

Badgers and Spartans Square Off in Matchup of Undefeateds

The Wisconsin football team (4-0, 1-0 Big Ten) takes on Michigan State (4-0) today at 2:30 p.m. The game will be televised by ABC with Brad Nessler. Bob Griese, Paul Maguire and Bonnie Bernstein on the call

UW is ranked ninth in both the Associated Press poll and the USA Today/Coaches' Poll. Michigan State entered the polls this week and is ranked 23rd in the Coaches' poll. The Spartans are receiving votes in the AP poll.

The Badgers are coming off a 17-13 win over Iowa in their Big Ten Conference opener. MSU defeated Notre Dame 31-14 and will be playing its first conference game of the season.

THE SERIES

This will be the 46th meeting between the two teams with Michigan State leading the series 26-19 ... the Spartans lead the all-time series 13-11 in Madison, but UW has won three of the last four at Camp Randall Stadium ... this will be the teams' first meeting since 2004 and MSU's first visit to Madison since a 56-21 Wisconsin victory on Nov. 15, 2003 ... UW wide receiver Lee Evans caught a school-record five touchdown passes in that game ... this will be just the second time in series history that both teams are ranked at the time of the game ... the only other time was on Oct. 23, 1999 in Madison when No. 16 UW defeated 11th-ranked MSU 40-14 ... the winning team has scored at least 40 points in each of the last four meetings



Key Notes to Consider

- Wisconsin's 13-game winning streak is the longest active winning streak in the country. It is the second-longest winning streak in school history, trailing only a 17-game stretch from 1900-02. It has been longer than one calendar year since the Badgers have lost.
- Wisconsin has more wins (35) than any other Big Ten school since the beginning of the 2004 season. Ohio State is second
- The Badgers have won 10 straight games (and 21 of the last 22) at Camp Randall Stadium, the sixth-longest home winning streak in school history. It is also tied for the seventh-longest current streak in the country. Wisconsin's last home loss came against Iowa on Nov. 12, 2005.
- Bret Bielema's 16-1 record as head coach of the Badgers is one of the best coaching starts in Big Ten history. Only three other coaches in conference history won at least 16 of their first 17 games. They are: Fielding Yost (Michigan), 55-0-1 from 1901-05; John B. Eckstrom (Ohio State), 16-0-1 from 1899-1900; and Carroll C. Widdoes (Ohio State), 16-1 from 1944-45. Each of these three coaches lost their next game after the records listed


General Notes

For the second time in three games UW overcame a fourthquarter deficit to win. The Badgers entered the fourth quarter trailing Iowa 10-7 but scored 10 points in the final frame for the 17-13 win. UW also came back to beat UNLV on Sept. 8 and has seven fourth-quarter comeback wins since the start of the 2004 season

The Badgers have won eight consecutive Big Ten Conference games, the longest streak in school history. The previous UW record was seven straight, set in 1999.

The Badgers have outscored their opponents 49-16 in the fourth quarter this season and have averaged a 3:11 advantage in time of possession in that quarter.

- Football fans in the state of Wisconsin have enjoyed a pretty good ride lately if they're cheering for the Badgers and the Packers. While UW owns the longest winning streak in major college football (13 games), the Green and Gold have won seven consecutive games, the longest active regular-season streak in the NFL. The last time either the Badgers or Packers lost was on Dec. 3, 2006 when the New York Jets defeated Green Bay 38-10.
- ♦ During its 10-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points seven times. The Badgers are averaging 31.9 points in those games, compared to 12.6 for their opponents.
- Wisconsin sold out its entire allotment of home game tickets prior to the start of the season for the third consecutive year. UW sold a total of 69,270 season tickets for the 2007 campaign. Camp Randall Stadium has played host to 28 straight sellouts. In fact, the Badgers have a drawn at least 70,000 fans to 91 consecutive home games (among those 91 games, 81 have been sellouts). The crowd of 82,630 vs. Iowa on Sept. 22 was the fifthlargest in school history.

Wisconsin has allowed just 26 points in the second half this season, an average of 6.5 points per game. UW is allowing an average of 112.8 yards in the second half this season, compared to 194.5 in the first.

♦ UW recorded four sacks vs. Iowa, its highest total since sacking Buffalo quarterbacks four times on Nov. 18, 2006. Freshman defensive back Aaron Henry recorded 2.5 sacks, the most by a Badger since Dontez Sanders had 2.5 at Hawaii on Nov. 25, 2005.

