President McNamara presiding

President McNamara welcomed Dr. Herbert J. Grover, Niagara, Wisconsin, to the Board.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, Erdman, Grover, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Thompson, Walter, Zancanaro

ABSENT. Regents DeBardleben, Fish, Gerrard, Hales

The Secretary requested that the minutes of the June 11, 1976, meeting be corrected on page 10 by substituting the word "discretion" for the word "discussion" in lines 9 and 11 of Mr. DeBardleben's statement.

Upon motion by Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on June 11, 1976, be approved as corrected above.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President McNamara stated that the standing committees of the Board will remain the same for the ensuing year, with the exception that Regent Grover will replace Regent Solberg on the Physical Planning and Development Committee. The list of committee members is attached as EXHIBIT A.

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President McNamara reported the appointment of Regent Lawton as an added member to the Special Committee for Medical Affairs. He also announced that Regent Barkla was appointed to the Hospital Council of Trustees for University Hospitals for a four-year term, and that Regent Neshek was resigning from the Hospital Council

of Trustees and Regent Lawton will replace him for a two-year term. He announced further that Mr. Ray Theisen, a public member appointed for a one-year term, had indicated that business commitments prevented him from accepting another appointment, and appointed Mr. Bruce Thomas, of Madison, as a citizen member for a four-year term to the Hospital Council of Trustees.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1271: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, attached)

President Weaver reported that Chancellor Baum, of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Campus, has been appointed by President Ford to serve a three-year term on the National Advisory Committee on Oceans and Atmosphere.

At the request of President Weaver, Vice President and Controller Reuben Lorenz reported that the National Association of College and University Business Officers, which has a membership of approximately 1,600 institutions, had requested its members to submit proposals outlining cost reductions in operation during the calendar year 1975. He reported eighteen winners had been announced and that the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay had received an award of \$500 for its cost reduction efforts in the area of energy utilization, and the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh had received a second place award of \$7,500 for its efforts in the better utilization of faculty time.

President Weaver referred to the report of the Legislative Audit Bureau on its survey of policies and procedures in the areas of academic administration, new program approvals, audit and review of existing programs, and evaluation of faculty productivity, which had been distributed to all members of the Board. He noted that we were generally very pleased with the report, which was both thorough and objective, and confirmed our belief that the policies and procedures we have put in place will maintain and strengthen the quality of our academic programs. President Weaver stated we were pleased with the open and professional manner in which the Legislative Audit Bureau staff carried out their work and with the cooperative spirit with which our universities provided information. The Faculty Administrative Advisory Committee gave immense help in the survey as it proceeded. He reported that in responding to the Board, Vice President Smith noted the recommendation of the Legislative Audit Bureau that the survey team proceed next year with its survey on the seven University campuses not involved in this year's survey, and the undertaking in 1977-78 of an audit of the effects of follow-up and program review recommendations. He stated that we have requested that if such an audit is to be undertaken that it be carried out not earlier than 1978-79 so that we may have

at least three years of experience prior to making an effort to do a thorough evaluation of results. President Weaver stated that Senator McKenna had indicated an intention to keep this recommendation in mind and keep open the question of the timing of such an audit.

President McNamara stated that a Regent Committee consisting of Regent Hales, Lavine and himself (Vice President Neshek could not attend because of a water-skiing accident) met with Senator McKenna and Robert Ringwood, Legislative Audit Bureau Chief, and distributed a written summary of the discussion. (Attached as EXHIBIT C.) President McNamara stated that he left the meeting with the firm conviction that the Legislative Audit Bureau has no intention of intruding into any areas which might impinge on the academic freedom of the University System. He stated the thing that pleased him most about the report is that the survey is an independent demonstration of how hard everyone in the University System has worked to make merger a success.

President Weaver made the following statement:

"It is 21 years ago this summer that I left my active professional life as a geographer to accept my first full time administrative position as an academic dean. Exactly half of the 22 administrative years I will have concluded twelve months hence will have been expended in service as president within two major state university systems. Along the administrative road I have travelled there has been a succession of six sensitive, often perplexing, but generally rewarding assignments in a half dozen Midwestern states. Nothing could have been more satisfying than my ultimate, career-climaxing return to alma mater.

"When in the summer of 1955 I abandoned my predilections for my favorite profession as a geographer at the University of Minnesota, to become a Dean of Liberal Arts in Kansas, I promised myself that before I finally concluded my academic life I would once again return to the satisfactions of maps and books. By July 1 of next year I will have no more than the normal expectation of eight years to make good on that self-promise. I believe that time both entitles and compels me to now move fairly promptly into the final chapter of my active professional life.

"Although my health is again strong, and my relations with the Board, my administrative and faculty colleagues and students, all remain both pleasant and completely cordial, if I have any reasonable hope that I might yet indulge myself in a useful return to geography, I need for personal reasons to be about that business on one or more of the campuses in the System where I was, at the time of my coming, awarded professorships. It seems clear to me that having been fortunate enough to marshal an uncommonly effective team to bring a merged system of public higher education to an early stage of maturity in Wisconsin, it is in the best interests of the Universities we all serve that a new, innovatively creative captain for that team now be sought.

"I would ask this Board's understanding and approval of my request to exercise the state-provided option of retirement at age 62 and conclude my present administrative duties at the end of the forthcoming academic year, on June 30, 1977. By making the request at this time I provide the Board adequate opportunity to undertake an orderly and systematic search for my successor, and I provide Ruberta and me the chance to plan in an equally orderly and systematic manner for our long-anticipated return to an academic way of life."

President McNamara made the following statement:

"When President Weaver asked me to come to his office last Monday to discuss his monthly report to the Board, I did not expect that the principal item in that report would be the statement you have just heard. I have respected his wish that no mention of his decision be made to anyone prior to this moment. My fellow Regents can now sense something of the surprise that was mine earlier this week! Having personally satisfied myself that Dr. Weaver's decision was irretrievably final, I resolved to use my unique position of advance knowledge to prepare remarks appropriate for the occasion.

