





Elite Company

Wisconsin, which became the first school in Big Ten history to capture back-to-back Rose Bowl wins (1999 and 2000), along with Miami, Fla. and Florida are the only schools in the nation that have won at least two Bowl Championship Series (BCS) games in its four-year history.

One of those BCS triumphs was a 38-31 win over UCLA in the 1999 Rose Bowl when Ron Dayne (below) was named game Most Valuable Player after rushing for 246 yards and four TDs. Dayne was twice named the Rose Bowl MVP during his career.



CAMP RANDALL STADIUM



Home of the Badgers

Camp Randall Stadium, built in 1917, is home for Wisconsin's football team. Distinguished by its double-deck structure and horseshoe design, Camp Randall Stadium is the nation's fourth-oldest, college-owned facility. It has a seating capacity of 76,634 which ranks among the top 15 largest school-run facilities in the nation.

During the Barry Alvarez era, the Badgers have been a formidable opponent at Camp Randall. Wisconsin is 47-25-3 at home under Alvarez' guidance, including undefeated home slates in the Rose Bowl seasons of 1993 and 1998.

Camp Randall houses the athletic department offices, lounges and study areas for student-athletes, as well as

video, training and weight rooms, the training table for team meals and a display of football memorabilia.

The stadium, which underwent an extensive utility and infrastructure renovation this year, is a cornerstone of the school's athletic complex. Located on the same block are the McClain Athletic Facility and the Wisconsin Field House.



Renovations at Camp Randall

The University of Wisconsin Department of Athletics has developed extensive plans to renovate historic Camp Randall Stadium. Plans to improve the 85-year old facility focus largely on making gameday a more enjoyable experience for the spectators.

The renovation has been delayed one season while fundraising efforts, endorsed by UW-Madison Chancellor John Wiley, continue to proceed.

The \$99.8 million renovation project, when completed, will include:

- addition of more than 8,000 permanent seats;
- creation of new and wider concourses and the addition of elevators to provide safe and convenient fan access;
- renovation of old (and the addition of new) restrooms throughout the facility;
- addition of larger and more conveniently located concession stands;
- installation of two video replay boards plus improved sound and lighting systems;
- addition of private suite and club level seating areas on the east side of the stadium;

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility (right) is the Badgers' indoor training site. Constructed in 1988, the facility features a 90-yard artificial turf field. The football team's locker room, training headquarters, strength and conditioning center and academic facilities are all located in the basement of the building. The facility was named for former Head Coach Dave McClain, who died tragically in the spring of 1986.

- construction of a new ticket office with convenient on-site parking;
- development of a consolidated office building for athletic department staff;
- expansion of accessible facilities for disabled fans and visitors.


Separate from the above amenity improvement was a \$10 million refurbishing project for the stadium's infrastructure which was completed over the summer. Improvements were made in the electrical, plumbing and chilled water services at Camp Randall. The plan is to debut the renovated facility in 2004.



COMMUNITY SERVICE

Badgers giving back

GOOD WORKS



Martin continued his charitable support as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles where he won the team's 2000 Ed Block Courage Award.

He also was named an "Unsung Hero" by the NFL Players' Association and was featured on the Fox Sports All-Madden Team as one of the National Football League's "good guys."



HEALTH CARE



The Wisconsin sports medicine program features top-rate facilities and the outstanding services of many sports and health care professionals.

The sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff utilizes Cybex strength-testing devices, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW-Madison is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine,

enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries.

Athletic trainers and physicians design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A variety of facilities and equipment, including a swimming pool, Cybex equipment, an Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize loss of fitness during recuperative time.

The University of Wisconsin Department of Athletics also has a sports nutritionist dedicated to ensuring that student-athletes meet their dietary and nutritional needs. The Wisconsin football team has its own training table in the McClain Athletic Facility for post-practice meals. The training table is operational during both spring camp and throughout the regular season.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT



The Fetzer Academic Learning Center is a \$1.6 million facility dedicated to giving student-athletes the best in academic support. Funded by a generous contribution from UW alumnus Wade Fetzer, the facility is located in the lower level of the McClain Athletic Center.

The primary objective of the student affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes.

The academic and student affairs staff assists the Badgers' 700 student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitoring progress toward degrees and career guidance.


Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group tutoring.

The department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and sponsors an annual career fair.

A recent addition to help student-athletes reach their academic aims is the \$1.6 million Fetzer Academic Center, which opened in 1997. Located in the McClain Facility, it houses the academic support staff and features a computer lab, classrooms, study carrels and an auditorium.

The UW-Madison encourages student-athletes to transfer the lessons learned on the playing field to their daily lives. Wisconsin is dedicated to providing its student-athletes with excellent teaching, facilities, support programs, academic tutoring programs and career guidance to help them reach their full potential as students.

- **Troy Vincent:** led Big Ten in punt returns; owns the longest punt return (90) in school history.









BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL



TV Exposure

When Big Ten fans aren't packing stadiums, they're watching the most comprehensive college football package on television. A partnership with ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPN Regional will allow the Big Ten to televise a record number of games again this fall. More than 90 percent of all Big Ten games will be shown on live TV in 2002, making the Big Ten the most-watched conference in the nation.

Attendance Leader

College football fans flock to Big Ten Conference campuses each fall to watch the nation's premiere teams. At Wisconsin, the crowds at Camp Randall Stadium number nearly 78,000 each week. The Big Ten leads the nation in college football attendance year after year and routinely draws more than four million fans to games on its campuses. The Big Ten has led the nation in attendance every year since the NCAA began keeping records in 1949, a string of 54 consecutive seasons.



Big Ten Bowl Games For the 2002 Season

The Big Ten boasts one of the deepest college bowl lineups in the nation. The Big Ten is one of six conferences with an automatic berth into the Bowl Championship Series (BCS), which was established four years ago to determine a national champ. The Big Ten also has seven other bowl bids guaranteed for member schools each year.

"The Big Ten's association with our bowl partners stabilizes the Conference's post-season future," says Commissioner James Delaney. "They also provide fans with terrific bowl destinations and games with quality opponents."

After the hosting college football's national championship game last season, the Rose Bowl will again feature the champions of the Big Ten and Pac-10 Conferences this year.

Playing Football at Wisconsin Means Playing in the National Spotlight

Combine the consistent success of the Badger football program during the Barry Alvarez era with the fact that Wisconsin plays in the conference with the most far-reaching television contract in the nation and you have a recipe for maximum team and individual exposure.

Over the past four seasons, 90 percent of the Badgers' games have been televised live. Seventy-three percent of those contests were aired on national or split-national telecasts. Wisconsin has appeared on ABC, CBS, ESPN, ESPN2, Fox and ESPN Regional in the past four seasons.

The Big Ten Conference, of course, is comprised of schools that reach into some of the nation's largest media markets, including New York, Philadelphia,

Chicago, Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Pittsburgh. Since 1990 the average number of games televised per season has nearly tripled and attendance has grown by 18 percent.


The state of Wisconsin is "football-crazy" and the Badgers are at the top of everyone's priority list each Saturday during the fall. It is not uncommon to have representation from 20-25 newspapers, 10-12 television stations and 15-20 radio stations – all from Wisconsin – in attendance at Badger home games. Every home game also is televised on a tape-delayed basis by Wisconsin Public Television.

The Wisconsin Radio Network consists of more than 40 stations around the state that broadcast Badger games live to a statewide audience and over the internet. The "Voice of the Badgers," Matt Lepay, is recognized as one of the best in the business.


Over the past four seasons, Wisconsin has appeared on live television in 90 percent of its games. The breakdown follows:

2002 OUTLOOK



SEASON OUTLOOK

The chances of 13th-year Wisconsin head coach Barry Alvarez leading the Badgers back to their customary spot in the upper half of the Big Ten in 2002 appear to be very good.

A year ago, a young Wisconsin club registered a 5-7 overall mark (3-5 in the Big Ten) after playing against a schedule ranked ninth-toughest in the nation. Six of the Badgers' seven losses were by an average of less than eight points per game.

Alvarez and his staff will have the services of 47 returning letterwinners and 11 returning starters as they begin fall workouts. Among those players are a veteran quarterback, who will be guiding an experienced and potentially explosive offense; a relatively youthful, but talented, defense that features numerous young players who gained valuable game experience a year ago; and special teams units intent on continuing to improve and become more consistent.

Wisconsin also will have available several newcomers capable of making an immediate impact once fall practice begins.



Following is a position-by-position look at the 2002 Badgers as they head into the fall.

Quarterback

There is no substitute for experience and that is just what the Badgers will have at quarterback in 2002. Wisconsin has the luxury of two 1,000-yard passers from last season in senior starter Brooks Bollinger and junior backup Jim Sorgi.

Bollinger returns for his final season sporting a 22-7 career mark as a starter. Bollinger, who is among the top seven on nine different Wisconsin career lists, endured an injury-plagued junior year. He missed all of three games and parts of two others, but is healthy now and primed to become just the third 5,000-yard passer in school history, while building upon the UW quarterback career rushing mark he set last season.

Set to appear in relief of Bollinger, if necessary, is Sorgi, who has proven time and again that he is one of the most capable No. 2 signal callers in the country. Sorgi appeared behind center in eight games, including starts against Oregon, Fresno State and Michigan State, and threw for 1,096 yards and nine touchdowns.

Sophomore Matt Schabert has played in only one game during his brief career, but he was ready when called upon. Schabert came off the bench in the third quarter of last year's Michigan State game and completed 10-18 passes for 177 yards and two touchdowns in relief of Bollinger and Sorgi, who both were injured.

