





Administration

Dr. Kit Saunders begins her eighth year as Wisconsin's Director of Women's Athletics. She has had a long association with women's athletics at Wisconsin, however, having served as the sports coordinator, lecturer in physical education, and women's tennis coach for eight years prior to her present appointment in 1974.

Under Kit's leadership the athletic program has experienced great increases each year in funding and participation. Wisconsin teams have enjoyed the benefits of excellent coaching, fine facilities and adequate budgets while the Wisconsin women's sports program has emerged as a model for other Division I athletic programs.

Kit's demonstrated leadership at home has also had an impact within the state, region and even nationally. She has served in numerous state offices including that of President. She has been a Commissioner for the six-state Midwest Region V, and is presently national Vice President of the AIAW for Division I schools.

Assisting Dr. Saunders in directing the Wisconsin women's athletics program is Paula Bonner. Beginning her fourth year as Assistant Athletic Director, the South Carolina native brings the enthusiasm and knowledge to her position which makes her so indispensable to the staff and student-athletes alike. Her varied responsibilities include working closely with the coaches and athletes in matters concerning recruitment, financial aid, eligibility and special events arrangements. Paula and Kit also work closely in areas of budget preparation, policy definition and fund raising. Paula is currently serving as chairperson of the State and Midwest Regional AIAW ethics and eligibility committees.





Sports Information

The responsibility for disseminating all information and publicity materials for the 12-sport women's athletic program lies with **Tamara J. Flarup**, Director of Women's Sports Information.

Now in her fifth year, Tam has been able to observe Wisconsin women's sports gain stature and recognition both statewide and nationally. Under Tam's direction the sports news staff coordinates sports results, plans brochures and other publicity materials, and writes weekly sports releases and additional features on the women athletes. Tam also assists the Women's Intercollegiate Sports Booster Club (W.I.S.) in their promotions and publications.

Active in concerns of women's sports publicists nationally, Tam organized and chaired the College Sports Infor-



mation Directors (CoSIDA) "Publicists for Women's Sports Committee" two years, and is a member of the AIAW Publicity Committee.

Sports Medicine



Janet Tappon begins her fourth year as the head Women's Athletic Trainer at Wisconsin. Utilizing the modern training facilities in Camp Randall Stadium, Jan provides for the care, prevention and treatment of injuries for all Wisconsin women athletes.

Together with her staff of student trainers, Jan is responsible for covering all practices and competitions of the 12 women's sports. Besides the Camp Randall training center, Jan also has access to training facilities in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse and Natatorium. All are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Jan is a N.A.T.A. certified athletic trainer whose experience and knowledge helped her in being selected to be one of 60 athletic trainers who worked with the athletes at the 1980 Winter Olympic Games in Lake Placid, NY.

Academic Counseling



Academic excellence is a phrase which is stressed at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athlete.

Assistant to the Director of Athletics Diane Johnson and Counselor Alan Zussman are responsible for the Wisconsin athletics counseling program which is offered to the nearly 900 Badger athletes. As former members of the academic dean's office, Diane and Al have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.



For those athletes that do request assistance, Diane and Allan offer counseling sessions on a one-on-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. Johnson and Zussman take a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether the needs be personal or academic in nature.

Volleyball History and Highlights

In its eight year history, the women's volleyball program at Wisconsin has fashioned a 223-103-14 record for a winning percentage of .676. The team has never had a losing season, and has made eight consecutive appearances in Midwest Regional competition.

The 1980 squad posted a 24-21 record while placing seventh in the Big Ten Championship. The Badgers also placed seventh in the 12-team Midwest Regional Tournament. Additional tournament finishes include a first place title in the DePaul Invitational, second place in the Illinois Invitational, and third in the Western Michigan Invitational.

Volleyball practice and tryouts begin the last week of August, and the competitive season begins in September concluding in November. Following the semester break ending in January, the varsity team competes in its "second season" as a school sponsored USVBA team.


Madison and the Wisconsin Campus

Nestled between a chain of four sparkling lakes, the most dominant feature on the Madison skyline is the majestic capitol building whose 200-foot illuminated white dome is visible for miles both day and night.

Madison is a clean, vibrant city whose chief business is education and government. Located just three driving hours from Chicago, one-and-one-half hours from Milwaukee, and five hours from Minneapolis, Madison is consistently rated as one of the most attractive places to live in the country. In 1978, Madison proudly accepted the designation of All-America City given by the National Municipal League.

The Wisconsin campus is located just one mile from the state capitol on a series of hills overlooking scenic Lake Mendota, the largest of the chain of lakes.

The campus covers over 900 acres—most within two blocks of Lake Mendota. Many of the residence halls have the lake in their backyard, and there are numerous bathing beaches along the Mendota shoreline. In addition, the UW Arboretum, a nature study and hiking area offers another 1,224 acres to the campus community. Also located near the campus is a 129-acre park-like peninsula called Picnic Point which extends into Lake Mendota and is used for nature study and recreation. Jogging paths and bike trails extend along the entire campus shoreline of Lake Mendota.



Volleyball Coaching Staff




Head Coach Niels Pedersen

Former UW assistant women's volleyball coach Niels Pedersen will be heading up the women's volleyball team in 1981-82. The Milwaukee native has been coaching at various levels for the past seven years including stints as the Madison Memorial High School boys' and girls' volleyball coach, the Wisconsin men's volleyball club coach, USVBA coach for men's and women's teams in Madison, and Junior Olympic boys coach and USVBA Junior National boys coach. He was selected the Midwest men's volleyball coach for the 1981 National Sports Festival in Syracuse, NY.

In addition to coaching, Niels has been a competitive volleyball player several years for the UW men's club team as well as Madison USVBA teams. He has been the host chairman for three international volleyball matches between the U.S.A. and Russia, Cuba and Korea which were held in Madison. He also serves as Associate Commissioner of the Wisconsin USVBA, and as head coach for Sports Camps International during the summer.

Niels is a 1972 Wisconsin graduate in anthropology, and is currently working on his master's degree in biodynamics.

Assistant Coach Russ Carney



Russ began his playing career at Kellogg, and later transferred to Ball State University in Ohio where he lettered two years. He graduated from Ball State in 1977 with a degree in physical education, and returned to Kellogg as the assistant coach two years before taking the head job in 1980.

Russ has also had several years of coaching Junior Olympic teams where his men's team won the gold medal at the 1980 Junior Olympics. Russ collected another gold medal in the 1981 National Sports Festival where he coached the men's East team to a first place finish.