"There will be ample time between now and the end of next June for Regents, members of the University System family, public officials and citizens to acknowledge their debt to John Weaver for the progress and accomplishments of this relatively young public enterprise. That debt is substantial. For nearly six years of unprecedented changes in higher education in general, and particularly in Wisconsin, Dr. Weaver has served ably and with distinction as our first System President. In fact, there have been so many challenges capably met and so many initiatives successfully pursued during this period that it is difficult to list them all, and easy to forget just how substantial each was. Suffice it to say for now, John, you performed exceedingly well in one of the most pressure-filled and innovative periods in the history of Wisconsin higher education. We know such performance will characterize the final year you have set for yourself as our chief executive.

"I should note that not even the temporary setback of an 'affair of the heart' could overcome your commitment to serve or prevent your early return to active duty. This Board, your associates and friends all marvelled at your full recovery from major heart surgery. You have judged the occasion of good health, good relations and the System's good repair to be a signal moment for you to re-enter the arena of your scholarly first love--the field of geography. I sense your excitement and enthusiasm in approaching the eight years beyond next June 30th, not as the twilight of a distinguished career, but as another horizon whose geography is not entirely unknown to you.

"I know that you expect to give, and the Board will vigorously support continued effective leadership during the next eleven months. With your obvious return to good health and the ongoing support of an able staff, persons inside and outside the System may be assured that this Board and its central administrative officers will continue to address vigorously in the months ahead, our ongoing tasks.

"John, you have given much of yourself to this System, and your decision, announced well in advance of your planned transition date, is another evidence of your selflessness. This Board faces a difficult and time-demanding task in selecting your successor and we deeply appreciate your consideration in making your wishes and plans known nearly one year in advance of their effective date. I will be in contact with the Board in the near future regarding the commencement of our selection effort."

The meeting recessed at 9:25 A.M., and resumed at 9:46 A.M.

(Regent Thompson entered the meeting at 9:46 A.M.)

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REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, during action on the Report of the Health Science Advisory Council on Medical Technology Programs Within the UW System, he had noted the recent receipt of communications from State Senator Dale McKenna, Margaret Jensen of Madison, St. Mary's Hospital Medical Center, and Professor Reginald Nash of UW-Whitewater. He noted the resolution also includes the changes recommended by Central Administration relative to the UW-Superior contained in Senior Vice President Smith's letter of July 9, 1976, to the Board of Regents. He reported Dean Gregory O'Brien, UW-Milwaukee, Chairman of the Health Science Advisory Subcommittee on Medical Technology Programming, briefly described the procedures followed by the Committee in organizing this study, gathering the data, and preparing the recommendations. Dean O'Brien also summarized the six principal criteria and related conclusions listed on pages 2-3 of the final report of the University of Wisconsin System Health Science Advisory Council Subcommittee on Medical Technology Audit and Review. He reported Vice President Smith traced the steps leading to the decision to audit and review the System's Medical Technology Programs.

Vice President Smith noted among other things that twelve programs are currently operative in the UW-System and that in proportion to its population, Wisconsin produces more than twice as many medical techologists as any other state in the United States. He also spoke of the relationship of available clinical facilities to University programs as well as supply and demand factors. Regent Lavine reported that he complimented Dean O'Brien and the Subcommittee upon his highly professional performance and Vice President Smith extended special recognition to Academic Planner Steven Bennion and Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson for their outstanding staff support to the Subcommittee.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1272: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Regents approve the recommendations concerning medical technology programs in the UW System as stated on pages 1-3 of ATTACHMENT A: Recommendations and Analysis - Concerning the Report of the Health Science Advisory Council on Medical Technology Programs Within the UW System, dated July, 1976. The Regents direct that these recommendations be implemented by the affected universities and administrative offices of the UW System.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day he recognized Buff Wright, President of the United Council of Student Governments, who introduced Terry Grimshaw, a student at UW-La Crosse, who is to become liaison between the United Council and the Education Committee.

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received Revisions of Academic Program Submission Deadlines (ACIS-1) (Academic Information Series). The effect of the change is to better distribute the workload associated with new academic program proposals.

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a Mini-Report--Student Evaluation of Instruction, which was described by Senior Vice President Smith as an encouraging report indicating that the campuses have developed effective policies on student evaluation of instruction. The policies are still undergoing refinement and implementation procedures are at varying degrees of development due to variations in size and/or diversity in campus organizational structures. During the coming year it is anticipated that System workshops will be held as a means for institutions to exchange information on methodology, procedures, and problems related to student evaluation of instruction policies.

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a Progress Report: Bachelor of Fine Arts Master of Fine Arts Audit. Phase I, Audit of Existing and Proposed BFA/MFA Programs in Art. He reported Senior Vice President Smith explained the need to acquire an adequate knowledge base for responding to requests for entitlement to plan for BFA/MFA Programs in art, including knowledge of the scope and quality of the curricula already existing in the System. He stated the report of an outside expert, retained to review existing programs and make recommendations, has been sent to the campuses and Art Departments for review and comment. The Regents will be informed by Central Administration as to the principles that finally emerge as bases for program decision making in this area. The matter will come back to the Committee when the guidelines are established later on in the Fall.

Regent Lavine reported that Senior Vice President Smith presented the Progress Report: Lateral Audit of Journalism Programs in the UW System, noting that the audit has been a staff study and that the report is currently on the campuses and in the Journalism Departments for review and comment. It is expected that seminars will be held in which principles and guidelines for a program continuation and development will be formulated. Those principles and guidelines will be brought to the Regents for their information.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1273: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System (Policy-New) and the Chancellor of UW-Eau Claire, the UW-Eau Claire faculty policies and procedures document be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1274: (Policy-Revised)

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee, the following amendments to the specified sections of the UW-Milwaukee faculty personnel policies and procedures as required under UWS 2.02 be approved:

Sec. 4.03 Strike period at end of the last sentence and add: "and minutes reflecting all formal actions taken shall be recorded."

Sec. 4.05 To be added:

(4) Each executive committee shall meet at least once each semester. Except as otherwise provided, minutes reflecting all formal actions taken shall be recorded.

Sec. 4.07 Strike paragraph (2) and replace with substitute wording:

(2) Calls meetings of the departmental faculty and of the executive committee, at his/her own initiative or at the request of any two members of the respective bodies, presides over the meetings, transmits minutes of the departmental and executive committee meetings to the appropriate dean, to the Secretary of the University, and to the departmental or executive committee members and maintains such minutes in the departmental files.

Sec. 4.07 Strike paragraph (4) and replace with substitute wording:

(4) Determines that all necessary records of meetings, teaching, research and public service of the department are properly kept and are always accessible to the proper authorities.

