The date for Easter was decided at the Council of Nice in 325 A.D. which decreed that "everywhere the Great Feast of Easter should be observed on one and the same day: Easter Day is always the first Sunday after the full moon which happens upon, or next after, the 21st day of March; and if the full moon happens upon a Sunday, Easter -Day is the Sunday after.

~~Spy-Wednesday~~ was so called from the treachery of Judas Iscariot, who, on that day, bargained with the Chief Priests for the betrayal of his Master. Maundy-Thursday is supposed to refer to the last Supper of the Lord. Good Friday in memory of the Crucifixion, probably was originally God's Friday.

On March 17th those of Irish descent celebrate St. Patrick's Day in honor of that semi-historical character who was the first missionary to Ireland.

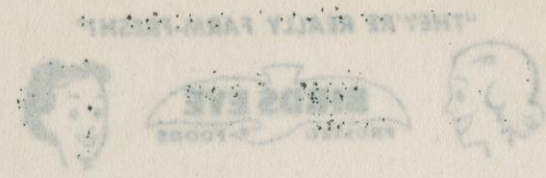

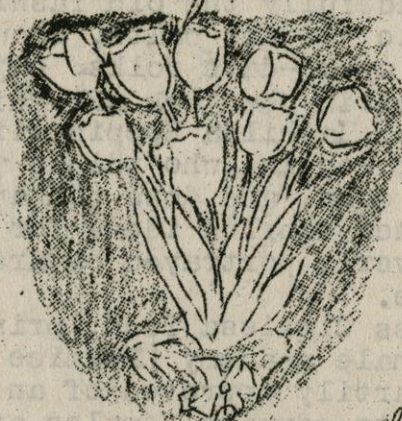

"THE FIRST CLUB MEETING"-PRESENTED
BY WILLIAMS BAY WOMAN'S CLUB

It happens rarely that women choose to go back in history one hundred years to reenact a story concerning their progress and advancement in the world, but that is just what the Williams Bay Woman's Club chose to do last Friday when ten of the members presented the one-act play "The First Club Meeting," which is based on historical facts.

The time was September 1833- the scene- a sitting-room in the home of Mrs. Rhoda Plumb (Mrs. Dorothy Fridlund) the postmaster's wife, in a small town in Illinois, where a group of women have assembled in response to an invitation from Mrs. Lois Goodall, wife of Dr. Nathaniel Goodall (Naomi Greenstein) who is considered to be a strong minded and far seeing person, to organize a society for the advancement of women.

Sally Drayton, Mrs. Plumb's young niece from Chicago, played by Ruth Phipps; is visiting her and has brought with her many new and smart ideas. She is anxious to meet Suzanne Huntington, a bride from New York (Barbara Fichtl) so that they might compare styles and up-to-date social activities of the younger set. The two dance very gracefully the old fashioned quadrille and the waltz, showing how the up-to-date folks enjoy amusement in New York and Chicago.

Mrs. Mathilda Hoppin, wife of Ebenezer Poppin, who thinks as her husband does, and does not approve of any new fangled ideas for women, was cleverly portrayed by Mrs. Gordon Case.

Miss Clarissa Todd, principal of a Female Academy (Bernice Thompson) heartily approves of an organization to educate females and to promote women's rights; and promises to help promote it.

An immigrant neighbor from Tennessee, Mrs. Sarah Pack (Elsie Hansen) who happens to make a neighborly call, sees the assembled guests, and is horrified when she sees so many things which to her seem worldly and too "up and comin'," and tells them so.

A Quaker lady, Hannah Stebbins, (Gertrude Van Epps) cannot make up her mind readily to favor any organization that might mean a new advancement for women in the world, and does not hesitate to say so. Her friend, Mrs. Amelia Weed, (Dorothy Gates) never had an idea of her own and always thinks as Mr. Weed does- (He thinks women's place is in the home) will ask Mr. Weed. But before the meeting adjourned all agree to meet again. From this meeting a women's organization was founded, the first Woman's Club in the United States was the Ladies Education Association of Jacksonville, Illinois, and later from this organization a female seminary, now the Woman's College at Jacksonville, Ill., and known since 1937 as McMurray College, which is a college strictly for the education of young women.

