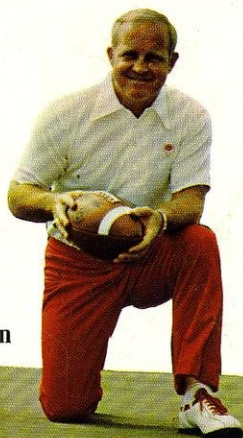

COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS: All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned

and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING: A limited number parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

The Media Interview Room on game days will be the newly renovated Wisconsin Weight-Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach McClain on a daily basis is from 2:30 to 3:15 daily in his office (in person or by telephone); from 3:15 to 3:45 p.m. Monday on the field prior to start of practice; and following practice each day in the "W" Club Annex

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Players are available for interviews prior to or following practice sessions during the week. Requests should be made through the Sports Information Office. Suggested best appointment times are 2:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Media representatives may interview Wisconsin players following each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

YOUR HOSTS in Camp Randall Stadium and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William 16**, **David 13**, and **Eric 11**.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films, does color commentary on the Badger hockey broadcasts, and is the producer-host of Badger Football which is seen each season on the state's public television stations.

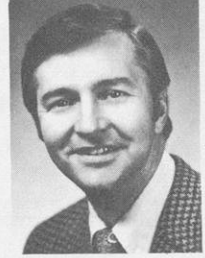
He and his wife **Janis** are the parents of daughters **Dawn 19**, **Amie 16**, and son **Adam 7**.

WISCONSIN'S 1978 FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

"There's a good nucleus of returning lettermen — both offensively and defensively — around which to build Wisconsin's 1978 football team.

"Wisconsin won its first five games of 1977, then lost its final six games to finish eighth in the Big Ten standings. A sputtering offense could account for only three touchdowns in the final half of the season.

"Though the offense malfunctioned, Wisconsin ranked third in the Big Ten in total defense — a yield of 281.4 yards per game — with the defense against rushing fifth allowing 202.9 yards per game, and the pass defense second giving up 78.6 yards per game. Nationally, the Badgers ranked sixth on pass defense on a yield of 91.1 yards per contest.

"Offensive starters returning include center **Jim Moore**, a two year regular; guards **Brad Jackomino** and **Dave Krall**; receivers **Greg Barber** at tight end and **David Charles** at split end; and tailback **Ira Matthews**. **Moore**, **Charles** and **Matthews** all have been two year regulars while both **Jackomino** and **Krall** were 1977 regulars who saw action as starters during their 1976 sophomore campaigns.

OFFENSIVE OUTLOOK—

Lettermen Returning — 15 (6 starters)

Major Position Changes — **Wayne Souza**, defensive back to wide receiver; **Tom Stauss**, tailback to fullback; **Ray Snell**, tackle to guard; **Dave Krall**, guard to tackle.

STARS TO WATCH — Split End **David Charles** (63 catches for 886 yards and six TD's) has been Badgers top receiver past two seasons; tailback **Ira Matthews** who paced nation in kickoff returns and Big Ten in kickoff and punt returns in 1976 as a sophomore.

"During the course of spring practice **Dave Krall** was switched to tackle, while **Ray Snell**, who saw considerable action at tackle as a sophomore, moved to a guard post and they appear set there as we head into pre-season practice.

"Also during the spring we moved **Wayne Souza**, a defensive back last year, to Z back (flanker or wide receiver) to give us more speed and good hands there, while **Mike Krepfle** progressed in the spring to move ahead of **Greg Barber** at tight end.

"A question everyone asks, "Who will play quarterback in 1978?"

"**Charles Green**, who started three games in 1977 — he also had four starts as a 1975 fresh-

man — was Number 1 and got most of the work during spring drills. He's a senior who has completed a career total of 48 completions in 97 attempts for 633 yards and three touchdowns, with seven passes intercepted.

Jeff Buss, who was red-shirted in 1977, also had a good spring of work. He'll be a sophomore.

"**Mike Kalasmiki**, a junior from Addison, IL, started one game (Ohio State) last year before being sidelined with a knee injury and he'll be in the battle for the starting assignment, as we plan to look at everybody.

"The incoming freshmen also will receive a great amount of attention and they include **John Josten** of Arlington Heights, IL., **Scott Moeschl**, Cincinnati, Ohio, **Dan Messinger**, Marinette, and **Jay Seiler**, Schofield.

"**Ira Matthews** is an exciting runner at tailback, and his style fits perfectly into the I-option type attack we'll be using. I'd like to see **Ira** get over 1,000 yards rushing this year — he can be the key to our success offensively.

"**Ira's** versatility is shown by his career totals of 986 yards rushing, 485 yards gained on 35 pass receptions, 871 yards on 36 kickoff returns, and 173 yards on 29 punt returns.