Offensive Notes

♦ Senior quarterback Tyler Donovan is 6-1 in his six career starts. In those gam's, Donovan is 92-of-148 (62.2 pere int) for 1,297 yards, 11 touchdowns and ust two interceptions. His passing efficiency for those six games is 157.60.

- Sophomore running back
 P.c. Hill has three consecutive
 100-yard rushing games,
 averaging 142.7 yards during
 that stretch. UW ran for 166
 y rds against the Hawkeyes,
 w th Hill accounting for 113.
- ♦ Hill became the 11th player in Wiscons in history to rush for 2,000 yards in a caleer. He passed the 2,000-yard mark in just his 17th career game. That is tied with Anthony Davis for the second-fastest to 2.000 yards in school history (Ron Dayne went over 2,000 yards in his 13th game). Hill currently has 2,081 yards, good for 10th on UW's career list.

♦ Wisconsin ranks fourth in the country in time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 33:52 over the first four games. UW held a 9:30 advantage over lowa last week, including a 7:18 advantage in the fourth quarter. The Badgers ran the ball on each of their final 23 plays from scrimmage against the Hawkeyes, with P.J. Hill carrying the ball on 17 of those plays.


- ♦ Tyler Donovan and Travis Beckum connected on a 3-yard touchdown pass with 43 seconds left in the first half against Iowa. That marked the 10th time in the last 13 games (and 12th time in the Bret Bielema era) that UW has scored points in the last two minutes of the first half.
- ♦ Wisconsin's offense converted 7-of-17 (.412) third downs against lowa, including 4-of-5 in the fourth quarter. The Hawkeyes entered the game allowing just a 26.5 percent third-down conversion rate. The Badgers have converted 50 percent of their third downs this season, tied for 15th in the country.

Defensive Notes

- ♦ UW allowed a seasonlow 59 yards rushing to lowa, including 15 rushes for zero yards in the first half. The Badgers have held two of their four opponents to less than 60 yards on the ground this season.
- ♦ The Badgers allowed lowa just 228 yards of total offense on Saturday, the lowest total for a UW opponent this season and 113.3 yards below Iowa's season
- ♦ Iowa converted just 2-of-16 third-down conversions against UW, with both



Bein ; a college football player and a student can sometimes be a really demanding j b. Between practices, classes, meetings, stud ing, community service, and social life, sometimes gets difficult juggling it all a once. Our busy schedules force us to develop some good time management skill to keep from falling behind in one

think that student-athletes deal with a much larger load, vet still find a way to manage to be some of the best students on campus ... or the worst. Chancellor John D. Wiley



hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Eviue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for Xray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86. he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.


I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.





arry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and secithout the additional title of head ond Il coach. Alvarez, who began his as athletic director in April of 2004, care as athletic director and football Serve in 2004-05 and in 2005-06. coac lvarez's first year as Director of Athle ics (without the football duties) was a me norable one as Wisconsin won four national titles (men's cross country, men's and omen's hockey and women's lightweig t rowing) during the 2005-06 athletic ampaign. The Badgers also won five conf rence titles.

he UW maintained its winning ways in 20 06-07 with the men's track and field tean winning its first NCAA title. The wom n's hockey team repeated as NCAA char pions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Thir een teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990–2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) on route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by Hispanic Business in October of 2001

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife Cindy are cocampaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Mideast Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Head Coach Bret Bielema

ne would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-youngest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work, organization and enthusiasm—all traits Bielema embodies—count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Biclema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its record-setting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Biclema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State. Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten). Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002–06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the lowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of lowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of lowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

lick's father, Al, is most commonly recognized as one of the NFL's most consiste it receivers. A three-time Pro Bowler, Toor had 507 receptions in 107 games in lise ght-year career with the New York Jets, before multiple concussions forced an early retirement.

Prior to being the No. 10 overall pick in th: 1985 draft, Toon played football and ran track at the University of Wisconsin from 1981-1984. That is where he met his vife, Jane, who is originally from 0cor omowoc, Wis.

Born in 1988, Nick (Nicholas) was only eight years old when his father retired.

According to Nick, growing up the son of a professional athlete is not much different than growing up in a so-called "normal" household. For him, life was ordinary because he did not know of anything else.

"I grew up in Madison," Nick said.
"Everybody thinks it'd be 'cool' to have a father who is a professional athlete, but for me, I don't know any different, so it just feels normal."

Because his father played for the Jets, the family moved back and forth from New York to Madison. During the season they lived on the east coast and moved back to Wisconsin during the off-season.

