's last home loss came against Iowa on Nov. 12, 2005.
- ♦ Since the beginning of the 2004 season only Ohio State has more wins than Wisconsin (36) among Big Ten schools. UW's 36 wins are tied for ninth-most in the country since 2004, behind only USC (41), Texas (39), Auburn (38), LSU (37), Ohio State (37), Boise State (37), Oklahoma (37) and Virginia Tech (37).

...

Junior Travis Beckum leads all tight ends in the country this season with 46 catches and 555 receiving yards. Over the last three games he has 26 catches for 362 yards.

...

♦ Including bowl games, UW has won 13 straight games against non-conference opponents. In regular-season play, the Badgers have won 15 games in a row against non-conference foes and 23 of their last 24. Wisconsin has won 16 of its last 17 non-conference home games.

General Notes

♦ Wisconsin has lost consecutive games for the first time sin Nov. 5 and Nov. 12, 2005. The last time UW lost three straight games was the final three games of the 2004 season.

Bret Bielema's 17-1 record to start his head coaching career is the second-best coaching star for a Big Ten coach in history. Only the legendar Fielding Yost of Michigan, who went 55-0-1 from 1901-05, had a better beginning to a career.

- ♦ Wisconsin is one of three programs in the nation with no more than one home loss since the start of the 2004 season. The Badgers are 22-1 at Camp Randall Stadium during that time. The others are Boise State (23-1) and Southern California (20-1)
- ◆ During its 11-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points eight times. The Badge are averaging 32.4 points in those games, compared to 14.5 for their opponents.
- ♦ Wisconsin was among the top 10 in both polls in each of the first six weeks this season. The last time UW was ranked among the top 10 in each of the first six weeks was 1963.
- ♦ The Badgers rank fourth in the country in time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 33:11 over the first sever games. In its four conference games, UW is winning the T.O.P. battle 32:53-27:07.

In ist two seasons as a tight end,
Travis I eckum has 1,458 career receiving yards, just one yard behind David
Charles for 10th place on UW's all-time receivir yardage list. At his current pace,
Beckur would become just the third layer Wisconsin history with more than 1, 00 yards receiving in a season.

The Badgers have converted 47 5 percent of their third down this season, third in the Big en and good for 14th in the country. UW is also 4-of-7 on fourth down this year (57.1 percent), fifth in the Big Ten.

Freshman Kyle Jefferson set career highs in both receptions (six) and receiving yards (124). The 124 yards were the econd-most by a true freshman receiver in UW history, trailing only Brandon Williams, who had 125 yards on Sept. 7, 2002 vs. West Virginia.

- Jefferson is averaging 19.7 yards per catch and is responsible for the Badgers' two longest touchdowns this season, a 64-yard reception vs. Michigan State and a 43-yarder at Illinois. His average per catch is the highest in the country among freshmen with at least 300 yards receiving.
- QB Tyler Donovan recorded career highs in pass completions (27), attempts (49) and yards (392) at Illinois on Oct. 6.


His 392 passing yards are the third-most in Badger history and the most for a UW player since Darrell Bevell threw for a school-record 423 yards vs. Minnesota (Oct. 23, 1993). His 49 passing attempts were also the third-most in Badger history and the most since Bevell threw the ball 51 times against Iowa (Nov. 18, 1995). Donovan's 27 completions were the fourth-most in school history.

Defensive Notes


- ♦ UW's defense has allowed 67 points in the second half this season (an average of 9.6), allowing the Badgers to outscore their opponents 89-67 after halftime. The Badgers have allowed an average of 74.6 fewer yards in the second half this season.
- ♦ True freshman defensive back Aaron Henry recorded a sack against Penn State and leads the team with 3.5 quarterback sacks this season. That is the most for a Badger defensive back in a single season since UW began tracking sacks in 1981.
- ♦ Junior linebacker Jonathan Casillas leads the Badgers in tackles with 53 this season. He recorded a team-leading 10 tackles at Penn State, his second consecutive double-digit tackle game and fourth of his career.

