

Mini Courses Celebrates 25 Years

This summer, Wisconsin Union Mini Courses celebrates its 25th anniversary of offering short, fun, informative noncredit courses to UW students, faculty, staff and Union members.

Mini Courses made its debut in the summer of 1972 with such early courses as "Haircutting the Modern Way," "Sandal Making" and "Wine Making." Only 22 courses were offered that year with an enrollment of 122 people.

The popularity of Mini Courses quickly grew. Five years after its inception, annual enrollment topped 8,000. At that time, disco dance was all the rage. In fact, disco dance classes claimed 22% of all participants in 1977-that's over 2,000 pairs of platform shoes!

As trends change, Mini Course offerings have changed, too. Currently, Mini Courses provides more diverse topics as well as shorter-length classes. The program now offers over 150 different course titles, five times a year, and enrolls approximately 7,000 people each year.


Mini Courses is always looking for new ways to meet the needs of its audience. A 24 hour (touch-tone) registration system will be introduced this fall, enabling people to register for classes at any time. Eventually, the Union hopes to offer Mini Courses on the Internet so people can participate in classes without leaving home.

Since its beginning, Mini Courses has been wholly self-supported by the UW students, faculty and staff, and Union members who enroll in its courses. As a Union member, you're not only eligible to enroll in Mini Courses, but you also receive the lowest price on all classes. A Remark About Where to Park

With "Terrace season" underway, the need for fast and convenient parking is a subject that is of great interest to many of you. In order to make your summer a bit more relaxed, we'd like to remind you of the many good parking options available.

Presently, there are several parking lots located within easy walking distance of Memorial Union. Consult our map and the following parking lot descriptions to find the perfect parking spot for your car this summer. With so many options available, there's no reason to miss any of the Union Terrace excitement.

LOT 1

has limited metered parking available daily adjacent to Memorial Union on Langdon Street.

LOT 6

(Helen C. White Parking Garage - entrance on Park Street)
has metered parking spaces available. The upper level is available to visitors daily, and the lower level is available to visitors evenings and weekends only.

LOT 7

(Grainger Hall Ramp entrance on Brooks Street). Visitor parking is available during evening and weekend hours with limited daytime parking based on availability.

LAKE STREET RAMP

is three blocks southeast of Memorial Union on Lake Street between State Street and University Avenue. 1,200 spaces are available.

LOT 46

is located between University Avenue and Johnson Street and has more that 130 metered spaces available.

LOT 47

is adjacent to University Square, between University Avenue and Johnson Street and has evening and weekend parking available.

LOT 83

is adjacent to lot 46 with spaces at \$5 per day when you enter between 6:30-9:30 a.m., \$4 for 9:30 a.m.- 4 p.m., and just \$1 after 4 p.m..



The Creative Zone

A Look at the Union Craftshop

Do any of the following statements apply to you?

- 1) You and your circular-saw have been kicked out of the garage.
- You're debating which household bathroom to onvert into a darkroom.
- want to make pottery...now!
- 4) You're looking for studio space in Madison.

If you answer "yes" to any of the above questions, the Wisconsin Union Craftshop is for you.

The Craftshop, located in the Memorial Union, is a zone of creativity, housing pottery wheels and kilns, woodworking equipment and even a photography darkroom. Also available are supplies and equipment for silkscreen, framing and matting, batik, art metals, jewelry, stained glass, leather-crafting, glass fusing and more.

As a Union member, you can purchase semester, half-semester or hourly permits for this multimedia studio space. The Craftshop is open seven days a week from 1 p.m. to 10 p.m. when the university is in session.

It provides an inexpensive option and a welcome relief to artists looking for space to be creative.

If you've taken a Mini Course, you may have already experienced the Craftshop since many courses are taught in the facilities.

Over the years, artists of all abilities have benefited from the Craftshop's dedication to the active creation of art. Since 1928, when the facility was located across the street from what is now the Memorial Union, the Craftshop has been used for artistic endeavors. After the old building was destroyed, the Craftshop moved into Memorial Union. It has been used for a variety of activities, including set design for campus plays and the printing of protest posters during the 1960s.

Today, the Wisconsin Union Craftshop is the oldest craftshop in the United States, serving some 700 customers a year and providing exciting opportunities for creative people.