Regent Lavine reported that the Planning Context for 1977-81, Major Assumptions and Data, will be thoroughly reviewed and discussed by chancellors and faculties in the fall and will be returned to the Regents in November or December for final approval.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1275: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) Academic/Fiscal Planning Paper #2 (LR-Series) - "The Planning Context, 1977-81: Major Assumptions and Data", dated July, 1976, be granted interim approval.

Regent Erdman inquired if we should not be working with all institutions of higher learning in the State of Wisconsin, because by the year 1980, the competition for students will be very intense, and we are almost talking in this long range paper as if we are the sole institution. She noted there is a community college projected on a multi-acred site in Madison, which is going to take many students away from the Madison area. Regent Lavine pointed out that we do have a series of committees working with the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education System, and it was his understanding that all information developed in our System is correlated with information they are developing and is shared between the two Systems. He pointed out this becomes a more difficult question when one deals

with the non-public post-secondary institutions of the state because their enrollment trends have been uneven in the past few years and it is much harder for them to project. President Weaver stated that we do have an organization that includes all the chief officers of public and private institutions that convenes annually and that we do keep in close touch with our private institutional colleagues. He stated we do not feel that we are in competition with them and that we see the function of the private university as being an extremely important one, and that we do try in various ways and in various fields to take them into account in our planning. He pointed out this was true in the study done on the Medical Technology Programs. He stated that while the private institutions are very proud of their independent status and the fact that they can function as they see fit, we find our relations to be comfortable and cooperative, and we do take them into account in our own planning. He noted the private institutions pride themselves on the fact that they provide a completely independent alternative to education, and we are supportive of them in their belief that they do have a very important mission.

Senior Vice President Smith stated that he felt there is more joint planning and more joint work on decision making going on between the University System and the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education System than at any time in the history of these institutions and Systems, and that this has been a post merger development. He continued that we are not only working on a joint academic program review committee, but we also have joint committees on continuing education in all of the regions of the state, and joint committees on facilities. He stated he felt we have a more serious problem on demographic projections which relate to variables that relate to public policy. He noted that starting in 1985 we are going to have a beginning decline in the number of 18 year olds in our population. We are also going to experience the largest population of people between the ages of 25 and 50 in the history of this nation. We will also have a growing and very much larger population of people beyond 50. The question is, how do these people participate and in what ways and at what levels in higher education. He stated there is, in a very large sense, ample demonstration of the appetite for further education that is almost unsaturable in this nation -- people wanting to come back to the University for continuing education, professional refreshment for personal development, etc. The question is how and in what way can this opportunity be made available to them, and the most painful question of all, how is it going to be paid for -- who is going to participate -- and what proportion of the cost is going to be placed upon those seeking the opportunities. He noted that, in the planning paper, we are talking about three lines of projections, one of which is a projection of what will happen if the present age distribution remains constant. He continued that you have a totally different picture of what kind of markets both VTAE and the University System and private colleges are going to have to serve, if we assume that the present percentages of people over 25 and over 35, who are now in those kinds of programs, are going to be maintained. He stated we do work at the problem cooperatively, with the other public post secondary education system and that the very serious problems of projection get intermingled with problems of public policy, and thus it is an important item for us.

Regent Zancanaro expressed appreciation to Vice President Smith for explaining what is going on between the VTAE and the University of Wisconsin. He stated there has never been a closer relationship between the University of Wisconsin and the VTAE System than exists today. He commended both Systems for their attitudes in this respect and stated that we are trying to avoid repetition and that there is no competition between the two Systems.

The question was put on Resolution 1275, and it was voted.

Regent Lavine reported that ACPS-3.2 is an elaboration of ACPS-3.0, the umbrella statement previously approved by the Regents which states the purposes and procedures within which System institutions are establishing programs for faculty development and renewal, and the supplement sets forth exact procedures for faculty transfer and exchange. These documents represent the modification of several earlier drafts and incorporate recommendations, comments and suggestions from the Chancellors, Vice Chancellors, Interim Faculty Consultative Council, and interested faculty members.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek and it was voted:

Resolution 1276: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) the Regents approve Academic Planning Statement #3.2, Faculty Development and Renewal: A System for Faculty Transfer and Exchange, dated July, 1976, and receive for information the supplement entitled, Administrative Protocol and Financial Guidelines for Faculty Transfer and Exchange.

Regent Lavine stated that it is specifically stipulated that for 1976-77 only, the sabbatical leave program will be limited to the second semester of the academic year, or approximately one-half the amount indicated in the statutes.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1277: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) the document entitled, "Interim Guidelines for the 1976-77 Faculty Sabbatical Program", dated July, 1976, is approved by the Board of Regents for immediate implementation.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee received a Progress Report on UW System Undergraduate and Graduate Program Audit and Review. He stated Vice President Smith noted that the report results from the action taken by the Regents in 1974 establishing policies and guidelines for academic program audit and review. Institutions were requested to develop processes and procedures compatible with those policies which were most likely to accomplish the goals of academic program evaluation. He continued that Dr. Smith emphasized that the function of the audit and review is to insure the health of programs rather than just determine which programs must be excised. The current report may be viewed as a "snapshot" of the situation at a particular point in time. A similar report will be brought to the Board in another year.

Regent Erdman inquired as to the magnitude of the paper work required to conduct this program throughout the System, noting that we had a report on academic management done by the Legislative Audit Bureau, and that it appeared that there were a great number of questionnaires, committee meetings, and many man hours devoted to this project. She inquired if it would be feasible to work with the Legislative Audit Bureau to provide the audits. Regent Lavine responded that the LAB will go to the remaining campuses next year and that this is not a terribly time-consuming operation because the campuses are simply re-

porting what they have already done. He noted that Senator McKenna did indicate that prior to commencement of further field audits, they would meet with us to outline what they are going to do. At that time we will deal with the question of how it is to be handled and the hours involved, the amount of paper work, etc.

Senior Vice President Percy stated that the Audit Bureau was checking to see whether we were doing the things we prescribe, so they would not have anything to audit unless we go through this exercise. Regent Lavine stated that he had been impressed over the last few years that the process of looking at and reviewing the graduate and undergraduate programs on the campuses is one of the most worthwhile efforts we make, and that where it has been done, it has brought out some significant changes. He stated that, just as we look carefully at new programs, if we are going to keep the quality we have, it is necessary that we go through this kind of effort with the present programs and that in times of limited resources, we look at both the quality and the nature of present programs.

