

Crowd of 10,935 breaks records

Every attendance record known to women's college volleyball fell Friday when 10,935 fans watched the University of

Wisconsin sweep Illinois at the UW Field House in a National Collegiate Athletic Association first-round tournament match.

"That was crazy," UW Coach Steve Lowe said. "It was so much fun."

Get out the erasers. These marks must be

changed–NCAA all-time record of 10,645; NCAA tournament mark of 9,107; NCAA first-round record of 4,969; and the UW mark of 4,335.

"Knowing there's that many people supporting us just makes us want to go out and play harder to show how much we appreciated the support," UW middle blocker Arlisa Hagan said.



The Coach-A Tribute

"I want people to really believe that good things can come out of adversity."

> Steven K. Lowe April 26, 1956 -August 22, 1991

Steve Lowe brought Wisconsin volleyball into national prominence in his five years as head coach.

The family and friends of Steve felt the quotation above, appearing in a news article prior to his death, best depicted Steve's positive outlook, and would be the message he would send to those who mourn his passing.

The Badger coach, 35, was hospitalized suddenly July 27, 1991, and died August 22 of complications resulting from lung cancer. Although Steve was never able to be on the court with his players during his four-week illness, he did review practice video tapes and communicated daily with his staff and players.

His hand-picked team of assistant coaches will continue his teaching this season, with first assistant Margie Fitzpatrick assuming the head coaching role for the year. A national search for Steve's successor will begin at the conclusion of the season.

In his sad and untimely death, Steve leaves behind a legacy of personal integrity and deep faith. He had a zest for life that was irrepressible, and had a great love for his family, friends and team. He had a highly competitive spirit, but a gentle, loving manner, always preferring positive encouragement rather than negative forms of motivation. He was deeply loved, and will never be forgotten.



1991 Badger Volleyball Team

Steve Lowe capped off his fifth season at Wisconsin with the UW's first Big Ten Volleyball title. Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record at Wisconsin, earned Big Ten and Mideast Coach of the Year honors in 1990.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In addition to steering

Wisconsin to its first Big Ten title, he guided the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final NCAA poll. Lowe also helped the UW produce its first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second team honors last year.

He provided the program with a boost in 1989, directing the Badgers to the title of the inaugural Women's Invitational Championship (WIVC) in their first post-season tournament appearance.


A native of Iowa City, Iowa, Steve was the assistant coach at the University of the Pacific from 1983 until his appointment at Wisconsin in 1986. Steve aided the Tigers in winning the 1985 NCAA Division I Championship title. UOP claimed the 1986 NCAA championship title as well. The Tigers also made it to the NCAA Championship semi-finals two

other years placing third in 1984 and fourth in 1983.

In addition to his coaching duties, Steve worked as a technical consultant in sports psychology with the United States National Women's Volleyball team, and traveled on domestic and international tours with the team. Teaching techniques in goal-setting, concentration and motivation, Steve developed individual mental preparation programs for each national team player. He also worked as a mental preparation consultant with university and high school athletes.

Steve was a 1978 psychology graduate of the University of Iowa. He received his master's degree in applied behavior analysis with a specialization in athletics from the University of the Pacific in 1981. He served as a lecturer in psychology of coaching and volleyball at UOP two years.

1991-1992 Coaches



Head Coach–Margie Fitzpatrick

Margie (Kaminski) Fitzpatrick has assumed the role of head coach due to the death of Steve Lowe.

The former UW volleyball player realized a championship dream last season when, as a first-year assistant coach, the Badgers' won the 1990 Big Ten title.

A 1989 graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in recreation resource management, Margie was Wisconsin's most valuable player in 1986 and 1987. She served as captain of the 1987 team and is a three-time all-Big Ten honorable mention selection.

She is currently the UW record holder in service aces and is partially responsible for the Badgers' aggressive style of serving. A former outside hitter, Margie ranks among the top-10 in every hitting and blocking career category at Wisconsin.

A native of South Bend, Ind., Margie was a member of the St. Joseph's Academy varsity team four years, and the South Bend Junior Olympic volleyball team from 1981-84. She played on the AAU Junior Olympic gold medal team in 1982, and received the Indiana President's Award for volleyball in 1983. Her teams won the Indiana State White River Games Championships in 1987 and 1988.