Special Teams Notes

- ◆ Taylor Mehlhaff has kicked 38 field goals in his career, one behind Mike Allen for third place on UW's career list. He also has 51 field goal attempts in his career, tied with John Hall for fourth alltime. Mehlhaff has connected on 38-of-51 (74.5 percent) of his field goals in his career, the third-best field goal percentage in UW history.
- ♦ Punter Ken DeBauche has rebounded from a slow start to the season. Over the last four games he has punted 21 times for an average of 44.1 yards per kick. His 8,704 career punting yards are third-most in UW history.
- ♦ Freshman David Gilreath broke a 60year school record for kickoff return yardage in a game with seven kickoff returns for 189 yards vs. Michigan State on Sept. 29. The previous record was 178 yards by Clarence Self against Michigan in 1947.
- ♦ Gilreath needs only 86 yards to break Brandon Williams' school record of 670 kickoff return yards set in 2002. Gilreath has 584 yards on 26 kickoff returns this season.

On Fr ays, the team has a walk-thru where we finish up with the last practice of the eek by making our final game corrections. We have a light practice on the fie and we go over the plays and ry to est prepare for the looks that we inticipate to get in the game the next day. This is also the most exciting time of the week because we know that the hard part s over we are all ready, and all we have o do now is go play and let it loose on aturday. After the walk-thru we all go hower and then we get on the bus and to the hotel.

The night before the game we stay in he hotel to get our minds and our focus in the game and on the game only. Our itual is to have dinner, a team meeting, atch a movie in our rooms, and then un down for a snack right before lights

out. Dinner is usually the same, salad, chicken, steak, mashed potatoes, spaghetti and clam chowder. That is usually followed by a very healthy dessert of cookies and ice cream. Afterwards is the team meeting, which usually consists of Coach B giving the team a speech, something about eagles (inside joke), followed by a quick meeting with the position coach and then off to your rooms to watch a movie and relax with vour roommate.

I room with Billy Rentmeester and we usually have nothing better to do than to talk about things that no one else in the world would find interesting. We also have our ritual where we call Marcus Randle El's room and sing songs to him as he hangs the phone up on us. That is usually followed by me just sitting there on my bed while Billy talks to his girl on the phone and whispers sweet nothings into her ear. After an hour or so of fooling around in the room we usually

take a look at the film of the opposing defense on my laptop and then I usually get some work done for class or try and write this. and they do a really good job with those. We then drive to the Camp Randall Arch and walk to the locker room a few hours before the game.

The locker room is usually quiet and most guys have their headphones on listening to their game music. I usually start off by listening to gospel to get me right and then I put on some typical hype music to get my blood flowing a little more. As we start getting called out for warm-up, our focus is really on the game as we take the field for the last time before the game starts. Our warm-up is really fun and just really is a chance to get a look at the other team and get psyched up with your teammates about the beauty that is about to occur. Finally we call it in and go back to the locker room and do our last-minute rituals before the game.

The Moment is Here

Finally, the moment comes when you walk out of the locker-room to the tunnel and down to the field. I must say that this is the second-best part of the day, besides the victory. As you walk out, you hear the fans roaring, the band playing, and see the student section just going nuts. This is a climactic moment and inside you know, 'It's Game Time.' When you look around at the stadium, and see all of the people cheering for your team, you want to go out and perform for them because you are on center stage. I always think to myself, "Wow, look at where the good Lord has brought me." Lastly, there is the kickoff, and the game begins. By the way, Badgers win!

Chancellor John D. Wiley



hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer. Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Eviue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for Xray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.



