They have done more to hold the organization together, and to keep members informed than any other activity I have observed in my 34 years of membership. And Hugh Singleton is one of our best philosophers and writers, who writes about activities everyone thinks about but do not record in words. Through his writings I am able to look at everyday events through his eyes and can always hear his sonorous, southern accented voice as he thinks and writes about the important events in his life.
