RULES REGARDING FAILURES AND CONDITIONS

1. A failure can be made good only by taking the study again in class. This must be done as soon as the study is repeated in the University program, and studies in which a student has failed take precedence of all others in the arrangement of his course.

2. A condition must be made good by passing an examination which is regularly held at the end of the semester following that in which the condition was incurred. If the condition is not made up at this time it becomes a failure and the study must be repeated in class.

A special examination will be held on the first Saturday of the first semester for students conditioned in studies of the second semester, or the summer session, under the following conditions:

a. A conditioned student who desires such an examination must notify the teacher or department concerned, on the first Thursday of the semester, so that examination questions may be prepared. He must also notify the Registrar on or before the same day, so that arrangements may be made for the examination. Unless such notice is received, neither department nor Registrar will arrange for an examination.

b. The regular examination for students so conditioned will be held near the end of the first semester. Mr. Pyre Carries off the Honors

Mr. Turner Takes Second Place

On the last Wednesday of the winter term the preliminary contest to select our representative to the Western Oratorical League at Evanston was held at Library Hall. The contestants were J. F. A. Pyre, H. A. Adrian, J. H. Turner and P. S. Reinsch, and Mr. Pyre was awarded the choice by the judges with a percentage of 92½ on a scale of 100. Mr. Turner was second with 90½. The judges on thought and style were Mrs. W. F. Allen, Rev. George H. Ide and Judge Romanzo Bunn; on delivery, Mrs. J. G. McMynn, Hon. Burr W. Jones and Mr. John M. Olin. Interspersing the program were several musical numbers. A piano duet by Miss Constance Garlick and Miss Alice Bunting was exceedingly well executed. Mr. F. J. W. Miller sang Shelly's bass solo entitled "Love's Sorrow," and responded to an encore with "Pauline." Mr. F. D. Silber rendered Chopin's Polonaise in A in a creditable manner, and was heartily encored.

Mr. Pyre's subject was "Poetry and Freedom." He outlined the progress of mankind in its struggles for freedom; and deplored the ever increasing demand for realism for cold, hard facts. Science would assume dominion over all man's thoughts and endeavors. But while science gropes in dark closets, poetry walks in the wide parks and among our fellow men. The poet's song is part of nature itself, and each generation finds new revelations in its beauty.

Mr. Adrian had for his subject "Revelation and Interpretation." He dwelt upon the increasing beauties and appreciations of our spiritual conceptions. Our forefathers saw spiritual power in material things, but finally they began to appreciate God's guidance in the rule of the universe. Reason has sharpened the wonders of God and the destiny of man. But while new thoughts accompany new ages, the Bible's interpretations fit all ages.

Mr. Turner's oration was on the "Genesis of Liberty." He told of the constitutional struggles of the English people with King John, and how on the plains of Runnymede they assembled, and the barons of England formed a conspiracy against John, and compelled him, on the 15th of June, 1215, to

sign that famous bulwark of English liberty, the Magna Charta. Upon this as a foundation the whole of England's constitutional growth is based. Mr. Reinsch's subject was "More Light." One thought was ever present with Goethe, one prayer on his lips, when he had become the master-mind of Germany, the flower of humanity, his cry was ever for "More Light." This universe and all it contains is a mystery, and defies the vision. In our country democracy is working out the problems of human freedom. If it should fail, woe to the world! Our government can rest only on the intelligence of man.

S. A. T. C. OFFICER IS GUEST OF MURATS

LIEUT. SLOAN ENTERTAINED
LAST MAY BY PRESENT
HOSTS OF WILSON

BY ELIZABETH PRUETT

Modesty prevents Lieut. George A. Sloan adjutant of the university S. A. T. C., from admitting positively that, while the boche bombed Paris, he was tendered a birthday party, May 30, 1918, by the very Princess Murat who is now hostess to President Wilson at her Paris mansion. But there was no doubt of it in the minds of his fellow officers who listened to the story yesterday.

Princess Murat is a beautiful young American girl, formerly Miss Helen Stallo of Cincinnati, who married a French prince. When she first met the young American lieutenant in Nice, she invited him to her royal home in Paris, in true American style. And on last Memorial day, there was a real American party where today President Wilson is dining.

Here is the story, as Lieut. Sloan told it.

"There have been many stories in the newspapers lately regarding the Prince and Princess Murat with whom President Wilson is staying in Paris. In some papers I have noticed President Wilson will visit Prince and Princess Joachim Murat at 28 Rue de Monceau, while in others the names and pictures of Prince and Princess Michael Murat have been given with pictures of their mansion at 23 Avenue Henri Martin.

Entertained by Princess

"Come on, now, you know it is your friends, the Princess Murat," interrupted one of the officers. "What have we been hearing about Georgette and the rest of it? You know that's where the president is."