Her coaching resume includes experience at the USVBA in West Allis, Wis. and Sports Camp International in Grand Rapids, Mich. In addition, Margie worked with the Badger volleyball camp for four years while a student-athlete at Wisconsin.

Prior to becoming an UW assistant coach, she worked as a recreation therapist for Warren Barr Pavilion in Chicago.



Assistant Coach-Liz Hert

Former University of the Pacific all-American setter, Liz Hert, begins her first year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. Liz was an assistant coach at Gonzaga University in 1989, and spent last year playing professionally for the Lyon-Franchville Club of the French professional league. She served as the starting setter for the team that advanced to the semi-finals of the 1990 French Cup. In addition, Hert played in the U.S. Professional League as the starting setter for the Portland Spikers.

While Liz was an assistant at Gonzaga, the Zags finished second in the West Coast Conference and advanced to the 1989 Women's Invitational Volleyball Championship.

Liz was a first team all-American at UOP in 1987, and was the starting setter for the 1985 and 1986 NCAA Championship teams. She was named to the NCAA all-tournament team in 1986. Liz served as captain for the Tigers in 1986 and 1987. She is the UOP career assist leader with 4,386 assists. She graduated from the UOP with a journalism degree in 1988, and is pursuing her masters degree in that field at the University of Wisconsin.



Graduate Assistant Coach-Andrea Redick

Andrea is in her second season with the Badgers as a graduate assistant. She is a 1989 graduate of the University of the Pacific with a degree in communications and public relations, and is pursuing a masters degree in education administration from the University of Wisconsin.

Andrea was a four-year member of the UOP volleyball team and served as captain of the 1989 squad. She was part of the NCAA

Championship team when Steve Lowe was an assistant coach at UOP in 1985, and was a member of the Tiger team that won the national title again in 1986. Andrea finished her college career with 628 digs. She earned most dedicated player honors her senior year.

1991 Badger Preview

ast season was a dream come true for the Badgers, winning the school's first Big Ten title and setting a national attendance record of 10,935 in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

The outlook for this season, suggests that they may be able to keep enjoying the dream. "When I came here, I had a few dreams and last year some of those were fulfilled," Head Coach Steve Lowe said. "But, I'm very goal-oriented. We'll keep on dreaming and work hard at

achieving them."

The Badgers are well aware that the 1990 season is in the Wisconsin record books as the finest in the history of the program. The UW made a name for itself at every level - replacing school marks, garnering Big Ten Conference and national honors. The Badgers peaked at ninth in the NCAA poll and gained entry into their first NCAA Championship. The NCAA record crowd of 10,935 that witnessed the Badger victory over Illinois in the first round of the NCAA tournament is recognized as one of the most memorable sports experiences in the history of

The 1991 Badgers would be hardpressed to duplicate the exalted accomplishments of 1990, but that is not the mission of this Wisconsin team. "Last season was a promise of more good things to come," Lowe said. "I believe winning begets winning, and in many ways the success of last season is our biggest

incentive this year."

With the addition of Penn State, a volleyball power in its own right, the Big Ten Conference race becomes even tougher. Last season, five Big Ten teams, including Penn State made the NCAA tournament. Penn State defeated Wisconsin in the first match of the NCAA Mideast Regional before losing to Nebraska in the regional final.

"The big question is can we win the Big Ten again," Lowe said. "I answer that by saying we're going to be very competitive. To win the Big Ten, everything has to fall into place and you need some positive, unexpected surprises to help you. With the talent in this league, winning the Big Ten title will be difficult, but we're definitely one of teams that has a chance.

Although Wisconsin loses three starters, including the Big Ten Player of the Year, Lisa Boyd, it has more returning all-Big Ten players than any other team. "Our three returning starters are a great nucleus for our 1991 team," Lowe said. At the beginning of last season the Badgers' only real question mark was at outside hitter, and Alison Abraham filled that void by having a remarkable season. This year,

Wisconsin has three starting positions open. "I'm excited about the openings in the starting lineup," Lowe added. It means that each player on the roster has a chance to make a significant impact. Competition for those spots will be keen between the newcomers and returnees.

A reason for the success last season was improved serving and passing. The Badgers have been consistently a good blocking team, and led the league in 1990 for the second straight year. Wisconsin also improved offensively last season, recording a school record 1,940 kills. According to Lowe, though, this season the UW will be better offensively. "A great offense starts with a great setter, and we believe we have the best setter around.