Regent Erdman stated that she was a bit disappointed with the report to see so little attention given to Schools of Education throughout the System. She stated that she knew it was the future plan that they would take up various schools here and there and various courses here and there, but wondered if it might not be feasible to have an audit of secondary education in the UW System. Regent Lavine stated that he felt it appropriate for each campus to figure out its own cycle, since one of the answers is workload in this kind of process. He stated you cannot try to do everything all at once, and it is necessary to phase it over time so that they will get to various facets of education at various times. He noted that the particular area is one which should be looked at more as a whole, and that is on the drawing board.

Senior Vice President Smith recalled that the initial audit and review of graduate masters and specialists programs in the System fell very heavily in the education areas, and noted that fifty some programs were phased out at that time and all of those were in the field of education, so the field of education would not believe that it has not been without attention since the beginning of merger. He stated that in the field of education we are dealing with an area in which we relate to other agencies, and in particular relate to them in terms of internship and preparation. Senior Vice President Smith stated it is not something that can be looked at in a segmental way, piece by piece, very effectively, and that we have to take a total look first and then decide whether or not there are particular areas where intensive work needs to be done.

Regent Thompson agreed that there is considerable evaluation of teacher education programs through two organizations -- the Department of Public Instruction, which visits campuses to certify courses for teachers to be certified in various areas, and there is a continuous cycle going on with the NTE evaluations of teacher education. She noted there is much evaluation taking place and that at times she felt we evaluate more than we teach.

Regent Lavine reported that Senior Vice President Donald Smith, in Chancellor Carrier's absence, announced the appointment of Mervyn L. Cadwallader, of Evergreen State College, Olympia, Washington, as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at UW-Platteville.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1278: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Norma J. Kolthoff be changed from Professor, School of Nursing to the Helen Denne Schulte Professor of Nursing, UW-Madison, beginning August 30, 1976, and extending through the end of the summer session, 1979, at a 1976-77 academic year salary of \$25,045, and at a salary in the ensuing years to be determined in the budget process, funded by the School of Nursing and the Helen Denne Schulte Fund.

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Vice President Neshek assumed the Chair.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Erdman.

Regent Erdman reported that the Committee meeting opened in joint session with all Regents invited to attend for the presentation of Book A -- the 1976-77 Annual Operating Budget for the UW System. She noted that prior to the formal presentation of Book A, President Weaver provided a brief chronological review of the steps which went into the production of this very significant document. The process has been underway since December, 1975, when the Regents approved the Annual Budget Policy Paper #1, which set the guidelines for distribution of discretionary salary funds for faculty and academic staff, and Policy Paper #3 on new criteria for charging special fees for certain courses. It has continued at subsequent meetings with our last action taken at the June meeting when we reviewed Book B on 1976-77 Personnel and Salary Actions delegated to the President and Chancellors, and approval of salaries and changes of status for specified categories of personnel. Regent Erdman stated that in his review, Senior Vice President Percy noted that the 1976-77 fiscal year is a time of transition from Phase I of post merger activities. It is also important since it becomes the base year for the next biennial budget. Regent Erdman stated that for an estimated 146,214 students, the 1976-77 operating budget is \$732,295,972 of which 46.7% is from State GPR appropriations. The proposed budget also includes a number of new and changed services, with a total of \$273,800 authorized.

Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1279: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the Chancellors, the University of Wisconsin System Operating Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1976 through June 30, 1977, in an estimated amount of \$732,295,972 (including the University Hospitals budget, the auxiliary enterprises and services budgets and user charge rates approved on May 7, 1976) and including fund allocations, program adjustments, classified salaries and adjustments, and other items reflected in Book A, Operating Budget Summary and Highlights, be approved and that Central Administration be authorized to make necessary final accounting changes, including any adjustments required by State bargaining agreements.

Regent Erdman called attention to a number of gifts and grants, including an additional gift-in-kind of 58.5 acres of land, which will be a fine addition to the campus at the UW-La Crosse.

Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1280: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

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Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1281: That, as recommended by the Chancellor of UW-La Crosse and the Vice President and Controller, the Board of Regents adopt the following resolution relative to the use of facsimile signature on checks drawn on the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse accounts held in the State Bank of La Crosse:

RESOLVED that State Bank of La Crosse, as a designated depository of this Corporation, be, and it is hereby requested, authorized, and directed to honor checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money drawn in this Corporation's name, including those payable to the individual order of any person or persons whose name or names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signature (s) of any 1 of the following:

and said bank shall be entitled to honor and to charge this Corporation for such checks, drafts or other orders, regardless of by whom or by what means the actual or purported facsimile signature or signatures thereon may have been affixed thereto, if such signature or signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with said Bank by the Secretary or other officer of this Corporation.

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REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Barkla.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1282: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Oshkosh Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a construction easement to the

City of Oshkosh for the right of way needed to construct a sanitary force main to serve the sanitary landfill located north of the boundaries of the UW-Oshkosh campus.

The legal description of the easement is as follows:

The West Thirty (30) feet of the South West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, and the South Thirty (30) feet of the West One-Hundred Forty-nine (149) feet of the South West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, and the West Thirty (30) feet of the South Five Hundred Sixty (560) feet of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, all in Section Eleven (11), Township Eighteen (18) North, Range Sixteen (16) East, Town of Oshkosh.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1283: That, upon the recommendation of the UW Center System Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary, be authorized to execute a release of 0.19 acres, more or less, presently leased from the County of Fond du Lac to allow its use by the State of Wisconsin Division of Highways for highway improvement purposes. This parcel is described as follows:

That part of the northwest one-quarter of section 12, Township 15 North, Range 17 East, described as follows: Commence at the southeast corner of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$; thence North $89^{\circ}59'25''$ west along the south line of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$ 264.00 feet to the point of beginning; thence North $1^{\circ}26'16''$ west along the owner's east property line 33.01 feet; thence North $89^{\circ}59'25''$ west 95.57 feet; thence North $86^{\circ}55'15''$ West 562.00 feet to the west property line of the owner; thence South $1^{\circ}26'16''$ east along said line 63.11 feet to the south line of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$; thence South $89^{\circ}59'25''$ east along said line 656.00 feet to the point of beginning.

