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REGULAR MEETING OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in Room 1820, Van Hise Hall Friday, August 6, 1971, 9:07 A.M.

President Ziegler presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Dahlstrom, Fish, Gelatt, Nellen, Pelisek, Renk, Sandin, Walker, and Ziegler.

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ABSENT: Regent Kahl.

Upon motion by Regent Dahlstrom, seconded by Regent Sandin, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board held on June 18, 1971, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

President Ziegler announced that the plan for this meeting was to go through the first item on the Reports and Recommendations of the President of the University and then recess for meetings of the Business and Finance Committee and Educational Committee, reconvening the meeting of the Board at about 10:15 A.M., with the hope that the meeting might be adjourned by noon or by 1:00 P.M.

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REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

At the request of President Weaver, Vice President Percy presented the Report of Personnel Actions by the President of the University, and the Report

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of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers and of Informational Items (<u>EXHIBIT A</u> attached). He noted that the Report of Personnel Actions included 1,264 new appointments of which 225 where on State funds and approximately half of which were Summer Session appointments. He explained that the appointments involved \$2.2 million in state funds and \$9.7 million in non-state funds.

Upon motion by Regent Pelisek, seconded by Regents Dahlstrom and Renk, it was VOTED:

- 1. That the actions by the President of the University since the last meeting of the Regents, relating to appointments, resignations, leaves of absence, and changes of status of faculty personnel with rank less than that of Associate Professor and other non-classified civil service personnel with salaries at the annual rate of \$15,200 or less, on file with the Central Business Office, and to tuition remissions, be approved, ratified, and confirmed.
- 2. That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT A attached) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

The meeting recessed for committee meetings at 9:10 A.M.

The meeting reconvened at 10:52 A.M., with President Ziegler presiding.

The meeting continued with further consideration of the Reports and Recommendations of the President of the University.

President Weaver presented the following recommendation, and asked Vice Chancellor Shain to discuss it:

That the recommendations of the Madison Campus Parking and Transportation Board, as amended and approved by the Madison Campus Faculty Senate on January 11, 1971, as set forth in <u>EXHIBIT B</u> attached, be approved.

Vice Chancellor Shain explained that this item primarily involved an administrative change, noting that the way the faculty regulations have been written, previously, every small item having to do with parking was naturally of great interest to the faculty, and it became very difficult to make minor administrative changes in operating the day-to-day bus system and the parking system, with the result that these recommendations were made to give the administration the authority to be the managers of the parking and bus operations on the campus without having to go back to the Madison Campus Faculty Senate every time some small change needed to be made. He also pointed out that this also reaffirmed the fact that parking and public transportation on the campus go hand in hand.

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Regent Pelisek inquired as to the staffing of the Madison Campus Parking and Transportation Office; and Vice Chancellor Shain explained that the Parking and Transportation Board had been in existence for some years and will continue, and that the Parking Office has always been a function in the Division of Physical Plant. He explained that there would be no additional personnel involved.

Regent Pelisek moved approval of the above recommendation, and the motion was seconded by Regent Dahlstrom.

Referring to "levels of subsidy sufficient to ensure its effectiveness" in recommendation 1. of <u>EXHIBIT B</u>, attached, Regent Gelatt stated that there should be some breakdown of those levels of subsidy. He expressed the opinion that when you do subsidize a service such as this, for the campus community, it would be very useful to know, if possible, how much you could attribute to the subsidy as an additional fringe benefit. Vice Chancellor Shain explained that, at this point, they had not found a way to provide funds for the subsidy. Regent Gelatt noted that the bus service had been subsidized out of parking fees. Vice Chancellor Shain explained that this was a request from the faculty to the administration to attempt to get state funds to subsidize the service.

Regent Gelatt expressed the opinion that, if they were successful in obtaining state funds, we should have a category of subsidy, either for parking or transportation, so that there is information as to salaries plus fringe benefits. Vice President Percy expressed the opinion that the administration would be willing to do that if it was done for other State employees, which it is not. He noted that State employees at the Hilldale State Office Building do not have their salaries shown as salary plus parking. Regent Gelatt noted that that was no reason that we should not do it.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

President Weaver presented the following recommendation, and asked Chancellor Young to report on it:

That the three recommendations contained in the Report of the Madison Campus Admissions Policy Committee, as approved and amended by the Madison Faculty Senate on January 11, 1971, as set forth in Madison Faculty Senate Document 20, attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>C</u>, be approved.

Chancellor Young stated that the purpose of this Madison Campus Faculty Document 20 was to find a policy that would increase minority representation. He recalled that these were the recommendations that were discussed with the Regents when the budget was put together, where the administration asked for funds for disadvantaged students with the goal of the campus being roughly that we have the same proportion of minority representation of in-state and out-ofstate students. He pointed out that this is a goal which we will not meet,

because we will not have the resources to do it, and that that is what this document is about. Noting that it is a statement of goal or purpose, Regent Gelatt stated that, although we do not have the resources, he wished that an estimate had been made of what resources would be necessary. Chancellor Young explained that an estimate was made in the budget document.

Regent Gelatt recalled that, some years ago, they had set a figure of \$4,000,000 for minority students, which this Board approved, but which did not get past the CCHE. Regent Gelatt stated that this was the problem of setting goals without recognizing the sources, even possibly the transference of resources from some present programs. He questioned whether the faculty believed in this strongly enough to transfer some resources from present programs or whether it is just a statement for somebody else to pick up the tab. Chancellor Young stated that he thought the faculty recognizes that. He recalled that, when the Black Studies Department was established, he had told the faculty, when they voted for it, that the only source of funds was from the existing departments, which was done.

Chancellor Young explained that what this document is saying is that, insofar as we can, we will use what resources are available for students, but we cannot transfer instructional money for this purpose. He expressed the opinion that this document is useful, and that the discussions that have prevailed so far with respect to the budget requests, in the Governor's Office, in the Assembly, and in the Conference Committee, have included funds to move in this direction.

Regent Gelatt inquired as to whether there was an estimate as to how much it would cost at today's prices. Vice Chancellor Shain explained that this was part of our budget request for minority group students, which was prepared last summer and was based on this kind of a concept, and that the undergraduate portion of it was approximately \$1,000,000. Regent Gelatt pointed out that was for student aid, and inquired about additional faculty, noting that, when this concept was discussed before, it was pointed out that more faculty would be needed. Vice Chancellor Shain explained that they had assumed that the total enrollment would be constant and the resources adequate for the students interested in the program, but that the student aid portion was the most important part of it. Vice President Percy agreed that there was a faculty portion involved, and recalled that the question was asked at the time of the biennial budget preparation, and he thought the amount was approximately \$40,000, which the administration had said would be covered out of a combination of enrollment funds and shifts in funds.

Regent Nellen inquired as to the definition of minority groups; and Vice President Percy asked if we had some kind of a standard definition running from native Americans. Assistant Vice President Robert Gentry replied that the definition consists of blacks, American Indians, Orientals, and Spanish surnamed Americans.

Regent Gelatt stated that, if you set minimum quotas for minorities, you also set maximum quotas for majorities. He stated this should be realized, and that, certainly, there is a bad as well as a good in setting quotas. He stated that it was the practice on this campus not to have quotas, and he noted

that there had been some reference subsequently to the action that this Board took to limit nonresident enrollment, in connection with which it was suggested it was an ethnic intent, which was not the case. He recalled that the figures, in that case, that had been published were derived by others, and not by this University, and he thought that that should be a matter of public record. He stated the Regents did not know the ethnic proportions on this campus, and did not look at this when they made the nonresident enrollment quota.

Regent Pelisek noted that, prior to the recent reorganization of the Board's committee structure, the question of admissions policies was the subject of a special study committee, and that it was his understanding that that committee had now been absorbed by the Educational Committee; and inquired why this item had not been referred to the Educational Committee for consideration and become a part of the Educational Committee report. Vice President Percy explained that it was an old item of business, and was placed on this portion of the agenda in error.

Regent Fish moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Dahlstrom, and it was voted.

