Dear President Frank:

The proposed budget for the Summer Session of 1936 is submitted herewith for presentation to the Regents at their meeting on December 10 and 11, 1935.

Last year, the receipts of summer session were in excess of \$129,000, and we have no reason to anticipate any decrease next summer. The budget herewith submitted totals \$126,000.


Two collateral enterprises, the laboratory school and the music clinic, were very successful last summer pedagogically, and both paid their way and earned a small profit. If the total for the business items in the budget seems large, it is because there is included about \$1400 for supplies, rent, printing, and furniture for the laboratory school and the music clinic. The University editor informs me, too, that printing costs have risen more than 25% since last year, and the budget appropriation for that item had to be increased.

It is my belief that the Regents can guarantee this budget with perfect safety, and I respectfully recommend it. I am satisfied that the enlarged staff and the improved program will bring an increased registration. The budget is built, as last year, on the basis of 15% of the cash salary for the current year.

It is also agreed that the leave-of-absence privilege is continued as last year.

The budget contains no appropriation for the courses for workers in industry.
