Upon motion by Regent Fitzgerald, seconded by Regent Thompson, it was VOTED that the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, held on April 10, 1981, be approved as mailed to the members of the board, with the following revision, as requested by Regent Emeritus DeBardeleben:

Page 15, paragraph 2, line 1:

During the Education Committee meeting, Regent DeBardeleben then <u>had</u> moved;-in-Gommittee; that the hearing be conducted by an independent hearing examiner appointed by the President of the Board of Regents and that the examiner be empowered to make findings of fact.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Erdman welcomed Regents Frank Heckrodt, of Appleton, and Paul Schilling, of Milwaukee, noting that Regent Heckrodt is Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Presto Products, Inc., and that Regent Schilling is an attorney associated with the firm of Mulcahy and Wherry.

Dr. Christopher Abebe, Chairman of the University Council of the University of Calabar, Nigeria, was introduced by President Erdman.

The report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting, held on April 24, 1981, was ordered filed with the papers of this meeting.

Regent Fox presented the following resolution and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith and voted unanimously.

Resolution 2381:

WHEREAS, Arthur DeBardeleben of Park Falls has retired from this Board after completing a seven-year term, and

WHEREAS, from 1959 to 1968, before the merger creating the present University of Wisconsin System, he was a member of the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents, serving concurrently on the Coordinating Council for Higher Education, and for three successive years was president of the Board of Regents, and

WHEREAS, he brought to this Board a background as a brilliant undergraduate and law student at Madison, a forceful and persuasive debater, a successful lawyer, and a formidable champion of faculty and student rights, of broad educational opportunity and of institutional democracy, and

WHEREAS, in propounding his convictions on matters of principle, he never hesitated to challenge the majority opinion on any issue, frequently casting the only dissenting vote, and

WHEREAS, his volunteer service to the state and its universities for 16 years involved great personal sacrifice, adding up to more than 400 days attending Regent and Coordinating Council meetings, and driving more than 125,000 miles from and back to his home in Park Falls, and

WHEREAS, he has generously offered his services to the University of Wisconsin System in the future wherever and however needed; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board commends and thanks Arthur DeBardeleben for his outstanding service, wishes him well as he resumes the role of attentive observer of our deliberations, and formally confers upon him the status of Regent Emeritus.

Resolution 2382, presented by Regent Grover, was unanimously adopted, upon motion by Regent Grover, seconded by Regent Finlayson.

Resolution 2382:

WHEREAS, on April 30, 1981, Mary Walter of Baileys Harbor completed a seven-year term as a member of this Board, serving on the Education and the Business and Finance Committees and heading a year-long study to review and improve residence hall programs, and

WHEREAS, her long commitment to serving education also has included seven years as a Regent of the former Wisconsin State Universities Board, 15 years as a Trustee of St. Norbert College, eight years on the DePere Board of Education, and one year each on the Wisconsin Higher Educational Aids Board and the Wisconsin Coordinating Council for Higher Education, and

WHEREAS, her preparation for formulating and developing educational policies included her career as a northeastern Wisconsin professional journalist, editorial writer and newspaper executive, her studies at both private and public colleges and universities over a span of 38 years while earning a liberal arts degree, and her responsibilities in seeing all seven of her children through colleges and universities after the death of her husband, and

WHEREAS, she received Regent appointments from both Republican and Democractic governors, and

WHEREAS, her service on the Board of Regents of Wisconsin State Universities and the University of Wisconsin System for a total of 14 years required her to attend more than 300 days of regular meetings involving monthly trips from Green Bay and Door County in automobiles and airplanes, often in bad weather; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board, with admiration and respect, expresses deep appreciation to Mary Walter for her wise counsel and for her many contributions to Wisconsin educational institutions, and confers upon her the status and title of Regent Emeritus.

Regent O'Harrow, Chairman of the Regent Committee on UW-Extension, announced that the committee's next meetings would be held at UW-Eau Claire on May 27 and UW-Oshkosh on May 28, stating that all regents were invited to attend.

Summarizing the contents of a letter he had sent to President O'Neil on May 4, 1981 (copy on file with the papers of this meeting), Regent O'Harrow said the committee concluded that it had reached a point in its study at which a

modification of format seemed appropriate. Based on the committee's belief that final recommendations should reflect the considered judgment of a group of faculty and administrators and in view of its concern about becoming unduly involved in issues of a management nature, the President was asked to appoint an advisory group composed of UW System faculty and staff to formulate for the system an outreach model which would be capable of implementation within a ten-year time frame. The committee proposed that the advisory group be asked to identify essential components of the model and to suggest new policies or policy changes as well as procedural elements necessary for implementation, reflecting such factors as organizational structure, fee policy, possible funding formulas for continuing education, rank/tenure policies, joint appointments, priority setting, maintenance of quality, breadth of programming, and institutional commitment to the extension/outreach function. The advisory group would submit its findings to the President who then would make recommendations to the Regent Committee.

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Regent O'Harrow explained that the advisory group would review and synthesize materials which had been gathered for the Regent Committee, as well as other documents and reports being generated within UW-Extension and between UW-Extension and UW-Milwaukee. It was expected that the advisory group would report by December 31, 1981, that President O'Neil would make his recommendations to the Regent Committee by February 1, 1982 and that the committee would submit its report to the board in March, 1982. In the meantime, the Regent Committee would continue to meet with those who wished to provide information, and individual committee members would continue to speak with people who they felt could be helpful.