To UW maintained its winning ways in 200 -07 with the men's track and field team unning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. hirteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football ortunes for 16 seasons (1990-2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during is entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Visconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl itles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) n route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in

Head Coach Bret Bielema

ne would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-voungest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work. organization and enthusiasm-all traits Bielema embodies-count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Bielema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its recordsetting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition. Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regularseason victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999. finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the highpowered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were firstteam All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, when he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeves posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked-Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry-have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games. so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the bush ness. The last four teams (2002-06) for which Bielema has coached accumu ated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-91 after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a playe or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a back elor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13.

Cameday at Wisconsin ...

There's Nothing Else Like It

n 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the oftenimitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83.184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnne!," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

"But the thing that really stands out about Wisconsin

is how the team is just such an integral part of the community there. In a lot of ways, Camp Randall is what college football is all about.







Home of the Badgers

ne of college football's finest facilities—Camp Randall Stadium—completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.





Wisconsin Traditions



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live in Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drain 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outlit with a papier-maché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascots name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The turn is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the U because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance an cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW aluminus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.



"Every Sunday we would bowl with the league and then, with my friends, we would go every Friday night when football season was over."


When asked if he was the best out of his group of friends he laughed, remembering the bowling competitions he used to have.

Graham said his brother Brian was the first to start surfing and then he soon joined in and brought his novice level up to experienced.


"I did it pretty much every day when I was young, All my friends surfed and pretty much everyone does it where I am from."






hey are like a lot of groups of friends one would find around campus. They describe themselves as closeknit. There's good-natured ribbing with an overlying of respect amongst everyone in this group.

The biggest thing that separates these four from other people on campus is that they just happen to be the starting defensive line for the Badgers. Senior defensive tackle like Hayden, junior defensive tackle Jason Chapman, and unior defensive ends Mike Newkirk and Matt Shaughnessy have forged a bond that goes beyond the football field.

The line has a wealth of experience. The four have started every game this season and have combined to play a total of 134 games between them.

C apman, a native of Bedford Heights, Ohio, says that having four guys up front with experience is key to adjusting to ame situations.

"I hen different situations occur, we know how to handle then because that experience makes us better," he said.

D ring practices, the four tend to stick together.

"Ve just like joking around with each other," Hayden, a Harl and, Wis., native, said. "We tell each other stories during practice while on the field. We keep to ourselves. But when e need to say something, we'll say it."

It because of each other that they have all progressed

as pla ers too.

"Ve learn from each other," Chapman said. "We learn from each other's mistakes, each other's games. Basically we are our own cotics."

O e person in particular who has noticed their development is defesive line coach Randall McCray.

"ney've got their own little clique inside themselves," he said. ' //hich doesn't bother me. The team understands what they

are an what they do."

E en though he is only in his second season as their coach,

McCra said that he has seen a lot of growth from the defensive

"They've worked really hard at it," he said. "As coaches, we just guide them. The kids need to take ownership of their positions. When they do that, which this group has done, they'll be successful."

McCray said that the four are good people and that they care about the game.

"They study and they want to be successful," he said. "They do all the little things and they're athletic. My first overall impressions were that they care and that they're fast."

He says that each one brings something unique to the table.


Chapman brings a great first step. Hayden has the experience. Shaughnessy brings speed off the edge with his pass-rushing ability and long arms. Newkirk brings strength and the ability to understand the game.

From a coach's standpoint, McCray said that they're pretty easy to coach.

"The more they want to be successful, the easier it is," he said. "These guys want to be successful. They want to be coached. They want to learn. They want to be right. They want to make plays."

Add it all up and you've got a front four that helped lead one of the best defensive units in the country last season.

The team led the Big Ten and was No. 5 nationally in yards allowed per game. It was No. 2 nationally in scoring defense, giving up just 12.1 points per game. Five opponents last year didn't score a touchdown.

To translate that to this year, the four feel that they're going to need to elevate their games.

"We lost a lot of great leaders from last year," Hayden said.

"I try to have fun all the time," he explained.

Chapman said, and the rest agreed, that he is the quiet one out of the four.