"I was really young, so I only remember a little bit, but I have three younger sisters and two of them weren't born until after he finished playing," Nick said. "My oldest sister was born pretty close to when he finished, so it wasn't as hard to do (move) because there weren't too many people in the family yet."

Today, Nick's family of five lives in Middleton, Wis., just outside of Madison. There he has three younger sisters, Kirby (16), Molly (15) and Sydney (12).

"My two oldest sisters play volleyball for Middleton and Wisconsin Power," Nick said. "They are both pretty good and are being recruited already, so hopefully volleyball will work out for them if that's what they decide to do. My youngest sister is still doing all the sports and is kind of into everything."

Growing up, Nick wasn't thrilled about having three sisters and no brother, but he thinks otherwise today.

"It's actually kind of cool now because it helped me understand how girls work to a certain degree. I guess it was a good experience."

After his father left the NFL world, Nick and his family began taking more family vacations. Nick said that his favorite family memories are from Disney World.

"We went to Disney World every year for Spring Break for awhile," Nick said. "That's probably my favorite family vacation growing up as a young kid. There is just something about Disney World-it's just a cool place."

Of course Nick went on all the rides, some of his favorites including the Tower of Terror and the Rockin' Roller Coaster.

Nick remembers that his youngest sister used to be scared of the Disney characters like Mickey and Minnie Mouse, that his father went on all the rides with him, excluding the spinning ones because his concussions wouldn't allow it, and that his mom even went on most of the rides.

The athletic family also took trips to Colorado in the winter to go skiing, snowboarding and to do other snow sports.

"Everyone in my family skies, except my dad does both and I snowboard," Nick said. "I started skiing when I was three, but liked snowboarding better."

Nick admits, though, that although he enjoys winter sports, he likes the warm weather better.

Today, his parents try to get to as many games as they can, but are busy with his sisters' volleyball games.

"I'm not playing right now, so I'm sure it's not as big of a deal," Nick said. "I know they'd try to get to all the games if I was playing, but it is kind of an important time for my sisters right now, so the support for my sisters is more important."

And because he lives so close, Nick tries to go home every couple of weeks. To get to his car, he drives his scooter 15 minutes and then it's a 15-minute drive home.


"It's about a half hour to get home," Nick said. "Not too bad. Better than a normal college student."






n 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the oftenimitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!


Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnnel," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds, Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.





Wisconsin Traditions



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.





Prior to his freshmen year of high school Carimi's family moved from the north side of Madison to Monona Grove, where he ended up playing for the Silver Eagles.

"We went to state my junior year and lost in the state championship game," Carimi said. "That's when I started getting looked at by the Badgers and I committed the summer of my senior year. It was my dream since I knew what a Badger was."

But Carimi didn't always play football. When he was in seventh grade he only played baseball until his coaches suggested he try out for the football team because of his size.

Johnson claims that even though the Lions were not a post-season contendor for the Vince Lombardi Trophy last year, 2007-08 is a new year.


"I don't know if they (the Lions) are as good now that he (Sanders) is not around, but they are still pretty much the best team in the NFL."





isconsin outside linebacker Jonathan Casillas was a highly-touted recruit that came to the Badgers from New Brunswick, N.J. As a senior in high school, Casillas earned first-team all-state honors in football along with being a standout basketball and track star.

However, it was Casillas' drive off the football field that made his journey to Madison such a unique and gratifying tale. While an athlete at New Brunswick High School, Casillas was able to be involved in an educational program targeted at high school football players called "Play It Smart."

Almost 10 years ago, New Brunswick High School was an economically disadvantaged urban school with low graduation rates. In 2000, however, that started to change. That is when the National Football Foundation's "Play It Smart" program was implemented into the school.

Created in 1998, "Play It Smart's" goal is to help student-athletes who come from disadvantaged environments where family and community support are often lacking. The program is designed to help students grow not only academically but also to help them gain a sense of self and community. "Play It Smart" participants graduate and go on to college at rates well above that of their peers.

In his first year in high school, Casillas didn't realize the power of "Play It Smart."

I really didn't know what it was," said Casillas. "I went into it my f eshman year and I really thought it was just a study hall with an a ademic coach."

That academic coach is highly trained and works with each stud nt-athlete throughout the entire year. "Play It Smart's" web site escribes the importance of this position, "At the heart of the prog am is the Play It Smart 'Academic Coach,' equal parts mentor, adve ate, counselor, teacher, coach and friend. The Academic Coach works with the student-athletes in ways that their head coach can't.

