WE'RE STARTING TO MINE GOLD FOR THE UNION'S GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

A general campaign to raise funds to improve and expand the Memorial Union building -- the first since the 1920's and 1930's when the original building and theater wing were constructed -- is in the offing.

The Trustees and Voting members of the Memorial Union Building Assoc. voted in May to undertake the new campaign to accomplish, in stages, all possible improvements of Union facilities prior to the celebration in 1978 of the golden anniversary of the opening of the original building. Included among the long-planned projects are:

- a large new reception-dining room opening into Great Hall and expanding its capacity.
- a new art gallery adjoining the present gallery and expanding opportunities for students, faculty and other artists to exhibit their works.
- enlargement of the Beefeaters room and addition of three more meeting rooms.
- a theater coffee house where theater patrons can gather after performances.
- a music listening lounge.
- conversion of the theater plaza into a garden-like setting with planters, sculpture, etc.
- major improvement of the lakeshore including weather-proof ramps for Hoofers sailboats.
- a general face-lifting for 46-year-old rooms.

The cost of the pending projects is currently estimated at \$1,000,000.

The new campaign got off to a fast start when it was announced that the classes of 1924, 1925, and 1934 have already pledged class anniversary gifts totaling more than \$100,000 as reported in the last Quarterly.

Other classes -- and all alumni, faculty, and interested friends -- will be invited to join in the golden anniversary undertaking. More information on what is in prospect, and how you can help, will come to you later this fall.

NEW CONCERT GRAND MEANS MORE GRAND CONCERTS

The classes of 1937 and 1950 have joined in the purchase of a new concert grand piano for the Union Theater. It replaces the concert grand which was the gift of the class of 1925 on the occasion of its 25th reunion in 1950. The class of '25 piano -- its harp inscribed by the famous artists who have performed on the Union stage (including Myra Hess, Arthur Rubinstein, and Isaac Stern) -- has been moved to the lounge of the Alumni House. After 24 years it is still in very good condition for all purposes except meeting the extraordinary requirements of formal classical concerts.

The piano arrangements were worked out by Judge James Doyle, Madison, president of the class of '37, Mrs. James Geisler, Madison, class of '27, and F. Anthony Brewster, Madison attorney and president of the class of '50.

MORE STUDENTS THAN EVER JOIN THE UNION FOR LIFE

Signs of an upsurge of student support for the Union and interest in continuing participation after leaving the University came last spring when 602 graduating students signed up as Union life members -- almost twice the number of a year ago. The total number of Union life members is now approaching the 44,000 mark; 5300 live in the Madison area.

SERIES OF CRAFTSHOP CLASSES FOR UNION MEMBERS STARTING

A series of six classes designed to acquaint Union members with the Union Craftshop will begin on Wednesday, September 11. Each class will run from 9 a.m. to noon and will emphasize a different craft and material. Coffee is included in the \$15 registration fee. Designed to acquaint young people with famous musicians and their music, the concerts will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will last about one hour. Individual tickets are \$1.00 per concert and the series price for all four concerts is \$2.00. Series sale closes October 5. Concerts scheduled are: Eastern Brass Quintet, Oct. 5; Jerry Bunke, clarinetist, Nov. 23; Jean-Pierre Rampal, flutist, Jan. 18; and Hiroko Yajima, violinist, Jan. 25.

OUTING CENTER MOVES

The Outing Center in the Memorial Union has moved to the former 12th Night Room next to the Games room. Rentals will continue in the lakefront location until the end of the sailing season when they too will move to the 12th Night Room. Each week the Outing Center and the Ruck Shack at Union South feature special sales on specific items. During the ski season, the Ruck Shack will become a downhill ski center specializing in this kind of equipment for sale. (Rentals of ski equipment will continue to be handled at the Outing Center only).

A reminder to canoeing fans -- the Outing Center runs a special every Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon -- all the canoeing you want for \$1.00. There's nothing like canoeing on the pleasant autumn days ahead.

NEW CORNER STORE AT SOUTH

A "Corner Store" combining gift items, greeting cards, school supplies and stationery has opened at Union South in the lobby area. The store also takes orders for the copy service located in the Craftshop. The store is open from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 3 to 5 p.m. on football Saturdays.

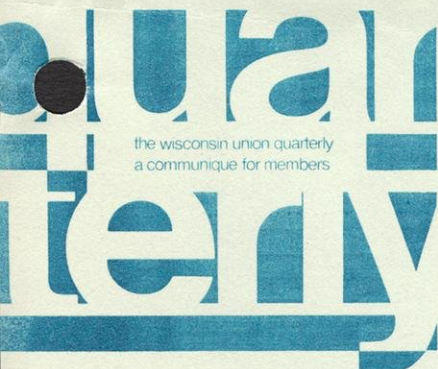