President O'Neil added that the members of the advisory group would be designated in time to attend the May 27 and 28 meetings of the committee. Stating that the structure described in Regent O'Harrow's letter provided an opportunity to study the issues involved in a new and constructive way, he expressed confidence that implementation of the modified approach would proceed on schedule with a commitment to aiding the committee's deliberations.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

It was moved by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Fitzgerald, and carried unanimously that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution 2383: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed. Noting that there had been much preoccupation of late with budgetary matters, President O'Neil observed that there was a greater degree of uncertainty about the short-term fiscal future than at any other time in recent years.

With regard to spring commencements, the President announced that nearly 13,000 degrees would be awarded at system institutions, approximately 10,200 of which would be baccalaureate and associate degrees and almost 2,000 of which would be master's degrees, the balance being doctoral and advanced professional degrees. When the month was over, he continued, the total alumni body would have increased by some three to four percent and the company of educated men and women across the state would be very substantially augmented. He regretted, however, that more could not be done to chronicle the sacrifices, defeats and triumphs which culminated in graduation. "The best we can do is to recognize, as I hope we will, that within these large aggregate numbers are hidden hundreds of human dramas, any one of which ought to inspire and reassure those who, from time to time, question the importance of a college or university education to students who have gone to such lengths to obtain it."

Indicating that some commencement exercises would include the conferral of teaching awards and other evidences of faculty accomplishment, he considered it appropriate to recognize on those occasions the achievements of both students and teachers in view of the fact that education is a mutual and joint enterprise. "As we honor the students who will be receiving degrees at commencement ceremonies across the state this month, I would urge that we also celebrate the integrally-related contributions of those thousands of professors and instructors who have made these degrees both possible and valuable."

President O'Neil then called on Ms. Kim Kachelmyer for her final report as president of the United Council of UW Student Governments, stating that he had enjoyed working with her and her colleagues during the past difficult but highly constructive year.

Ms. Kachelmyer introduced Robert Kranz, past president of the UW-Oshkosh student body, who was to become president of United Council as of June 1. She also introduced two new staff members: Women's Director Tammy Walters and Minority Director Teddi-Michele Beam.

Ms. Kachelmyer spoke about the funding formula for United Council, stating that it had been beneficial in the following ways: (1) United Council was provided with a stable funding base for the first time in its history, enabling the group to develop much more programming than had been possible previously and to maintain closer contact with students by traveling throughout the system; (2) two tabloids were published during the year, explaining the function of United Council; (3) committee operations were strengthened, with, for example, the Academic Affairs Committee having a full time staff person to give priority attention to financial aid issues; (4) the two new staff members who had been introduced would strengthen the council's advocacy of human rights' issues; (5) United Council was able to communicate effectively its views on the biennial budget to the Board of Regents and to the Legislature; (6) a larger office was obtained; and (7) staff members were paid more adequate salaries than had been

As to changes in the funding formula, she recommended better enforcement in terms of payment schedules and investigation of a funding base for the summer. She also asked that there be very little administrative control over the funding base, believing United Council had demonstrated that it could competently manage the funds. A document with further recommendations, she added, would be sent to the regents. Comments of United Council in OpDost Hon to be increase for Ms. Kachelmyer then commented on the 1981-82 annual budget for auxillary operations and segregated fees, stating that United Council was opposed to the recommended six percent increase. Although the increase, by itself, might not seem great, she said, it should be related to the possibility of a tuition increase, proposed reductions in financial aid, and continuing increases in the cost of living.

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Turning to another subject, Ms. Kachelmyer referred to a section of "UW System Financial Policy and Procedure Paper #37: Segregated University Fee Policy" which stated that if agreement on an annual plan for the use of allocatable fees could not be reached at the campus level, annual budget proposals representing the positions of both students and the administration were to be submitted to system administration for another attempt at resolution. In the event that this failed, system administration was to submit its recommendations to the regents, along with the other proposals for final resolution. Indicating that United Council wished to understand the intent of that section, she requested that the regents discuss the matter with Mr. Kranz during the coming months and said she would send a letter to the chancellors asking for their reaction. The question, she explained, related to the exact process that would be followed if SUFAC budgets submitted to the chancellors were rejected.

Copies of the United Council budget, year-end report and Executive Board minutes for April were distributed, along with booklets entitled "Training Your Successors" and "Policies and Positions of United Council."

In her closing remarks, Ms. Kachelmyer expressed her personal views regarding several matters about which she had reflected. With reference to the mission of the University System, she quoted the following passages from Chapter 36, Wis. Stats.: "The mission of the system is to develop human resources, to discover and disseminate knowledge, to extend knowledge and its application beyond the boundaries of its campuses and to serve and stimulate society by developing in students heightened intellectual, cultural and humane sensitivities, scientific, professional and technological expertise and a sense of purpose . . . " (s. 36.01(2)) "The primary responsibility for governance of the system shall be vested in the board which shall enact policies and rules for governing the system, plan for the future needs of the state for university education . . . " (s. 36.09(1)(a)) Asking if that mission was not being disrupted by those who neither recognized the significance of education nor wished to fund it adequately, she stated that people who are not educated do not have the knowledge necessary to analyze and challenge occurrences in the world around them. She was disturbed by the increasing erosion of support, she emphasized, and considered it imperative that the educational process be maintained in order to prepare students to deal with the problems of the future. Urging that the university continue vigorously to represent the importance of meeting this need and, in doing so, to reach out to alumni and students, she stated that "education is something that we must preserve. It is really the key united Council - comment on erosion of support for education. to everything that we do in this world."

Ms. Kachelmyer then spoke of difficulties which can be encountered in communication among people of different ages. Indicating that she had spoken frequently during the year with regents and administrators and had received much helpful advice, she remarked that, nonetheless, she felt that their differing life experiences created, to some extent, a barrier to communication. This problem of "ageism," she added, interferes with the efforts of people to learn from one another.

In conclusion, she expressed appreciation to the board, President O'Neil and his staff for the opportunity to work with them during her term as United Council president.

Chancellor Marshall, UW-Stevens Point, introduced Dr. Howard Thoyre who had been appointed dean of letters and science. A graduate of Louisiana State University who had received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Dr. Thoyre had been a member of the UW-Stevens Point faculty since 1962, serving as chairman of the mathematics department, assistant dean of letters and science, and acting dean of letters and science.

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REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Regent Beckwith presented the committee's report.

At a portion of the meeting to which all regents had been invited, the committee considered a proposed policy on sexual harassment (EXHIBIT A). Noting that the issue had previously been discussed at regent meetings in December, 1980 and March, 1981, Executive Vice President Kauffman stated that the proposed statement represented "our best effort" to develop a system policy that would allow maximum institutional definition and implementation in ways that best suited the needs of individual campuses. Assistant System Legal Counsel Patricia Hodulik described the participation of representatives of faculty senates in developing the statement, indicating that the intent was to set policy at a general level, enabling the institutions to develop their specific policies and procedures within the parameters of the general statement. Individual institutional policies and procedures, she added, would be submitted to the board for approval.

Regent Beckwith reported that three faculty members appeared before the committee to make statements. Professor Donald Larmouth, Chairman of the UW-Green Bay University Committee, spoke in favor of the proposed policy, pointing out that it placed emphasis upon education as a means of dealing with the problem. Professor Nadine St. Louis, Chairman of the UW-Eau Claire Faculty Senate, reported that the statement was fully acceptable to the UW-Eau Claire Executive Committee and that the proposals for implementation would allow each campus to proceed in ways most appropriate to its own needs. She mentioned a concern about the reference, in item II (1), to implementation procedures as a "disciplinary process," noting that, at UW-Eau Claire, any faculty-staff-student body empowered to hear allegations of sexual harassment would not have power to impose disciplinary action. Therefore, she said, the process was viewed as one which, instead of

being disciplinary itself, might lead to disciplinary action. She also gave strong support to the development of educational programs to prevent sexual harassment. Michael Lacktman, Chairperson of the UW-Milwaukee University Committee, stated that the proposed policy had been endorsed by the University Committee and emphasized support for the implementation portion of the statement which would recognize campus autonomy in development of the complaint and grievance process.

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In addition to the testimony given, a resolution from the UW-Whitewater Faculty Senate, which recommended approval of the draft policy, was distributed at the committee meeting.

In committee discussion, Regent Fox had expressed concern that portions of the proposed statement, particularly section (3) of the third paragraph, might tend to limit valid expressions on the part of faculty and students, in connection, for example, with the exhibition of artists' works. Attorney Hodulik and Executive Vice President Kauffman noted that the statement called upon the institutions to "be mindful of First Amendment rights and academic freedom" in the development of their definitions and procedures.

Upon motion by Regent Beckwith, seconded by Regent Fitzgerald, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolution 2384: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents adopts the "Sexual Harassment Policy Statement and Implementation," dated May 7, 1981 (EXHIBIT A).

Regent Beckwith summarized discussion which had taken place, during the portion of the committee meeting to which all regents had been invited, of a request for declaration of financial emergency at UW-Superior pursuant to Chapter UWS 5, <u>Wisconsin</u> <u>Administrative</u> <u>Code</u>. After reviewing the provisions in sections UWS 5.04, 5.05, and 5.06 relating to the procedures to be followed for declaration of a fiscal emergency, President O'Neil called upon Chancellor Meyer who described the process leading to the recommendation, noting that the draft report had been conveyed to the institution's entire faculty and staff as well as to the student association. He referred to successful efforts to relocate several tenured faculty members and spoke of recent encouraging developments relating to the university's enrollments. Dr. Donovan Coleman, Chairman of the UW-Superior Faculty Consultative Committee, stated the committee's unanimous belief that declaration of financial emergency would be in the best interests of the university, observing, however, that the committee had been unable to reach consensus as to the needed duration of the declaration. Chancellor Meyer and Professor Coleman then had responded to questions from regents regarding faculty morale and provisions for assisting faculty who might be relocated to other system campuses.

Professor Ronald Mershart, a member of the Faculty Consultative Committee and President of The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculties, delivered to the Education Committee a statement which he described as an "attempt to convey a sense of faculty sentiment regarding this (declaration of financial emergency) request." He asked that the regents modify the recommended resolution by not accepting the proposal for possible continuation of financial emergency Regular Board 5-8-81 Regular Board 5-8-8-81 Regular Board 5-8-81

into a second year, or longer. Additionally, in light of the apparent ability to relocate tenured faculty members from UW-Superior to other campuses, he questioned the need for the declaration.