In charge of the offense is senior setter Liz Tortorello, one



offense last season, Tortorello surpassed every UW assists record and became the UW all-time leader with 2,801 career assists. Tortorello, a three-time U.S. Olympic Festival participant and 1990 second team all-Mideast Region selection, will serve as team captain for the second consecutive year. "Not only is she a great setter, but she is a very positive force on the court," Lowe said. "Like a team with a great quarterback, with a great setter you always have a chance."

If Tortorello is the positive force, then senior Susan Wohlford is the catalyst. Wohlford, a 1990 second team all-Big Ten selection, topped her own UW records in every dig category and set a Big Ten record with 44 digs in a match. She finished last season ranked sixth in the nation with an average of 4.52 digs per game. "We believe that Sue is the soul of the team in the attitude she brings to the court," Lowe said. "Her competitiveness and aggressiveness make everyone she plays with better." Wohlford's exciting level of play earned her Most Inspirational Player honors from her teammates last season. "She wants this to be the best year ever for the Badgers and she'll instill that in everyone."


"Emerging" was the operative word in describing junior middle blocker Arlisa Hagan before last season. Now, she has arrived. Hagan earned all-Mideast Region honors last season and was an all-Big Ten first team selection. She produced UW season records in hitting efficiency (.332) and kills (479). She was a big part of the Badgers' conference-leading blocking corps, holding a top spot among the Big Ten blocking leaders throughout the season and ranking 15th among the nation's leading blockers. "One way for the Badgers to be a great team is for Arlisa to be as great as she can be. The sky is the limit for her," Lowe said.

'We want her to become the dominating blocker in the league. That is her goal too, and she's ready

for it."

After playing behind the Big Ten's leading blocker the last two seasons, senior Jeanette Simenson is ready to compete for the middle blocker position vacated by Boyd. Simenson has served an important role for Wisconsin the past two seasons, com-

opposite the setter, left open with the graduation of Mary Penosky, and she is the UW's setter of the future. "Kristin puts up a good block and has worked hard on her hitting," Lowe said. "She is also protection against an injury to Liz, but is not ready to concede the starting setter role to Liz."

Also vying for starting roles are newcomers Cathy Dezutel, Brigitte Lourey, Samantha Scott, and Laurie Smith. All four freshmen are listed as outside hitters and are all strong defensive players who pass well. "Of any class I've ever recruited, this is the most well disciplined," Lowe said. "They are not just raw talent, but they are very skilled players and will make immediate contributions to our team."

Lourey, from Columbia Heights, Minn., played both the outside hitter and middle blocker positions in high school. She was a 1990 K-Swiss all-American, and


Senior Liz Tortorello (picture at left) and junior Arlisa Hagan (picture below) both earned all-Big Ten honors in 1990.


ing off the bench in clutch situations, but has a real opportunity to crack the starting lineup this season. "Jeanette has always been an important component of the team," Lowe said. "We're excited for her because she has the chance to be a starter. Her competitiveness may be the deciding factor."


Senior **Sara Wilson** will also compete for a middle blocker position, according to Lowe. Wilson is in her third season at Wisconsin after playing her freshman year at North Carolina. "Sara is physically our strongest player and can dominant offensively at times with her power," Lowe said. "We need to find a way to capitalize on her strength."

Sophomore **Angie Meyer** saw limited action as a freshman with a solid blocking corps already in place, but will get a long, hard look from the coaching staff as they decide the middle blocker position. "I think Angie's situation is similar to Boyd's," Lowe said. They both did not play a lot as freshmen, but we knew they were going to be good. Angie has all the skills necessary to become a super middle blocker. She just needs the experience."

Just a taste of collegiate experience was all sophomore **Kristin Sobocinski** needed to show that she has a future among the Badger starting six. According to Lowe, Sobocinski helps the Badgers in two ways: She could play the position

served as captain of her high school team, which was ranked No. 1 in the nation by *USA Today*. "Brigitte has outstanding credentials and has a shot at a starting outside hitter position," Lowe said. "We needed someone who could hit and pass well, and she's just what the doctor ordered."