"Well, I know it, but I hate to come right out and say that I, a mere lieutenant, was entertained by the president's hostess."

"Where's the story?"

So Lieut. Sloan began again.

"I had the pleasure of meeting Princess Michael Murat and her mother-in-law, the Dowager Princess, last May, when on convalescent leave in Nice I was introduced by a friend, Garvni Thomas of Louiseville. He is a cousin of the princess and has made his home in southern France for 10 years.

"Princess Murat was Miss Helen Stallo of Cincinnati. During May, I attended many social functions with Thomas and the princess in the Riviera. There were few American officers in Nice at the time but there were several American families, which formed a sort of American colony.

"Mrs. Dulaney Hunter, wife of the American consul at Nice, was active in entertaining American officers on leave. In fact she and other Americans living along the coast started the American officers' club at Nice last spring. This club has been a great attraction to officers on leave.

Paris Delightful

"Princess Murat returned to Paris the latter part of May and promised a birthday party for me at her Paris home when I came thru May 30. Needless to say I arrived in Paris on the 30th. I had several days of leave left. They were spent in Paris. It was all too short. Paris is delightful!"

The storyteller caught his breath while the less fortunate officers who didn't get across heaved sighs of jealousy.

"I was greeted in Paris by Big Bertha. In fact I received a greater ovation than could possibly be given President Wilson, for big Bertha fired into the town every 20 minutes daily during the three days I was there.

"The church of the Madeleine was hit while I was in Paris. I was near at the time and went over to find the head of old St. Luke clipped off from his statue. He was the sole casualty.

"The birthday party at the home of Prince and Princess Murat turned out quite an event. It seemed everyone was a duke, dutchess, baron, baroness, princess or countess, with the excep-

KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA BARRED FROM TAKING PLEDGES; BROKE RULES

Strongly Organized Sorority Placed Under Membership Restriction Until Second Semester; Pan-Hellenic Notice Lists Two Infractions

A FUROR was caused in the Latin quarters late yesterday when official notice was received at every sorority house of a Pan-Hellenic ruling which bars Kappa Kappa Gamma from pledging any new members on account of violation of rushing rules.

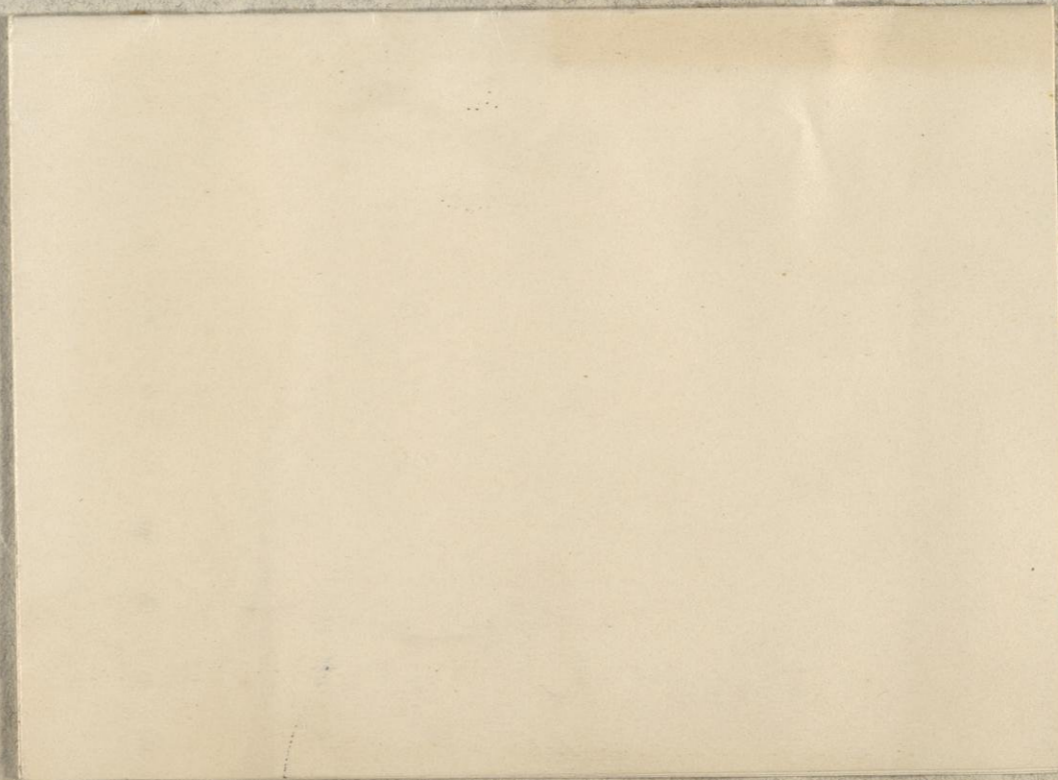
The Kappa house is one of the most pretentious residences in the Latin quarter and the sorority is regarded as one of the strongest of the Greek-letter organizations at the university.