President Weaver suggested that perhaps President Ziegler might have some comments he would like to make on the matter of the status of the biennial budget requests and merger legislation. President Ziegler stated he would like to chronologically review the events that took place since July 28, when the Joint Committee on Finance of the Legislature took up the question of Substitute Amendment 5 to Senate Bill 213, which is the so-called Heinzen Bill, which was the compromise bill under the Governor's merger proposal. He noted that it had been difficult to keep all the members of the Board current on these matters when things had moved as rapidly as they did last week. He noted that there then was no urgency as far as this Board was concerned, since it was on record as opposing the concept of merger prior to July 28.

He reported that, when the Substitute Amendment 5 came forward to the Joint Committee on Finance, he and the President of the WSU System were asked to be present, and that he and Vice President Neshek of the WSU System attended that meeting, and were asked to respond to some questions and make some comments. He reported that his comments merely reassured or reestablished the position this Board took in opposition to the merger concept and that he had told the Joint Committee on Finance that he did not feel it necessary for him to comment on Substitute Amendment 5, because it in effect was merger. He explained that the Substitute Amendment 5 was passed by the Joint Committee on Finance, which meant that it was possible that it could have been recommended to the Conference Committee and passed through the Senate and Assembly, which would have meant that this Board would have been sitting here today at its last meeting.

He explained that, consequently, on Monday of this week, they felt that some sort of a program ought to be considered, and that President Weaver had suggested that he felt it was time for him to take a positive stand with regard to merger itself, and specifically Substitute Amendment 5, because it was the first time a piece of legislation had been acted upon positively. He

reported that, at that time, he was in contact with the Executive Committee, merely wanted permission to continue our opposition to merger now that there had been a bill presented and acted upon. He also explained that the Executive Committee had agreed that, if it was his personal wish, President Weaver could make a public statement, if he desired to. He explained that President Weaver then held a press conference for the purpose of making his statement, which dealt primarily with Substitute Amendment 5, pointing out some of the deficiencies in the Substitute Amendment, but adding that Substitute Amendment 5 was in effect merger, and that his Board and he were still opposed to merger.

President Ziegler reported on the subsequent conferences between President Weaver and the Governor regarding the objections to Substitute Amendment 5, regarding which he had contacted seven of the Regents to reaffirm the objection of the Regents to the merger. He reported that, subsequently, the Governor had requested President Weaver to engage with him in a press conference on August 5, but that he had not been able to contact all the Regents about it, because there was not time. President Ziegler asked President Weaver to relate to the Regents exactly what had happened on the preceding day, because there had been some conflicting reports relating to what took place on the preceding morning and afternoon, so that the record could be set straight.

President Weaver explained that he felt that he had an obligation to sit down with the Governor and discuss the objections to specific items that he had criticized in Substitute Amendment 5. He explained that the Governor had indicated that the press conference that was held on the preceding morning was for the purpose of the Governor indicating that he was going to submit to the Legislature his recommendations for several amendments to Substitute Amendment 5, several amendments which were responsive to the specific criticisms that he, President Weaver, had leveled at that piece of legislation. President Weaver stated that his function at that press conference was simply to testify to the fact that these were responses to the criticisms that he had made, and that he did believe, if those amendments were made, the workability of the bill from a mechanical point of view would greatly improve.

He stated that he did not at that press conference either endorse the bill nor did he endorse the concept of merger, but on several occasions at that press conference he had made it clear that he was neither endorsing the bill nor the concept of merger. President Weaver then read a brief statement (EXHIBIT D attached), which he explained he would like to read to simply put on record his recollection of the matter.

President Ziegler stated that he had asked President Weaver to reaffirm, for the benefit of the Regents, what had happened during the past week, because of the conflicting reports; and he stated that he wanted to emphasize that President Weaver had not, either on his own, or representing the Board, taken a different position than the Board had agreed upon a month ago. He expressed sympathy with the awkward position that President Weaver was put in, but complimented him on the way he handled it. He noted that the Senate had agreed to separate the questions, the policy question of merger from the question of the budget bill, and take it up at a later date.

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President Weaver noted that there had been a considerable amount of activity regarding our biennial budget requests since the Regents had last met; and he stated that, although he was sure the Regents were aware of the essence of where we have been in the budget activity, he would like to ask Vice President Percy to report briefly on it.

Vice President Percy reported that, since the last Regent meeting in June, the Senate version of the budget was introduced, which for the University represented a budget level of \$10,000,000 less than the Assembly budget; that the Conference Committee was formed and began its deliberations on the budget, and in the first week of those deliberations approved the University budget allowing the President of the University to be present and to testify on the budget and on the probable impact of the Senate budget and the Assembly budget on the University; that, in view of President Weaver's appearance and testimony, the Conference Committee voted to restore the University budget not only to the Assembly level, but to approximately \$5,000,000 above that Assembly level, the major restoration being the restoration of about \$5.8 million representing the base cut in our present undergraduate, graduate, and professional funds; and that there was a restoration for funds for central administration and a provision of new money for the family medicine and the primary care program.

He reported that the Conference Committee had met the following week subtracting \$1,000,000 from the University request for price increases, while at the same time an additional \$400,000 was approved for price increases for other state agencies. He reported that, at that same meeting, there was concern expressed that, if there would not be merger, neither of the budgets would provide, in the second year, for central administration of the State University System, and consequently, there was \$1.2 million cut from the University budget in the second year for central administration, leaving the University approximately \$500,000 for the central administration of the University system. He explained that the University administration felt that the latter shift was at best an oversight, and called it to the attention of the Committee, which now has it under advisement. He noted that the present status of the Senate budget for the University, as we now stand, is about \$3,000,000 over the Assembly budget, but we are still short of what President Weaver considered the absolute top priority.

There was discussion of the funds that would be provided for administrative costs of the two systems under the various budget proposals, depending upon whether or not merger was approved. In response to a question as to how the University would operate if a budget is not approved or is long delayed, Vice President Percy explained that we operate under a directive and procedure in this State that we operate on last year's budget. He noted that, in his experience during the last eight years, we have managed to get a budget through before the school year began, which gives us some problem in the Summer Session, but we have been able to get by once the budget is finally approved, which has been as late as September 12.

He stated that we will be in bad shape once we get to the end of this month, since we will have the additional students, we will have staff, and we have an adverse situation in that the state provides that the classified employees get their state plan merit increase supplements on July 1, with or without money,

while unclassified employees, faculty, and other academic staff did not. He stated that, if we are forced to operate on last year's budget with this year's workload, we will be in dire circumstances very soon and very early in the year.

President Weaver noted that Regents Pelisek and Sandin had attended the meeting of the Coordinating Council for Higher Education since the last meeting of the Regents, and he suggested that one of them might like to make a report. Regent Pelisek reported that the last meeting of the CCHE was held several weeks ago, and added that President Weaver had attended the meeting for the first time, which might also turn out to be the last meeting of the Coordinating Council. He reported that two items of major concern were taken up by the Coordinating Council at that time. One related to the approval of a paper regarding faculty workload, the establishment of review processes for faculty workload and recommendation for system implementation regarding class sizes and other elements of faculty workload.

The other item related to a recommendation by the Coordinating Council staff in the area of community college development. He explained that the Coordinating Council staff had made a very strong recommendation, which had been presented to the Educational Committee of the Coordinating Council a month earlier, regarding a study group to be formed for implementation of the community college system throughout the state, involving our center campuses and the vocational and adult education system, and the branch campuses of the Wisconsin State University System. He reported that this concept had met very stiff opposition at the Coordinating Council Educational Committee meeting, both from University of Wisconsin representatives and from representatives of the Vocational and Adult Education System, and that the report was specifically rejected by the Educational Committee, but was brought to the full Council by the chairman of the Educational Committee with a recommendation for rejection, and the report was dropped after being discussed at some length and the overall concept being opposed by Mr. Noll, representing the Vocational and Adult Education System and by the representatives of the University of Wisconsin Regents.

Regent Pelisek noted that there was also a move at the Coordinating Council meeting to have the Coordinating Council adopt the concept of the Kellett Commission, but that that failed, with the result that the Coordinating Council did nothing on the subject, although the staff remained very adamant that some implementation study should be organized for a review of the entire question of the community colleges.