In committee, President O'Neil then reiterated his support for Chancellor Meyer's recommendation, quoting the following passage from the April 21, 1981 memorandum requesting the declaration of financial emergency, to begin with the 1982-83 fiscal year: "The state of financial emergency may continue in 1983-84 if the spring of 1982 preliminary budget allocations for 1983-84 show a reduction of budget as defined in UWS 5.02, <u>Wisconsin Administrative Code</u>. The chancellor's recommendation regarding 1983-84 will be submitted to the UW System President for final action. The chancellor's recommendation will be accompanied by a report from the Faculty Consultative Committee, expressing its views on the matter."

Dr. Edward Muzik, Executive Secretary of The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculties, addressed the committee, contending that the declaration would be traumatic, destructive, and unnecessary at this time and alluding to factors of faculty morale and effects of the layoff of tenured faculty which occurred in 1973-75. He also suggested a delay of at least a month in making a decision about the matter.

There had been committee discussion, Regent Beckwith continued, about the possibility of amending Resolution 2385 by inserting the words "pursuant to the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Superior, the University of Wisconsin-Superior Faculty Consultative Committee, and the concurrence of the Board of Regents" between the words "that" and "the" in the third-from-the-last line. After consideration of possible implications of the suggested amendment, however, the resolution as originally presented had been moved and seconded. An amendment, moved by Regent Fox and seconded by Regent Lawton, to delete all of the language after the word "Code" in the third-from-the-last line had been defeated, after which the resolution was approved, with Regent Fox voting "No."

Regent Beckwith moved adoption by the board of resolution 2385 and the motion was seconded by Regent Hendrickson.

Resolution 2385: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Superior and the University of Wisconsin-Superior Faculty Consultative Committee, the University of Wisconsin-Superior be declared, effective this date, to be in a state of financial emergency for the 1982-83 fiscal year, under Section 36.21, Wis. Stats., and under the provisions of Chapter 5 of the Wis. Adm. Code; and, that the state of financial emergency may continue for the following year(s) in the event of a reduction of budget as defined in UWS 5.02, Wis. Adm. Code.

Although the resolution had not been amended in committee to provide for board involvement in any continuation of the state of financial emergency after the 1982-83 fiscal year, Regent Beckwith explained, it had been observed that, in all probability, President O'Neil would report such an action to the regents, so that the board could take whatever action it deemed appropriate at that time, and that such a continuation would undoubtedly involve faculty consultation at UW-Superior.

Regent Fox stated that, although he would not again introduce an amendment, he continued to oppose the resolution. "I think it is a very serious matter to impose a state of financial emergency upon a campus, and it should be done for a time certain." He considered inappropriate "the language in the resolution which suggests that another state of financial emergency may be imposed in the near future and, at the same time, short-circuits the difficult but constructive process that led up to this one." While that might be more convenient for administrators, he concluded, it would do a disservice to the faculty and the institution.

President O'Neil referred to Regent Beckwith's comments about the process which would be followed in the event it seemed necessary to consider extending the financial emergency, emphasizing that, although it did not appear in the resolution, that expectation should be an important part of the action's history. He also recognized "the extraordinary time, energy, thought, and concern which have gone into this process in bringing the recommendation here," citing contributions to those efforts by Professors Coleman and Mershart, Chancellor Meyer, Vice Chancellor Haugland and Dr. Carter, among others. He said, "This is an unusual, difficult, complex process. What we see at the end of it does not, in many ways, do justice to everything that has gone on before."

Put to the vote, Resolution 2385 was adopted, with Regent Fox voting "No."

Regent Beckwith continued the report of the Education Committee, noting that he had directed that a statement submitted by UW-Madison Professor Walter J. Blaedel be incorporated in the record of the April 9, 1981 meeting of the Education Committee.

It was moved by Regent Beckwith and seconded by Regent Fitzgerald that the following resolutions be adopted:

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The committee's report was presented by Chairman Fox on Fuculty HAcudem Start Comparison of the meeting to which all regents were invited, the committee received an information report from Mr. Charles Bauer, UW-Eau Claire, and Dr. James Skiles, UW-Madison, Co-Chairmen of the Biennial Budget Working Group on Faculty and Academic Staff Compensation for 1981-83. The report indicated that faculty and academic staff had continued to lose purchasing power and remained in unfavorable compensation relationships with comparable professional positions in both the private and public sectors. The final report, which was to be presented to President O'Neil later in the month and brought to the board for action at the June meeting, would address the problems of recruiting and retention, the shrinking pool of qualified individuals interested in faculty positions, and compensation for senior faculty. Professor Anatole Beck, UW-Madison, also presented the Business and Finance Committee with a statement concerning compensation.

Regent Fox reported that the committee had considered the 1981-82 annual budget for auxiliary operations and segregated fees. In presenting the budget request to the committee, Associate Vice President Douglas Osterheld had stated that auxiliary operations were in sound fiscal condition with funded reserves for equipment replacement and building maintenance at adequate levels. By using all available income, including investment earnings, and with a level debt service requirement, average recommended increases of six percent in segregated fees, 4.9 percent in room rates and 6.6 percent in board rates were well below the rate of inflation. Major increases in the non-allocated portion of segregated fees were necessary at UW-La Crosse (\$10) and UW-Stout (\$24) because of substantial student center additions, which, together with renovations at the UW-Eau Claire and UW-Stevens Point centers, were the only major new construction planned for 1981-82. Residence halls occupancy was expected to continue at the high level experienced during the current year, with vacancies only at UW-Oshkosh and UW-Superior.

