# Wisconsin 60, Marquette 6 Wisconsin 45, West Virginia 13 Wisconsin 23, Purdue 14

Wisconsin 60, Marquette 6 September 28

O, YOU weren't dreaming! The score actually was 60-6 in favor of Wisconsin's Badgers over Marquette's Warriors when the final gun sounded to conclude opening day festivities in Camp Randall Stadium. The 1957 football campaign began with a display of opportune football as the cardinal jersied Badgers rolled relentlessly over an outclassed Marquette team.

60-6! You have to go all the way back to 1920 to recall the last time a

Wisconsin team rolled up that many points. During that season, the Badgers thumped Lawrence College 60–0 in the opening game of a season that produced six wins and a lone loss. Could it be that the 1957 season will repeat the success of that earlier campaign?

The game was not even three minutes old when the Badger wave of cardinal and white had racked up its first score of this long afternoon of football. Long, that is, for the thoroughly beaten Warriors. They never had a chance

The pattern of the game was thus established when left end Dave Kocourek recovered Warrior Frank Mestnik's second down fumble, and four plays later quarterback Sidney Williams had tallied the touchdown on a one yard sneak.

Six minutes later the alert Badgers had another easy score as Bob Zeman blocked a Marquette punt, and the ball squirted into the waiting arms of guard Pete Zouvas, who romped ten yards to the Marquette end zone.


Near the end of the first quarter, the Badgers stopped a Marquette threat on their own 24 yard line, and marched 76 yards in 22 plays, with Sidney Williams capping the drive by plunging over from the one yard line with nearly three minutes of the second quarter gone.

The Marquette penetration into Wisconsin territory had been accomplished by a 61 yard return of the kickoff, following the touchdown by Zouvas, by lithe Bill Burney, who was finally downed on the Wisconsin 27. Four plays netted just three yards, despite an 18 yard completed pass, and the Badgers were on their way, as already noted.

Wisconsin's fourth touchdown was set up by Danny Lewis' interception of a Marquette pass, and on the first play, Sidney Williams tossed to left end Dave Kocourek for 56 yards and a score.

Four plays after this score, the Badgers had the ball again, as the Warriors

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were forced to punt, and with sophomore quarterback Dale Hackbart engineering the plays, Wisconsin went 60 yards in 11 plays to make the half-time score read 33-0. Another soph, right halfback Ron Steiner, carried the ball the final two yards into the end zone.

The second half was again all Wisconsin, and the one-sidedness of the game afforded Head Coach Milt Bruhn an opportunity to play all 36 of the men he suited for the game, including nineteen sophomores. The Badgers opened the game with four sophmores in their line-up. Two tackles, Jim Heineke and Dan Lanphear, right guard Jerry Stalcup, and right halfback Bob Altman, had gained opening game first team berths.

And here is an interesting note to consider for future games. Bruhn used thirteen backfield men, and eight of them were sophomores. In fact, soph right halfback Ron Steiner was the game's leading rusher with 75 yards in 9 carries, while quarterback Dale Hackbart (54 in 10), and left halfback Eddie Hart (45 in 9), rated right behind in that category with their efforts.

Bruhn's second team line-up against the Warriors totaled six sophomores, while the third team had seven first year men. At times late in the game, nine sophomores were on the field for Wisconsin.

Getting back to the second half details, both teams scored once in the third quarter, with the Badgers controlling the ball after receiving the opening third quarter kickoff, and marching 66 yards in 11 plays for their score. Right end Tom Peters proved "Johnny-on-the-Spot" by capturing Dale Hackbart's goal line fumble out of the air, and stepping into the end zone.

Following an exchange of kicks, Marquette marched 83 yards in 13 plays, their only sustained drive of the afternoon, to score. Halfback Lou Casto plucked a 25 yard pass from quarterback Tom Sunderbruch to tally, and the Warrior fans smiled their only smile of the day.

The Badgers climaxed the afternoon's work by scoring three touchdowns in the fourth period, all on short drives inside the Marquette 45 yard line, and all set up by opportune football. Dave Kocourek partially blocked a Marquette punt, and the Badgers rolled 28 yards in 7 plays, with Bob Altmann crossing into the end zone.

On the first play following the kickoff, Sid Williams intercepted a Warrior pass, and returned it 29 yards to the Marquette 19. On the next play Williams passed complete to end Earl Hill for the score, and the Badgers led 53-6.

Six plays after the following kickoff, guard John Heineke pounced on a fumble on the Marquette 43, and the Badger third team took only five plays to send Frank Luksik into the end zone.

Yes, the score was 60-6! And 47,267 football fans sat in on the worst trouncing the Badgers have given their intrastate rivals since 1915, when the score was 85-0. Yes, 47,267 football fans went home wondering, and thinking, and shaking their heads in disbelief. Yes, 60-6, was the score.

#### Wisconsin 45, West Virginia 13 October 5

WISCONSIN'S football team moved to a community 45-13 win over West Virginia's Southern Conference championship contender on this sunny October afternoon before a crowd of 38,889 in Camp Randall Stadium.