"He's got little jokes that he whispers to people," Hayden said.

"I'm the instigator," Shaughnessy interjected.

Newkirk was described by the others as the intense one.

There is a lot of respect amongst the four, but that doesn't mean guys won't get their shots in on the others when they can.

When Hayden, the only senior of the four, was asked if he'd passed anything down to the other four or advised them on anything, he responded by saying his pass-rushing ability. He paused a moment before saying he was just kidding, but it was too late. Laughter and a joking sense of disbelief came across the other three.

"Did you really just say that?" Chapman responded incredulously. "Wow..."

Chapman got his own jabs in later. Playing video games is one of their favorite hobbies and he let it be known that Hayden might not have the stuff that the others do.

"We just chill and play video games," Chapman said. "Watch Nick lose at Madden every weekend. He is the worst player at Madden ever."

Off the field and on the field, the four have come to be good friends. Coach McCray has his own way of looking at them.

"Any time things go well or go wrong, family is what you always turn to," he said. "They consider themselves their own family."





Badgers in the NFL Update

Daliels Continues to Flourish in Houston

With v de receiver Andre Johnson contin ing to sit out with a sprained left kn e, second-year tight end **Owen**Danie and his Houston teammates have raised heir level of play to compensate for the loss of the Pro Bowler.

Daniel in particular has been a revelation fo the Texans, hauling in 23 receptions for 300 yards during the four games Johns on has missed, including five catches for 9 yards in the Texans' most recent 37-17 oss at Jacksonville.

During practice last week, head coach Gary Kubiak stressed the critical role Daniel has had of late in the Texans' gameplan.

'He's been very, very important," Kubiak old HoustonTexans.com. "In the game the other day, he told me, 'Give me the ball.' He's never said that to me (before). He's becoming a pretty darn good player."

Daniels, who played quarterback early in his Badger career, was a favorite of former quarterback David Carr and has quickly developed a good rapport with new signal caller Matt Schaub.

"He has a good feel for route running and zone coverages so he can get open and he finishes plays," Schaub said. "He catches the football and he makes something happen with it afterward."

On Oct. 7, in a 22-19 win over Miami, Daniels earned Houston's offensive player of the game honors by hauling in six passes for 96 yards. Five of his six receptions went for first downs, including two key grabs of 19 and 14 yards on Houston's winning drive.

For the season, Daniels has 372 yards receiving, a career-best, and his 29 receptions are only five away from his total from last season.

Williams Makes Debut with Rams

Two weeks after being released by San Francisco, wide receiver **Brandon Williams** signed with the St. Louis Rams to help fill the team's need for a return specialist. Williams will replace two-time Pro Bowler Dante Hall, who is expected to miss several weeks with an ankle injury.

In an otherwise dismal 22-3 loss to Baltimore, Williams provided a bright spot, averaging 22.4 yards on five kick-off returns and 11.0 yards on two punt returns.

Williams was also forced into action at wide receiver, after an already depleted Rams' receiving corps lost Drew Bennett to a hamstring injury in Baltimore. Despite having less than a week to learn the playbook, Rams' head coach Scott Linehan had plenty of confidence playing the St. Louis native.

"He knows the system is somewhat similar coming from San Francisco," Linehan told StLouisRams.com. "We were pretty much yelling (plays) at him from the sideline on a lot of them."

Overall, Williams was pleased with his performance.

"I felt good (in the return game)," Williams said. "I wish I could have gotten a little bit more here or there, but that will come with reps. Dante and I talked a little bit on the sideline during the game, so he gave me a little tip here and there, and I will be implementing that."

Prior to joining the Rams, the former third-round pick and second-year veteran had played in 16 games during his NFL career. During that stretch, Williams returned 27 punts for 179 yards (6.6 avg) and 16 kickoffs for 380 yards (23.8 avg) as a member of the 49ers.



Lea ning the Ropes With

Eric F ueve has been climbing trees and swing g from ropes for most of his professional life.