Regent Barkla stated the next resolution relates to additional monies given to the University at Madison by the National "W" Club to be used for movable bleachers and other equipment, which were not provided for when the original fieldhouse project was approved.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1284: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to increase the budget for the 1975-77 Field House Update Project from \$718,000 to \$787,000 through the use of gift funds from the University of Wisconsin National "W" Club.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1285: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for General Services be authorized to sign an extension of the agreement with the Tri-County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce, and St. Croix Counties) from August 1, 1976 to July 31, 1977 for use of a residence hall on the campus of UW-River Falls as a Half-Way House facility.

5. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution relating to Far West Campus Site Plan and the Pharmacy Building Remodeling and Addition at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1286: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following be approved:

The concept and budget report on the Far West Campus Site and Circulation Development for UW-Madison be approved; authority be granted to combine into a single project for design and bidding economies the previously approved separate projects for this development; and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct selected stages of the project at a total budget presently authorized of \$2,023,350, with the understanding that additional funds potentially required to complete the total project will be included for consideration in the UW System 1977-79 capital budget request and

The concept and budget report for the Pharmacy Building Remodeling and Addition, UW-Madison, at an estimated total cost of \$1,423,575 to be funded with \$585,400 in general obligation bonds, \$278,000 in gift funds and \$560,175 in federal grant funds.

6. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1287: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison, Oshkosh and River Falls Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

1975-77 Fleet Car Facility, UW-Madison, at a cost of \$75,000 from Auxiliary Enterprise Operating Funds

1973-75 Hydraulics Building Remodeling, UW-Madison, at an increased budget cost of \$155,000 from 1973-75 State Building Trust Funds (\$112,500) and 1973-75 Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds (42,500)

1975-77 Remodeling of Chalmer Davee Library, UW-River Falls, at a cost of \$63,852 from 1975-77 Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds

(Continued)

1975-77 Swine Nursery, UW-River Falls, at a cost of \$52,600 from Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds

1975-77 Halsey Science Remodeling, UW-Oshkosh, at a cost of \$86,100--from the National Science Foundation (\$65,000) and from 1975-77 Minor Project Contingency Allocation of the State Building Trust Fund (\$21,100)

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee next considered the extension of the lease of a building at the UW-Stevens Point with Camp Chileda, Inc., Chileda Institute Division, a Wisconsin non-profit corporation which offers residential treatment for children with multiple sclerosis. Because the Committee felt that further information about the lease, which represents a change in the cost for one item, was not complete at this time, the Committee agreed to keep the lease on a month to month basis, and plan to bring it back to the Board when further information is available.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee next considered the maintenance and stores buildings at Oshkosh, River Falls, and Green Bay. The plans are not ready at this time for approval by the Physical Planning and Development Committee, and the item has been withdrawn until further information is available.

President McNamara resumed the Chair.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1288: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Schofield Hall Remodeling Project, UW-Eau Claire, be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the project at a cost of \$921,000, to be funded through General Obligation Bonding.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee received an informational report that most of the lots at the Gugel Farm in Madison have been sold, resulting in a profit of almost \$400,000 to the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences to be used for development of the Arlington Farms. Regent Neshek pointed out that we could have sold the land for \$215,000; so our gain is about \$163,000, not \$400,000.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee had received an informational report relative to the status of Old Main on the UW-Stevens Point Campus. She reported that Chancellor Dreyfus stated that he had been advised that Old Main could be renovated at a reasonable cost, resulting in savings to the state, and there is a proposal before the State Building Commission to do a renovating study. Vice President Winter pointed out that the Regents and the Building Commission

had voted prior to this time to raze the structure but that the Bureau of Facilities Management is to appear before the Building Commission next week and ask that funds be approved for a study by an outside engineer or consultant so that there would be an estimate of how much it would cost to renovate Old Main at this time.

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The meeting adjourned at 10:50 A.M.

Report by President McNamara on meeting with Senator Dale McKenna; Audit Bureau Director, Robert Ringwood, and the Legislative Audit Bureau Team

Last week at the invitation of Senator Dale McKenna, Regent Business Committee Chairman Ed Hales and Education Committee Chairman John Lavine and I--as well as Regent Vice President Milton Neshek who was unable to attend--were invited to participate in meeting with Senator McKenna, Legislative Audit Bureau Director Robert Ringwood, and the team that did the UW LAB audit. Also in attendance was a representative of the press invited by Senator McKenna.

In summary form, the Senator opened the discussion by noting that any concerns about academic freedom had been decided by the new language in the mini-budget. This language prohibited the Legislative Audit Bureau from doing any auditing which would encroach on areas of academic freedom of faculty members in the UW System.

The Senator then said that the thrust of the audit was to try to answer a basic legislative question. That was whether merger was working and whether the Legislature had drawn overly broad or too narrow language to set up the merger.

It was pointed out by the Regents present that the only way that one could really determine whether merger was working was to have the two former, separate systems and the Coordinating Council running on the one hand. On the other hand, one would run the merged system.

We suggested that perhaps the real question was not whether merger was working in a past tense sense, but rather, how the UW System was working now. There seemed to be agreement on this point.

We then noted that the document that the Legislative Audit team had put together appeared to us not to encroach on any area of academic freedom. Further, it appeared to be a good, professional and fair representation of how the University of Wisconsin System is managing the academic side of this enterprise.

We did make two suggestions:

First, we said that the only area of the report which we believed could require further elaboration was the area which dealt with faculty teaching loads. This was noted not because the report was inaccurate,

but simply because persons unfamiliar with the University might, in this section, misunderstand that there is good reason for a difference in teaching loads between varying kinds of institutions in the UW System, and for that matter between varying courses and programs within an institution.

The example was used that a faculty person who was acting as a professor for a studio art course or a science lab, could never carry the kind of credit hour production that was carried by, for example, a lecturer in a large 200-person lecture section. Moreover, it would not be good teaching for the instructor of the studio art course or science lab to carry this large load since students would not get the individual kind of attention that they need and deserve. There seemed to be agreement on the reasons for these differences.