Owen Daniels and Devin Hollins both redshirted as true freshmen last season.

Running Backs

There was speculation at the start of last year that Wisconsin's streak of consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher might end at eight, but that proved to be far from reality. Anthony Davis saw to that.

Davis, a redshirt freshman in 2001, led the Big Ten and finished fifth nationally with 1,466 yards (133.3 per game). A Doak Walker Award semifinalist, Davis broke Tony Dorsett's NCAA record for 100-yard rushing performances by a freshman with 10. For his efforts, he was voted Big Ten Freshman of the Year and was a consensus first-team all-conference choice.

Finding depth behind Davis is an objective for the Badgers. Sophomore Jerone Pettus (255 yards rushing) saw

limited action in 2001, but is expected to see increased playing time this season. Behind those two are several redshirt and true freshmen who will be vying for playing time.

Fullbacks

Chad Kuhns provided the Badgers with steady and consistent play at fullback for the past three seasons, so his departure leaves a hole to fill.

One of the surprises of last spring's workouts was the play of senior Erik Bickerstaff, who earned his way to the No. 1 spot by breaking a number of long runs. Fellow senior Russ Kuhns (Chad's younger brother) and freshman Matt Bernstein, both of whom sustained spring practice injuries that hampered their progress, will be ready to go by the fall.

Wide Receivers

Everyone in the Wisconsin football program breathed a sigh of relief when flanker Lee Evans announced in January that he would be returning for his senior year.


Three months later, however, Badger followers were stunned when Evans injured his left knee while making a catch in the spring game. Though his status for the fall remains unknown, there is little

question that a healthy Evans is among the nation's top players.

All Evans did in 2001 was become one of three finalists for the Fred Biletnikoff Award, break the Big Ten single-season record for receiving yards (1,545), earn All-America and consensus first-team All-Big Ten honors and elevate himself into one of college football's most dangerous offensive threats. Already Wisconsin's career leader in receiving

yards (2,255), Evans stands a reasonable chance of approaching the top of the Big Ten's all-time list in that category. He needs 1,055 yards to surpass conference career leader D'Wayne Bates of Northwestern.

Though split end Nick Davis has departed, the Badgers have a host of talented, young pass-catchers to complement Evans. Foremost among them is sophomore split end Darrin Charles, whose 6-6, 205-pound frame makes for an inviting target. Charles caught 14 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns as a true freshman last season and enjoyed an outstanding performance in the spring game.

Senior David Braun and junior Byron Brown have game experience, while sophomore Travann Hayes and redshirt freshmen Jonathan Orr, DeAndre Kemp and Donte Sanders all will look to get into the mix.

Offensive Line

Wisconsin's skill-position players will have a solid, veteran line behind which to operate. The Badgers' starters at center, both guards and both tackles all return from last season, prompting *The Sporting News* to rate Wisconsin's offensive line as the No. 2 unit in the nation as fall workouts approach.

Senior Al Johnson, rated by *The Sporting News* as the nation's top center heading into the 2002 campaign, returns for his final season after earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten honors in 2001. He missed the second half of the Indiana game due to injury, but did not miss another play during any other game.

Sophomore left guard Dan Buenning earned fourth-team freshman All-America kudos from *The Sporting News* after starting all 12 games and missing only 13 plays (all in the season opener) the entire season.

Senior left tackle Ben Johnson, Al's cousin, was a consensus second-team All-Big Ten selection in 2001. He started all 12 games and missed just one snap the entire season.

On Al Johnson's right, guards Jonathan Clinkscale and Kalvin Barrett each started six games as redshirt freshmen. Clinkscale also filled in at center for Johnson in the second half of the Indiana game.

Senior Jason Jowers started all 12 games at right tackle, missing just nine snaps in the process.

Tight End

All-Big Ten tight end Mark Anelli is gone and with him go 35 catches for 357 yards and three touchdowns in 2001. Though no current Badger tight end has caught a pass in college, the next generation is a good-looking unit. The group will be tutored by first-year coach Paul Chryst.

Bob Docherty played in all 12 games (as a true freshman) as a backup to Anelli and started twice in two-tight end formations. Fellow sophomore Tony Paciotti had been Anelli's primary backup until a shoulder injury at midseason.

Junior Rob Tucker, sophomore Mark Bell, redshirt freshman Jason Pociask and junior Matt Mialik also will look to get in the mix.

Defensive Line


Though Wisconsin lost starters Wendell Bryant (a first-team All-American and first-round NFL draft choice), Ben Herbert and Chuck Smith to graduation, the Badgers should still be able to field a more experienced and solid defensive line than the aforementioned departures might suggest.

Sophomore Darius Jones, who redshirted with a hand injury last season, will be joined at right end by sophomore Jonathan Welsh, who appeared in nine games as a freshman in 2001.

Jason Jefferson, a sophomore who played in two games in 2001, will battle for the right tackle spot with junior Nick Cochard, who appeared in all 12 games a year ago, and redshirt freshmen Lyle Maiava and Jeff Lang.

The left tackle spot will be manned by up-and-coming sophomore Anttaj Hawthorne, who started three of the final four games in 2001 as a true freshman. Joining Hawthorne at that position will be junior Jesse Mayfield (three games played last season), along with redshirt freshman Mike Kleber and junior Matt Gajda.

At the other end of the line, senior Jake Sprague returns for his final campaign. Sprague, who redshirted last season, played in the Rose Bowl as a freshman and gives the Badgers a solid, experienced presence up front. Sprague will battle for the starting spot with junior Erasmus James (his six QB sacks last season were second on the team behind Bryant). Sophomore Traison Lewis and freshman Tim Ovadal also are in the mix.

Linebacker

Wisconsin will need to do some rebuilding at the linebacker positions. The three players who started five of the last six games in 2001 were seniors, including national tackles leader Nick Greisen.

The Badgers will not be totally devoid of experience, however. Junior Jeff Mack will move back inside after starting eight games at OLB and making 34 tackles last season before a back injury sidelined him for the remainder of the campaign. Redshirt freshmen Greg Root and John Gillen will compete for the backup spot behind Mack. Sophomore Howard Boye-Doe, who saw action in seven games a year ago (primarily on special teams) also is in the mix.

The other inside linebacker spot is slated to be manned by junior Broderick Williams, a converted running back who enjoyed a good spring at his new position. Williams will be joined at that spot by junior transfer Kyle McCarrison and sophomore Tom Jonjak. The Badgers have a number of talented recruits coming in at the linebacker spot, including junior college transfer Alex Lewis.

Sophomore Kareem Timbers, who saw action in eight games in 2001, will move to outside linebacker to better take advantage of his abilities. Sophomore Chris Catalano, who saw limited playing time a year ago, will join Timbers at OLB, as will converted defensive back Ryan Simmons.

Defensive Backs

Wisconsin's defensive backfield lost All-Big Ten cornerback Mike Echols and a solid free safety in Joey Boese, but the Badgers do return two starters as well as a number of talented young players who got valuable experience a year ago.

Sophomore Scott Starks will start at one corner after starting the last 10 games of the 2001 campaign as a true freshman. He had a team high-tying three interceptions, was second in pass breakups with 10 and finished sixth on the team in tackles with 64. Sophomore Chuckie Cowans and redshirt freshman Johnny Sylvain also will vie for playing time.

Senior B.J. Tucker, who has starting experience, will man the other cornerback spot. Tucker enjoyed solid spring workouts and also finished second in the 100-meters at the Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Tucker will be joined by sophomore Brett Bell at that position. Bell played in 11 games as a freshman.

Junior Ryan Aiello, who made nine tackles a year ago, played well enough in the spring to earn the No. 1 free safety spot heading into fall workouts. Sophomore Robert Brooks, who made 21 tackles in 11 appearances as a true freshman on special teams and at nickel back last season, will compete for playing time with Aiello, as will sophomore Patrick Ellestad.

Junior Michael Broussard, the starter at strong safety for all of 2001, returns to that position in 2002. Broussard regis-

tered a team high-tying three interceptions a year ago. Sophomore Jim Leonhard, who played well on special teams last season, continued to progress in the spring and will look to challenge for playing time.

Special Teams

Special teams play will be an area of concentration for the Badgers, and Alvarez will look for the pieces to be in place for the club to improve in all areas of the special teams.

Sophomore punter R.J. Morse displayed a strong leg as a true freshman, compiling a 41.6-yards-per-punt average on 28 attempts. He had six punts of 50 yards or longer. Junior Kirk Munden averaged 39.7 yards per punt and took over when Morse was injured for five games. That pair will battle for the starting spot.

Wisconsin used three different kickers throughout much of the season and the Badgers will be looking for more consistency at this position. Sophomores Mike Allen, who booted a 50-yard field goal against Fresno State last season, and Adam Espinoza return and will be joined in the fall by junior college All-American Scott Campbell in competition for that position.

The loss of return specialist Nick Davis is significant. He eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark in both career punt and kick return yards. The race to replace Davis is open heading into fall workouts.



PRESEASON NOTES

Wisconsin returns a finalist (Lee Evans) and semifinalist (Anthony Davis) from two of college football's major individual awards. Evans was one of three finalists for the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver. Davis was one of eight semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award, given to the nation's top running back.

The UW last season became the first team in Big Ten history to have two 1,000-yard passers (Brooks Bollinger and Jim Sorgi), a 1,000-yard rusher (Anthony Davis) and a 1,000-yard receiver (Lee Evans). All four of those players are back for 2002.

The Badgers return their entire offensive line (from tackle to tackle) from last season. That includes standout center Al Johnson (honorable mention All-Big Ten) and his cousin, Ben, a second-team All-Big Ten selection from a year ago.