Any new programs to be funded by the segregated fee or user charge are subject to review and prior approval by System Administration; and that System Administration, together with the campuses, be authorized to revise and approve budgets in accordance with actual enrollment experience for the first semester 1981-82, or other significant economic factors which necessitate a budget change, subject to approval by the Board of any room and board or segregated fee rate changes.

Regent Erdman stated that the auxiliary operations staff should be highly commended for holding increases below the inflation rate, observing that "our students who are lucky enough to be in the dormitories are receiving a great bargain."

The question was put on Resolution 2400, which then was adopted unanimously.

The 1981-82 annual budget for the University Hospital and Clinics then was considered by the committee. Superintendent Gordon Derzon had indicated that the budget had been approved by the Council of Trustees, and Regent Lawton had added that the hospital administration should be complimented on its excellent achievements. During 1980-81 the hospital and clinics experienced a significant increase in the utilization of its services, in addition to which the level of patient care required had increased 8.7 percent over the previous year, with the result that gross patient revenue was significantly higher than expected. The projected net income of approximately \$3.9 million for the current fiscal year would produce a substantial year-end cash balance which would be available for use the following year; therefore, on the basis of present budget data, a room rate increase would not be required for 1981-82. It was pointed out, however, that if certain variables produced an adverse effect on operations, a rate increase might be requested some time during the latter half of the fiscal year.

Regent Fox moved adoption of Resolution 2401 and the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald.

The total outside support of \$202 million for the current year was about \$15 million greater than for the previous year.

It was moved by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Finlayson and carried unanimously, that the following resolution be adopted:

Regent Gerrard presented a request to increase the budget for construction of the fine arts facility at UW-Platteville to a total of \$5,171,000. Approved by the regents in the 1979-81 capital budget at \$5,888,500, the cost of the project had been revised to \$4,713,000 in September, 1980 by the regents and the State Building Commission, based on the architect's preliminary design and cost estimate. The currently recommended budget was based on the acceptance of all except the mechanical bids which were to be rejected, redesigned and rebid. The Old Main building at UW-Platteville, which contained two auditoriums primarily used for the performing arts, was in the process of being demolished, he continued, adding that, with approval of this request, all of the four-year universities would be provided with fine arts facilities.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent O'Harrow.

Indicating that rebidding of the mechanical work was expected to save between \$100,000 and \$150,000, Vice President Winter said 2 percent-2-1/2 percent contingency usually was carried on a project, which was the amount anticipated following the rebidding. Regent Beckwith asked if changes had been made in the project plan in preparation for rebidding, to which Regent Gerrard responded in the affirmative.

The question was put on Resolution 2406, and it was adopted unanimously.

The committee then considered a revised resolution concerning six minor projects: two for UW-Eau Claire to fund a boiler repair project and a masonry repair project; one for UW-Oshkosh to develop the vacated portion of Pearl Avenue into a parking area, fire lanes and a landscaped area; one for UW-Stout to request state alternate energy funds to complete an experimental, energy-efficient vehicle; one for UW-Whitewater to correct a safety hazard in the library; and one for UW-Extension to make handicapped access improvements in the Civic Center campus buildings in Milwaukee.

Adoption of Resolution 2407 was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent O'Harrow.

Resolution 2407: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire, Oshkosh, Stout, Whitewater and Extension Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

Regent Erdman observed that a project relating to window modifications for the UW-Madison engineering building was not included in the revised resolution. Regent Gerrard indicated that it had been withdrawn for further study but probably would be returned to the board in June.

Put to the vote, Resolution 2407 was adopted unanimously.

UW-Extension _Bld45

Regent Gerrard reported that the committee had approved a request to conduct a fire safety study of nine representative residential buildings in the system at a cost not to exceed \$40,000 of program revenues. The purpose of the study would be to determine whether any modifications were needed in the residence halls to assure that students not in the immediate area of a fire would be alerted to the emergency in time to evacuate the building without being exposed to danger. He thought it important to have the study performed, adding that it probably was late in coming.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent Finlayson:

Resolution 2408: <u>Residence Halls</u> - five Shfety study approved R.2408, p.247-25

That, upon the recommendation of the University of Wisconsin System President, authorization be granted to enter into a contract with Rolf Jensen & Associates, Inc., Deerfield, Illinois for a total estimated cost not to exceed \$40,000 from Program Revenues - Non-GPR. The purpose of the study would be to determine whether any modifications are needed to System residential buildings to assure the safety of building occupants.

Regent Erdman asked if there was any possibility of having staff within the system undertake the study, to which Regent Gerrard replied that, although system personnel might be able to perform such a study, he thought it advisable to obtain expert assistance.

In response to an inquiry by Regent Schilling, Vice President Lorenz indicated that the university did not pay for insurance on the buildings.

The question was put on Resolution 2408, which then was unanimously approved.

UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Regent Gerrard commended Ms. Kachelmyer for her work with the Board during her tenure as president of United Council and President Erdman added that she was sure the entire board joined in that commendation. Recalling that he had been active in United Council as a student, Regent Schilling remarked that the group had made much progress since that time. "I am proud to think that perhaps some of the things that we began in the WSU System have resulted in a very organized, thorough group of students speaking on behalf of other students."