Second, the major point that we raised was that the Legislative Audit Bureau should go ahead and finish the review of the remaining seven campuses in the System during the next school year. This way LAB and the Legislature will have a base line of how the System operated on its academic side. On the other hand, by the LAB's own review report the UW System will not be fully up and running with all of the new academic procedures until the school year 1977-78. Hence, we suggested that if the auditors felt the need to do a field audit in this area, their time and effort--as well as the time and effort of people in the System--would be best spent waiting until the latter part of 1977 and into 1978 when a full cycle of decisions and implementation had taken place. This would make it possible to evaluate the productivity of the policies and procedures.

On a tentative basis, there seemed to be agreement on this point. However, Senator McKenna said that he would have to check with other members of his committee and the Assembly committee before a final decision could be made.

In summary, then, we indicated that the audit report was professional and was an accurate picture of how the University managed the academic part of the UW System. We thanked the auditors for their cooperation and professionalism. We joined with Senator McKenna in expressing agreement that LAB auditing should not get into even any appearance of encroachment on academic freedom--either in this general review phase or in any subsequent field audit--and, finally, we agreed that a similar meeting would be held subsequent to the completion of the review of the seven remaining campuses which were not audited in this first effort. Also a meeting would be held prior to the commencing of any field audit, if such an audit were undertaken.

The Secretary requested that the minutes of the June 11, 1976, meeting be corrected on page 10 by substituting the word "discretion" for the word "discussion" in lines 9 and 11 of Mr. DeBardleben's statement.

Upon motion by Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on June 11, 1976, be approved as corrected above.

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A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President McNamara stated that the standing committees of the Board will remain the same for the ensuing year, with the exception that Regent Grover will replace Regent Solberg on the Physical Planning and Development Committee. The list of committee members is attached as EXHIBIT A.

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2. President McNamara reported the appointment of Regent Lawton as an added member to the Special Committee for Medical Affairs. He also announced that Regent Barkla was appointed to the Hospital Council of Trustees for University Hospitals for a four-year term, and that Regent Neshek was resigning from the Hospital Council of Trustees and Regent Lawton will replace him for a two-year term. He announced further that Mr. Ray Theisen, a public member appointed for a one-year term, had indicated that business commitments prevented him from accepting another appointment, and appointed Mr. Bruce Thomas, of Madison, as a citizen member for a four-year term to the Hospital Council of Trustees.

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B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

1. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1271: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, on file)

2. President Weaver reported that Chancellor Baum, of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Campus, has been appointed by President Ford to serve a three-year term on the National Advisory Committee on Oceans and Atmosphere.

At the request of President Weaver, Vice President and Controller Reuben Lorenz reported that the National Association of College and University Business Officers had made an award of \$500 to the University of Wisconsin-Bay for its cost reduction efforts in the area of energy and an award of \$7500 to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh for its efforts in the better utilization of faculty time.

3. President Weaver referred to the report of the Legislative Audit Bureau on its survey of policies and procedures in the areas of academic administration, new program approvals, audit and review of existing programs, and evaluation of faculty productivity, which had been distributed to all members of the Board. He noted that we were generally very pleased with the report, which was both thorough and objective, and confirmed our belief that the policies and procedures we have put in place will maintain and strengthen the quality of our academic programs. He reported that we have requested that if an audit is to be undertaken in the future, it be carried out not earlier than 1978-79 so that we have at least three years of experience prior to an effort to do a thorough evaluation of results.

President McNamara stated that a Regent committee consisting of Regent Hales, Lavine and himself (Vice President Neshek could not attend because of a water-skiing accident) met with Senator McKenna and Robert Ringwood, Legislative Audit Bureau chief, and prepared a written summary of the discussion (See EXHIBIT C, attached to the full minutes on file in each library).

4. President Weaver made the following statement:

"It is 21 years ago this summer that I left my active professional life as a geographer to accept my first full time administrative position as an academic dean. Exactly half of the 22 administrative years I will have concluded twelve months hence will have been expended in service as president within two major state university systems. Along the administrative road I have travelled there has been a succession of six sensitive, often perplexing, but generally rewarding assignments in a half dozen Midwestern states. Nothing could have been more satisfying than my ultimate, career-climaxing return to alma mater.

"When in the summer of 1955 I abandoned my predilections for my favorite profession as a geographer at the University of Minnesota, to become a Dean of Liberal Arts in Kansas, I promised myself that before I finally concluded my academic life I would once again return to the satisfactions of maps and books.

By July 1 of next year I will have no more than the normal expectation of eight years to make good on that self-promise. I believe that time both entitles and compels me to now move fairly promptly into the final chapter of my active professional life.

"Although my health is again strong, and my relations with the Board, my administrative and faculty colleagues and students, all remain both pleasant and completely cordial, if I have any reasonable hope that I might yet indulge myself in a useful return to geography, I need for personal reasons to be about that business on one or more of the campuses in the System where I was, at the time of my coming, awarded professorships. It seems clear to me that having been fortunate enough to marshal an uncommonly effective team to bring a merged system of public higher education to an early stage of maturity in Wisconsin, it is in the best interests of the Universities we all serve that a new, innovatively creative captain for that team now be sought.

"I would ask this Board's understanding and approval of my request to exercise the state-provided option of retirement at age 62 and conclude my present administrative duties at the end of the forthcoming academic year, on June 30, 1977. By making the request at this time I provide the Board adequate opportunity to undertake an orderly and systematic search for my successor, and I provide Ruberta and me the chance to plan in an equally orderly and systematic manner for our long-anticipated return to an academic way of life."

President McNamara made the following statement:

"When President Weaver asked me to come to his office last Monday to discuss his monthly report to the Board, I did not expect that the principal item in that report would be the statement you have just heard. I have respected his wish that no mention of his decision be made to anyone prior to this moment. My fellow Regents can now sense something of the surprise that was mine earlier this week! Having personally satisfied myself that Dr. Weaver's decision was irretrievably final, I resolved to use my unique position of advance knowledge to prepare remarks appropriate for the occasion.

"There will be ample time between now and the end of next June for Regents, members of the University System family, public officials and citizens to acknowledge their debt to John Weaver for the progress and accomplishments of this relatively young public enterprise. That debt is substantial. For nearly six years of unprecedented changes in higher education in general, and particularly in Wisconsin, Dr. Weaver has served ably and with distinction as our first System President. In fact, there have been so many challenges capably met and so many initiatives successfully pursued during this period that it is difficult to list them all, and easy to forget just how substantial each was. Suffice it to say for now, John, you performed exceedingly well in one of the most pressure-filled and innovative periods in the history of Wisconsin higher education. We know such performance will characterize the final year you have set for yourself as our chief executive.