Wisconsin last season had a 1,000-yard rusher (Anthony Davis) for the ninth consecutive season, a Big Ten record. In Division I college football history, only North Carolina (12 from 1973-84) and Southern California (10 from 1972-81) have had as many consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher as Wisconsin currently has going.

The Badgers have three new coaches on their staff. Paul Chryst, formerly the tight ends coach for the San Diego Chargers, takes over as tight ends coach. Brian Murphy, a former administrative assistant with the program, will coach special teams and outside linebackers. Ron Cooper, the former head coach at Alabama A&M, is the new defensive backs coach.

The Badgers return 99 percent of their rushing yards, all of their passing yards and 70 percent of their receiving yards from last season.

Wisconsin's defense may be young, but it is more experienced than one might imagine given the loss of eight starters from a year ago. Eight returnees, in fact, have started at some point in their

careers. Among the returnees are defensive backs Scott Starks and Michael Broussard, who tied for the team lead in interceptions with three apiece.

Wisconsin is scheduled to play a school-record eight home games in 2002. The slate will kick off with the earliest game in school history, an August 23 matchup with Fresno State in the John Thompson Foundation Classic in Camp Randall Stadium. The UW also plays home games with West Virginia, Northern Illinois, Arizona, Penn State, Ohio State, Illinois and Minnesota.


The Badgers averaged 78,333 fans per game in 2001, the second-highest attendance average in school history behind the 2000 season's average of 78,711. Wisconsin fans purchased more than 62,000 season tickets for the 2001 season. That was a school record and is the fifth time in the past seven seasons that the Badgers have eclipsed the 60,000 mark for season tickets sold.

Wisconsin enters the 2002 season having won nine of its last 12 Big Ten road games. The UW will travel to Indiana, Michigan State, Iowa and Michigan this season.

Among Big Ten opponents, the Badgers will not face Purdue or Northwestern in 2002.

Wisconsin set a school record for passing yards last season with 2,556, eclipsing the old mark of 2,453 set in 1994. The quarterbacks primarily responsible for that figure (Brooks Bollinger and Jim Sorgi) are both back in 2002.

In Anthony Davis (1,466 yards) and Lee Evans (1,545), the Badgers return both the Big Ten's leading rusher and receiver from last season. In addition, quarterback Brooks Bollinger gives the Badgers a dual threat as he ranks fifth in school history in passing yards (3,869) and first all-time in rushing yards (1,301) among signalcallers.

HEAD COACH BARRY ALVAREZ

"I'm here to tell you that I've made the decision to stay at the University of Wisconsin and finish my career."


With those words on Feb. 2, 2001, Barry Alvarez, the winningest coach in Wisconsin history, told Badger partisans, recruits and current players that he will be the UW coach until he hangs up his whistle.

Any early retirement talk can also be shelved for awhile. "My staff and I have put in over a decade of work building a program that we think is well run and on solid ground," Alvarez said. "I'm excited and energized to continue building this program."

The program that Alvarez wants to continue to build is one that has enjoyed remarkable success. In 12 years as the head coach at formerly downtrodden Wisconsin, the 55-year-old Alvarez has built a program that is one of the nation's elite.

When sizing up Alvarez' coaching career, it's easy to get overwhelmed with statistical evidence. Simply, he has restored a proud tradition at Wisconsin, built a fan base that is legendary, won many games and done so in a first-class manner. Consider some of these Alvarez superlatives:

- winningest coach in school history.
- his teams have won at least a share of three Big Ten titles since '93.
- coached the four winningest teams in the modern era at Wisconsin.
- is one of only two coaches to have won more than one Bowl Championship Series game.



- won back-to-back league titles in 1998 and 1999. Wisconsin hadn't done that since 1896-97.

- coached winners of five — Heisman Trophy, Doak Walker Award, Maxwell Award (all by Ron Dayne), Jim Thorpe Award (Jamar Fletcher) and the Ray Guy Award (Kevin Stemke) — national awards.

Alvarez, who grew up in the mining areas of western Pennsylvania, made a steady climb in the high school coaching ranks before getting his college start from former Iowa Coach Hayden Fry. He got Alvarez to join his Hawkeye staff in 1979, one year after Alvarez' Mason City (Iowa) High School team won a state championship. The Hawkeyes played in six bowls during Alvarez' eight years in Iowa City. His star player with the Hawkeyes was Larry Station, the school's career tackle leader and an All-American on the field and in the classroom.

Then-Notre Dame Coach Lou Holtz hired him from Iowa and during Alvarez' three years there, he was promoted — linebackers coach, defensive coordinator and assistant head coach — every season. Notre Dame was 32-5 while Alvarez was there and won the 1988 national championship.

Four of Alvarez' Fighting Irish linebackers earned All-America praise, including consensus choice Michael Stonebreaker in 1988.

Alvarez said his college coach, the legendary Bob Devaney, urged him to set a timetable for becoming a head coach by the time he turned 42. Alvarez was hired at UW on Jan. 2, 1990, one day after the Fighting Irish defeated Colorado in the Orange Bowl. His 42nd birthday was three days earlier.


The successes of Alvarez' teams have confirmed his status as one of the elite coaches in football. Seemingly every year, suitors have called the football office to see if Alvarez wanted to take on another rebuilding effort. Alvarez has answered those inquiries. "This (Wisconsin) is my program, and I think I've got my stamp on it," Alvarez said. In other words, he'll continue to build Badger football.

The Book on Barry

- Barry Alvarez is one of only two coaches in collegiate history to win more than one Bowl Championship Series game. Alvarez is 2-0, and former Florida coach Steve Spurrier is 2-1. Mike Bellotti (Oregon), Bobby Bowden (Florida State), Lloyd Carr (Michigan), Larry Coker (Miami), John Cooper (former Ohio State), Butch Davis (former Miami, Fla.), Dennis Erickson (Oregon State), Phillip Fulmer (Tennessee), Rick Neuheisel (Washington), Nick Saban (LSU), Frank Solich (Nebraska) and Bob Stoops (Oklahoma) all have one BCS game victory.

- He led the Badgers to the three winningest seasons (11 in 1998, 10 in 1993 and 10 in 1999) in Wisconsin history.

- Barry coached winners of national player of the year awards by the Associated Press, Walter Camp and *The Sporting News* (Ron Dayne) and recipients of the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Doak Walker Award (Dayne), Jim Thorpe Award (Jamar Fletcher) and Ray Guy Award (Kevin Stemke).

- Alvarez is the only coach in Big Ten history to win the Rose Bowl in back-to-back years.
- He coached Wisconsin to consecutive league championships (1998-99), something that hadn't been accomplished in Madison for more than 100 years.
- Barry became the winningest coach in Wisconsin history with a 40-10 rout of 11th-ranked Michigan State in 1999.
- Alvarez renewed spirit in a program that has attracted nearly five million fans to Camp Randall Stadium during his 12-year tenure and sold more than 50,000 season tickets eight years in succession.
- He joined Ohio State's Woody Hayes as the only coaches in Big Ten history to win at least three Rose Bowls. Alvarez' Wisconsin clubs have captured three in the past nine years. Hayes' Buckeyes won four Rose Bowls over a span of 20 years.
- Alvarez owns a 6-1 career bowl record, including a perfect 3-0 mark at the Rose Bowl. Alvarez' career winning percentage in bowls (.857) is tied for second-best all-time (with Frank Kush, Gene Stallings and Warren Woodson) for coaches with a minimum of seven bowls.
- Barry built a fan base so large, that Wisconsin has played before crowds of at least 70,000 in Camp Randall Stadium 54 games in a row.
- Alvarez led the UW to seven bowls in eight seasons after the school qualified for only six bowls in the previous 103 years.




Alvarez' Wisconsin Teams

2001: (5-7): Several individual achievements highlighted a season in which the Badgers never won or lost more than two straight games. WR Lee Evans set the Big Ten record for receiving yards in a season with 1,545 and RB Anthony Davis led the conference in rushing and gave the UW a 1,000-yard rusher for a Big Ten-record ninth consecutive season. Evans and Davis were All-Americans and six Badgers earned first-team All-Big Ten acclaim, including DL Wendell Bryant who became a first-round NFL draft choice. The Badgers lost by a field goal to both Oregon and Michigan.

2000 (9-4): A five-game winning streak to end the season highlighted the Sun Bowl champions' 9-4 season. Fighting injuries and suspensions, the Badgers had a difficult time getting consistency in the early part of the league season. Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe Award) and Kevin Stemke (inaugural Ray Guy Award) allowed UW to be the only school in the nation with two different players winning major awards.

1999 (10-2): A 17-9 win over Stanford in the Rose Bowl allowed Wisconsin to become the first Big Ten school in history to win the "Granddaddy of Them All" in back-to-back campaigns. The 10-2 Badgers finished fourth in both the media and coaches final polls. Wisconsin defeated five nationally rated foes for the first time in school history and concluded the year with eight consecutive victories. The Badgers led the Big Ten in both scoring offense and scoring defense. Ron Dayne became the NCAA's all-time leading rusher and then walked away with the Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Doak Walker Award. Chris McIntosh (Outland Trophy) and Vitaly Pisetsky (Mosi Tatupu and Lou Groza Awards) were major award finalists. Alvarez was forced to coach from the press box or hospital in eight games after a mid-season knee surgery.