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At 10:40 a.m., the following resolution, moved by Regent Beckwith, seconded by Regent Fox, carried on a unanimous roll call vote, with Regents Beckwith, Erdman, Finlayson, Fitzgerald, Fox, Gerrard, Grover, Heckrodt, Lawton and O'Harrow voting "Aye" (10) and Regents Hendrickson, Knowles, Majerus, Schilling, Thompson and Veneman absent (6):

Resolution 2400:

Auxiliary Enterprises Sudnet fly approved 400, P.1

That, upon the recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin System's operating budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1981, through June 30, 1982, for Auxiliary Enterprises and Segregated Fee Operations, including user charges and other items reflected in Book B, 1981-82 Annual Budget Documentation, May 1981, as presented to the Board and on file with the records of this meeting be approved. Any new programs to be funded by the segregated fee or user charge are subject to review and prior approval by System Administration; and that System Administration, together with the campuses, be authorized to revise and approve budgets in accordance with actual enrollment experience for the first semester 1981-82, or other significant economic factors which necessitate a budget change, subject to approval by the Board of any room and board or segregated fee rate changes.

Regent Erdman stated that the auxiliary operations staff should be highly commended for holding increases below the inflation rate, observing that "our students who are lucky enough to be in the dormitories are receiving a great bargain."

The question was put on Resolution 2400, which then was adopted unanimously.

The 1981-82 annual budget for the University Hospital and Clinics then was considered by the committee. Superintendent Gordon Derzon had indicated that the budget had been approved by the Council of Trustees, and Regent Lawton had added that the hospital administration should be complimented on its excellent achievements. During 1980-81 the hospital and clinics experienced a significant increase in the utilization of its services, in addition to which the level of patient care required had increased 8.7 percent over the previous year, with the result that gross patient revenue was significantly higher than expected. The projected net income of approximately \$3.9 million for the current fiscal year would produce a substantial year-end cash balance which would be available for use the following year; therefore, on the basis of present budget data, a room rate increase would not be required for 1981-82. It was pointed out, however, that if certain variables produced an adverse effect on operations, a rate increase might be requested some time during the latter half of the fiscal year.

Regent Fox moved adoption of Resolution 2401 and the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald.

Resolution 2401:

Hospithe & Clinics Operations budget Noghest for 1981-82 approved. R.2401, p. 19-20 That, upon recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics Operating Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1981 to June 30, 1982 (documentation on file with the papers of this meeting), at an estimated amount of \$85,997,000 be approved, and that the rates in effect since July 1, 1980 continue to be charged; that the University Administration be authorized to make the necessary final accounting adjustments; and submit the budget request to the Joint Committee on Finance.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY STATEMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION

I. Policy Statement

It is the policy of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, consistent with its efforts to foster an environment of respect for the dignity and worth of all members of the University community, that sexual harassment of students and employees in the University of Wisconsin System is unacceptable and impermissible conduct which will not be tolerated.

Sexual harassment is a form of sex discrimination. It occurs in a variety of situations which share a common element: the inappropriate introduction of sexual activities or comments into the work or learning situation. Often, sexual harassment involves relationships of unequal power, and contains elements of coercion--as when compliance with requests for sexual favors becomes a criterion for granting work, study or grading benefits. However, sexual harassment may also involve relationships among equals, as when repeated sexual advances or demeaning verbal behavior have a harmful effect on a persons's ability to study or work in the academic setting.

For general policy purposes, sexual harassment may be described as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other physical conduct and expressive behavior of a sexual nature where: (1) Submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment or education; (2) Submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for academic or employment decisions affecting that individual; or (3) Such conduct has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's academic or professional performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or demeaning employment or educational environment.

In keeping with this policy, a concerted effort must be made to protect employees and students from sexual harassment as defined, and to rid the University of Wisconsin System of such conduct.

II. Implementation

Procedures for prompt corrective action and discipline consistent with due process are an essential part of the effort to eliminate sexual harassment. Equally important, however, is the establishment of programs to educate members of the university community on the subject of sexual harassment, and to make them more sensitive to its forms and damaging consequences. Development of the necessary programs and procedures is most appropriately and effectively undertaken at the institutional level. Therefore, the Board directs as follows:

(1) Each institution within the System shall have or develop a disciplinary process to address allegations of sexual harassment. This process shall include a definition of those forms of sexual harassment which will be grounds for disciplinary action; formal hearing procedures in accordance with due process requirements; and procedures allowing for resolution by mutual consent. In developing these definitions and procedures, institutions should be mindful of First Amendment rights and academic freedom, particularly as they relate to sexual harassment in the instructional setting. Institutions should also recognize that this policy does not address consensual sexual relations that do not involve harassment or discrimination. Institutions should also be aware of and sensitive to the fact that disciplinary action is not the only means of dealing with the problem of sexual harassment; there may be some kinds of conduct which are more appropriately addressed by an educational process or through other informal means. All institutional definitions and procedures are subject to approval by the Board and shall be presented to the Board not later than February, 1982, for purposes of review leading to approval.