Smith, from Wheaton, III., earned all-America honors from the Amateur Athletic Association and the U.S. Volleyball Association. "Laurie has all the skills needed to come right in and compete for playing time," Lowe said. "She will compete for the starting rightside hitter position, and I see the adjustment from high school to collegiate volleyball being easy for her."

Both Dezutel and Scott have shown the style of play Lowe admires so much in a another Badger. Dezutel, from West Chicago, Ill., was an all-area second team selection and a *Chicago Sun Times* all-star. Scott, from Templeton, Calif., was the Los Padres Conference's 1990 Most Valuable Player and a three-time all-conference selection. "I figured it might take two people to relace Wohlford, so I went after them early," Lowe explained. "Both Cathy and Samantha have that fiery competitiveness. Having them with us this season will give Sue a year to play with people who play the way she does, and

that will make us a great defensive team."

Besides its personnel, Wisconsin has several other factors that will contribute to its success this season.

A carryover from last season is the UW's 15-match home win streak dating back to September of 1990. The Badgers reaped the benefits of playing at the Fieldhouse, going undefeated at home in Big Ten matches. "The support we see and feel when playing at the Fieldhouse definitely pumps us up," Lowe said. Wisconsin continued to set attendance records throughout last season and finished the season ranked first in the Big Ten for attendance and third in the nation. "I think the community is eager to see how we do this season after the excitement of last season," Lowe said. "We just need to stay focused and enjoy the process."

The season past bodes well for the season to come. The defense of the Big Ten title is no small task, but a simple plan may be what it takes. "We won the Big Ten last season by taking one match at a time," Lowe said. "You can't win the conference in the first match of the season. You have to win one point, one game, one match at a time, and then the records, the crowds, the honors and the championships will come."


TOP: Susan Wohlford concentrates on her next serve. She holds the UW record for most serice aces in a match with eight.







Wisconsin's First All-American

Lisa Boyd, a 6-0 middle blocker, became Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American, earning second team honors in 1990. She served as co-captain of the Badgers' first Big Ten Championship team and led them to their first NCAA tournament appearance. The 1990 Wisconsin Most Valuable Player, Boyd became the first Big Ten Player of the Year from the UW. She was a unanimous all-Big Ten first team selection and earned first team all-Mideast Region honors in 1990.

Boyd earned the nickname "Big Ten Boyd" from teammates after leading the conference in blocking her junior season. She topped that feat in 1990, setting a Big Ten record with 1.74 blocks per game and tallying a conference record 15 blocks in one Big Ten match. She finished her senior season ranked 14th in the nation in blocks per game. In addition to her strong blocking game, Boyd ranked among the Big Ten leaders in every category except assists in 1990 and was third in the league in hitting with a .323 efficiency. She was a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week in 1990.

Boyd's successful career will also be well documented in the UW record books. She leaves Wisconsin ranked among the top 10 in every category except assists. She is the school's all-time leading blocker with 523 block points and set the UW single season blocking record with 206 in 1990.

The best all-around player in the history of the Badger program, Boyd ranked either first or second on the team in every category except assists last season. She led the Badgers with 44 service aces and was second in kills, hitting efficiency, and digs.


Boyd earned honorable mention all-Big Ten her sophomore and junior seasons. She led the Badgers' in their first post-season tournament appearance, earning Most Valuable Player honors at the Women's Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1989. Boyd also earned second team all-Mideast Region honors in 1989.

Based on her credentials, Boyd was named Wisconsin's Female Athlete of the Year and was a nominee for the Big Ten/Jesse Owens Athlete of the Year. She was also a finalist for the Milwaukee Athletic Club 1990 Amateur Athlete of the Year, an award won by former UW graduate and NCAA President Judith Sweet. The honor included a \$500 gift to the charity of her choice, which she bestowed on her high school athletic program.


With one year of school remaining before graduating with a degree in finance, the two-time all-Big Ten academic selection is focused on carrying over her athletic success to her professional life, and plans to pursue a masters degree in business administration.





isconsin met all expectations in 1990, winning its first Big Ten title and earning its first trip to the NCAA tournament.

The Badgers opened the 1990 campaign with their first national ranking, appearing at 20th in the *Volleyball Monthly* preseason poll. Wisconsin rebounded from an 0-3 season start to win the JMN. Premier Tournament, a 16-team tournament that featured defending NCAA Champion Long Beach State. The Badgers' success at the JMN gave them their first American Volleyball Coaches Association ranking, as they appeared at No. 19 in that poll.