"As a sophomore he led the nation — and the Big Ten — in kickoff returns, and became the first Wisconsin player ever to score a touch-

down by rushing, by pass reception, by punt return, and by kickoff return in a single season.

"Tom Stauss earned the fullback assignment with a fine spring practice and while he's not as big a fullback as I'd like to have, he blocks well and runs with authority.

"Defensively, Wisconsin returns nine lettermen starters including Dave Crossen, the team's most valuable player in 1977 at linebacker; Dave Ahrens, who started all eleven games last year as a freshman; and at tackle, Tom Schremp, who is one of the finest defensive tackles that I've had the opportunity to coach.

STARS TO WATCH - End Dave Ahrens, named to All-American Freshman team in 1977; Tackle Tom Schremp, 2nd team All-Big Ten in 1977; Linebacker Dave Crossen, Wisconsin's MVP and leading tackler in 1977; Defensive Backs Lawrence Johnson, 2nd team All-Big Ten in 1977; Greg Gordon, A solid hitter and Scott Erdmann, 6th nationally in pass interceptions in 1976.

"The defensive secondary of Lawrence Johnson, Dan Schieble, Scott Erdmann, and Greg Gordon returns intact - they've played together the past two seasons - and they have good reactions and are hard hitting backs.

"Dan Relich at middle guard and Bruce Woodford at left tackle round out the list of lettermen starters returning.

"Staying healthy and free of injury can be one of the key factors to our success in 1978. Hard work by each player during the summer months will insure their being better football players when pre-season workouts begin August 24. If we can stay healthy during the course of the season, it'll help us with our depth situation.

"Our kicking game should be adequate, though we've lost a fine punter by graduation in Dick Milaeger (40.3 career average). Joe Ruetz had some experience punting in last year's non-conference games and rates a slight edge as we prepare for 1978.

"Steve Veith took care of the extra point and field goal chores almost exclusively last year, and split the kickoff duties with Mike Brhely. Both return this season.

"Wisconsin's schedule is a rugged one, though a favorable one with seven home games. The Badgers play all nine Big Ten schools again this year, with Indiana, Michigan, Ohio State, Purdue, and Minnesota all appearing in Camp Randall. Non-conference opposition will be provided by Richmond - the season's opener on September 16 - and Oregon (September 30), both in Camp Randall.

"I don't know how we'll do won-and-lost-wise, but we'll be well coached and well disciplined and I think we'll go out and play darned exciting football."

Dave is a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, and is a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education.

His playing and coaching career has been one of success.

Teams he played on at Upper Sandusky, Ohio, High School had a three year record of 23-2-2; Bowling Green football teams of 1957-58-59 on which he played as a quarterback and safety went 22-3-2; teams he was associated with as an assistant coach compiled an overall 70-26-1 record over nine seasons; and his seven year mark at Ball State was 46-25-3. His 13-4-0 Mid-American Conference record for the past three years was the best in the conference.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio, High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961 — he served as freshman offensive coach — and earned his master's degree in Education.

He learned his coaching lessons from Doyt Perry at Bowling Green — as a player and assistant coach; from Tom Harp at Cornell in 1962; from Glenn E. "Woody" Hayes at Ohio State 1969-70 before taking the job at Ball State — then an NCAA Division 11 school — in 1971.

Ball State became a member of the Mid-American Conference in 1973 and gained NCAA Division 1 status in football at the end of the 1974 season.

The Cardinals, in their first Mid-American Conference campaign in 1975, went 9-2 overall

champions on a 4-1 mark. The team allowed just 124 points in 11 games and ranked 8th nationally in that category.

In 1977 Ball State was 9-2 and placed third in the Mid-American Conference with a 5-1 record. The team scored 377 points in 11 games — 34.3 per game — and ranked 8th nationally in that category.

McClain's Ball State football teams had won 31 of their last 39 games dating back to mid-1974 when he accepted the challenge of Wisconsin.

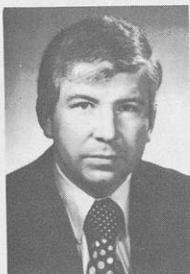
BILL DUDLEY, Quarterbacks and Receivers

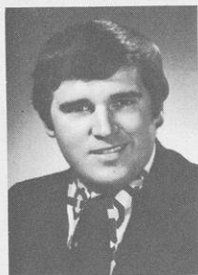

The Detroit, Michigan native lettered four years in football and twice in basketball at St. Agatha High School in the Motor City before graduating in 1962.

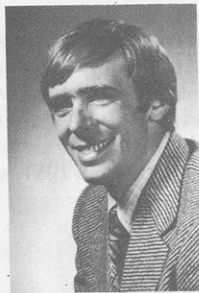

Doug and his wife, **Faye**, have two sons, **Joseph**, 3, and **Jerome**, 1.