Casillas' academic coach, Laurie Lazovick, fulfilled all of these Lazovick has been working with "Play It Smart" for more than ars and has been at New Brunswick High School for nine years. She learly remembers what Jonathan was like as a freshman.

Jon was never a typical freshman. You could tell he was a star from day one," said Lazovick. "He was the epitome of a student-athle always came to study hall, even as a freshman. He always did ommunity service and over the years he developed his leadership skills and became a complete student-athlete.'

The "Play It Smart" program assisted Casillas immensely, helpm earn a GPA of 3.1 as well as an 1100 on his SATs, the highests ore on his football team. Due to his academic achievements off the feld and his incredible ability on the field, former Wisconsin head coac | Barry Alvarez offered Casillas a full football scholarship to UW. Casillas attributes much of his success at Wisconsin to the pro-"I found out over the years that it was probably one of the best prog ams I've ever been associated with," said Casillas. "It helped me with academics, time management and it got me involved in commu-

Community service is a major goal of "Play It Smart" and Casillas, with the support of his mom, was highly involved in that aspect of the program. Casillas would participate in every community service activity possible, about 50 hours a year, from reading to kindergartners to volunteering at a Special Olympics bowling event.


nity service.

He did everything," said Lazovick. "I honestly think he did every event at least once. Reading to the kindergartners definitely sticks out to me and he was so good with them."

He was so good with the kindergartners in fact, that the class asked him to speak at their kindergarten graduation. At the end of his senior year, Jon went to kindergarten graduation and spoke to the kids, first having them sing the ABCs and count from one to 10 and then telling them to make sure that they go home and read over

"I swear it was one of the cutest things I've seen in my entire life," recalls Lazovick.

He was so fantastic in fact, that ever since then, the kindergartners have asked one of the "Play It Smart" students to speak at their graduation every year.



Casillas is one of many student-athletes who have gained so much from "Play It Smart" including current Badgers Niles Brinkley, Kyle Jefferson, Daven Jones and Otis Merrill.

"It's definitely a great program and it has bettered me as a student," said Casillas. "We had a lot of guys from my high school involved, like Dwayne Jarrett from USC, who graduated last year and is on the NFL's Carolina Panthers now."

One of Jon's greatest achievements while with "Play It Smart," was his commitment to the Special Olympics athletes during a bowling event his senior year. Casillas, who had already signed with Wisconsin and was finished with his "Play It Smart" obligations, was still ready at 7 a.m. to help the Special Olympics athletes. To accommodate the athletes in wheelchairs, Jonathan would wheel them up to the front of the lane and help them roll the bowling ball down a metal ramp.

"It was an unbelievable thing to watch," remembers Lazovick. "Our guys would not only help them bowl but also serve as cheerleaders. Jon and his friends were the loudest and the most compas-

At the end of the day, with most of the lanes finishing up and the volunteers handing out awards and putting medals around the athlete's necks, you could still hear Jon cheering on his athletes from the other side of the bowling alley.

"Instead of getting frustrated and walking away or just sitting there and getting quiet they went the opposite way and they were hugging the athletes and high-fiving them and cheering them on," said Lazovick.

Jon and his teammates were so supportive that a small crowd gathered to watch Jon finish bowling with his athletes for the day.

Jonathan has gained so much from his experiences with "Play It Smart" that he would like to get involved in the program again when his playing days are over.

There are a lot of schools like New Brunswick and if I can go back and lend a hand that would be great," said Casillas. "I'd love to help because it has helped me get to the place where I'm at now."

"Coach Lazovick," as she's referred to, speaks to Jonathan constantly, and was touched to hear that he wants to be involved in the program again at some point in his life.

"I'm not surprised that he wants to help out and work with 'Play It Smart' but I am completely moved," said Lazovick who even flew out to Madison to see Jon play against Washington State this season. "I don't know if he realizes the impact he continues to have on the football program, in the high school and in the community in general. He has become a true role model, he's that special. He is 'Play It Smart' and he's going to go on and make us proud forever."





Chambers Starts Season Hot

Mis ni wide receiver Chris Chambers rec rded his second straight 100-yard rec iving day by catching six passes for 101 yards in the Dolphins' 31-28 loss at the New York Jet. Five of his receptions we t for first downs.

It is the first time that a Dolphin has recorded consecutive 100-yard receiving performances since Chambers did it three straight times, in Weeks 12-14 of 2005.

Through the first three games of the season, the seventh-year NFL veteran has recorded 21 catches for 302 yards. This puts him on pace to shatter personal records posted during his career-best 2005 season when he racked up 82 catches for 1,182 yards en route to a Pro Bowl

Chambers has developed a quick rapport with new Dolphins' quarterback Trent Green, who Miami acquired in an offseason trade with Kansas City to address its quarterback needs.