A adviser for Adventure Learning Progr. ns (ALPs), a unit of UW-Madison's Stude t Organizations Office, he's an expert in experiential education, a teaching philosophy involving learning by doing

One key facet of ALPs is the use of climbing and ropes courses to help groups build self-esteem, trust, teamwork, communication and problem-solving skills. A ropes or challenge course is a series of activities and obstacles that provides small groups with an intense adventure experience in accessible urban areas. In a low ropes course, obstacles are on or near the ground, while a high ropes course is built on utility poles, in trees or in the rafters of buildings.

Knueve and the students at ALPs are making a two-decade-old dream a reality; the idea of a ropes course owned and operated by UW-Madison has been supported campuswide since the 1990s.

Located at the West Madison

Agricultural Research Station, the lowropes portion of the challenge course is
how complete, and ALPs is working to
find funding to add a high ropes element

and a shelter structure.

Last year, more than 3,000 people participated in ALPs workshops. As the programming and resources continue to grow, Knueve hopes to also increase its community involvement.

"More and more outside groups are coming to us because they've heard of us through people at the university." He says that with the new ropes course and

additional staff, he hopes ALPs can sustain itself with outside group workshops, helping them further their mission and goals while carrying out the Wisconsin Idea.

Researchers Identify Key Step Bird Flu Takes to Spread in Humans

Since it first appeared in Hong Kong in 1997, the H5N1 avian flu virus has slowly evolved into a pathogen better equipped to infect humans. The final form of the virus, biomedical researchers fear, will be a highly pathogenic strain of influenza that spreads easily among humans.

Now, in a new study, a team of UW-Madison researchers report the identification of a key step the virus must take to facilitate the easy transmission of the virus from person to person.

A team of researchers led by virologist Yoshihiro Kawaoka has identified a single change in a viral protein that facilitates the virus's ability to infect the cells of the upper respiratory system in mammals. By adapting to the upper respiratory system, the virus is capable of infecting a wider range of cell types and is more easily spread, potentially setting the stage for a flu pandemic.

As the name implies, bird flu first arises in chickens and other birds. Humans and other animals in close contact with the birds may be infected, and the virus begins to adapt to new host animals, a process that may take years as small changes accumulate. Over time, an avian virus may gather enough genetic change to spread easily, as experts believe was the case with the 1918 Spanish flu, an event that killed at least 30 million people worldwide.



Bowling with the Badgers ...

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!



ver the last 14 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' nine bowl victories over that spaties them with Boston College for the most in the nation. UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14, to capture its second straight Capital $\Omega_{\rm R}$ Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.


Bowl games with the Badgers are als a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida Arizona and Texas.

This second-quarter touchdown catch by tight end Travis Beckum gave Wisconsin a 17-7 lead over Arkansas in last year's Capital One Bowl. The Badgers went on to win the game 17-14, their second consecutive Capital One Bowl victory.



very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In 2006, many UW individuals were recognized for their contributions to the school-record 12 wins. Chief among those players was offensive tackle Joe Thomas. Thomas was a consensus first-team All-American and became the first UW player to win the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top lineman.

Two returnees, junior tight end Travis Beckum and sophomore running back P.J. Hill also garnered national recognition last year. Hill was named national Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com and also earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Beckum, in his first season as a tight end, was a second team All-American and John Mackey Award semificient

American and John Mackey nalist.

In his first year at the helm, UW head coach Bret Bielema was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Bear Bryant national Coach of the Year

Award.

The most decorated former Badger is running back Ron

Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy

(best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarik Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and





National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He was also a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.






This Week in Badger History



Tony G nato, who along with Jim Johannson recorded the two fastest consective goals in UW history, went on to play in the NHL where he lallied: \$4 career goals with the New York Rangers.

OC OBER 20-27

Sept. 20, 1991 — After posting 10 losses and two ties in 12 previous meetings, the men's soccer team ecorded its first-ever win over national power Indiana, 1-0, in Madison.