(2) Each institution within the System shall establish educational programs designed to inform employees and students of the nature of sexual harassment, to increase their sensitivity to it, and to publicize the procedures, sanctions and remedies available against it. Institutions shall report to the Board on their educational efforts not later than February, 1982.

(3) System Administration staff shall, upon request, assist the institutions in their efforts to implement this policy and shall make available information and materials on the subject of sexual harassment which would be useful in the drafting of definitions or procedures or in preparing education programs.

University of Wisconsin System POSITION STATEMENT Radio Broadcast Stations

INTRODUCTION

"The broadcast facilities and resources of the University... shall be so utilized as to advance the educational purposes of the University and serve to the fullest extent the interests and needs of the people of the state."

> University of Wisconsin Board of Regents January, 1960

It is the premise of this paper that a University of Wisconsin System position statement on radio broadcasting, with regard to use of and plans for UW System stations, would be helpful to discussions of long-range planning; deliberations of study committees; and coordination of internal and external relationships.

In formulating a position statement, the first issue might be whether the University of Wisconsin System intends to continue operating radio stations. If the answer were negative, it would then become necessary to develop mechanisms for divestiture. If the position were positive, it would then be useful to develop a statement relating to administration, categories of stations, programming/operations, and oversight/coordination.

This paper assumes continued operation of UW System radio stations.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of the following statement is to provide information regarding future plans of and prospects for the radio stations licensed to the Board of Regents and operated by UW System institutions.

These stations are integrally associated with their sponsoring institutions and with the communities they serve. Students, institutional administrators, and professional staff who direct these activities, combine efforts in pursuit of service, training, and outreach. The UW System Administration will continue to coordinate and assist the stations' endeavors in these areas.

Improved Services

University of Wisconsin System radio stations, with the concurrence of institutional administrators, and in keeping with FCC rules and regulations, are encouraged to propose and implement plans and procedures designed to enhance their service responsibilities to communities and institutions in which they are located.

Radio One-Radio Two

Extension of the Radio One-Radio Two dual programming service (Radio One: News and Information; Radio Two: Music and Arts) to areas other than Madison, is a desirable means of providing optimal public radio service to residents of the state.

To this end, the feasibility of consolidated Radio I-Radio II programming services will be explored in Milwaukee and La Crosse. Such arrangements would contemplate joint programming and operation of UW System public radio station WUWM-FM and ECB public radio station WHAD-FM in the Milwaukee area; and UW System public radio station WLSU-FM and ECB public radio station WHLA-FM in La Crosse.

Other UW System stations wishing to modify or expand their present services in accord with public radio criteria (CPB-qualified) or the Radio One-Radio Two concept, or both, should be encouraged to do so.

Statewide Program Service

The University System, recognizing the need for statewide public radio service, will provide programming and promotion for such service through contract between University Extension, operating WHA-AM in Madison, and the ECB. Concurrently, the ECB and the University System should explore the extent to which the feasibility of university stations could provide locally oriented program service to various regions of Wisconsin via ECB transmitters.

APPENDIX

The purpose of this section is to provide supportive information relative to the foregoing position statement concerning radio stations operated by the University of Wisconsin System. The following concerns will be addressed:

- * administration;
- * categories of stations;
- * programming/operations; and
- * oversight/coordination.

Such information should prove useful in providing responses to inquiries and as an administrative overview of UW System purposes and intentions with regard to these stations.

Administration

The Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System is the licensee for twelve radio broadcast stations (11 FM, 1 AM). Authority and responsibility for operational administration of these stations is delegated through the President of the University System to Chancellors of institutions at which stations are located. (The UW Center System, and institutions at Madison and Parkside, do not have radio stations. University Extension operates WHA-AM and WHA-TV in the Vilas Communications Center on the campus of UW-Madison.)

Administration and operational supervision of individual radio stations are in most cases delegated to an academic department, with a departmental faculty member designated as general manager or director. Depending on the station mission, type of service, and departmental procedures, these directors' assignments vary. Some have responsibility for the radio station as part of their overall workload; others are assigned under a specific portion of their time (1/2, 1/4, or less). In other cases, station directors are professionally-qualified academic staff or classified appointees, reporting to a department head or Associate Chancellor. This flow of administrative and operational authority and responsibility provides for direct and continuous supervision in accord with federal, Regent, and institutional policies applicable to University System broadcast stations.

Categories of Stations

All radio stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission to the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System are operated as noncommercial educational broadcast stations. These stations can be classified under two categories.

1. <u>CPB-qualified</u> stations meet or exceed criteria established by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) and are generally referred to as <u>Public</u> radio stations. CPB qualification normally carries with it affiliation with National Public Radio (NPR) and access to its program services. Entitlement to federal funding in the form of Community Service Grants is a particular benefit accruing to Public radio stations.

University System Public radio stations are WLSU-FM, La Crosse; WHA-AM, Madison (operated by UW-Extension); and WUWM-FM, Milwaukee. As Public radio stations, they meet or exceed CPB criteria: each has a staff of at least five full-time professionals; maintains a broadcast schedule of at least 18 hours per day; has a Community Advisory Board reflecting diverse needs and interests of the communities served; and operates on a budget that includes a non-federal amount of at least \$100,000 in fiscal year 1981.

In addition, each UW System Public radio station operates at a transmitter power sufficient to provide a primary signal to its community of license; and maintains studios, control rooms, and production facilities adequate to allow for simultaneously producing and broadcasting programs of high quality.