The Secretary reported for the record the following actions voted by the Regents on mail ballots since their last meeting:

1. That Gene Arnn be appointed Associate Vice President for Budget Planning, Central Support Services, effective August 15, 1971, at an annual salary rate of \$26,800. (Mail ballot initiated July 2, 1971)

- That the By-Laws be suspended; and that the meeting of the Regents scheduled for October 8, 1971, be held in Hayward, Wisconsin, instead of in Madison. (Mail ballot initiated July 15, 1971)
- 3. That the By-Laws be suspended; and that the meeting of the Regents scheduled for December 10, 1971, be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, instead of in Madison. (Mail ballot initiated July 15, 1971)

There was discussion regarding making arrangements for the meeting in Hayward. Vice President Percy explained that these out-of-town meetings would complete our efforts to meet in all locations of the University, and that the October meeting represents our first to a location selected by University Extension. He noted that the meeting at Hayward would be held in the County Court House, and would be in Regent Sandin's territory. President Ziegler noted that this did not quite conclude meetings in other locations, since there is a recommendation being made to the Board that the standing committees be the vehicles for visiting various campuses, rather than the full Board.

President Ziegler stated that he would also like to suggest that Regent Pelisek's idea be taken up of enlarging the Regent standing committees to include the Regent Subcommittee on Physical Planning and Development. He requested Regent Pelisek to be ready by at least the next meeting, if possible, to make a suggestion that would involve a change in the Regent By-Laws to accomplish this.

President Ziegler presented the report of the Executive Committee.

Upon motion by Regent Dahlstrom, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was VOTED, That the resolutions adopted by the Executive Committee since the June 18, 1971 annual meeting of the Board, as set forth in <u>EXHIBIT E</u> attached, be included in the record as official actions of the Executive Committee.

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Regent Dahlstrom presented the report of the Educational Committee

Regent Dahlstrom moved approval of the following recommendation of the Educational Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

That Chapter 34, Milwaukee Campus Committees, of the Laws and Regulations of the University of Wisconsin (EXHIBIT F attached), be approved.

Vice President Percy reported that, at the meeting of the Educational Committee, it was agreed that the administration would work out language of an introductory nature for the Laws and Regulations of the University of Wisconsin to indicate the extent and nature of the delegation of Regent authority and responsibilities to the faculty under such rules and regulations.

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The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Dahlstrom moved approval of the following recommendation of the Educational Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

That the recommendations of the Madison Campus Committee on Student Housing, as set forth in Madison Faculty Senate Document 45 (<u>EXHIBIT G</u> attached), be approved.

Regent Dahlstrom explained that the principal change is for the purpose of description and definition of the types of housing available to students, which shall be University Supervised, University Listed, and University Unlisted.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Dahlstrom moved confirmation of the following three personnel actions taken by the Central Administration since the last meeting of the Regents, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

- 1. That Robert G. Bell be appointed Assistant to the Athletic Director and Business Manager, Division of Intercollegiate Athletics, Madison Campus, beginning July 1, 1971 at an annual salary of \$18,000.
- That David J. Hanson be appointed Assistant to the Chancellor, Madison Campus, and Research Associate, Law School, Madison Campus, beginning August 1, 1971 at an annual salary of \$16,500.
- 3. That the status of Lon W. Weber, Assistant Vice President, Central Administration, be changed to Executive Director of Communiversity Programs (and Two-Year Campuses) and Lecturer, School of Professional Studies, University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, effective September 1, 1971 at an annual salary rate of \$20,750.

Regent Dahlstrom moved approval of the recommendations of the Educational Committee, relating to fifteen appointments set forth in <u>EXHIBIT H</u> attached, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin.

Regent Dahlstrom called attention to the fact that items 14. and 15. on this list had not been included in the original agenda.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

At the suggestion of President Weaver, Regent Pelisek reported that he was involved as the Regent designee, in the search and screening process, for the selection of the Vice Chancellor at the Parkside Campus. He stated that he had had an opportunity to review the vitaes of all the candidates that were put forth by the Search and Screening Committee, and that he also participated with President Weaver in the interview process of these individuals, including specifically the interview with Mr. Bauer. He stated that he strongly recommended the appointment of Mr. Bauer to this position.

Regent Dahlstrom reported that Tim Higgins, President of the Wisconsin Student Association on the Madison Campus, attended the meeting of the Educational Committee earlier, and reported on some of the activities of WSA during the summer, such as with reference to the voter registration drive across Wisconsin. Regent Dahlstrom stated it was a particular pleasure to work with the WSA once again. President Ziegler inquired whether Mr. Higgins had given any indication of how they were handling their WSA insurance programs. Regent Dahlstrom explained that Mr. Higgins had reported that they were still having some problems with their insurance program and were being sued by one organization. He explained that WSA is trying to put forth a health and life insurance policy for the students on the Madison Campus, and feels that they are getting a good deal of cooperation from the campus administration.

President Ziegler noted that Vice President Percy reported that a report was now ready on the admissions question that Regent Gelatt had raised earlier in the meeting. Vice Chancellor Shain reported that they now had some figures which are projections based on the current admissions and applications extrapolations, which indicate that, in the fall semester, on the Madison Campus, we will have about 13% nonresident freshmen, about 20% nonresident sophomores, about 20% nonresident juniors, and about 24% nonresident seniors, with a total average undergraduate nonresident enrollment of about 18%. Regent Gelatt inquired whether that included children of alumni; and Vice Chancellor Shain stated that it did as far as he could determine, noting that, if they were excluded, the proportions would be somewhat lower. Regent Gelatt commented that there is apparently quite a bit of room within Regent rules for additional nonresident students.

Regent Pelisek presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Regent Pelisek noted that the first item related to the acceptance of Gifts, Grants and the approval of Government Contracts, copies of which had been sent to the Regents in advance of the meeting and copies of which were being distributed at the meeting. He called particular attention to a gift from Mrs. Kenneth L. Greenquist, appearing on page 23 of the list, an addition to the Kenneth L. Greenquist Memorial Scholarship at Parkside, noting that the Regents were certainly most appreciative of Mrs. Greenquist's continued interest in the

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University. Regent Pelisek called attention to the total grants from the federal government in amounts of about \$6,100,000 in connection with the Poverty Institute, appearing on page 60 of the list. Referring to the summary at the end of the list, he noted that the total received for the current year to date was approximately at the same level as in 1970. He pointed out that there has been a very minor fall-off of general giving, although Federal gifts and grants are in excess of those at the same time last year.

Regent Pelisek moved approval of the following recommendation, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk:

That, upon recommendation of the Chancellors and Vice President for Business Affairs, the gifts and grants listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal Contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

President Ziegler inquired as to whether President Weaver wished to comment on any of the specific items. President Weaver stated that, when you put such a list of two months of gifts to this University together, it is pretty impressive, noting that the list consisted of about 70 pages, and included many outstanding grants that relate to renewals of major institutes and centers of research and instructional activity. He pointed out that, if you read those pages carefully, the total of some \$24,000,000 says quite a lot about both the complexity and the influence of this University.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Pelisek noted that the next six recommendations of the Business and Finance Committee, as set forth in <u>EXHIBIT I</u> attached, related to bequests, all of which were relatively small, and which had been described in the material submitted to the Regents with the preliminary agenda for this meeting.

Regent Pelisek moved approval of the recommendations of the Business and Finance Committee, relating to the acceptance of bequests (EXHIBIT I attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Walker, and it was voted.

Regent Pelisek presented the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee:

That the fees and tuition for the first semester 1971-72 be tentatively established in accordance with the 1971-72 Fee and Tuition Planning Schedules attached as <u>EXHIBIT M</u>.

Regent Pelisek explained that, since the University does not have a budget for this year at this point, it is impossible to prepare a fee and tuition schedule in exact accordance with the previously established formulae, but, because school was about to start and probably will start before a final budget is passed, it is essential that tuition and fees be established for the first semester of the coming year. Regent Pelisek noted that the full-time first semester resident undergraduate tuition has been increased from \$254 to \$275, and that the nonresident undergraduate tuition for a semester has been increased from \$899 to \$950. This is an increase in the undergraduate resident tuition of \$42 per year for the University of Wisconsin; and he reported that the Wisconsin State University System has also been forced to take this type of action in the absence of a specific budget, and has increased its undergraduate resident tuition \$50 per year.

