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

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NORTHWESTERN ICE YACHTING ASSOCIATION REGATTA

This weekend, January 26th thru 28th, Williams Bay will be the scene of one of the most thrilling sights in the country. Between fifty and seventy-five ice boats will be flashing back, and forth across the Bay, hiking at all angles; and out of this melee will come champions in four classes— A-B-C and E - of iceboats. The class winners will be decided by the "horse race system"; that is the winners will be picked by the best three out of five races.

The opening race will start at 2:00 P.M. Friday and thereafter the morning races will start at 9:30 and the afternoon races at 2:00 P.M.

The officials and judges have been named as follows: Ben Lampert of Oshkosh, Commodore of the Northwest Ice Yachting Association; and Lyman Dwight of Milwaukee will be officials: Judges will be Starcky Heyers, Arnold Meyers and Henry Meyers of Milwaukee:


