The Business Manager reported that Mrs. Cape was offering her property on Orchard Street for the sum of \$8500, reserving the privilege of removing the house from the premises. It was VOTED, That if the proposal is received in proper form it be accepted, the amount to be charged to the balance of \$11,000 in 20.41(1)R for this purpose.

Upon recommendation of Director Halverson, authority was granted for the closing of Adams Hall for the summer session.

Upon recommendation of Director Halverson, it was VOTED, That students withdrawing from the university at the end of the first semester may be allowed to terminate their leases for the year.

Upon recommendation of Director Halverson, authority was granted for the closing of one section in one of the men's dormitories during the second semester of the current year, if necessary.

The matter of extension of time for the payment of room and board bills was discussed and also the matter of excusing students from living in the dormitories who have rooms leased there and who remain in the university. No action was taken.

Upon recommendation of the Secretary it was VOTED, That authority be granted to deposit with the Bondholders' Committee bonds to the amount of \$4000 of the Fuller & Johnson Mfg. Co. which were received from the Torger Thompson Estate, subject to further advice of the Attorney General.

The Secretary presented a communication from Kemper K. Knapp, of Chicago, together with a check for \$5000, representing an additional donation to the Kemper K. Knapp Loan Fund. It was VOTED, That the gift be accepted and that the Secretary be requested to express to Mr. Knapp the appreciation of the regents for this generous gift. (This makes the total donation for this fund from Mr. Knapp \$25,000.)

A communication was presented from the Ford Motor Company, of Dearborn, Michigan, presenting to the department of physics, for the museum, a cut-away motor. It was

VOTED, That the gift be accepted and that the Secretary advise the Ford Motor Company of the appreciation of the regents.