On the same day in 1996, the Badger women's soccer team played to a scoreless tie with Michigan, becoming the first Big Ten team to complete the conference season undefeated (5-0-2).

Sept. 21, 1899 — Pat O'Dea kicked a 100-yard punt in the pre-modern era for the Badger football team against Yale.

Sept. 22, 1976 — The men's hockey team set a learn record for most assists in a period with 14 in the third period against Western Ontario.

Sept. 23, 1993 — Sophomore Darrell Bevell passed for 423 yards against Minnesota en route to setting

the team single-game record for passing yards. It is one of two 400-yard passing games in UW history.

Sept. 24, 1993 — Laura Bleyhl set the once all-time lowest individual total on 54-holes with a 221 total (73-74-74) at the Stanford Invitational in Palo Alto, Calif.

Sept. 25, 1986 — Wisconsin men's hockey player Steve Tuttle scored three goals in a 5-2 win over Minnesota to become one of three players to record a hat trick during the 1986-87 season.

Sept. 26, 1984 — More than 600 people crammed the floor of the Field House to honor 10 years of women's participation in athletics at the UW. Kit Saunders-Nordeen and former UW and Olympic rower Carie Graves were inducted into the newly initiated Women's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Sept. 27, 1985 — Tony Granato and Jim Johannson tied the record for the fastest two goals scored in UW history when they tallied goals six seconds apart at Lowell.


Meet the Northern Illinois Huskies

Novak is in his 34th year of coaching. He has served as an assistant with Miami (Dhio), Illinois, Indiana and Northern Illinois.





Sophomore running back Justin Anderson had a team-leading seven touchdowns in the Huskies' first six games. The Chicago native is in his first season as the starting RB. In the team's first six games, Anderson averaged 122.7 rushing yards and 28.7 receiving yards per game.

Huskie Stadium (capacity 24,000) has been the home of Northern Illinois football since 1965. In August of 2007, the football team moved into the brand new Jeffrey and Kimberly Yordon Center. The addition provides student-athletes with academic services, athletic training and strength and conditioning facilities. In 2003, the playing field was rededicated as Brigham Field in honor of long-time Huskie, Robert J. Bingham. Over 50 years, Bingham was a student-athlete, assistant coach, head coach, athletic director and assistant to the university president. FieldTurf and a video scoreboard have been present since the 2001 season.

Behind the Scenes With ...

THE FIELD GOAL NET OPERATORS

Ever wonder who is responsible for raising or lowering the nets behind the goalposts at Camp Randall Stadium when a kicker is getting ready to attempt a field goal or extra point? Well the Badger Football Gameday Program was so we searched out Mark Petranyi and Gene Neumaier of the UW Facilities and Maintenance Staff to see what they could tell us about their Saturday jobs.

How did you get this job?

GENE NEUMAIER: It's just part of our gameday duties.

MARK PETRANYI: I worked on campus for the Physical Plant for about one year. I found out about an opening at the Athletic Department. I applied for the job, which was a promotion and was hired. That was back in 1985. Part of the responsibilities working for facilities was working the football games.

Is it something you need to practice or have any special training?

GN. No

MP: No. You just need the strength to pull the net up. It just involves pulling on a rope, holding it in place and then letting it down.

How long does it take you to get it all the way to the top?

GN: About 20 seconds. MP: Approximately 15 seconds

Ever raise or lower the net at an inopportune time?

GN: When the band was still on the field, the net used to be about 20 yards further back than it is now. We couldn't see as well from back there and put the net up as the Badgers went for it on fourth down. They ended up getting a first down. MP: No. With 80,000 people watching you sure don't want to make a mistake. Although the net has gone up and the team called a fake field goal. The net was not needed.

Has the net ever gotten tangled or hung up on something so that it couldn't be raised?