This game was to have been the acid test for the Badgers before they embarked on their Big Ten schedule of seven foes, but they got an early jump on the invading Mountaineers, and the game's outcome never was in doubt. Indeed, for the second straight Saturday, Coach Milt Bruhn could empty his bench of all players who had suited up for the game, and give them valuable game experience. This was particularly true of the 19 sophomores who comprise the major portion of the team this

Many fans had barely reached their seats when Sidney Williams and Danny Lewis combined on a spectacular 62 yard pass play that gave the Badgers a 7-0 lead with just 54 seconds elapsed in the first quarter. The pass was a special play, set up by Coach Bruhn and his quarterback, Sidney Williams, before the game. Its effect was to surprise . . . actually it was shocking, and the Mountaineers, their poise shaken, never recovered until the Badgers had a comfortable 35-0 lead midway into the third quarter.

The Badgers scored again the second time they had the ball, marching 50 yards in 9 plays after Bob Altmann had returned a punt 15 yards to the midfield stripe. The pay-off play was Williams tossing nine yards to left end Earl Hill for the score. Right tackle Karl Holzwarth added the extra point, as he did after the first score, and the Badgers led 14-0.

Driving Danny Lewis was named United Press Midwest-Back-of-the-Week after this game. Are there any finer breakaway runners?



West Virginia received an early opportunity to menace the Wisconsin goal line, but were stymied by the Badger defense. Toward the end of the quarter, the Mountaineers Ralph Anastasio kicked 60 yards on fourth down, and when a 15 yard penalty set Wisconsin back to its own 15, the strategy called for a quick kick on first down. The kick, by Frank Luksik, went only 15 yards, and West Virginia had the ball on the Badgers' 30. They moved quickly for a first down on the 19, but Badger center George Chryst threw left halfback Whitey Mikanik for a three yard loss, the Mountaineers took to the airlines, threw three incomplete passes, and Wisconsin took over.

Early in the second quarter, the West Virginians had the ball on the Wisconsin 33 and again took to the air, but this time sophomore right halfback Ron Steiner of the Badgers fielded the ball on the six yard line, and behind a wave of cardinal jersies, together with a fine display of heady running, ran 94 yards to the West Virginia goal. The key block that set Steiner on his way was executed by left halfback Danny Lewis, though it seemed that men in Old Gold and Blue uniforms were sprawled all over Camp Randall—the Cardinal wave had struck so suddenly.

Wisconsin kept the pressure on the Southern invaders the rest of the quarter, too. The Badgers recovered a West Virginia fumble on the Wisconsin 48, and in 7 plays had a near score, as Sidney Williams fumbled when hit on the goal line, and Mountaineer guard Chuck Howley picked the ball out of the air, and ran it back to the West Virginia 8 yard line.

But, this was only delaying the inevitable. Two plays later, John Heineke pounced on Ralph Anastasio's fumble, and the Badgers needed only five plays to travel 26 yards, with Dale Hackbart, sophomore quarterback, running left end on a keeper play from six yards out for the score.

The Badgers were threatening again at the end of the half, resting their case on the Mountaineer 9 yard line as the gun sounded.

In the third quarter, the Badgers had the ball for only one play in the first 10 minutes and 25 seconds of the period, but it was a corker. The Badgers had the ball on their own 14 yard line, and on the first play, Danny Lewis ripped over tackle, picked up speed, and outran the Mountaineer secondary. The tally was the second longest run from scrimmage for a score in Wisconsin football history.

West Virginia braced here, and took the ensuing kickoff and marched 73 yards in 12 plays to score for the first time. A sophomore back, Ray Peterson, was the sparkplug for the Mountaineers, running 36 yards in three plays, including a 22 yard romp that put the ball on the Wisconsin five yard line. Fullback Larry Krutko tallied on a one yard plunge.

The Badgers took the following kickoff, and went right down the field in four plays, with Dale Hackbart climaxing the 64 yard march with a 29 yard keeper play around left end for the score. Bob Zeman, with a 19 yard run, and Ron Steiner, with an 11 yard gainer off a single wing reverse play, added valuable yardage in the march.

That ended Wisconsin sorties over the goal line, and the West Virginians

added an easy, consolation score early in the fourth period, when they recovered a Frank Luksik fumble on the Badgers 19. In three plays they scored, with Anastasio scampering 12 yards into pay dirt.

Third and fourth team members played out the remainder of the game for Wisconsin, and gave a good account of themselves. A final march, covering 57 yards and 13 plays, was halted by penalty on the one yard line, and with five seconds showing on the stadium clock, Karl Holzwarth booted a field goal from the 17 yard line for Wisconsin final three points. (Actually, of course, it was a 27 yarder, because of the goal posts being 10 yards behind the goal line).