Chambers has far and way been the 14thyear veteran and former Pro Bowler's favorite target, accounting for 21 of

Green's 70 completions and 301 of his 824 yards passing.

While Miami's quarterback situation has fluctuated over the years, including using three different starters last season, Chambers has been a constant presence for the Dolphins. The Cleveland, Ohio. native has never caught less than 48 passes in a season or had fewer than 677 yards receiving in a season and has only missed two games over the course of his

Daniels Fills Void

After starting the season 2-0 for the first time in franchise history, the Houston Texans headed into a important early-season contest with division rival and defending Super Bowl champion Indianapolis.

The problem was that they were going to be without Pro Bowl wide receiver Andre Johnson, who had accounted for nearly 58 percent of the team's receiving yards through the first two games of the season.

However, just as he did at Wisconsin, tight end Owen Daniels stepped up his game when called on, catching a teamhigh seven passes for 56 yards and providing quarterback Matt Schaub a muchneeded safety valve against the Colts' fifth-ranked defense.


"I think we all can play and that showed today, guys making plays when called upon," Texans' wide receiver Kevin Walter told HoustonTexans.com following the

Ultimately, it was not enough as the Colts hung on for a 30-24 win.

The Texans were forced to throw early and often after losing starting running back Ahman Green to injury in the first quarter. Houston's running game was further limited due to the absence of backup Ron Davne, who missed the game with a chest

Microbial Sciences Building designed for discovery, collaboration

As the doors swung open at the new Microbial Sciences Building, students and researchers found a facility designed to spark exchanges of ideas aimed at answering biological questions of unprecedented complexity and importance.

The 330,000-square-foot facility - the campus's largest academic building — combines facilities for innovative instruction, "neighborhoods" of worldclass research laboratories to stimulate collaboration and features that recognize the lifestyles and shared needs of researchers.

The building is part of the BioStar program rolled out by the state in the late 1990s to ensure Wisconsin maintained its pre-eminent place in biology and technolgy. It features state-of-the-art classrooms and the 450-seat Ebling Symposium Center, which is cable of hosting national and international conferences and workshops on the microbial sciences.

It also has specialized instructional laboratories, including the Kikkoman Fermentations Laboratory, where students will learn the technology of largescale production of microorganisms — an essential process in the biotechnology industry, especially in the production of pharmaceuticals, antibiotics and

One part of the laboratory will be a small-scale pilot brewery donated by the Miller Brewing Co.

The building's research labs are organized in "neighborhoods" of research suites that promote ideasharing and interaction among faculty and stu-

Major grant advances UW's clinical. translational research enterprise

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) has awarded UW-Madison's new Institute for Clinical and Translational Research (ICTR) one of the largest grants in the history of the School of Medicine and Public Health, making the university a key player in an ambitious NIH plan to transform the country's clinical and translational research enterprise.

The primary goal of the plan is to find ways to do a better job of moving biomedical and health sciences discoveries into practical use in health care providers' offices, clinics and hospitals, where the new knowledge can be used most rapidly and effectively to improve people's health.

With \$41 million over five years, ICTR will aggressively address clinical and translational research in Wisconsin by first building a network of key partners from across campus and around the state. With an infrastructure in place, the institute will expand training programs and coordinate an array of resources and services for both new and established investigators. Input from public health departments and community health offices throughout the state will be essential to ensure that research is relevant and reaches people and areas with the great-

Hybrid buses come to campus

Two of Wisconsin's first hybrid electricpowered buses will be in service on cam-

The university and Metro Transit worked together to bring five GM-Allison hybrid buses to Madison. The university paid \$200,000, the local share of the cost for its buses. The new buses are expected to reduce fuel consumption and emissions, provide smoother acceleration and improve braking, and they may even be quieter.

The buses have a new seating arrangement that will provide more standing room and make it easier for passengers to move through the aisle. There are more aisle-facing seats, and the rear doors are wider than those on the current buses. They'll also feature a UW paint scheme and Badger red seats.

Bowling with the Badgers ...

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!



ver the last 14 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' nine bowl victories over that spanties them with Boston College for the most in the nation. UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14, to capture its second straight Capital One Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida. Arizona and Texas.

This second-quarter touchdown catch by tight end Travis Beckum gave Wisconsin a 17-7 lead over Arkansas in last year's Capital One Bowl. The Badgers went on to win the game 17-14, their second consecutive Capital One Bowl victory.



very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In 2006, many UW individuals were recognized for their contributions to the school-record 12 wins. Chief among those players was offensive tackle Joe Thomas. Thomas was a consensus first-team All-American and became the first UW player to win the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top lineman.

Two returnees, junior tight end Travis Beckum and sophomore running back P.J. Hill also garnered national recognition last year. Hill was named national Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com and also earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Beckum, in his first season as a tight end, was a second team All-American and John Mackey Award semifi-

In his first year at the helm, UW head coach Bret Bielema was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Bear Bryant national Coach of the Year Award.

The most decorated former Badger is running back Ron

Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.





These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He was also a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.



Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.





Alan Ameche (elected in 1975) was the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner and a multi-year All-American in the classroom and on the field.








Wisc Insin soccer player Erica Handelman scored three goals vs. India a on Oct. 2, 1993, a record that still stands.

SEPTEMBER 29 - OCTOBER 6

Set t. 29, 1962 — The football team set the school record for most points scored in a game with a 69-13 vin over New Mexico State.

Sept. 30, 1981 — The men's soccer team recorded its largest margin of victory, and tied the record for most goals in a game, with a 10-0 win over UW-Whitewater.

Oct. 1, 1977 — Steve Veith of the UW football team tied the game record for most field goals attempted with six against Northwestern. The Badgers beat the Wildcats, 19-7.

Oct. 2, 1993 — Erica Handelman of the women's soccer team tied the individual record for most goals scored in a game with three against Indiana.

Oct. 3, 1970 — Larry Mialik set the receiving record for average per reception in a single game (min. three rec.) with an average of 47.3 yards as the Badgers beat No. 16 Penn State, 29-16.

Oct. 4, 1981 — Mark LaPorte of the men's soccer team set the school record for most saves in a game with 17 against St. Louis.

Oct. 5, 1974 — The Badger football team set the team record for most rushing touchdowns in a game with seven as they beat Missouri, 59-20.

Oct. 5, 1986 — Julie Angevine set the UW women's soccer single-game record with seven points against Macalester. Angevine scored three goals and added an assist in the win.

Oct. 6. 1899 — Pat O'Dea set the record for most field goals made in a game during the pre-modern era with four as the Badgers beat Beloit, 36-0.







Otis Wiley, a junior free safety from Flint, Mich., is in his second year as a starter in the Michigan State secondary. Wiley was ranked as the nation's fifth-best safety by *Phil Steele's College Football Preview* magarine. Through three games this season, Wiley has two interceptions, 12 tackles and a pass breakup.




Mark Dantonio returns to Michigan State after serving as an assistant there from 1995-2000. Dantonio, the Spartans' 24th head coach, spent the previous three seasons as the head coach at Cincinnati, After MSU's first three games of the 2007 season, the Spartans were 3-0 and had outscored their opponents 100-48.







- The MSU football team has won six national championships and six Big Ten titles.
- East Lansing, the home of MSU, and Lansing, Mich., the state's capital, form an urban area with a population of roughly 300,000.
- Michigan State currently has one of the three largest undergraduate study abroad programs in the nation with 2,787 students studying abroad last year.
- Wisconsin and Michigan State are partnering together to establish the \$125 million Great Lakes Bioenergy Research Center, one of three in the nation. The research is aimed at finding new ways of converting natural materials to energy.



Spartan Stadium is in its 84th season as the home of the Michigan State football team. A \$64 million expansion project prior to the 2005 season added nearly 3,000 seats, including 24 suites and a 193-seat press box. The current capacity of Spartan Stadium is 75,005. In 2005, the natural grass surface earned Field of the Year honors from the Sports Turf Managers Association.

Behind the Scenes With ...



DIRECTOR OF **VIDEO SERVICES ROB PORTEUS**

Rob Porteus joined the Wisconsin Department of Athletics in 2004 after serving the previous four seasons as the video director for the NFL's Washington Redskins. At UW, Porteus manages the entire video operation for the

Badgers' 23-sport intercollegiate program and oversees a staff of six assistant directors and numerous students. His main sport responsibility is football, but he also has oversight duties for the video needs of all UW sports.

How late were you guys in the office following the lowa game?

We try to get out 3 hours after the end of the game.

In a nutshell, what are your postgame duties?

We put together intercuts (sideline view followed by the end zone view) for all of the coaches immediately after the game. We share the offense, defense and kicks out to the coaches' computers and also post it on a secured web site for other Big Ten teams to download. We also digitize the highlights of the network copy, two ground cameras and the scoreboard to be used in web highlights, "hit tapes," scoreboard highlights and end-of-the-year review tapes.