The play was given at the home of Mrs. Gordon Case. The lovely antique furniture, rugs and drapes used for the setting caused much comment by the invited guests. Before the play Mrs. F.M. Van Epps sang "Beautiful Dreamer" by Stephen Collins Foster, and "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms". Miss Jean Radabaugh, soprano, whom it is always a pleasure to hear, sang two numbers; Miss Jane Meyer, a graduate of Lawrence College School of Music, played a group of piano solos. Both musicians are from Walworth. Mrs. Lawrence Hollister and Miss Meyer were the accompanists.

The costumes worn by the players were attractive and in keeping of a century ago.

Dainty cookies, tea and candies were served from an attractively set table, decorated with spring flowers, by a committee composed of Mrs. E.H. Iverson, Miss Sarah Ruhl, Mrs. Gordon Case.

Mrs. Floyd Blakeley directed the play.

FINLANDS' SURRENDER TO RUSSIA IS A VICTORY FOR HITLER

At 3 A.M. C.S.T. Wednesday, March 13, and 11 o'clock Finnish time, the war between Finland and Soviet Russia ended. The war which has been going on for three and a half months ended in a victory for Russia, a nation whose man power and other resources were fifty times larger than that of Finland. Finland now gives up more than half of her country to be occupied by Russia. It was a bitter defeat for the little republic whose heroic fighting will ever live in history. The victory for Russia means no gains for the democracies of Europe, they still must fight against communism and Nazism, altho Finland maintains her independence. Germany now can get all the oil and grain as well as all the other materials it needs to carry on the war against the Allies. Finland needed an army to win against Russia, but the Scandinavian countries were kept from sending men as they were threatened by Hitler, even if they allowed troops from other countries to pass thru their countries to fight for Finland. Volunteers were allowed to go from Sweden, and only last week one of Sweden's gallant soldiers, Lieut. Col. Maenus Dryssen, who went to Finland to command Swedish volunteers in Finland, was killed in action.

The Finns in the 20 years since they have been free from Russia and became an independent democracy, have built thousands of schools at a cost of more than a billion marks, and the country's universities have greatly increased. They are great readers, and have larger book stores than in our country's large cities. Finland with her little more than 3,000,000 population, beside spending money for public improvements has paid every installment on her war debt to America when it came due, and the only European debtor that has.

Hitler is marching on, and March is a lucky month for the Fuehrer. The Ides of March, one of the divisions of the Roman calendar, generally fell on the 13th of the month; but

in March, May, July and October they occurred on the 15th, and that is exactly when it occurs this year, on Friday, March 15. It was exactly on the fatal Ides of March 15, 1939, that Hitler began his annexation of Czechoslovakia. This brings them very close to Saturday, Hitler's lucky day. On March 3, 1933, Hitler became head of the Reichstag.

President Roosevelt sent Under-secretary of State Sumner Welles to Europe on a visit to the belligerents to see if peace might be brought about among them or to find the status quo, he being a fact finder for the President.

Here is when there will be peace in Europe—read it carefully—

"When the widow of Franco visits Stalin on his deathbed and tells him that Mussolini was assassinated at Hitler's funeral."

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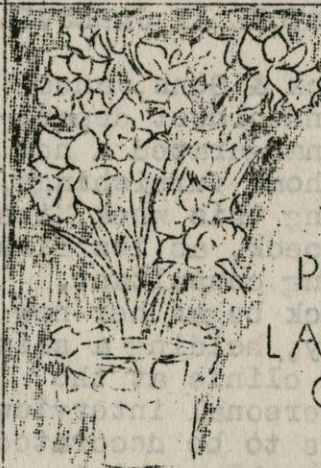