"I should note that not even the temporary setback of an 'affair of the heart' could overcome your commitment to serve or prevent your early return to active duty. This Board, your associates and friends all marvelled at your full recovery from major heart surgery. You have judged the occasion of good health, good relations and the System's good repair to be a signal moment for you to re-enter the arena of your scholarly first love--the field of geography. I sense your excitement and enthusiasm in approaching the eight years beyond next June 30th, not as the twilight of a distinguished career, but as another horizon whose geography is not entirely unknown to you.

"I know that you expect to give, and the Board will vigorously support continued effective leadership during the next eleven months. With your obvious return to good health and the ongoing support of an able staff, persons inside and outside the System may be assured that this Board and its central administrative officers will continue to address vigorously in the months ahead, our ongoing tasks.

"John, you have given much of yourself to this System, and your decision, announced well in advance of your planned transition date, is another evidence of your selflessness. This Board faces a difficult and time-demanding task in selecting your successor and we deeply appreciate your consideration in making your wishes and plans known nearly one year in advance of their effective date. I will be in contact with the Board in the near future regarding the commencement of our selection effort."

The meeting recessed at 9:25 A.M., and resumed at 9:46 A.M.

(Regent Thompson entered the meeting at 9:46 A.M.)

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C. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

1. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution (including substitution of the material recommended by Central Administration relative to UW-Superior), the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1272: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Regents approve the recommendations concerning medical technology programs in the UW System as stated on pages 1-3 of ATTACHMENT A: Recommendations and Analysis - Concerning the Report of the Health Science Advisory Council on Medical Technology Programs Within the UW System, dated July, 1976. The Regents direct that these recommendations be implemented by the affected universities and administrative offices of the UW System.

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2. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received Revisions of Academic Program Submission Deadlines (ACIS-1) (Academic Information Series). The effect of the change is to better distribute the workload associated with new academic program proposals.

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3. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a Mini-Report--Student Evaluation of Instruction, which was described by Senior Vice President Smith as an encouraging report indicating that the campuses have developed effective policies on student evaluation of instruction.

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4. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a Progress Report: Bachelor of Fine Arts/Master of Fine Arts Audit. Phase I, Audit of Existing and Proposed BFA/MFA Programs in Art. He noted that the matter will come back to the Committee when the guidelines are established later on in the fall.

5. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee received a Progress Report: Lateral Audit of Journalism Programs in the System.

6. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1273: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System (Policy-New) and the Chancellor of UW-Eau Claire, the UW-Eau Claire faculty policies and procedures document be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

7. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1274: (Policy-Revised)

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee, the following amendments to the specified sections of the UW-Milwaukee faculty personnel policies and procedures as required under UWS 2.02 be approved:

Sec. 4.03 Strike period at end of the last sentence and add: "and minutes reflecting all formal actions taken shall be recorded."

Sec. 4.05 To be added:

(4) Each executive committee shall meet at least once each semester. Except as otherwise provided, minutes reflecting all formal actions taken shall be recorded.

Sec. 4.07 Strike paragraph (2) and replace with substitute wording:

(2) Calls meetings of the departmental faculty and of the executive committee, at his/her own initiative or at the request of any two members of the respective bodies, presides over the meetings, transmits minutes of the departmental and executive committee meetings to the appropriate dean, to the Secretary of the University, and to the departmental or executive committee members and maintains such minutes in the departmental files.

Sec. 4.07 Strike paragraph (4) and replace with substitute wording:

(4) Determines that all necessary records of meetings, teaching, research and public service of the department are properly kept and are always accessible to the proper authorities.

8. Regent Lavine reported that the Planning Context for 1977-81, Major Assumptions and Data, will be thoroughly reviewed and discussed by chancellors and faculties in the fall and will be returned to the Regents in November or December for final approval.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1275: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) Academic/Fiscal Planning Paper #2 (LR-Series) - "The Planning Context, 1977-81: Major Assumptions and Data", dated July, 1976, be granted interim approval.

The discussion which followed relative to competition of the University campuses with community college campuses and Vocational, Technical and Adult Education campuses will be found in the full minutes on file in each library.

The question was put on Resolution 1275, and it was voted.

9. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1276: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) the Regents approve Academic Planning Statement #3.2, Faculty Development and Renewal: A System for Faculty Transfer and Exchange, dated July, 1976, and receive for information the supplement entitled, Administrative Protocol and Financial Guidelines for Faculty Transfer and Exchange.

10. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1277: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) the document entitled, "Interim Guidelines for the 1976-77 Faculty Sabbatical Program", dated July, 1976, is approved by the Board of Regents for immediate implementation.

11. Regent Lavine reported that the Committee next received a Progress Report on UW System Undergraduate and Graduate Program Audit and Review. He noted that Vice President Smith pointed out the report results from the action taken by the Regents in 1974 establishing policies and guidelines for academic program audit

and review. Dr. Smith emphasized that the function of the audit and review is to ensure the health of programs rather than just determine which programs must be excised. A similar report will be brought to the Board in another year. The discussion relating to the report will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library.

12. Regent Lavine reported that Senior Vice President Donald Smith, in Chancellor Carrier's absence, announced the appointment of Mervyn L. Cadwallader, of Evergreen State College, Olympia, Washington, as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at UW-Platteville.

13. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1278: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Norma J. Kolthoff be changed from Professor, School of Nursing to the Helen Denne Schulte Professor of Nursing, UW-Madison, beginning August 30, 1976, and extending through the end of the summer session, 1979, at a 1976-77 academic year salary of \$25,045, and at a salary in the ensuing years to be determined in the budget process, funded by the School of Nursing and the Helen Denne Schulte Fund.

Vice President Neshek assumed the Chair.

D. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Erdman.

1. Regent Erdman noted that the Committee meeting opened in joint session with all Regents invited to attend for the presentation of Book A--the 1976-77 annual operating budget for the UW System.

Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1279: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the Chancellors, the University of Wisconsin System Operating Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1976 through June 30, 1977, in an estimated amount of \$732,295,972 (including the University Hospitals budget, the auxiliary enterprises and services budgets and user charge rates approved on May 7, 1976) and including fund allocations, program adjustments, classified salaries and adjustments, and other items reflected in Book A, Operating Budget Summary and Highlights, be approved and that Central Administration be authorized to make necessary final accounting changes, including any adjustments required by State bargaining agreements.

2. Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1280: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

3. Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1281: That, as recommended by the Chancellor of UW-La Crosse and the Vice President and Controller, the Board of Regents adopt the following resolution relative to the use of facsimile signature on checks drawn on the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse accounts held in the State Bank of La Crosse:

RESOLVED that State Bank of La Crosse, as a designated depository of this Corporation, be, and it is hereby requested, authorized, and directed to honor checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money drawn in this Corporation's name, including those payable to the individual order of any person or persons whose name or names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signature (s) of any 1 of the following:

James W. Morgan

and said bank shall be entitled to honor and to charge this Corporation for such checks, drafts or other orders, regardless of by whom or by what means the actual or purported facsimile signature or signatures thereon may have been affixed thereto, if such signature or signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with said Bank by the Secretary or other officer of this Corporation.

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E. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Barkla.

1. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1282: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Oshkosh Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board be authorized to execute a construction easement to the City of Oshkosh for the right of way needed to construct a sanitary force main to serve the sanitary landfill located north of the boundaries of the UW-Oshkosh campus.

(Continued)

The legal description of the easement is as follows:

The West Thirty (30) feet of the South West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, and the South Thirty (30) feet of the West One-Hundred Forty-nine (149) feet of the South West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, and the West Thirty (30) feet of the South Five Hundred Sixty (560) feet of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$ of the North West $\frac{1}{4}$, all of Section Eleven (11), Township Eighteen (18) North, Range Sixteen (16) East, Town of Oshkosh.

2. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1283: That, upon the recommendation of the UW Center System Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary, be authorized to execute a release of 0.19 acres, more or less, presently leased from the County of Fond du Lac to allow its use by the State of Wisconsin Division of Highways for highway improvement purposes. This parcel is described as follows:

That part of the northwest one-quarter of section 12, Township 15 North, Range 17 East, described as follows: Commence at the southeast corner of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$; thence North 89°59'25" west along the south line of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$ 264.00 feet to the point of beginning; thence North 1°26'16" west along the owner's east property line 33.01 feet; thence North 89°59'25" west 95.57 feet; thence North 86°55'15" West 562.00 feet to the west property line of the owner; thence South 1°26'16" east along said line 63.11 feet to the south line of said NW $\frac{1}{4}$; thence South 89°59'25" east along said line 656.00 feet to the point of beginning.

3. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1284: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to increase the budget for the 1975-77 Field House Update Project from \$718,000 to \$787,000 through the use of gift funds from the University of Wisconsin National "W" Club.

4. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1285: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for General Services be authorized to sign an extension of the agreement with the Tri-County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce, and St. Croix Counties) from August 1, 1976 to July 31, 1977 for use of a residence hall on the campus of UW-River Falls as a Half-Way House facility.

5. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution relating to Far West Campus Site Plan and the Pharmacy Building Remodeling and Addition at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1286: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following be approved:

The concept and budget report on the Far West Campus Site and Circulation Development for UW-Madison be approved; authority be granted to combine into a single project for design and bidding economies the previously approved separate projects for this development; and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct selected stages of the project at a total budget presently authorized of \$2,023,350, with the understanding that additional funds potentially required to complete the total project will be included for consideration in the UW System 1977-79 capital budget request and

The concept and budget report for the Pharmacy Building Remodeling and Addition, UW-Madison, at an estimated total cost of \$1,423,575 to be funded with \$585,400 in general obligation bonds, \$278,000 in gift funds and \$560,175 in federal grant funds.

6. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1287: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison, Oshkosh and River Falls Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

1975-77 Fleet Car Facility, UW-Madison, at a cost of \$75,000 from Auxiliary Enterprise Operating Funds

1973-75 Hydraulics Building Remodeling, UW-Madison, at an increased budget cost of \$155,000 from 1973-75 State Building Trust Funds (\$112,500) and 1973-75 Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds (42,500)

1975-77 Remodeling of Chalmer Davee Library, UW-River Falls, at a cost of \$63,852 from 1975-77 Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds

1975-77 Swine Nursery, UW-River Falls, at a cost of \$52,600 from Unprogrammed Surplus State Building Trust Funds

1975-77 Halsey Science Remodeling, UW-Oshkosh, at a cost of \$86,100--from the National Science Foundation (\$65,000) and from 1975-77 Minor Project Contingency Allocation of the State Building Trust Fund (\$21,100)

7. Regent Barkla reported that the Committee next considered the extension of the lease of a building at the UW-Stevens Point with Camp Chileda, Inc., Chileda Institute Division, a Wisconsin non-profit corporation which offers residential treatment for children with multiple sclerosis. Because the Committee felt that further information about the new lease, which represents a change in the cost for one item, was not complete at this time, the Committee agreed to renew the lease or keep it on a month-to-month basis and then plan to bring it back in September, when further information is available.

8. Regent Barkla reported that the Committee next considered the maintenance and stores buildings at Oshkosh, River Falls, and Green Bay. The plans are not ready at this time for approval by the Physical Planning and Development Committee, and the item has been withdrawn until further information is available.

President McNamara resumed the Chair.

9. Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1288: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Schofield Hall Remodeling Project, UW-Eau Claire, be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the project at a cost of \$921,000, to be funded through General Obligation Bonding.

10. Regent Barkla reported that the Committee received an informational report that most of the lots at the Gugel Farm in Madison have been sold, resulting in a profit of almost \$400,000 to the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences to be used for development of the Arlington Farms. Regent Neshek pointed out that we could have sold the land for \$215,000; so our gain is about \$163,000, not \$400,000.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee had received an informational report relative to the status of Old Main on the UW-Stevens Point Campus. She reported that Chancellor Dreyfus stated that he had been advised that Old Main could be renovated at a reasonable cost, resulting in savings to the state, and there is a proposal before the State Building Commission to do a renovating study. Vice President Winter pointed out that the Regents and the Building Commission had voted prior to this time to raze the structure but that the Bureau of Facilities Management is to appear before the Building Commission next week and ask that funds be approved for a study by an outside engineer or consultant so that there would be an estimate of how much it would cost to renovate Old Main at this time.

The meeting adjourned at 10:50 A.M.