2. <u>Non-CPB-qualified</u> stations operate according to FCC rules and regulations, but do not meet all of the criteria necessary to be designated Public radio stations; nor are they full-fledged NPR affiliates, although it is possible, on a fee basis, for them to obtain NPR program service. These stations are generally referred to as university radio stations. Radio stations in the University System categorized as university (non-CPB-qualified) stations--all FM--are:

Programming/Operations

All noncommercial educational radio stations, CPB-qualified or not, by virtue of licenses granted, are required to operate in the public interest, convenience, and necessity. Federal Communications Commission rules, with minor exceptions regarding technical matters, apply uniformly to all noncommercial educational radio broadcast licensees.

Programming services provided by UW System radio stations are devoted primarily to meeting community needs of an informational, cultural and educational nature. This programming approach can be characterized as "public service radio" or "radio for public purposes," and is based on four elements:

- providing informal education and information for the general population;
- providing a forum for discussion of public policy issues and alternatives;
- expanding the cultural horizons of the public by serving as a cultural resource; and
- tying together a dispersed and diverse population by providing a sense of identity.

Separation of UW System radio stations into Public and university categories is not absolute in providing differentiation between the two types of stations. Indeed, both types describe their programming services according to the same four elements above. Any distinction is, therefore, a matter of degree, or emphasis.

These distinctions in programming services are largely related to the amount and kind of resources available for providing such services. University stations have smaller operating budgets than Public stations. Their facilities are not as extensive or sophisticated. They operate at considerably lower transmitter power and signal strength. They have few, if any, full-time professional staff.

While all university stations have a faculty or professionallyqualified manager or director, they depend on volunteer student help for a significant proportion of their total staff complement. This dependency on student help, while enriching the practicum and academic facets of educational opportunities, means that operating schedules of university stations are affected by availability of qualified students. Some stations have an abundance of student personnel and can operate virtually full time the year 'round; others shut down during vacation and recess periods, or go to abbreviated schedules. Recent FCC rules have established minimum operating schedules of 5 hours per day/36 hours per week, except during official institutional vacation or recess periods.

At their inception, university stations operated as a student activity comparable to the campus newspaper or forensics program. Their primary purpose was to provide students with opportunity in a variety of broadcast experiences. Allowing for specific differences peculiar to each institution, the initial functions of these stations could be summarized as follows:

- provide listeners with educational, informational and entertainment programming supplementary to established broadcast services in the area;
- provide students interested in broadcasting an opportunity to gain experience in operation of a radio station under professional supervision; and
- 3. provide the institution with an outlet for public information in the area from which most of its students are drawn, acquainting the public with the program and activities of the university.

Over the years, these functions have evolved into a broader, more comprehensive range of services, reflective of two conditions: (1) broadened scope of institutional academic program offerings and shifting priorities; and (2) additional audiences resulting from expanded coverage areas.

In making programming determinations for university stations, audience needs are combined with institutional needs as station management attempts to fulfill mission obligations related to community service

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and outreach, and to provide academic opportunities to students enrolled in courses of study associated with broadcasting. These programming decisions are also arrived at in light of requirements of law and Regent policy, e.g., access to UW System broadcasting facilities for expression of varying social, economic, and political viewpoints on an equal opportunity basis.

In fulfillment of their programming responsibilities, university stations exhibit a considerable range of offerings. While each station emphasizes those broadcast activities which best meet the needs of its audience, educational benefit to students is the common objective. This practicum, or training, aspect of university stations is integral to their role in institutional and University System functions.

Two UW System Public radio stations (WLSU-FM, La Crosse; WUWM-FM, Milwaukee) also provide practicum experience to students. WHA-AM does not offer "training" per se, but regularly employs a significant number of students in a variety of assignments.

Funding Support

Sources of funding for University of Wisconsin System radio stations vary according to the type of station. As indicated earlier, Public radio stations derive significant amounts of their total operating budgets from Community Service Grants. Additional financing comes from citizen support groups, general program revenue, and contract productions.

University radio stations depend in varying degree on student fee allocations in addition to institutional budget support. Few receive any significant income from private donations, grants, or contracts. Changes in enrollment and allocations committee priorities affect student fee support. Institutional funding from general program revenue is also affected by changes in enrollment because operating budgets for institutions are based in part on a formula tied to student population.

Oversight/Coordination

Oversight relating to UW System broadcast stations is exercised through the Office of Academic Affairs by the Coordinator for Television Production and Media Activities. This position consolidates in one office such coordinating responsibilities as ensuring compliance with FCC rules, processing license applications and renewals, and liaison with the Wisconsin Educational Communications Board.

Another responsibility of the Coordinator is to provide information to the licensee of record (the Board of Regents) so that Regents have an awareness of activities and issues related to UW System broadcast stations, and thereby exercise authority appropriate to their responsibilities.

In addition, the Coordinator maintains close and continuous contact with broadcast station directors to discuss problems, provide information, and assist in handling general concerns associated with broadcast operations. Thus, the necessary operational management link to broadcast operations required of licensees by the FCC is provided.

The Coordinator does not participate in day-to-day operational and management decisions concerning UW System broadcast stations. However, this office is the focal point for inquiries and processing of applications relating to major facilities changes, interpretation or application of FCC rules, and matters concerning System and Regent policy.