1998 (11-1): The winningest season (11-1) in school history ended in dramatic fashion with a thrilling 38-31 upset of sixth-ranked UCLA at the Rose Bowl. Ron Dayne keyed the win with 246 yards rushing. Wisconsin led the nation in scoring defense and turnover margin. The Badgers' nine-game win streak to open the season tied a school record. Tom



Burke (NCAA sack leader) and Aaron Gibson (a finalist for the Lombardi Award and the Outland Trophy) were consensus All-Americans. Alvarez was Big Ten Coach of the Year.

1997 (8-5): A six-game winning streak catapulted the Badgers to a second consecutive eight-win season and berth in the Outback Bowl vs. Georgia. The Badgers joined the '37 Michigan team as the only squads in league history to win three one-point decisions. Ron Dayne earned first-team All-America honors and Matt Davenport won two games with last-second field goals.

1996 (8-5): The Badgers opened quickly with a 3-0 non-league slate before losing

four games (three by a combined total of 10 points) to highly ranked foes. The UW closed 4-1 and posted a 38-10 win over Utah in the Copper Bowl. Ron Dayne set an NCAA freshman rushing record and had 2,109 yards, including the bowl win.

1995 (4-5-2): With the most inexperienced squad in the Big Ten and facing the nation's most difficult schedule (according to the *Seattle Times*), the Badgers posted a 4-5-2 mark. Darrell Bevell broke many passing records at the UW. The 17-9 upset at Penn State broke the NCAA's longest win streak (20 games).

1994 (8-3-1): Wisconsin won its second straight January bowl game by defeating Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl. The regular season featured a win at Michigan for the first time since 1962. Center Cory Raymer was a consensus All-American. Seven players were drafted by the NFL.

1993 (10-1-1): The 10-1-1 Badgers were Big Ten co-champions, beat UCLA in the Rose Bowl and were ranked as high as fifth (coaches) in the final polls. The UW had the NCAA's largest attendance increase, and its .875 winning percentage was the best by a Big Ten team since '79. A school-record eight players were named first-team All-Big Ten. Brent Moss was the Badgers' first Big Ten MVP since 1962.

1992 (5-6): The UW was 5-6 and climbed in the Big Ten standings for the third season in a row. The Badgers upset 12th-ranked Ohio State, the first win over a nationally rated foe in eight years. Wisconsin received votes in the national polls for the first time in Alvarez' career and ended the year one victory short of a bowl bid. Three of the losses were by a total of four points.

1991 (5-6): Wisconsin improved its win total by four games, the fourth-largest improvement in the NCAA. Troy Vincent was an All-American, runner-up for the Jim Thorpe Award and the No. 7 pick in the NFL draft. A victory at Minnesota broke a 23-game road losing streak.

1990 (1-10): Wisconsin was within striking distance entering the fourth quarter in 10 games, although its only victory was over Ball State. UW had the third-best attendance gain nationally.


BCS Perfection

Since the format was instituted, the Badgers are one of only three schools in the nation with more than one BCS game victory.

spring of 2000. "I thought it was a small way for me to say thanks to the UW-Madison," Alvarez said of his quarter-million dollar contribution to the school's foundation.

- Alvarez set a goal to become a collegiate head coach by his 42nd birthday and was named to the Wisconsin post three days after he turned 42.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic Director. In that role, he serves on the department's policy-making management team.

Alvarez grew up in a small mining town (Burgettstown) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirate outfielder Roberto Clemente.

Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.

Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer

Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.

- He was the leading tackler among linebackers on Nebraska's 1967 squad, which led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award. He was one of 18 coaches named to new positions in 1990 and just two (Alvarez and Ron McBride) are still at the schools which hired them.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. One of the staffs Alvarez was a member of featured six men who went on to lead their own college programs, including: Alvarez; Kirk Ferentz, Iowa; Dan McCarney, Iowa State; Del Miller, former SW Missouri State; Don Patterson, Western Illinois; Bill Snyder, Kansas State.
- Alvarez was named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by *Hispanic Business* in that magazine's October 2001 issue.





BRIAN WHITE

Offensive Coordinator & Running Backs

Fourth-year offensive coordinator Brian White continues his ascent to the elite level of college football coaches. The enthusiastic White, who has coached UW running backs since 1995, continues to make his mark both on the field and the recruiting trail.

In three years directing the offense and calling the plays, the former college quarterback has begun to leave his imprint on the Badger program.

In his rookie season at the controls of the offense (1999), the Badgers set a school scoring record and finished 10th nationally in that category. In 2000, first-year starter Michael Bennett was the NCAA's third-leading rusher, but the team also had a school-record six 200-yard passing games.

Last season Anthony Davis was the nation's fifth-leading rusher and Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Lee Evans set the Big Ten record for receiving yards in a season (1,545) and quarterbacks Brooks Bollinger and Jim Sorgi each threw for more than 1,000 yards.

As backfield coach, White has helped the Badgers produce a 1,000-yard rusher in each of his seven seasons at the school. The UW has led the Big Ten in rushing three times (1996, 1998 and 1999) with White on staff.

White's star pupil, of course, is 1999 Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne. White was a driving force in Dayne's march toward the NCAA Division I-A career rushing mark.

One of college football's top recruiters, the personable White is credited with opening doors in Texas and California for the Badgers. White has signed a number of top prospects from talent-rich California in the last four seasons.

Prior to Wisconsin, White worked for Jeff Horton (now the Badger quarterbacks






coach) at UNLV and Nevada. Randy Gatewood, one of White's wide receivers at UNLV, caught 23 passes (for 363 yards) in one game. QB Chris Vargas was second nationally in total offense while White was at Nevada.

As a graduate assistant for Lou Holtz at Notre Dame, White helped tutor running backs (1988-89) and worked with Jerome Bettis and Reggie Brooks.

The former Harvard quarterback (school's No. 2 career passer) earned his B.A. in 1986, an M.A. from Fordham in 1988 and an M.B.A. from Notre Dame in 1990.

Brian and his wife, Salli, have a daughter, Cassi, and a son, Jackson.

PAUL CHRYST

Tight Ends

Paul Chryst, a three-time letterwinner for the Badgers from 1986-88, enters his first season as tight ends coach for the University of Wisconsin football team.

Chryst comes to the Badgers after serving the past three seasons as tight ends coach for the NFL's San Diego Chargers.

"It's great to bring a former Badger back to the program," head coach Barry Alvarez said. "We are very fortunate to be able to add Paul to our staff. He brings a wealth of knowledge, along with fresh ideas, as a former coordinator and as an assistant in the NFL. I will assign him to be our in-state recruiting coordinator where he will be a natural."

Chryst was instrumental in the development of San Diego's Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends. Jones was San Diego's offensive player of the year in 2000 after leading the team with 71 receptions for 766 yards and five touchdowns.

Chryst went to San Diego after two seasons (1997-98) as offensive coordinator at Oregon State. He spent the 1996 campaign as offensive coordinator for the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League and was in the same position at Illinois State in 1995. He was an assistant with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the CFL in 1994 and was offensive coordinator at UW-Platteville in 1993. Chryst was with the World League's San Antonio Riders from 1991-92, coaching wide receivers and tight ends in '91 and running backs and tight ends in '92. He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at West Virginia.

A native of Madison, Chryst earned letters in football, basketball, baseball and track at Platteville High School and was an all-state quarterback on Platteville's 1983 state championship team. Chryst went on to earn three football letters and a bachelor's degree (1988) in political sci-





JEFF HORTON

Quarterbacks

Jeff Horton's reputation as a first-rate developer of quarterbacks continues to flourish. His three-year term as quarterbacks coach at Wisconsin has produced some significant successes.

In his rookie season at UW, Horton had to replace two-year starter Mike Samuel at the controls. He supervised the development of freshman Brooks Bollinger, who started his first game in front of more than 90,000 fans in historic Ohio Stadium and guided the club to a Rose Bowl championship win. Bollinger, 19 years old at the time, was the league's freshman of the year and finished second in the league in pass efficiency.

In 2000, Bollinger had another solid campaign but injuries took him out of games for extensive periods of time. Once again, Horton turned to a freshman. Jim Sorgi came off the bench three times with games hanging in the balance and turned two of those opportunities into road victories. Sorgi posted a pass efficiency rating (164.4) that would have ranked second nationally if he had more attempts.

Last season, with Bollinger again battling injuries and Sorgi stepping in when necessary, both quarterbacks threw for more than 1,000 yards and combined for a school-record eight 200-yard performances.

Horton, the former head coach at both Nevada and UNLV, earned his reputation for quarterback development at both of those stops. Chris Vargas, his signalcaller with the Wolf Pack, finished second nationally in total offense in 1993 and Jon Denton threw for more than 7,000 yards and broke 10 NCAA records in two seasons at UNLV.

Horton's head coaching experience included five years at UNLV (1994-98) and one season at Nevada (1993). Horton





JIM HUEBER

Offensive Line

Sometimes a college football program becomes known for producing star performers at a specific position. The case can be made that Wisconsin develops as many top-flight offensive linemen as any program in the nation.

Jim Hueber has coached Badger linemen for seven seasons, and he is the coach responsible for helping build the reputation of Wisconsin's strong line play.

Hueber, entering his 11th year at Wisconsin and his 19th in the Big Ten (he coached for eight years at Minnesota), has worked with 11 offenses which ranked in the top 25 nationally in rushing. Six of the offenses he's coached led the Big Ten in rushing offense, including three of the last six at Wisconsin.

Hueber's lines have paved the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in nine straight seasons. That's a Big Ten record.

A year ago, running back Anthony Davis was the nation's fifth-leading rusher and was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year, thanks in no small part to Hueber's line that included the Johnson cousins (Al and Ben), who both earned all-conference mention, as well as guard Dan Buenning, a fourth-team freshman All-American according to *The Sporting News*.