Regent Pelisek moved approval of the above recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt.

President Ziegler inquired on what basis these fees are set. Regent Pelisek explained that it was done on the basis of the budget proposed by the Joint Committee on Finance, by applying the formulae to the Joint Finance Committee budget. He pointed out that some action is essential now, because school at UWM will start before the end of this month, before this Board meets again, and we must have a fee and tuition schedule. He stated that the only really viable starting point is the Joint Finance Committee proposed budget.

Regent Fish inquired as to what figure was utilized by the administration in the enrollment admission requests. Vice President Lorenz explained that they used the May enrollment figure, except for summer session, where they used the actual income. President Ziegler inquired whether, in preparing these figures, the administration stuck to the actual percentages of cost. Vice President Lorenz explained that the percentages were used but the final amounts were rounded off. He noted that the Joint Finance Committee, in arriving at its figures, did not use the formulae used in the past. He then explained the percentages used for the various types of students. Regent Renk commented that this proposed schedule will generate not quite \$3,000,000 more than if we had used the present fees. Vice President Lorenz explained that this increase of about \$3,000,000 results from both the increase in enrollment and the increased fees.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Pelisek moved approval of the following recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

With reference to the budget process, Regent Pelisek informed the Regents that the Central Administration has made main budget allocations to the various campuses and units based on the proposed Joint Finance Committee budget for planning purposes, and that the auxiliary enterprises operating budgets (for 1971-72) will be brought before the Regents at the September meeting in final form, whether or not a total operating budget is approved by the Legislature, since the auxiliary enterprises budgets are actually outside of the legislative budget. Regent Fish presented the report of the Subcommittee on Physical Planning and Development.

Regent Fish moved approval of the following recommendation, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk:

That the concept and budget be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for the Chemistry Building located immediately east of the Science Complex on the Milwaukee Campus, at an estimated project cost of \$6,864,000.

In response to a question by President Ziegler, Regent Fish explained the location of this project; and Regent Fish also informed the Regents he had asked the Central Administration to provide all of the members of this committee with better maps of the campuses to make more readily apparent to the members of this committee exactly where the exact locations of the buildings will be and how they are tied into the total campus.

Regent Dahlstrom inquired whether there were any federal funds involved in this project; and Regent Fish explained that there was about \$400,000 of interest subsidy from Federal Title III.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Fish moved approval of the following recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Walker, and it was voted:

That the concept and budget be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for the Milwaukee Humanities Building, at an estimated project cost of \$4,392,000.

Regent Fish moved approval of the following recommendation, and the motion was seconded by Regent Walker:

That the concept and budget be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for the Library Stage II project located immediately east of the present library on the Milwaukee Campus, at an estimated project cost of \$4,331,792.

Regent Dahlstrom inquired whether this project would take us to 1974, when we will have room for 845,000 volumes, with the ultimate goal being 1,200,000 volumes at the completion of Stage III. Regent Fish indicated that that was correct; and he pointed out that Stage III would be a tower complex built on top of the original structure, for which provision was made in the way of footings at the time it was constructed.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted.

Regent Dahlstrom presented the report of the Regent Subcommittee on Faculty Tenure Criteria. He reported that a preliminary report should be forthcoming within another month or six weeks, noting that most of the testimony has been summarized into a document less bulky than the original testimony and submitted to the members of the committee for their review and comment. He hoped to get the final report to the Board in November.

Regent Nellen reported that he had received a communication from Mr. Lunney, a member of the Dane County Board of Supervisors, in which he expresses some concern for the Arboretum, for the infringement upon the Arboretum by commercial ventures and by urban development, which Regent Nellen thought had much validity. He stated that he would refer the communication to the Secretary for distribution to all the Regents and to the proper Regent committee, which he assumed would be the Business and Finance Committee. He expressed the opinion that this matter was somewhat redundant, because he understood that the proposal of the last commercial venture fell through.

President Ziegler reported that he had received a letter from the President of the American Alumni Council in Washington, D. C., informing him that the University of Wisconsin Alumni Association was the recipient of a 1971 Alumni Administration Citation for Improvement. (Copy of letter filed with the papers of the meeting.) President Ziegler pointed out that this is quite a noteworthy citation and worthy of mention. He stated that we do have a good Alumni Association, and that we know it.

President Ziegler announced that the meeting would be recessed for an Executive Session, after which there might or might not be a report.

The meeting recessed for Executive Session at 12:12 P.M.

The Regents arose from Executive Session at 1:30 T.M.

President Ziegler reported that the following action was voted by the Regents in Executive Session:

That Richard G. Jacobus be appointed a member of the Board of Visitors for the term July 1, 1971, to June 30, 1977, to succeed Richard L. Cates.

REPORT OF THE ADMISSIONS POLICY COMMITTEE (Approved, as amended - Fac. Senate Minutes 1-11-71)

Background:

The Madison Campus Admissions Policy Committee is primarily concerned with policies which pertain to the admission of students to the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Such policies, upon receiving approval by the faculty and the Board of Regents, then serve as guidelines for the operation of the Office of Admissions. The Committee has recently given considerable attention to policies associated with the admission of disadvantaged and minority (non-white) groups. The University community is aware of the national concern over the lack of equal educational opportunity for minority group students, as well as of the efforts which have been made by the University of Wisconsin to better meet the needs of a group of students who previously had been denied access to higher education. For example, the Special Five-Year Program of Tutorial and Financial Assistance was begun on the Madison campus in 1966 with only 24 students. Faculty and administrative support, flexible admission standards, growing financial assistance, and enthusiastic and energetic leadership have all been factors contributing to the successful expansion of the Program so that 168 new students were admitted in September 1969. In addition to the Special Program, various departments on the Madison campus have also taken steps to increase the number of disadvantaged and minority group students who are admitted to departmental programs.

The faculty, in May 1967, approved a recommendation made by the Admissions Policy Committee that qualified non-resident students from disadvantaged backgrounds be given high priority in the selection procedure (Madison Campus Faculty Document 133). The Committee has also continued to support the concept of flexible admission standards for the Special Five-Year Program. However, comparatively little has been said about the admission of minority group students. Therefore, the Admissions Policy Committee urges the faculty to approve the four recommendations given below. These can then be implemented by the Office of Admissions.

Recommendations:

Recommendation 1

The University of Wisconsin-Madison should strive to achieve, in its undergraduate student body, a level of minority group representation that is at least proportional to the population served. Among undergraduates from Wisconsin, at least 3% minority enrollment would be proportional to the population; and among undergraduates from other states, at least 15% minority enrollment would be proportional to that population. Given the University of Wisconsin present minority student proportions of approximately 1.4% and 5.4% respectively, a much greater effort to discover and aid these minorities is plainly a responsibility of the University, despite its intensive efforts in this matter of the past several years. There is no magic in proportions (all persons who can benefit from higher education should have the opportunity to do so); but the 3% and 15% may stand as our guidelines for early realization. As a leader in providing opportunities for minority students in Wisconsin, the Madison Campus should consider enrollment goals at higher levels than those suggested.

Further, the Committee recognizes that establishing any goal for minority group representation is an irresponsible action without giving concomitant attention to providing the additional financial and educational assistance which may be required. Therefore, we urge that the Madison Campus administration and faculty take such steps as are necessary to provide this assistance.

Recommendation 2

The Committee proposes that the following statement with respect to the admission of minority group students become part of the official admissions policy of the University of Wisconsin-Madison:

We are aware of and sensitive to the discrepancies in the quality of education on the primary and secondary levels of some minority students, and the resultant variations in academic preparation. In all cases of minority students, special attention in the admissions decision will be given to the nature and type of courses taken in the secondary school, to an emerging and improving commitment to an educational goal, and especially to comments and statements made on the maturity, motivation, and other personal qualities of the applicant as supplied by the applicant, his secondary school and character references.

Recommendation_3

Recommendation 4

With respect to the Special Five-Year Program of Tutorial and Financial Assistance, standardized tests, although required, will not be used as a decisive factor in the admission of either Wisconsin or out-of-state applicants. Further, it is our recommendation that for other minority group applicants, test scores should not be considered a major factor in admission but should be used primarily for counseling and placement after admission to the University.

STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT JOHN C. WEAVER

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS

August 6, 1971

Those of you who have seen or heard the news reports resulting from yesterday's press conference which I attended with Governor Lucey may be confused as to what actually transpired. The several news stories could easily lead to contradictory conclusions.

On Tuesday, August 3, I met with representatives of the press detailing many of the objections to Senate Substitute Bill #5. I also stated that quite apart from these specific objections I had to this bill, I still had taken no position that merger as such was in the best interests of higher education in Wisconsin.

On Wednesday, August 4, the Governor requested that I attend a meeting and a subsequent press conference in his office on Thursday, August 5. At that news conference, both the Governor and I stressed the basic point that I remain opposed to Substitute #5 and merger itself. The Governor accepted some of the flaws in Substitute #5 that I had stressed and indicated his willingness to offer amendments to most of these critical problem areas.

I responded that this did make Substitute #5 better mechanically, but still conceptually unacceptable. Governor Lucey recognized my objection to the concept and very graciously indicated on several occasions during the news conference that my presence and my comments were not to be construed as support for merger, but that I was simply indicating that I felt his proposed changes in Substitute #5 would make it a workable bill, not necessarily a desirable bill.

I agree with my Board's position that merger is not in the best interests of the University of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin State University system, or the people of this State.

34.10 University Committee--Milwaukee

 The committee consists of six members, two elected each year for three-year terms. No more than four members shall be from a single school, college, or division.

The chairman serving a one year term, is elected annually by the Committee during the preceding year, serving during that period as chairman-elect. Nominees for the chairman-elect can be only from those having at least one more year to serve as a Committee member.

Nominations for the University Committee shall be made by the Committee on Nominations and Elections in line with its usual procedure.

Vacancies in the University Committee membership are to be filled as soon thereafter as possible, by special election, through preparation of special slate of nominees prepared by the Nominations Committee and permitting nominations from the faculty at large, followed by a mail ballot. The provisions above concerning membership distribution shall be honored.

(2) Functions.

18.

- (a) The University Committee serves as the Executive Committee of the UWM Senate.
- (b) Considers questions concerning the educational interests or policies of the Milwaukee faculty.
- (c) Examines any actions taken respecting the Milwaukee campus by the Board of Regents, the Board of Visitors, the various faculties or faculty committees, or by other bodies or individuals related to the Milwaukee faculty.
- (d) Consults with appropriate administrative officers on budget matters and reports thereon to the faculty.

- (e) In consultation with the Calendar Committee prepares the agenda for the committee of the whole discussion or consideration of matters of general interest to the Milwaukee faculty.
- (f) Makes an annual report to the Faculty Senate at its first regular meeting of the academic year, and reports, from time to time, in its judgment upon matters completed, pending or projected which should be brought to the consideration of the faculty or Senate.
- (g) Makes, on its own initiative, studies and recommendations to the faculty or administration concerning educational policy. The administration is encouraged to ask the University Committee-Milwaukee for advice. The University Committee-Milwaukee may give advice directly to the administration, or refer the matter to the faculty for discussion.
- (h) Advises on procedures within the framework of the University Faculty Council document on Search and Screening Committees (UFC Document #1) which involve the faculty in making nominations for appointments to major administrative positions.
- (i) Advises on procedures which involve the faculty in making decisions on the organization or reorganization of interdepartmental or interdisciplinary programs of instruction, research and service, or the creation of new colleges, schools or institutes involving significant educational programs.
- (j) Serves as the grievance committee of the Faculty.

(Faculty Approved Doc. 546, 1/8/70)

34.11 Academic Affairs Committee

(1) Membership. Six elected faculty members and five student representatives as voting members; and <u>ex officio</u> the Dean of Letters & Science, the Dean of the Graduate School, and one other Dean of a School or College, appointed by the Chancellor on a rotating basis to a one year term, or administrative delegates of these. Among the student members be a graduate student, a student in Letters & Science and an officer of University Student Government. No more than two students or three faculty members may be from the same School or College. Student representatives will be appointed by the President of Student Government, subject to confirmation by the Student Senate, not later than September 1 of each year. If the President of the Student Government does not make an appointment within 30 days of notification of a vacancy, the vacancy will be filled by appointment of the Dean of Student Affairs.

(2) Functions.

(a) On its own initiative and/or in cooperation with other faculty committees, to represent student interests and concerns in academic matters and problems of educational policy which are within the purview of the UWM Faculty. To study and to make recommendations to the Administration, the UWM Faculty or its Senate, or appropriate other faculty committees concerning these academic matters. The Committee may arrange for public forums and referenda among students on matters which the Committee is studying.

- (b) To maintain liaison with the Administration and the Faculties of the several Schools and Colleges on matters of educational policy which are within the jurisdiction of these units for the purpose of consulting with them on matters which have been brought to the attention of the Committee and which it has studied; and for the further purpose of proposing possible uniform standards in these matters. For the latter purpose the Committee may consult with individual representatives of the Schools and Colleges.
- (c) Specifically, to consult with the several Schools, Colleges, and Departments their executives and relevant committees, about problems of curriculum and instruction which have been brought to the attention of the Committee. In these matters the Committee shall maintain close liaison with the Academic Program and Curriculum Committee and appropriate other University Committees.

In order to consider matters of educational concern, the Committee may empower the chairman to appoint subcommittees. The Committee may delegate its responsibilities to these subcommittees, which delegation does not abridge the responsibility or authority of the parent committee. These subcommittees may include, in addition to members of the parent committee, also faculty members and students who are not members of the parent committee; however, all such subcommittees shall have a majority of faculty members and not less than one half of such subcommittees members shall be members of the parent committee.

(Faculty Approved; Document 560, 4/9/70)

34.13 Academic Program and Curriculum Committee

(1) Membership. The Committee consists of 13 voting members representing as much as possible all academic areas of UWM, as follows: each Divisional Executive Committee designates three faculty members from its area, with preference given to those who are or have been involved in the curriculum committee of their schools or colleges with not more than two from the same school or college. One student appointed annually by the President of Student Government is a voting member; if this appointment has not been made by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs makes the appointment. One member of the Dean's Council, appointed annually on a rotating basis by the Chancellor, is a member <u>ex-officio</u>. (2) Functions. The Committee reviews questions of academic programs and curricula, and makes recommendations on suggested changes to the appropriate department, school or college, or, if of broader implication, to the Faculty or its Senate. It reviews broad questions of relationships of courses to each other and to existing and proposed curricula, rather than whether individual courses follow existing rules and regulations, which questions are the responsibility of the course and curriculum committees of the individual schools and colleges. The Academic Program and Curriculum Committee is required to maintain liaison with these committees through the exchange of minutes and other appropriate means.

The University Committee reviews, on a 3-year basis, membership, functions, and policies of this committee, and makes appropriate recommendations to the Faculty or its Senate for action.

(3) Operation. This committee decides whether any course or curriculum presents any problem on which further deliberation is necessary. In that case, the committee may, if that seems advisable, appoint a subcommittee to study that question and report its conclusions to the full committee. The subcommittee may seek consultation from specialists in the area involved. If action by the committee is decided on, the originating unit and its course and curriculum committee are notified of such action, with explanation of reason for it.

All actions concerning new curricula or relationships between the educational purposes or courses of different schools or colleges, are brought before the Academic Program and Curriculum Committee by the course and curriculum committees of the appropriate schools and colleges, and are reviewed by it.

(Faculty Approved; Document 610, 5/21/70)

34.14 Committee on Admissions, Records, and Student Information

(1) Membership. This committee is divided into two sections with different membership and function, but operates when necessary as a single committee.

(a) Policy Section. Four elected faculty members, no more than two of whom shall be from the same college or school; and six faculty members appointed by the Chancellor in such a way that each school and college has one appointed or elected member of its teaching faculty on the committee, except that the College of Letters and Science and the School of Education shall have two each. Two students appointed by the Dean of Student Affairs shall be voting members. The Dean of Student Affairs and the Registrar and Director of Admissions and High School-College Relations serve <u>ex-officio</u>. The policy section shall elect from its faculty members a chairman, who will serve as chairman of the entire committee and its sections. (b) Administrative Section. A representative of the chancellor's office, one representative of the Dean or Director of each college or school, the Dean of Student Affairs, the Registrar and Director of Admissions and High School-College Relations, the Director of the Department of Student Counseling, and other administrators as appointed by the Chancellor at his discretion.