How big is your staff and how are those postgame duties divided?

David Blaker, Joe Yang, and Adam Wamsley handle all the football coaches' requests and have seven students assisting them. Thad Jackson, along with four students, oversees the student shooters on the field, the streaming of the post-game press conference, and digitizing footage after the game. Steve Ackermann oversees all of the content and operation of the scoreboard with a staff of his own of 10-15 people.

What is the "Hit Tape?"

The "Hit Tape" is the weekly motivational tape made only for the football players and coaches. At home and away games, it is played at the hotel right before the players get on the bus.

Do the coaches give you any input week-toweek on that?

Surprisingly no, although Coach Hank (defensive coordinator Mike Hankwitz) gave me a few good ideas last year. Sometimes I will be a little nervous when I show it to Coach B (head coach Bret Bielema) on Thursdays. I call the "Hit Tape" the player's caffeine before a game - hopefully it gets them jazzed up a little, but it isn't going to determine the outcome of the game.



Rob Porteus and his video services staff shoot practice and game footage for the coaches as well as produce video packages for the players, uwbadgers.com and end of the year highlight tapes.

What are some of the best clips you've spliced into a "Hit Tape?"

Mob movies, action, westerns, national geographic specials - no Comedy (Coach Alvarez and Coach B both turned those down). I try to keep it different and fresh from week to week.

Any memorable "Hit Tapes" that stand out?

Not any specific one, but for some reason Jack Nicholson always seems to fire them up.

How did you get started into video services? Watch a lot of movies as a kid?

I went to UW-Platteville and started as an intern with the Chicago Bears, I watched a fair share of movies as a kid.

What was the first thing you ever taped with your own camera?

I remember playing with my Godfather's camera as a kid - I can't remember what I shot, but it probably was out-of-focus.

What has been your weirdest assignment over the years?

Being ordered to shoot Jackson De-Ville (Jaguars' mascot) at halftime with the Redskins because he was mocking our players

What's the biggest difference between the NFL and college?

The parking lot - college players drive mopeds and tandem bikes (Paul Standring) while NFL players drive Hummers and Mercedes

A Great Time to Be a Badger!

n 2006–07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year.


Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.

he Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mis-

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8.400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- · are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- · have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- · house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

· Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the

Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates-the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR). which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows: original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.




- · The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey. Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country. field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball. synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.
- · Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued wi the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Sha was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafe is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

co-signing a loan;

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost ser-

ices;
b) providing a loan, or arranging for or

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

 h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

• The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletic ability:

 The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and

 The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 

Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items. cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items





Bert DeHate was honored by the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department this past August as a member of the 2007 Hall of Fame Class.

DeHate joined the UW hockey team in 1966. In the 1967–68 season, DeHate became the first Badger to win the national scoring title with 47 goals and 30 assists. The 47 goals ranks him 2nd in the all-time UW single season scoring history standings. In his sophomore season, he also set a Badger record for goals in a single game (5) and points in a single game (8).

In 1968, DeHate was named team co-captain. For his career, DeHate recorded a record 15 hat tricks for Bucky. DeHate ranks second all time (behind Mark Johnson) for career goals with 108 in 95 games.

Following his Badger career, DeHate went on to play in the EHL for the Greensboro Generals and in the IHL for the Toledo Hornets.

DeHate currently resides in Atlantic Beach, Florida.



There are hundreds of UW Athletic artment employees that work all k and long hours on Saturdays ake Badger football games the nts they have become.

This week we profile the food and beverage department.

Then Tim Taggart, the Food and Beverage Director for the UW Athletic Department, comes to work on football game days, he arrives well efore the sun rises. For an 11 a.m. kicke f, Taggart is at Camp Randall by

e meets with Executive Chef Herb rt Hackworthy and begins to comlete his pre-game to-do list.

My pre-game duties are to make ure hat all of our other operations are oing well; make sure my catering, elevaor service group and suite services are akin care of their areas and that things reg tting ready to go," said Taggart. "I elp vith any problem solving that comes up b fore games, as small problems usu-

During the game, Taggart continues to check in with club seat holders, the west side press box and the Wisconsin

If there are extra people that come to own like ABC or ESPN Gameday, those rews need a little more effort, as they ask for more meals, and so I help out with those," said Taggart.

There are about 150 people who work during football games to serve various

"Of the 150 workers, 90 percent of them are UW students, which is nice," said Taggart. "When August 1st rolls around, I have 14 cooks, 20 student workers and 12 other administrative staff who work for me everyday.

