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REGULAR MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Madison, Wisconsin

Monday, September 11, 1933, 2 P.M.

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Sholts; President Frank, Business Manager Phillips, Secretary McCaffrey.

Regent Wilkie could not attend, being absent from the state.

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Loans and Scholarships, Kenneth Purdy was appointed Marston Scholar for the year 1933-34, to receive a stipend of \$300, to be paid in four installments of \$75 each.

Scholar

Dean Bardeen came to the meeting and presented the following recommendations in re loan scholarships to medical students in the amount of the new \$50 semester fee, which were approved:

Loan Scholar

1. That for the first semester of the present year, owing to the relatively short notice of the new tuition fee for students in the medical school, a student may defer to November first without penalty the payment of this tuition fee, upon written recommendation of the dean of the medical school that this delay be granted.

2. That fourth year students who have already paid the previous incidental fee of \$21.50 and have completed half of the half year's work for which this fee was paid, be exempted from the new fees for the current half year (July 1 to December 29).

3. That for the present year, owing both to general conditions and to the special conditions of short notice of additional fees, tuition loan scholarships be granted in such numbers as may appear necessary to enable worthy students to remain in school and carry on their work without undue financial distress, owing to unanticipated charges for medical education; that such loans carry an interest charge of 5%, that they be made renewable up to not later than three years after graduation from the medical school for students remaining here to graduate and one year after leaving

the university for students not thus graduating here; that a discount be granted to students repaying loan scholarships within the time stated, such that the result will be as follows: If paid within one year after receipt the interest shall be charged at the rate of 2% instead of 5%. If paid within two years after receipt the interest shall be charged at the rate of 3% instead of 5%. If paid at the end of four years the interest charge shall be at the rate of 4% instead of 5%.

4. That upon the basis of the principles laid down, scholarships be awarded to the following students in groups I to IV, inclusive, in each class. (See Exhibit A attached.)

Loan Scholars

5. That no student be granted credit for the completion of any given year of the medical school curriculum until he has paid the full tuition fee for that year's work except in case of students who previous to September, 1933, have as regularly enrolled students been registered for merely a part of a year's work and have completed the part for which they have been registered with good grades. In such cases the tuition fee shall be pro-rated at \$3.10 per credit for the additional subjects necessary to complete the year's work.

6. That students repeating a year because of poor scholarship be charged the full regular tuition fee even though not required to repeat all the work of the year.