The notice reads: "Pan-Hellenic announces that Kappa Kappa Gamma shall be unable to issue invitations of membership until second semester. This action is the result of breaking parts of rules 2 and 4."

The rules broken were explained as follows:

"Kappa Kappa Gamma failed to get their rushees home at the stipulated hour of 10 or 11. Kappa Kappa Gamma held a noon picnic and hired a pianist to furnish additional entertainment in the afternoon"—an infringement of the regulation forbidding more than one function each day during the rushing season.

New girls who were rushed by the sorority and wish to become members may wait until February to join. During this intervening time all other sororities have the privilege of entertaining and bidding the girls who hold off. A special meeting of Pan-Hellenic was called this morning for reconsideration of the action, but a vote of 15 to 1 sustained it.

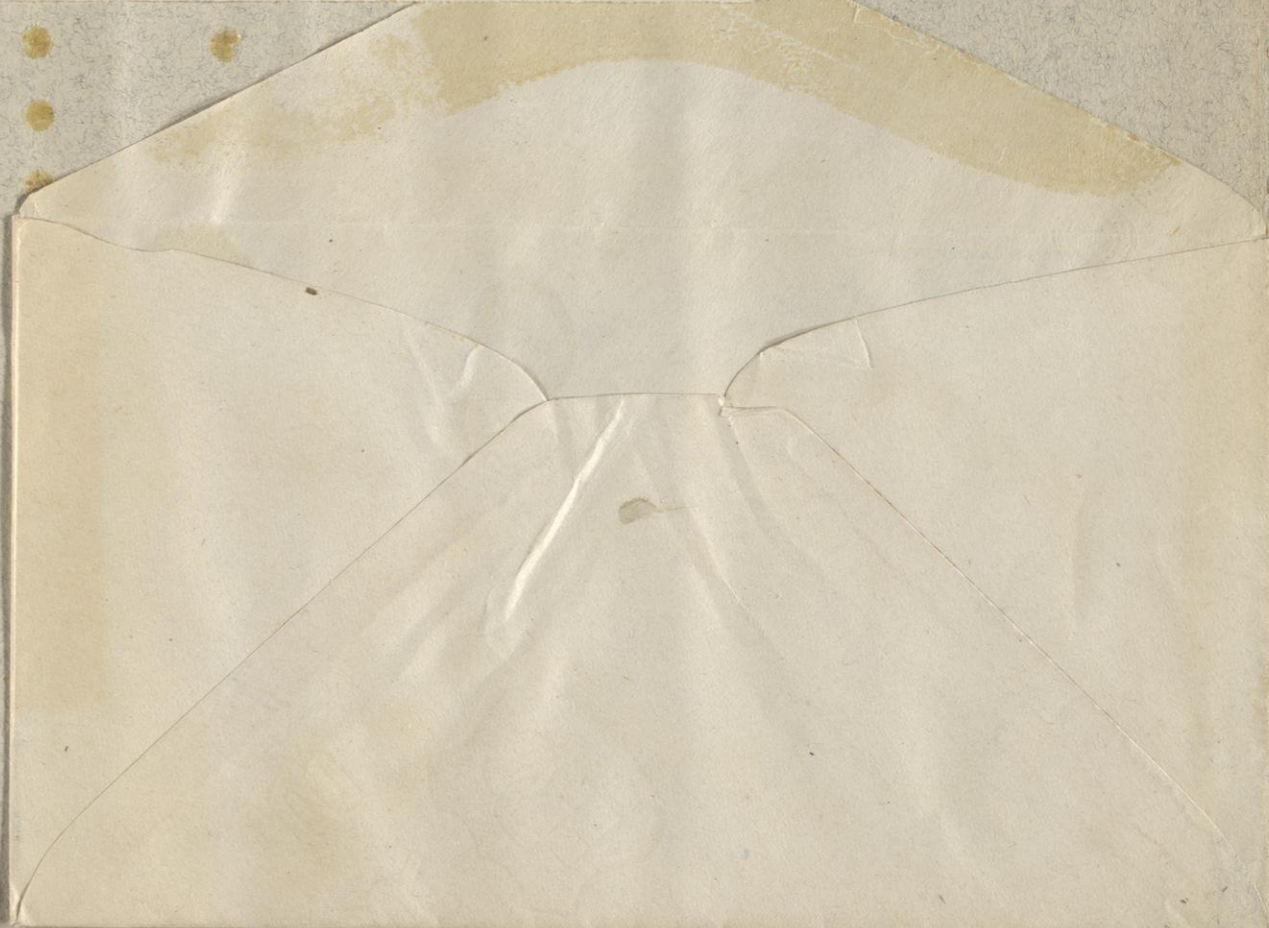