The 2000 Badgers broke in a new tailback and fought a lot of lineup inconsistencies, but Michael Bennett finished third nationally in rushing. Three of Hueber's seniors (Casey Rabach, Bill Ferrario and Dave Costa) earned pro contracts.

His 1999 line helped Ron Dayne become college football's career rushing leader. Among Hueber's blockers was Chris McIntosh, the league's 1999 Offensive Lineman of the Year and a finalist for the Outland Trophy.

One of his other former pupils was Aaron Gibson, a finalist for the Lombardi Award and the Outland Trophy. Gibson,






like McIntosh, was a consensus All-American and first-round NFL draft pick. Twenty-five of Hueber's former players have made NFL rosters.

Hueber also coached running backs for three seasons (1992-94) at UW. He tutored Big Ten MVP Brent Moss and

Terrell Fletcher in 1993 when that duo combined for 2,633 yards.

HENRY MASON

Wide Receivers

In seven seasons at Wisconsin, Henry Mason has quietly built a reputation for developing and bringing major league talent to the UW-Madison campus.

The Badgers, especially during the Ron Dayne era, certainly ran the ball more than they passed.

That trend is starting to change a bit and part of the reason has been the outstanding play of the Wisconsin receivers. The Badger receiving corp started to make a name for itself when Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes formed one of the best tandems in college football. That duo ranks fourth (Simmons) and seventh (Hayes) in career yardage at Wisconsin.

The most-recent pair of star pass catchers at Wisconsin are a pair of Bedford, Ohio natives (Chris Chambers and Lee Evans) that Mason recruited.

Evans put together the greatest season ever by a Badger receiver in 2001 when he set the Big Ten record for receiving yards (1,545) in a season. A Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-Big Ten choice, Evans emerged as one of the nation's top offensive threats.

Chambers, the school's MVP in 2000, is one of only three Badgers (Al Toon and Evans are the others) in history to record more than 2,000 yards receiving. Chambers was picked by Miami in the second round of the 2001 NFL Draft.

Mason came to Wisconsin prior to the 1995 season after helping Western Michigan lead the Mid-American Conference in passing three times in four seasons.

His lone head coaching position was an impressive rebuilding effort at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record.

Mason served one year as an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and



KEVIN COSGROVE

Defensive Coordinator & Linebackers

One constant on defense during the Barry Alvarez era has been that an inside linebacker nearly always leads the club in tackles. Another constant during the Alvarez era has been that Kevin Cosgrove has led the linebacker contingent.

Cosgrove, the only remaining member of Alvarez' first coaching staff, has coached linebackers for 12 years. For the last eight years, Cosgrove has also coordinated the Wisconsin defense.

That's a defense that has been among the most fundamentally sound in college football and that continues to produce standout players.

A year ago the Badgers boasted the nation's leading tackler in linebacker Nick Greisen. Greisen joined cornerback Mike Echols and Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year Wendell Bryant as first-team All-Big Ten selections. Bryant, a Cosgrove recruit, was the 12th overall pick in the 2002 NFL Draft.

Wisconsin's 2000 stop troops boasted the winner of the Jim Thorpe Award (Jamar Fletcher) and Big Ten co-Defensive Lineman of the Year (Bryant). Fletcher was a Cosgrove recruit.

The Badger defense of 1999 was fifth nationally in scoring defense and boasted the Big Ten's top defense for scoring, total yards and pass efficiency. UW was second in rushing defense.

Cosgrove's 1998 defensive team finished among the top 10 nationally in all four major categories. The Badgers led the nation in scoring defense, surrendering just 10.2 ppg.

In 11 of his 12 years on staff, a Cosgrove-coached linebacker has topped the team in tackles. Three times Cosgrove's linebackers – Pete Monty in '96 and Nick Greisen in '00 and '01 – led the conference in tackles, too. Monty is the Badgers' No. 1 career tackler.



Cosgrove signed Jeff George (NFL's No. 1 draft pick), Moe Gardner (two-time All-American) and Darrick Brownlow (Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year).

RON COOPER

Defensive Backs

Ron Cooper, the head football coach at Alabama A&M for the last four seasons, joined the Wisconsin football staff last winter as an assistant coach in charge of defensive backs.

"I'm really looking forward to what Ron will add to our program," head coach Barry Alvarez said. "He has had proven results throughout his career. Our players will definitely benefit from his experience."

Cooper took over as head coach at Alabama A&M in 1998 and guided that team into the Division I-AA ranks (from its Division II status previously). He took the Bulldogs to the Eastern Division championship of the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in his third season. That 2000 club led the nation in rushing defense (39.7 ypg) and finished eighth in total defense (275.0 ypg). His four-year record at Alabama A&M was 22-23.

Prior to his stint at Alabama A&M, Cooper was head coach at Louisville from 1995-97. He directed the Cardinals to a 7-4 mark in his first year. Louisville forced more turnovers than any team in the country in 1995 and finished ninth nationally in scoring defense, 18th in total defense and 20th in rushing defense. Louisville was 5-6 the following season, but ranked No. 4 nationally in both total and rushing defense. In Cooper's three seasons at Louisville, the school had three All-Americans, two all-conference choices and a third-round NFL draft choice. His three-year mark at Louisville was 13-20.

Cooper's first head coaching position came at Eastern Michigan (1993-94) where he spent two seasons guiding that school to a 9-13 mark after it had won five total games in the three seasons prior to his arrival.

Before his move to Eastern Michigan, Cooper was linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Austin Peay (1985-86); defensive coordinator at Murray State (1987-88); linebackers coach at East Carolina (1989); defensive coordinator at UNLV (1990) and assistant head coach and secondary coach under Lou Holtz at Notre Dame (1991-92). Cooper helped coach the Irish's 1992 Sugar Bowl and



BRIAN MURPHY

Special Teams & Outside Linebackers

Brian Murphy, who has worked for the Wisconsin football program in five different capacities, is in his first season with the Badger coaching staff in a full-time role. Murphy will coordinate special teams and coach the outside linebackers.

"Brian has been involved in many different areas of this program during my tenure," said head coach Barry Alvarez. "I'm confident that he'll step into his new role as a full-time coach and meet the challenges like he has previously in his career. He is an enthusiastic and capable teacher who I'm excited to have join my staff."

Most recently, Murphy was an administrative assistant for the Badger football program. Prior to that appointment, Murphy was defensive line coach and strength and conditioning coordinator at Lehigh, his alma mater, for one year. He spent the 1998 season as defensive coordinator, linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for the University of San Diego.

Murphy also worked one season (1997) as a graduate assistant with the defensive backs at Baylor. He assisted former Badger defensive backs coach Mike Cassity with the Bears' secondary.

He helped Wisconsin assistant head coach John Palermo with the Badger defensive line as a graduate assistant in 1995 and 1996. The 1996 squad won the Copper Bowl. Murphy was a G.A. for Bill Callahan's offensive line in 1994 when UW played in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

Additionally, he helped direct Wisconsin's recruiting efforts in 1994 after Rob Ianello left for Arizona. Murphy's






JOHN PALERMO

Assistant Head Coach & Defensive Line

Building strong defenses is nothing new to assistant head coach and defensive line boss John Palermo.

During Notre Dame's rise to the top of the college football world in the late 1980s, Palermo and Badger coach Barry Alvarez devised the Fighting Irish defensive game plan.

Palermo is in his 12th year as an aide to Alvarez at Wisconsin, and the duo has, once again, built some fine defenses.

Palermo's latest prized pupil, Wendell Bryant, was the 12th pick overall (to Arizona) in the 2002 NFL Draft after being named the Big Ten's Defensive Lineman of the Year for the second consecutive campaign.

The 1998 Badger defenders ranked first nationally in scoring, fourth in rushing, fifth in total and seventh in pass efficiency defense. That defense was led by Tom Burke, the hard-charging defensive end tutored by Palermo. Burke led the nation and set a Big Ten record for quarterback sacks. Burke was Palermo's second All-America end at UW.

Palermo's first national honor recipient at UW was Tarek Saleh, who set many school sack and TFL marks and earned All-America praise in 1996.

Palermo has also been a strong recruiter at UW having drawn Saleh, Tennessee Titan Bobby Myers and prep All-American Anttaj Hawthorne to the UW from Connecticut.

As assistant head coach, Palermo had to step in for Alvarez at Minnesota in 2000 to serve as head coach. Alvarez was out after knee surgery and Palermo helped the Badgers to a 20-17 overtime victory.

Palermo's time at Wisconsin has been split between coaching outside linebackers (1991-94) and the defensive line (1995-present). Before his appointment


John Chadima, who has worked for the Wisconsin Department of Athletics since 1990, was named an Assistant AD / Director of Football Operations in 2001.

The 1988 Iowa graduate (B.S. degree in athletic administration) is single.




Scott Kavanagh

Kavanagh is a native of Naperville, Ill.




Spence Nowinsky

Nowinsky attended D.C. Everest High School and was an all-state linebacker for the '89 state champs.




Jeremy Sinz





Pat Richter, the dean of Big Ten Directors of Athletics, begins his 14th year heading the athletic department at his alma mater.

The former all-star student-athlete, not only rescued the Badger athletic department in the early 1990s, but has also charted a plan for a prosperous future in the new millennium.

When Richter accepted then-Chancellor Donna Shalala's offer to run the division in 1989, he inherited a \$2.1 million debt, a downtrodden program on the field, subpar facilities and deteriorating fan support.

During his administration, the Badgers have eliminated the red ink on the financial ledgers, won on the playing field, built new facilities, added three new women's sports and made it fashionable to "be a Badger."