(2) Functions.

(a) The Whole Committee. Normally, the whole committee meets only once each semester. If decisions of the policy section raise disagreements, or no concurrence between the two sections is possible as to what constitutes policy, or about the line of responsibility between them, the entire committee shall be called into joint session. Matters not resolved in this fashion will be brought to the attention of the University Committee-Milwaukee.

(b) Policy Section. To recommend to the UWM faculty or to its senate on matters of policy relating to high school and college relations, student admissions, registration and record keeping. In all these questions it is the function of this committee to recommend procedures to achieve the necessary coordination. This committee should maintain liaison with the appropriate all-University committees through its chairman.

(c) Administrative Section. To implement policies and procedures recommended by the policy section of this committee, and to determine ways in which these policies can best be carried out. To coordinate the various administrative practices involved. To discuss problems of administration as they arise and to resolve them, and to report those that raise a question of policy to the policy section of this committee.

(Faculty Approved; Document 671, 5/18/71)

34.15 Archives Committee

- (1) Membership. Four faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; the Chairman of the UWM Library Committee, the Director of Libraries <u>ex-officio</u>, the Archivist, the Director of Business Affairs, and one student appointed by the President of Student Government; if not appointed by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs shall make the appointment.
- (2) Functions. The UWM Archives Committee has the responsibility for representing the faculty interest in the establishment of policies for the UWM Archives and in advising the UWM Director of Libraries on Archives operations.

The UWM Director of Libraries is responsible for the actual operation of the UWM Archives, such as direct supervision of its staff and its collections, provision of fireproof and secure storage space, protection against unauthorized use of materials and papers as well as assistance to proper reference and research requests, and management of the budget allocated for its maintenance. (Faculty Approved; Document 574, 4/9/70)

34.16 Athletic Board

- (1) Membership. Three elected Faculty members and two Faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; an alumni representative who shall be an alumni trustee appointed by the Chancellor from a group of three candidates selected by the President of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Alumni Association; two students appointed by the President of Student Government; if not appointed by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs will make the appointment; the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, ex-officio.
- (2) Functions. The program of intercollegiate athletics is under the control of the Faculty of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee through the Athletic Board. The Board (1) approves and submits the budget for Intercollegiate Athletics; (2) recommends the appointment of the Director of Athletics and approves the assignment of personnel to coaching positions; (3) approves schedules for intercollegiate athletic contests; (4) rules upon questions of eligibility of students under institutional and conference regulations; (5) implements policies concerning athletic scholarships; (6) reviews the policies governing intercollegiate athletics and recommends to the Faculty changes that appear to be in keeping with the long-term development of the University.

(Faculty Approved; Document 593, 10/8/70)

34.17 Awards and Recognition Committee

- (1) Membership. Four elected faculty members and three faculty members appointed by the Chancellor, the latter selected to include members of departments, schools or colleges most directly concerned with the awards to be made in the immediate future. The Chancellor is encouraged to appoint UWM members of pertinent all-University committees to the committee. Two students appointed annually by the President of Student Government; if he does not make the appointments by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs will make the appointments.
- (2) Functions. Subject to Administrative policies and guidelines and subject to the provisions of gifts, bequests, or other unbudgeted sources not administered directly by colleges, schools, or departments, this committee either recommends or selects candidates for awards or recognition for faculty members. It recommends candidates for University endowed professorships allocated to the Milwaukee campus. It selects recipients for outstanding teacher recognition awards from candidates nominated by various departments. It recommends students for appropriate scholarship awards not under the jurisdiction of other faculty committees or other agencies. This committee maintains liaison with appropriate all-University committees where these are pertinent to UWM and it acts as an information clearing house concerning sources of awards and recognition.

(Faculty Approved; Document 577, 4/9/70)

34.22 Faculty Welfare Committee

 Membership. Six elected faculty members. The representatives of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee who are on the all-University Fringe Benefits Committee are also voting members of the Faculty Welfare Committee.

The Nominations Committee is requested to nominate two faculty members who have been at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee less than ten years.

(2) Functions. To advise the Faculty on such matters as pertain to sick leave, group insurance, retirement, and all other matters of Faculty Welfare. On its own initiative, or at the request of the University Committee-Milwaukee, to undertake studies and to make recommendations for faculty consideration of compensation, salary, and fringe benefits. To maintain liaison with the University Committee-Milwaukee, the Faculty Association, and other University groups concerned with these matters. (Faculty Approved; Document 559, 4/9/70)

34.26 Committee on Housing

- Membership. Five faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; four students appointed by the President of Student Government, three of whom are dormitory residents and one living off campus; if not appointed by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs will make the appointments; the Director of Housing, ex-officio.
- (2) Functions. The Committee on Housing serves as an adivsory body to the Housing Office in implementing faculty-approved policies related to student housing and gives assistance to the faculty concerning the availability of housing. The Committee may delegate its responsibilities or parts thereof to appropriate subcommittees or administrative offices; such delegation, however, does not abridge the responsibility of the Committee. The Committee recommends for faculty approval general policies affecting housing. In unusual circumstances, the Committee may establish interim procedures concerning housing which have temporary effect until requisite faculty action can be taken or relevant policy issue. (Faculty Approved, Document 595, 10/8/70)

34.27 Human Rights Committee

(1) Membership. Three elected faculty members; three faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; one representative of the classified service and one academic Dean appointed annually by the Chancellor; three students appointed annually by the President of Student Government; if not appointed by September 1, the appointment shall be made by the Dean of Student Affairs. The Director of the Institute of Human Relations, and a designated representative of the Chancellor responsible for Human Rights matters are members ex-officio.

(2) Functions.

1. To implement the principle of eliminating all violations of human rights, including discrimination based on race, creed, color, religion, sex, age, national origin or based on any other reason. In working toward elimination of discrimination against members of the University community, the committee considers alleged violations of human rights and reports its findings to the UWM Faculty or its Senate and/or to the University Administration.

 The Committee serves as an advisory body to the Administration concerning administrative policies related to human rights of members of the University community and maintains liaison with other university committees on these issues. The committee shall make appropriate policy recommendations to the UWM Faculty or its Senate.
 Specifically, the Committee shall assist and advise in

the development of policies, programs, and activities designed to assure equal employment and equal educational opportunities for all, but not restricted to, functions undertaken to increase the competencies and skills of those who, because of past or present discriminatory practices, require special assistance in becoming members of the University community. 4. In the exercise of the Committee's functions, the chairman appoints a sub-committee with concurrence of the committee, on Human Liberty Grievances consisting of three faculty and two student members of the Committee. This subcommittee is to give students, junior faculty members and other members of the University a direct channel which they can use to bring their complaints concerning the infringement of their human rights to the attention of the faculty and University Administration.

In addition, the chairman may appoint other subcommittees, with concurrence of the Committee, which can include members of the University community other than members of the parent committee; however, all subcommittees shall have a majority of faculty members and not less than one half of such subcommittee members shall be members of the parent committee. Whenever the committee delegates its responsibilities to a subcommittee, this delegation does not abridge the responsibility or authority of the parent committee.

(Faculty Approved; Document 611, 10/8/70)

34.28 Lectures Committee

(1) Membership. Seven members of the faculty appointed by the Chancellor; one student appointed annually by the President of Student Government; if not appointed by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs makes the appointment. (2) Functions. The Lectures Committee allocates funds available to it to bring distinguished speakers to the campus. The committee receives and acts upon requests from departments, interdepartmental academic units, or student organizations when the requésts are co-sponsored by a department or unit.

