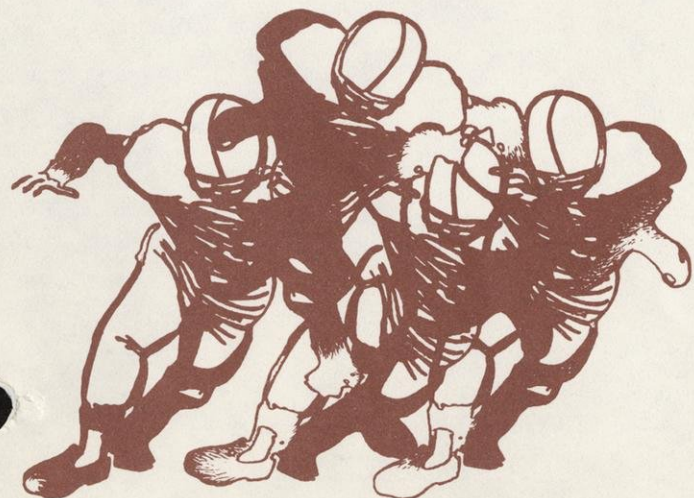
FOOTBALL IS THE THEME FOR FALL PROGRAMS AT UNION SOUTH

Union members who attend the Wisconsin home football games are all familiar with the Badger Bash -- a rousing post-game party at Union South. Starting after the game and running until 6 p.m., two bands will perform at Union South.

Roy B will bring his rollicking polka band back to the Snack Bar and Doc De Haven's dixieland group will return to the Carousel Cafeteria. Admission is free and a good time is always had by all.

This will be the second year that another follow-up program will be held after the football games -- "At the Coach's Table," will be held on Mondays during the lunch hour. From noon to 1:30 p.m. Coach Dave McClain will answer questions, show game films and review game strategies. The first program on Sept. 10 and the last on Nov. 12 will be held in Dag Hammarskjold Hall. All of the others are scheduled for the Union South Snack Bar.

While the building rocks with football activities, the Susan B. Anthony gallery will also take on a football theme. An exhibit of football woodcuts by Stan Kaplan will open on September 30 and run through Oct. 1. Brooklyn-born Kaplan has been an active artist and teacher for over twenty-five years, and has divided his efforts between carved wood plank murals and printmaking.



MUSIC, DRAMA, DANCE, FILM IN THEATER'S 1979-80 SPOTLIGHT

Music, music, music--and dance and drama and film--will share the spotlight as the 1979-80 season brings a stellar array of world-renowned performers to the Union Theater stage.

The fall brochure mailed to all Union members outlines all of the events scheduled for the Theater's 41st season, but we'd like to call your attention to some of the season's major events--and also remind you that Union membership benefits include preference in ordering tickets for all of the Theater's programs. For your convenience, a mail order blank is included in this Quarterly; the Theater's newsletter, *The 41st Season*, will provide information and order forms for other events throughout the season.

- Tickets are still available, in all price ranges, for the 60th annual Concert Series, distinguished as one of the few pure recital series presented on a university campus. This season's Red Concert Series will feature Paula Robison, flutist, and Kenneth Cooper, harpsichordist; Janina Fialkowska, pianist; the Cleveland Quartet; Henryk Szeryng, violinist; and the Beaux Arts Trio. Appearing on the White Series will be Nathaniel Rosen, cellist; Pinchas Zukerman, violinist; the Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio; Richard Stoltzman, clarinetist; and the Amadeus Quartet.
 - Great Performance Series A and B demonstrate the exciting diversity of the performing arts. Due to the cancellation of the New York City Opera Theater, slated to appear on both series, each series now includes four programs. The Dresden State Orchestra, Les Grands Ballets Canadiens and the Paul Taylor Dance Company will appear on each series, with the Toulouse Chamber Orchestra completing Series A and the Philip Jones Brass Ensemble concluding Series B.
 - Season ticket sales for the second annual drama series, Theater 79-80, have been so successful that only a limited number of tickets remained at publication time. If you miss the opportunity to purchase the series, watch the theater newsletter for information concerning single tickets specifically designated for individual performances.
 - There's a special benefit for season subscribers to the Red or White Concert Series, either Great Performance Series

or Theater 79-80. Purchase any of these season tickets and you're eligible to purchase advance tickets for the November 9 concert by violin virtuoso Isaac Stern and for "H.M.S. Pinafore," an April 12 performance featuring the Gilbert and Sullivan A La Carte Company and the Richmond Sinfonia.

- The Theater' Debut Concerts, designed to showcase the talents of young artists just beginning to achieve recognition, will feature Dancer Ze'Eva Cohen and Violinist Daniel Phillips, with additional artists to be announced.

FALL MINI COURSES INCLUDE WIDE RANGE OF SUBJECTS

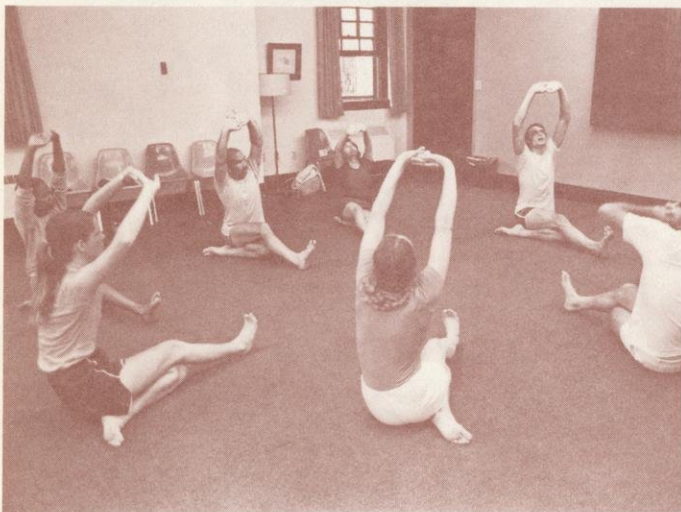
Many new courses will be among the list of offerings this fall in Wisconsin Union Mini Courses.

- Ireland: Chicago departure; Oct. 9-17, \$435.85
- Alpine Adventure: includes Munich, St. Moritz and Innsbruck. Oct. 15-30, Chicago departure, \$803.85
- Lisbon: Chicago departure, Oct. 30 -Nov. 7, \$447.35
- Morocco: Chicago departure, Nov. 19-27, \$458.85

HOOFERS SKI TRIP TO EUROPE ANNOUNCED

While the rest of the world is still enjoying the cool lake breezes while swimming and boating, the Hooper Ski Club is thinking "snow" and dreaming about the Alps.

The '79-80 European Ski Trip to Austria and Switzerland is scheduled for Dec. 29 through Jan. 13. The group will leave from Chicago via Swissair and will spend one week in Salzburg skiing and touring and one week in Switzerland skiing St. Moritz and Pontesstrina.

The package includes round-trip air transportation, 13 nights accommodations, 13 breakfasts, 7 dinners, parties (including a gala New Year's Eve party), and the tour bus for the group in Salzburg. Lift tickets are extra. Cross country skiing will also be available. The prices range from \$895 to \$1,035 depending on the type of accommodations you choose.