The cumulative effect of Richter's efforts are appreciated in a recent survey conducted by *The Sporting News* which ranked the Badgers as the 10th-best program in the nation.

Every program has flourished during his administration. Some of the highlights include:

- the football team, which has three Big Ten titles, six bowls and filled Camp Randall Stadium for the past 10 years.

- the men's basketball team, which has played in six NCAA tourneys and three NITs, produced the two winningest teams in school history and last season won the UW's first Big Ten title since 1947.

- the women's hoops team, which has played in five NCAA tournaments and three NITs.

- the volleyball team, which has won back-to-back Big Ten titles (2000-01) and has recorded nine straight 20-win seasons.

Three teams – men's hockey (1989-90), men's crew (1989-90) and men's soccer (1995) – have won national titles during Richter's tenure.


Richter's own college athletic prowess is well-documented. He earned All-America (1961-62) and academic All-America (1962) honors as a tight end.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and topped the nation as a junior. As a senior, Richter won the prestigious 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor.

Richter was recognized for his college gridiron exploits in 1997 with his induction into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

DAVID MCDONALD

David McDonald, the former chair of the Athletic Board, is a special assistant to the Chancellor for Athletics. In that role, McDonald oversees some day-to-day operations of the Department of Athletics, including academics and rules compliance.



McDonald, a history professor first appointed to the 22-member UW Board of Athletics in 1994, served as its chairman one year succeeding Jim Hoyt. McDonald's research and teaching interests are in the history of imperial Russia (1649-1917). He is the author of "United Government and Russian Foreign Policy, 1900-1914" (Harvard University Press, 1992).

He also earned all-league honors in baseball at UW as a power-hitting first baseman, but the 6-5 center received his scholarship for basketball.

Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Redskins and played professionally from 1963-71. Richter earned his B.S. degree from the UW-Madison in landscape architecture (1964).

Upon retirement from the NFL, he earned a law degree (1971) from UW-Madison. After working at a Madison law firm, he joined Oscar Mayer where he was V.P. of personnel.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame and the NFL Player Alumni Association.

Pat was enshrined into the UW Athletic Department and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in 1991 and 1994, respectively. In 1995, he gained induction into the Verizon Academic All-America Hall of Fame. The Sales & Marketing Executives of Madison named Richter their "Executive of the Year" in 1997.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four sons: Scott (wife Khaki and grandsons J.P. and Cole), Brad (wife Chrissy, grandson Max and granddaughter Samantha), Barry (wife Kim, grandson Blake and granddaughter Alexandra) and Tim.


10-20-20 CLUB

Perhaps one of the most-satisfying seasons for Richter was 1999-2000. Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne led UW to a Rose Bowl victory and 10 wins overall. Both the men's and women's basketball teams won at least 20 games. The men made the Final Four and the women won the WNIT. Only 21 schools in history have accomplished that 10-20-20 success in the same season.


Barry Alvarez Football Operations


Cheryl Marra Sports Administrator


Mike Moss Student Services


Jamie Pollard Chief Financial Officer




Vince Sweeney is in his eighth year as an Associate A.D. in charge of external relations. In 2000, he was given additional responsibilities with various entities on campus, including

SEASON REVIEW

Season Capsule

Wisconsin finished the 2001 season (the 113th in school history) with a 5-7 overall record and a 3-5 Big Ten mark that left the Badgers in a tie for eighth place.

Alvarez Record

Head coach Barry Alvarez completed his 12th year at Wisconsin. The winningest coach in school history, his career head coaching mark (all at the UW) now stands at 84-55-4 (.601).

Strength of Schedule

Wisconsin tied with Florida State for the ninth-toughest schedule in the nation in 2001. The Badgers' opponents, which included seven bowl game participants, put together a cumulative 70-43 (.619) record during the regular season.

All-Americans

Wide receiver Lee Evans, defensive lineman Wendell Bryant, running back Anthony Davis and offensive lineman Dan Buenning earned All-America honors from various organizations following the 2001 campaign. Following is a listing of those honors:

All-Big Ten

Freshman RB Anthony Davis and senior DL Wendell Bryant earned individual honors and six Badgers were named first-team All-Big Ten.

Davis was a consensus choice as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year, while

Bryant was selected by the league's coaches as the conference's Defensive Lineman of the Year.

Davis was Wisconsin's fourth Big Ten Freshman of the Year and third in the past six seasons. Ron Dayne earned the honor in 1996 and Brooks Bollinger did so in 1999. Bryant was named the co-Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year last season and gives Wisconsin a league defensive lineman of the year for the third time in the past four seasons.


Davis, Bryant, wide receiver Lee Evans and linebacker Nick Greisen all earned consensus first-team All-Big Ten honors. Only twice in history (1993 and 1999) has Wisconsin had more than six first-team all-conference performers.

Tight end Mark Anelli earned first-team all-conference honors from the Big Ten

coaches and was an honorable mention choice by the media. Defensive back Mike Echols was a first-team choice by the coaches and second-team by the media. Offensive lineman Ben Johnson was a consensus second-team all-league selection. Center Al Johnson was an honorable mention choice by both the coaches and media.

Academic All-Big Ten

The following players, by virtue of their 3.0 grade-point averages (or higher), were named to the Academic All-Big Ten team: Joey Boese (communication arts), David Braun (business), Erasmus James (undecided), Chad Kuhns (kinesiology), Russ Kuhns (psychology), Jeff Mack (biology) and Jason Schick (business).





Big Ten Players of the Week

Wisconsin had four players selected as the conference's player of the week in 2001. They were: WR Lee Evans (offense) on August 27; DL Erasmus James (defense) on August 27; DL Wendell Bryant (defense) on Sept. 24; and Mike Echols (defense) on Oct. 15.

National Awards

Two Badgers were finalists and two others were semifinalists for national position awards in 2001. Wide receiver Lee Evans was one of three finalists for the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver (LSU's Josh Reed won the award). Return specialist Nick Davis was one of 10 finalists for the Mosi Tatupu Special Teams Player of the Year Award (won by Iowa's Kahlil Hill). Defensive




Wendell Bryant was a first-team All-American in 2001 and was named the Big Ten Defensive Lineman of the Year.

lineman Wendell Bryant was a Lombardi Award semifinalist and running back Anthony Davis was a Doak Walker Award semifinalist.

Offensive Team Notes

Wisconsin set a school record for passing yards with 2,556, eclipsing the old mark of 2,453 set in 1994 ... the Badgers became the first team in Big Ten history to have two 1,000-yard passers (Jim Sorgi and Brooks Bollinger), a 1,000-yard rusher (Anthony Davis) and a 1,000-yard receiver (Lee Evans) ... the UW had a 1,000-yard rusher (Anthony Davis) for a Big Ten-record ninth consecutive season ... only North Carolina (12 from 1973-84) and Southern California (10 from 1972-81) have had as many consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher as Wisconsin currently has going ... a Badger now holds the Big Ten single-season record for rushing (Ron Dayne with 2,109 yards in 1996) and receiving (Lee Evans with 1,545 yards in 2001) yardage ... Wisconsin's starters at center, both guards and both tackles all return next season ... center Al Johnson, guard Dan Buenning and tackles Ben Johnson and Jason Jowers each started all 12 games in 2001 ... Jonathan Clinkscale and Kalvin Barrett split time at the other guard spot ... five Badgers (Lee Evans, Anthony Davis, Mark Anelli, Al Johnson and Ben Johnson) received all-Big Ten mention on some level ... the Badgers lost only six fumbles all season, the second-fewest in


school history (the 1998 team lost five) ... underclassmen accounted for 99 percent of Wisconsin's rushing yards, all of the team's passing yards and 70 percent of the receiving yards.

Defensive Team Notes

Three Badgers (Nick Greisen, Mike Echols and Wendell Bryant) were named first-team All-Big Ten by either the coaches or media ... Wisconsin improved its total yards-per-game allowed by almost 22 yards per contest over the previous season, the fourth-best season-to-season improvement of the Alvarez era ... the Badgers lost projected starting linemen Jake Sprague and Darius Jones to injuries for the season, and then lost starting DE Delante McGrew to injury for the remainder of the campaign following the Illinois game ... the Badgers allowed an average of only 4.9 points per game in the fourth quarter ... Wisconsin limited Michigan to just 163 yards of total offense on Nov. 17 (that was the lowest total for Michigan against the Badgers in the Alvarez era) ... the Badgers also had other fine performances against Penn State (131 yards allowed) and Western Kentucky (143 yards allowed).

Special Teams Notes

Wisconsin's punters (R.J. Morse and Kirk Munden) and kickers (Mark Neuser, Mike Allen and Adam Espinoza) were an inexperienced group, as only Neuser had ever played in a college game prior to the

start of the 2001 campaign ... Nick Davis led the Big Ten in punt return yards per game (12.3) ... Neuser finished fourth in the Big Ten in field goals per game (0.89) and field goal percentage (66.7), and was one of six league kickers to make all of his PATs (27-27).

General Notes

Wisconsin's 42.9 yards per game in penalties were the third-fewest in the Big Ten ... the Badgers averaged 78,333 fans per game in 2001, the second-highest attendance average in school history behind the 2000 season's average of 78,711 ... Wisconsin fans purchased more than 62,000 season tickets for the 2001 season. That is a school record and is the fifth time in the past seven seasons that the Badgers have eclipsed the 60,000 mark for season tickets sold ... the youth of the 2001 Wisconsin football team was illustrated by the fact that half of the players who made the squad's trek to Oregon on Sept. 1 were on their first road trip as college football players ... four of Wisconsin's seven losses came against teams ranked in the top 25 at the end of the regular season. In three of those games, the Badgers' opponent scored the game-winning points very late (Oregon with 4:03 left; Illinois, 6:18 and Michigan, 0:10) in the contest. The UW lost those three games by a combined 13 points.