The department or academic unit sponsoring a guest speaker is responsible for making all local arrangements for the lecture, including reservation of facilities and publicity. (Faculty Approved; Document 596, 10/8/70)

34.29 Library Committee

- (1) Membership. Six elected faculty members and three students, one of whom is a graduate student, appointed by the President of Student Government; if the students are not appointed by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs shall make the appointments. The Chancellor, the Director of Libraries, and the Dean of the Graduate School are members ex-officio. The Chairman of the Committee shall serve on the all-University Library Council.
- (2) Functions. The Library Committee represents the interest and authority of the Faculty in library affairs. The Committee serves as both an advisory and policy-making group, as the importance and the nature of issues concerned indicate, in all matters pertaining to the Library. (Faculty Approved; Document 575, 4/9/70)

34.30 Nominations Committee

- (1) Membership. Seven members of the faculty, no more than four of whom are from a single college, school or division, to be nominated annually viva voce from the floor of the February faculty meeting. Other nominations, sponsored by three members of the faculty, may be made prior to the meeting, by submitting the names of the nominee in writing to the Secretary of the Faculty. The election takes place, by secret mail ballot, immediately after the faculty meeting.
- (2) Function. The Committee nominates candidates for all positions to be filled by faculty election. The Committee also advises the Chancellor on committee appointments.
- (3) Procedures.
 - A. The Committee circulates a questionnaire to the faculty immediately following the February faculty meeting, which questionnaire shows the names of all faculty committees and all other elected and appointed positions, and requests the faculty members to indicate first, second, and third choices of such positions in which they are willing to serve if elected or appointed.

- B. The Committee then prepares a slate of nominees to be distributed with the calendar of the April Senate (Faculty) meeting, where it is the first item of business. The Committee nominates at least two candidates for each vacancy. Additional nominations may be made from the floor of the meeting. Other nominations, sponsored by three faculty members, may be made, prior to the meeting, by submitting the names of the nominees to the Secretary of the Faculty.
- C. Immediately following the meeting, the Secretary of the Faculty, prepares a secret mail ballot to be distributed to all members of the faculty. (Faculty Approved; Document 597, 10/8/70)

34.32 ROTC Committee

- (1) Membership. Five members of the faculty, appointed by the chancellor, two students appointed by the student government, and the Commandant of the ROTC, ex-officio. Of the student members one shall be a cadet in the ROTC program and one shall be in no way connected with the program. In the event that the student government fails to appoint the student members by the first meeting of the Committee for the school year, the committee may request the Dean of Student Affairs to make the appointments.
- (2) Function. To aid the Chairman of the Department of Military Science and Tactics in the administration of the law and regulations on exemption from ROTC. Since ROTC policies and functions will be of interest to both the Faculty and the administration, it should function as a policy committee to recommend and advise on matters that concern ROTC and UWM. (Faculty Approved; Document 466(D), 5/9/68)
- 34.33 <u>Committee on Student Conduct</u> (Formerly Committee on Student Conduct Hearings)
 - (1) Membership. The Committee on Student Conduct includes five elected faculty members and four student members. The student members shall be selected annually by USG and shall include at least two undergraduates. The Committee elects its chairman annually from its faculty members.
 - (2) Functions.
 - a) Policy recommendations. The Committee shall make a continuing study of student discipline policies and procedures and shall make recommendations to the faculty for subsequent Regent action from time to time. The Committee shall designate official observers at any hearings on student conduct. Arrangements shall be made to guarantee that these observers will be able to attend all hearings and have access to all records that the Committee deems pertinent, in order to report on the procedures and make recommendations.

b) Appeals. The Committee shall hear and decide cases of appeals from disciplinary actions imposed by the highest student court in which a decision may be had, as provided in the Student Court Constitution.

Pending appeal, any penalty imposed by the authority appealed from will be in force, except that the Committee may in its discretion stay such penalty upon petition.

The Committee shall establish procedures for conducting a prompt, fair and orderly review.

(Faculty Approved; Document 649, 5/13/71)

34.34 Student Financial Aids

- (1) Membership. Five faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; four students appointed by the President of Student Government, if not appointed September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs will make the appointments; the Director of Student Financial Aids, ex-officio.
- (2) To recommend for faculty approval policies governing funds available for loans, awards, and grants to students not administered directly by colleges, schools, or departments. To recommend for faculty approval campus wide policy governing the student employment program, and to implement such approved policies. To receive and adjudicate any student appeals from the decisions of the Office of Student Financial Aids. To encourage securing of funds for student financial aid.

(Faculty Approved; Document 594A, 1/14/71)

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34.35 Student Life and Interests Committee

(1) Membership. Faculty. Eight faculty members appointed by the Chancellor. Five ex-officio members: Dean of Student Affairs; an Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, designated by the Dean of Student Affairs; Dean of Women; Student Activities Coordinator; Director of the UWM Union. Students. President of the University Student Government; President of the UWM Union; one student appointed jointly by the Panhellenic and Interfraternity Councils; President of the Student Housing Administrative Council; four other students, one of whom must be a graduate student, one of whom must be enrolled in Letters and Science, at least one of whom is a representative of a culturally distinct group(s), the group(s) to be determined by SLIC at the last regular meeting of the spring semester, and none of whom may be an elected official of UWG or member of the Student Court. (These four members are to represent at least three different schools or colleges of the University. They are selected by the Chancellor from a list compiled by USG through open interviews. The list should include three names for each seat, making a total of twelve); Editor of the recognized student newspapers, ex-officio. Chairman. Appointed by the Chancellor in consultation with the Dean of Student Affairs from among the faculty members on the committee.

Vice-Chairman. Appointed by the Chancellor from among the faculty members on the committee.

Executive Secretary. The Student Activities Coordinator serves as executive secretary and takes responsibility for all administrative functions assumed by the committee; including preparation of agenda and minutes, registration of speakers, and publication of the student organization handbook.

(2) Function. The Student Life and Interests Committee provides for joint student-faculty participation in the evaluation and improvement of all aspects of student extracurricular activities. It has jurisdiction, subject to faculty direction and control, over all extracurricular activities and interests of UWM students. The committee may delegate its responsibilities or parts thereof to appropriate subcommittees, student organizations or administrative offices, such delegation does not abridge the responsibility or authority of the committee. (3) Responsibilities. Recommend for faculty approval general policies affecting group activities and events. In unusual circumstances, the committee may establish interim procedures concerning student organizations which have temporary effect prior to the requisite faculty policy action thereon. Implement faculty approved policies affecting group activities and events, including establishment and implementation of procedures to:

> Determine official status of student organizations. Authorize new and evaluate existing officially-recognized student publications.

- Define minimum eligibility requirements for participation in activities.
- Establish procedures and rules pertaining to group activities and events.
- Allocate funds to student organizations and supervise financial procedures of organizations.

Approve student health insurance policy as necessary. Maintain other operational functions as authorized by the faculty.

Present annual combined student organization budget request to University Administration. Evaluate and develop extra-curricular programs and activities.

- (4) Subcommittees. SLIC subcommittees consider in depth specific subject-matter areas. Subcommittees meet at least twice each semester and report to the Student Life and Interest Committee at least once each semester, or more frequently as necessary or requested.
- (5) Student Organizations and Legislative Review Subcommittee
 - (a) Recommends minimum eligibility requirements of students participating in campus activities except intercollegiate athletics and recommends waivers of such requirements in individual cases as necessary.
 - (b) Receives, clarifies, and make recommendations concerning legislation passed by USL or under consideration by SLIC.
 - (c) Reviews, studies, and makes recommendations about all matters relating to student organizations.
- (6) Finance & Appropriations Subcommittee
 - (a) Recommends annual combined student organization budget requests.
 - (b) Recommends the allocation of funds to student organizations based on complete budget requests and financial statements.
 - (c) Maintains a file of all budget requests and allocations.

- (d) Aids and encourages organizations toward self-support.
- (e) Identifies, encourages and assists organizations in using effective financial practices.
- (7) <u>Publications Subcommittee</u>
 - (a) Makes recommendations concerning proposals for the establishment of new publications.
 - (b) Evaluates student publications by written reports presented at least once each semester to the publication and to SLIC.
- (8) Program Evaluation & Development Subcommittee
 - (a) Gathers data and make recommendations about the frequency, quality, level of participation, variety and appropriateness of all extracurricular programs planned, for and by students. Studies and recommends ways of improving the dissemination of information about programs.
 - (b) Program evaluation and development may extend to programs planned by student organizations, University departments, faculty committees, UWM Union and Milwaukee community.

Additional ad hoc committees may be appointed by the Chairman of SLIC when necessary.