The Fieldhouse proved a welcome place for the Badgers after their success on the West coast. The UW went on to win eight straight at home to move to 13-4 on the season. The Badgers took their eight match win streak to the FirsTier Invitational, where they extended it to 13 matches with wins over North Carolina and 12th-ranked Brigham Young before losing to then top-ranked Nebraska. After posting a 2-1 record at Nebraska, the UW appeared at No. 19 in the NCAA top 20, marking its first appearance in that poll.

The Badgers never looked back after gaining sole possession of first place in



the Big Ten standings with a mid-season win over lowa on the road. They swept the last four conference matches to clinch their first Big Ten Championship with a 16-2 mark, and earned their first NCAA tournament bid. Their conference record included two wins each over 1989 Big Ten Champion Ohio State and perennial conference power Illinois. A highlight of the conference season was the memo-

rable win at the UW Fieldhouse when the Badgers overcame a 14-6 deficit in the fifth game to stun a veteran Purdue team, 16-14.

Five Badgers earned all-Big Ten honors. Lisa Boyd, the Big Ten block leader, became Wisconsin's first Big Ten Volleyball Player of the Year and Head Coach Steve Lowe became the UW's first Coach of the Year. Boyd was also a unanimous all-Big Ten first team selection. Joining Boyd on the first team, were middle blocker Arlisa Hagan, and setter Liz Tortorello. Outside hitter Susan Wohlford received second team all-Big Ten honors.

In NCAA first round action, the 10th-ranked Badgers took full advantage of the opportunity to prove they were indeed Big Ten Champions. In front of a national record crowd of 10,935, the Badgers downed perennial NCAA tournament team Illinois in three games to advance to the Mideast Regional. The Badgers had three players on the all-

region team and Boyd earned the UW's first volleyball all-America honors. Lowe also became the first UW coach to earn Mideast Region Coach of the Year hon-

The Badgers, ranked 10th in the final NCAA poll, lost to Penn State in the first match of the Mideast Regional to finish the season with the best record in the history of the program at 29-8.

The 1990 Badgers excited their fans not only with their level of play, but also with their enthusiasm.





Big Ten Volleyball





The University of Wisconsin is a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The NCAA, which established women's championships in 1981-82, conducts 35 women's championships in 15 sports.

In addition to its national affiliation, UW-Madison benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference. Big Ten women's athletics programs take pride in leading the nation in volleyball attendance and in receiving more network and cable television exposure than any conference in the nation.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. The women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972.


As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin athletes compete in conference champion-

ships in basketball, cross country, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference is considered one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation and is well represented on the national level. In 1990, the Big Ten and the Big West were the best represented conferences in the NCAA Volleyball Championship. Five Big Ten schools, including new member Penn State, were selected to the NCAA Volleyball Championship. Wisconsin was the 1990 Big Ten Champion and earned an automatic bid to the tournament. The Big Ten Champion is determined by record within the conference. The teams play a double, round-robin schedule with all teams playing each other twice, both at home and away.

First round sites for the 16-team NCAA Championship will be determined by the Division I Women's Volleyball Committee at the end of the regular season. The NCAA Volleyball Championship Final Four is scheduled for December 19-21 at the University of California-Los Angeles.





A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin–Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW–Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, over 5 million volumes in 28 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The University's national ranking of fifth in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey done on graduate level education—the five-volume Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.

More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at UW–Madison. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and pro-

fessional degree programs.

Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten nationally in recent years include sociology, mathematics, chemical engineering, economics, political science, zoology, geography, statistics, history, plant pathology, molecular biology, biochemistry, Spanish, and German.

Much of the University's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. UW–Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975 for his study of retroviruses.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of medicine, nursing, and pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C., and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.

ocated between Lakes Mendota and Monona, amid rolling hills and wooded areas, Madison is one of the nation's most beautiful campuses.

The city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit Back To School starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on

the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.







The Student Body

ver 43,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 9,500 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.


Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW–Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.


A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1990, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority



groups accounted for 6.86 percent of the student body, an increase from 5 percent ten years ago.

The University's diversity is also evident in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.

The Chancellor


r. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW–Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the University extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help

solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962, and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.