MADISON, Wis. — Sophomore quarterback Jim Sorgi came off the bench to throw a pair of second-half touchdown passes to Lee Evans to lead the Badgers to a 26-17 victory over Virginia in the Eddie Robinson Classic before 76,740 fans at Camp Randall Stadium.

The game was delayed for 31 minutes due to strong thunderstorms and lightning in the area.

The Cavaliers scored first on a 35-yard field goal by David Greene in the first quarter before the Badgers grabbed a 10-3 halftime lead on a 22-yard field goal by Mike Allen and a 16-yard touchdown run by Jerone Pettus, both in the second quarter. Early in the second stanza, Badger quarterback Brooks Bollinger left the game with a liver contusion.

Allen added another field goal to open the second-half scoring with 10:59 left in the third quarter, but Virginia closed the gap to 13-10 when Bryson Spinner hit Billy McMullen on a 33-yard scoring strike a little less than eight minutes later. Wisconsin responded when Sorgi found Evans for a 38-yard touchdown pass with just 39 seconds left in the third quarter.

Sorgi and Evans hooked up again — this time on a 78-yard touchdown pass — with 11:01 remaining to play in regulation to put the UW ahead 26-10. Spinner hit Tyree Foreman with a 14-yard aerial tally with 5:54 left to play, but that ended the scoring.

Evans made four receptions for a career-high 135 yards. Davis became just the third Badger of the Barry Alvarez era to rush for 100 yards in his first action at running back.



EUGENE, Ore. — The Badgers gave the seventh-ranked Ducks all they wanted before dropping a 31-28 decision in front of 45,919 fans at Oregon's noisy Autzen Stadium.

After falling behind 10-0 just nine minutes into the game, UW quarterback Jim Sorgi, starting in place of injured Brooks Bollinger, capped a 10-play, 80-yard drive by hitting Nick Davis with an 18-yard scoring strike early in the second quarter.

With the Badgers trailing 10-7, Sorgi connected with freshman Darrin Charles on a 13-yard touchdown pass to give the Badgers a 14-10 advantage with 11:54 left in the third quarter. Oregon all-American Joey Harrington responded with an 11-yard touchdown toss to Justin Peelle with 7:21 left in the third stanza. Badger freshman Anthony Davis then scored on a 69-yard touchdown run just 26 seconds later. Oregon went back ahead, however, when Harrington hooked up with Maurice Morris on a one-yard touchdown pass.

Wisconsin didn't go quietly, however, taking a 28-24 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Sorgi with 9:37 left in regulation. But Harrington brought the Ducks back one more time with a nine-play, 78-yard drive that culminated in a two-yard touchdown run by Harrington with 4:03 remaining in regulation. Wisconsin's final drive of the game began with 1:47 left and Sorgi directed the Badgers to the Oregon 47-yard line before being stopped for good.

Sorgi and Harrington combined to throw for 509 yards and five touchdowns in the highly entertaining game. Davis rushed for 130 yards on just 13 carries and Badger Lee Evans netted career highs of 168 yards and eight receptions.



MADISON, Wis. — Fresno State scored 22 unanswered points in the second half to overcome a 20-10 halftime deficit and defeat Wisconsin, 32-20, before 78,506 fans at Camp Randall Stadium.

Wisconsin quarterback Jim Sorgi, starting for injured Brooks Bollinger, got the Badgers on the board first with a one-yard touchdown run just 1:14 into the game. Fresno State standout quarterback David Carr responded by connecting on a 20-yard touchdown pass to Marque Davis just 4:46 later. Sorgi returned the favor, hitting Lee Evans on a 53-yard scoring strike with 3:01 left in the first quarter. But the

Bulldogs got a 42-yard field goal from Asen Asparuhov with just nine seconds left in the high-scoring first stanza.

A pair (37 and 50 yards) of Mike Allen field goals in the second quarter gave Wisconsin a 20-10 edge at the break.

The game turned early in the third quarter when Fresno State's Bernard Berrian brought the second-half kickoff back 96 yards for a touchdown. Sorgi was intercepted on Wisconsin's ensuing possession and Carr delivered a 16-yard touchdown pass to Rodney Wright with just 2:34 gone in the second half, giving the Bulldogs a 26-20 lead. Asparuhov nailed two more field goals — a 34-yarder late in the third quarter and a 17-yard effort with 6:26 left in the game — to account for the final margin.

Evans caught seven passes for a career-high 182 yards, then the fourth-best single-game total in school history. Badger Anthony Davis rushed for a then career-high 146 yards. However, that pair was matched statistically by Carr, who completed 22-38 passes for 240 yards and two touchdowns, and Berrian, who caught eight passes for 102 yards, in addition to his momentum-changing 96-yard kickoff return.

Anthony Davis rushed for 103 yards and a touchdown, while Nick Davis and Lee Evans combined for nine receptions, 182 yards and a touchdown.


COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He was also a two-time team captain.




Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterman at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in '42.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.




Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.

WISCONSIN'S RON DAYNE



Honors, awards and records were never the focus of Ron Dayne's career. "I just tried to do what I could to help the team win," is what the soft-spoken tailback repeated many times throughout his career. Helping the Badgers win may be Dayne's favorite personal legacy, but other witnesses to his career will forever marvel at his on-field accomplishments.

Here's a look at some of his achievements:

- college football's most-decorated player after winning the Heisman Trophy and Maxwell and Doak Walker Awards in 1999.
- national player of the year by Associated Press, *Football News*, *The Sporting News* and Walter Camp.
- first player in college history to run for more than 7,000 career yards (bowl play included).
- college football's all-time leading rusher with 6,397 yards (no bowls). He bettered the old mark of 6,279 on a 31-yard run in his last game (vs. Iowa).
- three-time bowl game MVP (1996 Copper, 1999 Rose and 2000 Rose).
- first three-time Big Ten rushing champion.
- second nationally in rushing (by only 16 yards) as a senior despite sitting out six full quarters in large-margin wins.
- tied NCAA record for career 200-yard games (bowls not included) when he gained 216 yards vs. Iowa. Dayne, along with Marcus Allen (USC) and Ricky Williams (Texas), had 11 such games.
- Big Ten career leader in rushing and scoring.

- an average of 148.8 yards rushing per game (career) ranks fifth all-time in the NCAA.
- Big Ten offensive P.O.W. four times in 1999 (equalled the conference record).
- only player to lead the Big Ten in three categories (rushing, all-purpose yardage and scoring) during the 1999 season.
- recorded five games of at least 200 yards rushing in 1999, a national-best figure.
- had his name and number unveiled on the facade of Camp Randall Stadium after the Iowa game on Nov. 13, 1999.
- personally outrushed the opposing team 29 times in 43 career starts.
- joined Amos Lawrence (North Carolina), Tony Dorsett (Pitt) and Denvis Manns (New Mexico State) as the only players in history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in four consecutive years.
- recorded 2,000-yard seasons as both a freshman and senior (counting bowl games).
- gained just over 50 percent of his career yardage after contact.
- landslide winner in the Heisman Trophy balloting. His 2,042 votes were the 10th-most of all time.
- honored with "Ron Dayne Days" as proclaimed by Governor Tommy Thompson, Madison Mayor Sue Bauman and Milwaukee Mayor John Norquist.







#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Although he played football only one season (1942) at the UW, Elroy Hirsch is one of the most beloved figures in Badger sports history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He also starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams before returning to the UW-Madison as Director of Athletics from 1969-87.


**Dayne and Ameche honored

The University of Wisconsin began a tradition in 1999 to honor outstanding achievement in Badger football history. The school has displayed the names of two of its greatest gridiron heroes – Ron Dayne and Alan Ameche – on the facade of the second deck at Camp Randall Stadium.

The tradition began during a special post-game ceremony on Nov. 13, 1999, when the Department of Athletics saluted the accomplishments of Dayne by putting his name on the upper deck facade. It was Dayne's last game in Camp Randall Stadium, a contest in which he became college football's all-time rushing leader.


Ameche became the second Badger honored when his name was added to the facade prior to the Badgers' game vs. Oregon on Sept. 9, 2000. The Kenosha, Wis., native was represented by his widow and son at the ceremony.



the Walter Camp Award in 1953 as outstanding college player of the year...led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in the game...was the Big Ten rushing champion in 1951 and 1952...had the first 1,000 yard season by a Badger in 1952 as a sophomore...named first-team All-Big Ten in 1952, 1953, and 1954...set the NCAA career rushing mark of 3,345 yards...inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1975...was the second overall pick in the 1955 draft by the Baltimore Colts, which is tied for the highest UW player selected...played for the Colts from 1955-60...participated in four NFL Pro Bowls...scored the winning touchdown in the Colts 23-17 overtime win over the Giants in the 1958 NFL title game.

Tackle, 1959**

Played left tackle for the UW...played for the Houston Oilers in 1960 and 1962...his father, George, was a star lineman for the Badgers in the

1930s...named first-team All-Big Ten in 1959.



**Pat Richter
End, 1961-62**

Was a consensus All-American in 1962...led the nation in receiving as a junior in 1961...was a captain in 1962...led team in receiving from 1960-62

and the Big Ten in receiving in 1961 and 1962...named first-team All-Big Ten in 1961 and 1962...led the Badgers with 163 yards and 11 receptions in the 1963 Rose Bowl...also lettered in basketball and baseball at the UW...played for the Washington Redskins from 1963-70 after being a first round draft selection in 1963.