(9) Each subcommittee is composed of no Subcommittee Composition. less than eight (8) and no more than twelve (12) members, the number to be determined annually by the Chairman of SLIC. There shall be an equal representation of students and faculty. Two students and two faculty members from the Student Life & Interests Committee will serve on each subcommittee. Faculty appointees may include the ex-officio members of SLIC. SLIC members on the subcommittees are appointed annually in May by the Chairman of SLIC. The remaining faculty members of each subcommittee are appointed by the Chancellor. The remaining student members of each subcommittee shall be appointed by the Chancellor from a list submitted by University Student Government. The members of the Publications subcommittee shall not include advisers or staff members of student publications. Faculty members shall include at least one representative of the Journalism Department with attention given to Creative Writing, Art and related areas in making the remaining faculty appointments. The term of office for subcommittee members shall be one year. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of SLIC shall be ex-officio (non-voting) members of all subcommittees. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of each subcommittee shall be selected from among the SLIC representatives.

(Faculty Approved; Document 466(D), 5/9/68 & 12/12/68)

34.36 University Relations Committee

- (1) Membership. Three elected faculty members and three faculty members appointed by the Chancellor; one representative of the Alumni Board of Directors appointed by the Chancellor from three nominations submitted by the Alumni Board; the President of the Senior Class, and one student appointed annually by the President of Student Government; if the appointment has not been made by September 1, the Dean of Student Affairs shall make the appointment. The Assistant Chancellor for University Relations, the Director of News Service, and the Secretary of the Faculty are members Ex-officio.
- (2) Functions.
 - (a) To advise the Administration on policy matters relating to public events, including Commencement and other convocations.
 - (b) To maintain liaison with the Committee on Honorary Degrees, the Awards and Recognition Committee, and other appropriate committees.
 - (c) To advise and make recommendations to the appropriate administrative officials and/or the UWM Faculty or its Senate on matters of development, public information, alumni relations, government relations, and other related subjects.
 - (d) The Committee may empower the chairman to appoint subcommittees. The Committee may delegate its responsibilities to these subcommittees, which delegation does not abridge the responsibility or authority of the parent Committee. These subcommittees may include, in addition to members of the parent Committee, faculty members and students who are not members of the parent Committee, however, all such subcommittees shall have a majority of faculty members and not less than one half of such subcommittee members shall be members of the parent Committee. (Faculty Approved; Document 576, 4/9/70)

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON STUDENT HOUSING

The Madison Campus Committee on Student Housing recommends that the Faculty Senate of the University of Wisconsin, Madison approve the following recommendations, to be effective with the start of the 1971-72 academic year:

- That for purposes of description and definition all housing available to students shall be classified as being either 1) University Supervised,
 University Listed or 3) Unlisted.
- 2. Any unmarried students at the University of Wisconsin under 21 years of age must have written parental or guardian consent to live in unsupervised housing.
- 3. That Supervised housing shall be defined as housing that operates under the supervision of the University and is intended to offer a living environment for undergraduate students that is educationally oriented and that will work to aid the student in making the most of the opportunities offered by the University. Supervised housing is expected to meet the following criteria:
 - a. <u>Non-discrimination</u>. No student tenant may be excluded because of race, creed or national origin.
 - b. Physical standards.
 - The unit must comply with all State codes, City ordinances and University requirements concerning general safety, fire hazards and building requirements.
 - 2) The unit must comply with standards of physical equipment, services and maintenance of premises as established by the University.
 - 3) The physical facilities and operational plan must be approved by the University
 - c. <u>Rental agreements</u>. Rental agreement forms provided by and/or approved by the University shall be used.
 - d. Resident staff.
 - 1) Resident staff shall be provided by the owner as specified by the University.
 - Qualifications, conditions of employment and the definition of responsibilities for the resident staff shall be as specified by the University.
 - e. Student organization.
 - 1) The owner must agree to cooperate in the encouragement and establishment of an effective student organization within the unit.

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- The owner must agree to comply with University policies and regulations concerning student governance and social events in living units.
- f. <u>Student tenants</u>. Occupancy shall be limited to students attending the University unless specific approval for exceptions is given by the University.
- 4. That Listed housing be defined as housing that is eligible to use and does use the rental listing services of the University Office of Student Housing. Listed housing is expected to meet the following criteria:
 - a. <u>Non-discrimination</u>. No student tenant may be excluded because of race, creed, or national origin.
 - b. Physical standards.
 - The unit must comply with all State codes, City ordinances and University requirements concerning general safety, fire hazards and building requirements.
 - The unit must comply with standards of physical equipment, services and maintenance of premises as established by the University.
 - c. <u>Discretionary factors</u>. It is intended that integrity of operation, general satisfaction of former tenants, appropriateness of shared facilities, reasonableness of lease arrangements and other pertinent factors be taken into account when offering University listing services. The decision on listing shall be at the discretion of the University Office of Student Housing with the landlord having appeal to the Madison Campus Committee on Student Housing. No landlord shall be removed from the listing until he has been notified in writing of the intended removal and has been given an opportunity to appeal the decision.
- 5. That Unlisted housing be defined as all housing that is not classified as Supervised or Listed.
- 6. That the Board of Regents recommends that freshman men and women live in Supervised housing. Parents, in the opinion of the Board, should grant permission to freshmen to live in non-Supervised housing only under unusual circumstances. That this recommendation of the Board be printed in any literature having to do with entering freshmen and freshman housing.
- 7. The following hours for freshman women under 21 years of age living in Supervised housing shall be imposed for those freshman women whose parents request such hours:

Weekdays: 12:00 o'clock midnight Friday, Saturday and on days preceding legal holidays: 2:00 a.m.

There shall be no specified hours for any other student in Supervised housing.

- 8. There shall be two types of Supervised housing for undergraduate students. If the student is single and under 21 years of age, the choice will require parental or guardian consent.
 - a. Students may live in a supervised residence hall where the policy is the traditional no visitation between the sexes. Visitation in the foregoing recommendation shall exclude those areas designated as public areas.
 - b. Students may live in a Supervised residence hall that will permit visitation between the sexes in accordance with the following limitations:

Friday and Saturday - 12:00 noon to 2:00 a.m. Sunday through Thursday - 12:00 noon to 12:00 midnight

Visitation in the foregoing recommendation shall exclude those areas designated as public areas.

Guests shall be escorted to and from the entrance by the host or hostess.

These are maximum limitations. Any housing unit may adopt a schedule of hours within this recommendation.

- 9. That definitions of class standing for purposes of application to housing regulations shall be those as defined by the College of Letters and Science.
- 10. That students who will be 21 years of age by December 1 of the first semester or by April 1 of the second semester are considered 21 for the entire semester in question.
- 11. That administrative procedures necessary to carry out all housing regulations are to be formulated by the Office of Student Housing. Exceptions to housing regulations must be approved by the Office of Student Housing.

COMMENT:

The recommendations outlined above represent an effort to clarify University housing policies and to bring Faculty documents concerning housing policy for the Madison campus up-to-date. If approved, the Faculty Senate action would in effect rescind Faculty documents #1269, #32, #92, #124, #203, and #289. Recommendations #1, 4, and 5, which redefine the housing available to students, represent changes from the present policy. All other recommendations reflect existing Faculty and/or Regent legislation brought together in one document.

The major change being proposed is the redefinition of all housing available to students as University Supervised, Listed, or Unlisted rather than the present categories of University Supervised, Certified, or Non-Certified.

No changes are being recommended for the category of University Supervised housing.

We are recommending the approval of two new categories of housing, Listed and Unlisted, because the present categories of Certified and Non-Certified are not

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administratively viable. It was not possible to achieve full compliance with the criteria of Certified Housing because there were no effective sanctions available when some private units failed to comply. To a large segment of the private housing sector, the most important service the University can offer is to "list" their facilities in the Office of Student Housing. Because of this, the opportunity to list in the Office of Student Housing should provide a greater impetus for more private units to meet the criteria of Listing Housing. These criteria are the requirements of non-discrimination, the compliance with required physical standards and a number of discretionary factors, such as integrity of operation, reasonableness of lease arrangements, appropriateness of shared facilities, etc. which are to be taken into account by the Office of Studient Housing before University listing services are offered.

The Committee sees this change as effectively strengthening the hand of the Office of Student Housing.