On an average football gameday, Taggart and his staff will feed 8,000 people in meal-type situations - a figure

that does not count people served at the concession stands.

These meals are served at the hospitality tent, pre-game tailgates, those in the suite or club seats, members of the media, my staff, the field officials and the chain crew," explained Taggart.

On a football Saturday, Taggart doesn't leave the stadium until about 5 or 6 p.m., approximately two to three hours after the game. He ends his day by looking over any notes he made and reviewing how everything went. "It makes for a long day, but I think the most rewarding part of my job is seeing that everything went

An interesting change that Taggart witnessed over the years was how, in other football stadiums or athletic venues. fans in suites were able to order food individually.

"When we saw the plans for the Camp Randall Stadium renovations, we knew that (ordering food individually) wouldn't be possible. The corridors outside the suites are not quite 6 feet wide which would make delivering food during game is impossible. The bathrooms are also located in the hallway, causing congestion."

To combat this issue, Taggart and his crew created a different menu for each game, giving each suite a menu.

"At first, we weren't sure what the reaction would be, but it was accepted by the suite administrators," said Taggart.

"Once we saw the kind of food we were preparing, and the system of delivery, it worked out really well.

"For the Varsity Club seats, there is in-seat service, where we take food orders and prepare them in a small kitchen and then deliver them to the customer," said Taggart. "The Buckingham Club is unique because as a part of their season package, food is included. We have buffet lines so the customer can get food when they want and have as much as they want. We started doing this three years ago, and other professional stadiums have adopted that idea. It was fun to come up with an idea and see it go to other venues around the country."


The next time you're anxiously awaiting for your food at a restaurant, try to think about how Tim Taggart and his crew are able to feed more than 8,000 people on football gamedays.

Did you know that during a typical football season, Badger fans consume:

- 14 tons of hot dogs and brats (about 2 tons/game)
- · Depending of the weather, up to 4 1/2 semi loads of bottled water
- Depending on the weather, up to 57,000 gallons of beverages
- 2,400 pounds of popcorn seed
- 2.1 miles of red rope licorice



Final Thoughts



Each week, Justin Doherty, UW's assistant athletic director for communications, will offer a look at the Badger football program. In his position, Doherty has unique access to the coaches and players and a good understanding of their experiences. This week he provides a look at preparing for a televised game.

The first Badger football game ever televised live, according to our records, was a 14-10 loss to Illinois in Champaign on Oct. 6, 1951. NBC carried that contest.

Over the next 38 years, through the 1989 season, the Badger football team made 39 more television appearances on NBC, ABC, CBS and Turner. During that time, it was rare if the Badgers were on TV more than once or twice in a season. And sometimes they weren't on at all (we don't have a record of the Badgers being on national or regional television from 1975-80). Those days are obviously over.

Today's game against Michigan State will mark the 159th time since 1990 that a Wisconsin football game will have been televised live. That's an average of nearly nine televised games per season. The technology and communications explosion of the past couple decades has made college football available on a wide variety of electronic media.

Fans of Big Ten football are very fortunate because our conference not only has its own television network, but it also has an agreement with ABC/ESPN that provides for additional national exposure. Today's game, for example is on ABC to a certain segment of the country and on ESPN in parts of the nation where it is not being carried on ABC. In other words, it's truly national TV.


You might be interested in what happens when the large networks come to town. Early in the week, we work with producers and talent to set up interviews with our student-athletes, arrange a walk-through at the stadium and discuss the pre-game timing.

This week, ABC's crew arrived in Madison on Thursday for a 1 p.m. walk-through. It's usually about 10 people from ABC and from our communications, game management and facilities staffs that get together in Camp Randall to discuss camera locations and a variety of other logistical issues. Last week, in addition to the Sky-Cam and the Outback Steakhouse blimp, ABC had 18 cameras here. The size of their crew required 110 game credentials. (Incidentally, our office distributed 407 media credentials for last week's game with lowa. I'm not sure what our record is, but that's in the ballpark).

The talent usually interviews a couple of our players on camera on Thursday afternoons. We often set these up in a meeting room in the Fetzer Center. By Friday, preparations are in full swing. The ABC talent meets with our offensive and defensive coordinators, along with Coach Bielema, on Friday afternoons. Oftentimes, the networks may ask us for seat locations of players' families or if there are any well-known alums they could interview or put on camera.

By the time Saturday rolls around, things are pretty much in place and it's time to let the game itself tell the story.