GN: About six years ago, a band member passed out on the net just as the team was about to kick a field goal. The paramedics were working on her so we couldn't get the net up. Per Mar had to go into the student section to retrieve the ball.

MP: It has gotten caught or stuck a few times both going up and down. We have to react quickly and correct the problem. The main cause is the ropes getting tangled. We have always got it unstuck quickly. It never affected the kicking of the ball.

Ever get caught sleeping on the job and forget to raise it?

MP: Never. We always have to pay attention to the game and be aware of where the team is on the field so we are ready to put the net up if needed. We have been a little late in getting the net up

and have had the field goal kicked while we are still pulling the net up.

Any changes now that there's a sponsor logo on one end?

GN: It's a little heavier.

MP: The net is a little heavier with the ad logo on it. With the sponsor net, we have to make sure the net is all the way up and even at the top so the logo hangs straight.

Do you ever move it slightly while the opposing team's kicker is lining up a kick?

GN: No.

MP: No. We put the net all the way up and hold it there. We do not operate the net any different for either team.

Ever get heckled by the fans?

GN: If you are in the north end zone, in front of the student section, sometimes they will cheer the net guys so it makes our day a lot more fun.

MP: Once, when my walkie talkie got caught in the net when it was going up. The net pulled the radio off of my belt and it was caught on the net. The radio went up with the net. A few fans cheered and pointed at the radio.

A Great Time to Be a Badger!

In 2006–07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year.


Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.







he Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mis-

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8.400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- · are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- · have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- · house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

· Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the

Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates-the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years. and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.



The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- · The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey. Minnesota wrestling. Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country. field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.
- · Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



40 HIRSCH

#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-11 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



88 RICHTER

#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued in the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shawas fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shaws one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a foolball-related injury.

PAT RICHTER (1960-62): Hall of Fame inductee both on field and classroom ... former Badger A.D.



NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin:

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic commu-

nications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost ser-

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

 h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the above.

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and
- The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.







Matt Demaray

Wrestling 1989-1992

Matt Demaray took his place among Badger legends as he was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in August of 2007. Prior to joining the Badgers in 1989, Demaray was named the 1988 USA Espoir National Champion and USA Fila Espoir World Freestyle Champion.

During Demaray's illustrious career at Wisconsin, he was a 3 time All American (1990-92.) Demaray's junior and senior campaigns established his place as a Badger Wrestling Legend. In 1991 and 1992, Demaray was a two-time NCAA champion in the 150 lb weight class. In both years he was named Big Ten Wrestler of the Year, earned the 150 lb. Big Ten Championship, and was also named Wisconsin's Outstanding Wrestler.

In 1991, Demaray also became one of only three Badgers of all time to record an undefeated season in 1990-1991 (42-0.) In 1992, Demaray was also named First Team Academic All-American by the National Wrestling Coaches Association, and received the Big Ten Medal of Honor Award.

Following his career at UW, Demaray won the U.S. Senior Open Freestyle Championships from 1992-1995. He was an Olympic Team Alternate in 1992. Demaray also served as assistant coach of the Badgers in 1992 and 1993.



Pror to practice, Peeler and his staff makes sure the players have everything they need. Whether it is socks, shoes, things hey lose or things that are worn out, the staff is there to make sure each athlete has everything they need.

"Every day we check the equipment, especially the helmets, to make sure everything is in working order so that it doesn't break on the field," said Peeler. "Only when something breaks and isn't fixed is the time that us equipment personnel get attention, and it's usually not the good kind of attention."

'Our student managers do so much for us," Peeler remarked. "We have a total of 15 student managers that help us out. Five are in the locker room helping with the check-in and check-out of equipment. The other 10 are on the field and are each assigned a coach to help with drill-specific

Whether it is setting up cones, holding dummies, setting balls and holding chains, the students do a lot of work and are a very important part of the program.



The equipment staff is responsible for setting up the locker room, making sure everyone's uniforms and pads are in order, prior to each home and away game.