Athletic Director Pat Richter

Pat Richter, the guiding force behind University of Wisconsin Athletics, is no stranger to the sports or business worlds.

A former UW student-athlete, professional football player, successful businessman, and family man, Pat Richter was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's new athletic leader in December of 1989.

He was an all-America end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, enjoyed a long and distinguished career as a standout with the National Football League's Washington Redskins, and was most recently a vice president of personnel for Oscar Mayer & Co. in Madison.

Richter has essential experience as a student, an athlete and an administrator. He is committed to excellence in the classroom as well as on the playing field. He is committed to Wisconsin, and to providing UW student-athletes with an experience they'll cherish the rest of their lives.


The Community

adison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, and is also considered one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 191,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life for full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.







Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW–Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Funding

- Federal Grants: UW–Madison ranked 13th nationally in 1988, receiving 1.7% of the federal budget for university research.
- Research and Development Funds: UW-Madison ranked fifth in the country for research and development expenditures in 1989, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- Tuition: Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW–Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW–Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- Voluntary Support: UW-Madison ranked eighth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1988-89 by receiving \$102 million in private support.
- Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education: Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988-89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.



Research and Programs

- Research Activity Index: In 1986, the UW–Madison ranked second in a new multidimensional study that evaluated research activity at U.S. universities.
- Doctoral Degrees: Between the school's founding and 1990, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 27,584 Ph.D.s. Few institutions in the world can match this record.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- Business: The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.
- Education: The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1990. The UW's educational administration and educational policy studies rank second.
- Forestry: In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.
- Journalism and Mass
 Communication: The faculty at the
 School of Journalism and Mass
 Communication was rated first in the
 nation in research productivity in 1988 by
 Journalism Quarterly.
- Plant Pathology: In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.
- Libraries: The UW–Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 28 locations across campus.
- **Graduates**: According to a 1987 Wall Street Journal survey, UW–Madison produced the third highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.





Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

Band Caps

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.




Graduating Law Students

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the crossbar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW–Madison in 1910.

Halloween

In 1979, the Wisconsin Student
Association began sponsoring what for
years had been a spontaneous event—
the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and
fame each year as costumed revelers
filled the eight blocks between the
Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party
at the fieldhouse.



Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of one he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and its pedestal.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the



university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.


"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW–Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brain-child of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Historic Buildings at the UW



Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

Bascom Hall


Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW-Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office. Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.

Memorial Library

Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.

Memorial Union

Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.







North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the University (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark. It now houses the political science department.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygienic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.

Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

Van Hise Hall

Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW–Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.



Scholarships



Wisconsin Sports Facilities

thletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. In 1984, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium was ranked by the USTA as the number one indoor tennis facility. It seats 1,500 spectators and is valued at over \$8 million. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court. The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2,500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes will be able to use the 400-meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track, located on the west side of campus, once construction is completed in 1993. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The "Nat" contains an eightlane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter



Opened in 1988, the McClain Athletic Facility offers indoor practice facilities for football, soccer and track and field. A 90-yard artificial turf practice area is contained in the 76,380 square foot main floor.

Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields near the University Hospital. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was recently com-

pleted on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room space.

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The McClain Athletic Facility offers an indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track, as well as lockers for both the men's and women's track teams. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multipurpose gyms, weight rooms, run-

ning tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, carpeted room. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.- *certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff may use training rooms in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.

Media Row: Wisconsin working facilities for press/radio/television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, just below the first balcony. Electrical outlets are available at every seat. Telephones must be installed in advance of the season.

Working Media Tickets: Requests for media tickets must be placed 24 hours in advance of the match with the Varsity Sports Information Office, 608-263-5502. Media should enter through the pass gate located at Gate A.

Photographers: Photographers may work from any side of the floor, except in front of team and scoring benches, or ends of the court.

Media Services: Event programs and notes are available from the sports information staff on media row before the event. A complete box score will be available at the completion of the event.

Player Interviews: At the completion of the event, a member of the sports information staff will take interview requests from media representatives. Interviews will take place in the basketball locker room, located at the north end of the Fieldhouse. Players are also available for interviews outside of competition. Requests should be made through the Women's Sports Information Office (608-263-5502).

Coach Interviews: The opposing coach and the Wisconsin coach will meet with media representatives after each event. The basketball locker room, located at the north end of the Fieldhouse, will serve as the media room. The opposing coach will usually appear first. 