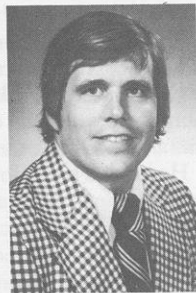

GEORGE CHRYST — ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

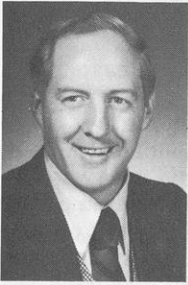

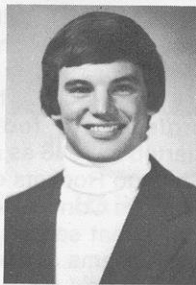

He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education in 1960 and his master's degree in Educational Administration in 1968, both from Wisconsin.

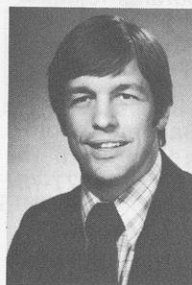

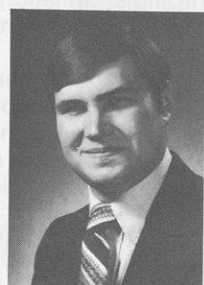

Elroy Hirsch

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy Hirsch is in his tenth year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

A study of Wisconsin's Big Ten participation in 15 sports for men and 12 for women listed the Badgers second overall in men's and fourth in women's competition for the 1977-78 school year.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969, and his original appointment as athletic director, slated to end in 1979, was extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984.

Professor **Frederick W. Haberman**, athletic board chairman, points out, **"Elroy richly merits our confidence. His dynamic personality has infused our entire operation with that indefinable quality we usually call spirit. He has heightened the total consciousness of the state and of our alumni throughout the country. He's taken the role of the leader."**

Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basketball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had an highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

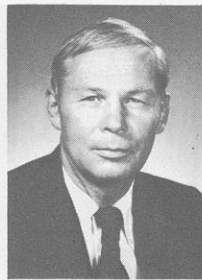

He started coaching at Morehouse College in Atlanta in 1961. He moved to Albany State College in 1963 for a six year stay — the last two as head coach.

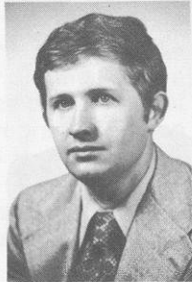

TWO BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end **Dave Schreiner** when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback **Allan J. Shafer** in 1944.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U. S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. Shafer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall Stadium, November 11, 1944.

CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 84 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime viewing seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the fifth largest college owned stadium in the United States — exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State and Tennessee.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.



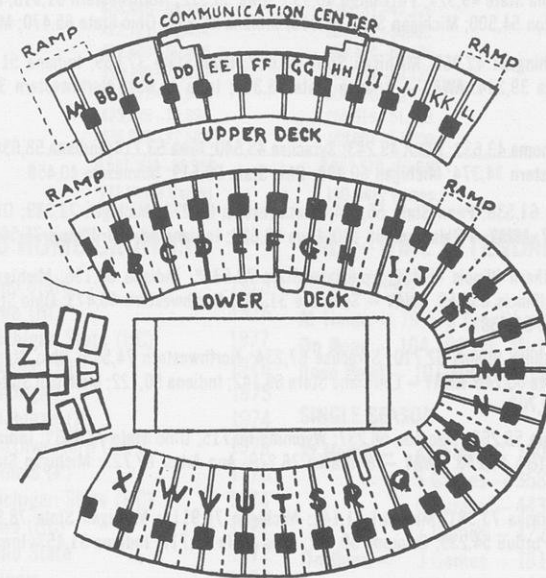

Second nationally in number of doctorates awarded in the past four decades.

Third in providing federal executives holding doctorates, in total gifts received by state universities, and in contributions from business and corporations.

Fifth in number of full-time students, and seventh among alma maters of presidents serving the nation's largest corporations.

Excellence results from the continued financial support provided by the citizens of Wisconsin, and from the University's dedication to providing maximum educational opportunities for all state citizens, the acquisition of new knowledge through research, and the application of knowledge to the improvement and use of society.

An immense variety of intellectual experiences awaits the students on the Madison campus. Here is a nuclear reactor, one of the finest textile collections in the country, a building in which nearly every conceivable environmental condition can be simulated, a 50 mev fixed-field alternating gradient Synchrotron, a collection of over 1,700 United Artists movies from 1919-1951, and full scale models of a mastodon and gypodon.

The faculty has created special earth-satellite cameras that reveal weather patterns on a scale never believed possible, is conducting experiments with moon-rock samples returned by the Apollo 15 crew, and still others are working in one of the nation's premier cancer research centers.

True, much praise has come from the University's research efforts, but basically, the campus is a place of scholarship. And next on the list is serving the people of Wisconsin and the nation.