"Our students managers are such a great group of kids," said Peeler. "We couldn't do what we do without them,"

On gamedays, the equipment staff packs the equipment trunks with all kinds of extra gear, from facemasks to gloves to extra coats and towels. When traveling to away games the staff literally moves the entire equipment operation on

Peeler and his staff arrive at the stadium about four hours before kickoff to prepare the locker room and field. They get the helmets out and hang the jerseys in front of the players' lockers to make the locker room look nice and ready for the players. The game pants and a game program are laid out for each player to take a look at as they are arriving to the locker

After a game, all the students work together collecting all the clothing and equipment. Peeler and his assistant, Terry Calloway, take care of the actual washing of the uniforms and getting them prepared for the next game. Home games are a lot easier due to the turf; the uniforms don't accumulate much for stains. Away games on grass and rain games are a whole other story. The road white uniforms can

become very dirty very fast with wet conditions.


Peeler and his staff spend numerous hours every day working with the athletes and coaches and are a key part to the program's yearly success.

"The thing I love most about this job is seeing the growth of the students as they progress over four or five years," said Peeler. "When these kids come in as freshmen they are experiencing a whole new world. I really enjoy the way they mature and become better players and better people in the time they are here. Also, I love to come to work every day, and you can't ask for more than that."

The next time you are watching the Badgers at Camp Randall or on TV, be sure to take a minute and observe the numerous people on the sidelines assisting the players and coaches before, during and after the game.





Final Thoughts



Each week, Justin Doherty, UW's assistant athletic director for communications, will offer a look at the Badger football program. In his position, Doherty has unique access to the coaches and players and a good understanding of their experiences. This week he talks about a couple of Coach Bielema's philosophies.

A nyone who has listened to head coach Bret Bielema speak publicly – at a news conference, Badger Days function, media day, alumni gathering – has likely heard one of two phrases: "1-0 mentality" or "it's not what happens during the course of a game, it's how you react to it."

Bret has uttered these mantras hundreds of times and, because of that, I sometimes wonder if their impact is lessened. I hope not, because they're not just meaningless clichés. Rather, I'd say they are pretty wise philosophies that apply not only to football, but to life in general.

Let's take "1-0" for example and use it in a football analogy. My take on "1-0" is that you focus on each moment (or day, or game, or meeting, etc.), do the best you can with it and then move on so you can focus on the next moment. Regardless of whether a quarterback throws a touchdown pass, an incompletion or an interception, he has to move onto the next play. He can learn from the previous play, but he has to let go of it or he won't be able to focus completely on the next play.

The "1-0" philosophy is available to all of us at most any time. But it's often easier said than done. Potential distractions are everywhere. Our focus shifts or floats off somewhere and, the next thing we know, we're stuck thinking about the previous play. Which is where the second of Bret's sayings — "it's not what happens during the course of a game, it's how you react to it" — comes into the picture.

All kinds of situations arise during a football game. A touchdown. A missed field goal. A foolish penalty. A great catch. A brilliant coaching decision. And on and on. Each event, each action, elicits a response or reaction. Team A intercepts a pass and returns it for a touchdown. How does Team B respond? Team B's offense fails on a fourth-and-1, giving Team A momentum. How does Team B's defense respond?

I witnessed a great example of both philosophies last week. I ran into Luke Swan the day after his season-ending injury at Illinois. He was on crutches and, obviously, pretty down. I mentioned to him that, prior to the injury during the Illinois game, he had gone over 1,000 yards receiving for his career. I also told him that I believe that buried somewhere in each moment of adversity is an opportunity.

Luke showed up at practice two days later, encouraging his teammates and offering tips to the likes of freshmen Kyle Jefferson and David Gilreath. It was both of Bret's philosophies rolled into one at that moment. It was a young man doing what he could in that given moment ("1-0") and demonstrating a most useful way to react to something that had happened in the course of his life.