The win was most pleasing for Coach Milt Bruhn and his staff, and already the Badgers have doubled their winning output of a year ago, when they beat Marquette for their lone win. The Badgers all last year scored but 93 points, and after two games they had racked up 105 points, with eleven different players scoring touchdowns.

#### Wisconsin 23, Purdue 14 (October 12)

ISCONSIN'S Badgers won their first Big Ten game since late in the 1955 season on a bright October afternoon in Purdue's Ross-Ade stadium before a homecoming crowd of 40,507.

The win was particularly pleasing for Head Coach Milt Bruhn, who last year, in his first season, saw his Badgers go winless in the Big Ten campaign, although they did play three tie games. One of the tie games was against Purdue, and in 1957 the Badgers still maintained their hex over the Boilermakers who have not won against Wisconsin since the 1945 season.

The story of the game for the sophomore studded Badgers must revolve around three tested veterans, quarterback Sidney Williams and fullback Jon Hobbs, both junior lettermen, and left halfback Danny Lewis, a senior who is the only man on the squad to have won two major "W" awards. They took care of the Badgers' offensive power on this autumn day, and Hobbs was a terror to the Boilermakers on defense, too.

Williams, the Little Rock, Ark. product, took care of two of the Badgers touchdowns, climaxing a seven yard march early in the first quarter with a one yard plunge for the first score of

the game. Then, after Purdue had drawn close early in the fourth quarter, he scampered 73 yards on a keeper play for a decisive score. It appeared that he was going to be smacked down on two or three occasions, but each time he twisted, side-stepped, dodged, and then twisted again before breaking into the clear and outrunning the Purdue secondary.

Lewis, running better than ever, broke around Purdue's left end off a single wing play, and rambled 80 yards midway in the second quarter to break a 7–7 tie and put the Badgers ahead for

good in the game. Danny was the game's leading rusher, piling up 134 net yards on a mere 8 carries.

Jon Hobbs played a tremendous game at fullback, and his defensive alertness saved the Badgers on more than one occasion. Moreover his placekicking of a 26 yard field goal three seconds before the half ended changed the complexion of the game. As Coach Milt Bruhn commented afterwards: "The field goal made the score 17–7, and Purdue knew they had to score twice in the second half to overtake us. As you know, they only scored once."

Hobbs also contributed a blocked punt, an intercepted pass, a recovered fumble and key tackles to Wisconsin's defense during the course of the game, and they were all highly important.

The blocked punt occurred at the conclusion of Purdue's first series of plays following the opening kickoff, and when Earl Hill recovered the loose ball on the Purdue 7 yard line, the Badgers were in position for their first score. It marked the third consecutive game that the Badgers had tallied the first time they had possession of the football.

His interception of the Purdue pass, thrown by Boilermaker quarterback Ross Fichtner ended a Purdue threat that had reached the Badger 14 yard line late in the second quarter, and the Badgers immediately started a march down the field that ended on the Purdue 16 yard line when Hobbs stepped back and booted his field goal three seconds before the end of the first half.

In the third quarter, Purdue reached the Wisconsin 35 yard line, and had fourth and two for a first down, when Hobbs broke through the Boilermaker defense and spilled Purdue left halfback Tom Barnett for a five yard loss, and Wisconsin took over on downs.

The Badgers moved down to the Purdue 26 yard line, mainly on the strength of a 32 yard pass, Williams to Steiner, but then were stymied, and Purdue took over. The Boilermakers moved for one first down, then Hobbs hit Purdue's Tom Fletcher hard at the line of scrimmage, and recovered the ensuing fumble to thrwart the losers again.

Purdue's two scores were tallied by the second team left halfback, Kenny Mikes, who returned a punt 50 yards for a score late in the first quarter (1:50 left) and then capped a 71 yard, 14 play drive, by plowing over from the two yard line on the first play of the fourth quarter.

The Boilermakers were a frustrated team for most of the first quarter, before breaking into the scoring column. John Jardine, left guard, intercepted a Williams pass on the Purdue three yard line to end a Wisconsin threat, and he ran it back 61 yards to the Wisconsin 36. The Boilermakers then went down to the Wisconsin 5 yard line, but the Badger defense held, and took over on Wisconsin's 8 yard line.

On third down, the Badgers sophomore quarterback, Dale Hackbart, fumbled, and Purdue's Len Wilson recov-

ered on the Wisconsin 2 yard line. But, here Purdue's fullback Jim Redinger fumbled on the first play before crossing into the end zone, and Dale Hackbart recovered in the end zone for a touchback. Four plays later Hackbart punted, and Mikes ran it back 50 yards for the tying score.

Sidney Williams experienced an off day on his passing, completing only 2 in 9 attempts for 45 yards, but he ranked second in the Badger rushing attack with net gain of 83 yards in 9 carries, and of course, we've told you of his key 73 yard touchdown run.

For the third straight week, Coach Bruhn employed all the players at his command, with only end Dave Kocourek sitting it out, resting his ailing right knee. Bruhn was happy over the game's outcome, and pleased with the play of his starting sophomore tackles,