A consensus All-American in 1975...was first-team All-Big Ten in 1974 and 1975...played in the 1976 Hula Bowl, 1975


East-West Shrine Game and 1976 Japan Bowl...drafted eighth overall in 1976 by the Chicago Bears...played for the Bears from 1976-81.


Tim Krumrie


Troy Vincent





Wide Receiver, 2001

One of three finalists for the 2001 Biletnikoff Award, given to the nation's top wide receiver...broke the Big Ten record for most

receiving yards in a season with 1,545...averaged 128.8 yards per game in 2001, ranking him fourth nationally...his 2001 receiving yardage total was the 15th-highest in NCAA history...in only three years, eclipsed the UW record with 2,255 career receiving yards...in 2001, he set school single-season records for receptions (75), touchdown receptions with nine (tied the record) and 100-yard receiving games (eight)...first Badger to lead the Big Ten in receiving since 1963.

HISTORY



1896 Western Conference Champions

After opening the season with seven victories, the Badgers tied Northwestern 6-6 and lost to the Carlisle Indians. Despite the late-season swoon, the Badgers claimed the inaugural Western Conference title. The Badgers' tough defense registered shutouts in six of its seven victories. The loss to the Carlisle Indians was the first night game in school history (played indoors at the Chicago Coliseum).




1897 Western Conference Champions

Wisconsin won its second straight conference title and registered eight shutouts on the way to a 9-1 mark. The only loss was a 6-0 decision to the UW Alumni. Victories over Minnesota, Chicago and Northwestern propelled the Badgers to the Western Conference title. Australian kicker Pat O'Dea, the famed "Kangaroo Kicker," booted 14 field goals. It was the second league title for Coach Phil King.



1901 Western Conference Champions

Phil King's Badgers won nine straight games to become the first undefeated team in school history. Using a potent offense and stingy defense, Wisconsin defeated every opponent by at least three TDs and recorded eight shutouts. The Badgers outscored the opposition 317-5. Wisconsin's slate included two wins over high school teams and conference wins over Chicago and Minnesota.




1906 Western Conference Champions

Although traditional league powers Minnesota, Michigan and Chicago were missing from the schedule due to a faculty reform movement, Wisconsin claimed a share of the conference championship with the Gophers. Coach Dr. C.P. Hutchins' team posted Western Conference wins over Iowa, Illinois and Purdue by a combined score of 63-15.




1912 Western Conference Champions

The Badgers ended their third undefeated (7-0) season with a 28-10 win at Iowa. Coach William Juneau's squad was the last Badger team to post a perfect record. Led by consensus All-America tackle Robert "Butts" Butler, the Badgers placed a school-record nine players on the All-Western Conference team. Wisconsin registered four shutouts and allowed only 29 points all year.




1952 Big Ten Conference Champions

Following a 20-6 win over Illinois in the second game of the season, Wisconsin sat atop the polls as the nation's No. 1 team. The Badgers lost the following week, but went on to a 6-3-1 record and the school's first Rose Bowl appearance. After losing to USC 7-0 in Pasadena, the Badgers ended the season ranked 10th by United Press International and 11th by Associated Press.



1959 Big Ten Conference Champions

Needing a victory in the regular-season finale to clinch a league title, Wisconsin beat Minnesota 11-7. It was the Badgers' first undisputed title since 1912. At the Rose Bowl, Washington scored 17 points in the first quarter on the way to a 44-8 win. All-Big Ten QB Dale Hackbart and All-Big Ten guard Jerry Stalcup were stars on a club that finished the season ranked sixth by AP and UPI.




1962 Big Ten Conference Champions

Although USC defeated Wisconsin 42-37 in perhaps the most exciting Rose Bowl ever, the Badgers finished the storybook campaign with an 8-1 record and ranked second nationally in both the AP and UPI polls. Ron Vander Kelen set a Rose Bowl record with 401 yards passing as the UW scored 23 straight points in a fourth quarter rally. Pat Richter was a consensus All-American after catching 49 passes.




1993 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1993 Badgers established a new standard of excellence, shattering school records and earning numerous honors. After claiming Wisconsin's first Big Ten title in 32 years (a co-championship with Ohio State), the Badgers defeated UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. The 10-1-1 club set a Wisconsin record for wins and boasted eight first-team All-Big Ten players, including Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP Brent Moss. Wisconsin ended the season ranked fifth and sixth by the coaches (CNN/USA Today) and media (Associated Press), respectively.




1998 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1998 Badgers concluded the winningest campaign in school history with a 38-31 Rose Bowl victory over sixth-ranked UCLA. The 1998 club opened the season with a nine-game winning streak and registered the best winning percentage (.916) in the modern era at the UW. Aaron Gibson was a finalist for the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy and Ron Dayne was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award. Tom Burke led the nation in sacks and Jamar Fletcher topped the NCAA in interceptions. Wisconsin was first nationally in turnover margin and scoring defense.



1999 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1999 Badgers ended the season with an eight-game winning streak after splitting their opening four contests. A 17-9 win over Stanford in the Rose Bowl allowed UW to become the first Big Ten school in history to win consecutive games in "The Granddaddy of them all." Wisconsin won its first undisputed Big Ten championship since 1962 and finished fourth in each of the final national polls. Ron Dayne was the consensus national player of the year and won the Heisman Trophy. Chris McIntosh and Jamar Fletcher joined Dayne as first-team All-Americans.

BADGER BOWL GAMES

1953 Rose

PASADENA, Calif. — USC scored the game's only points on a 22-yard pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojans' 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by Alan Ameche's 133 yards rushing, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche broke loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers got to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and USC recovered.

The Trojans then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended with Bukich's TD pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan two-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club was the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game.

1960 Rose

PASADENA, Calif. — Washington scored the game's first 17 points en route to a 44-8 Rose Bowl win over Wisconsin.

Washington tallied the first TD on a 6-yard run by Don McKeta 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard field goal after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 Husky lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a four-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion that cut the lead to 17-8.

Washington quarterback Bob Schloredt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close the first-half scoring. Schloredt completed four passes for 102 yards and rushed for 81 yards.

Wisconsin mounted a challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. The Badger defense entered the bowl with a defensive average of barely 10 points allowed per game for the regular season.

Bennett was named Special Teams MVP, while UCLA's Freddie Mitchell (9-180) was the game MVP.






Randy Wright, 1981 Garden State Bowl MVP







BADGERS VS. GOLDEN GOPHERS

There is more at stake than just a win or loss on the team record when Wisconsin and Minnesota face each other on the gridiron. The most-played rivalry in NCAA Division I-A football (111 meetings, including every year consecutively since 1907) is also a battle for possession of Paul Bunyan's Axe. The winner of the game each fall gets to keep the Axe on its campus.

"The records can be thrown away when these two rivals meet on the football field," said Coach Barry Alvarez. "It didn't take very long for me to understand the importance of the game and the history associated with it."

Probably not many people in attendance realized the history they were watching on Nov. 15, 1890. That was the first time that bordering state universities from Wisconsin and Minnesota met on the gridiron in Minneapolis.

The game was just the Badgers' fourth gridiron battle ever. The Golden Gophers won the inaugural battle 63-0, but the start of one of college football's hottest rivalries was born.

The schools met for 15 consecutive years after that (the Badgers won seven and the Golden Gophers won eight) before the series took a one-year hiatus in 1906.

The resumption of the series was a 7-7 tie in 1907 and the schools have met every year since. It is the longest-running rivalry in Division I-A football.

Madison and Minneapolis have alternated hosting the historic matchup

since the beginning of the modern era in 1946.

Much prestige has always been associated with the game, but another factor was added in 1948. After Minnesota won a hard-fought 16-0 decision in 1948, the Wisconsin lettermen's group (the National W Club) presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by legendary lumberjack Paul Bunyan.

Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with final scores painted on its handle, for display on its campus.

The Badgers have taken six of the last seven games from their border rivals. Wisconsin also won six straight in the series between 1978-83.


In the all-time series, Minnesota holds a 58-45-8 advantage. Wisconsin has a 27-22-6 mark in Madison and the Gophers have registered a 36-17-2 mark in Minneapolis.

There have been many notable contests between Wisconsin and Minnesota. Consider these:

- In 1961, Wisconsin intercepted three Gopher passes and upset No. 3-ranked Minnesota 23-21. The loss was Minnesota's only conference defeat of the season and cost it a share of the Big Ten title.
- No. 3 Wisconsin met fifth-ranked Minnesota in 1962 at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers, playing for a league title and Rose Bowl berth, won a 14-9 decision. Ralph Kurek scored the

winning TD with just 1:37 left.

- Fifth-ranked Wisconsin dropped a 28-21 verdict at the Metrodome in 1993, costing the Badgers an undefeated season. "The loss to Minnesota in '93 might have cost us a national championship," said Alvarez. Wisconsin got a school-record 423 passing yards from Darrell Bevell, but UW had six turnovers.
- With Alvarez watching from a hospital bed after knee surgery, the 1999 Badgers escaped with a 20-17 win. Kicker Vitaly Pisetsky ended the first over-

time game in school history with a 31-yard field goal.

"There are a lot of folks who have personal attachments to this matchup," Alvarez said. "The game is a critical one each season for our players and supporters."

SLAB OF BACON TROPHY

The Slab of Bacon Trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize for the winning team in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series.

Apparently the trophy was given to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was eventually discovered in a storage room at Camp Randall Stadium by an intern from the UW Men's Sports Information Office during a cleanup project.

The Slab of Bacon trophy is currently housed in the football offices at the UW. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said in 1992, "and kept it."





COVERAGE GUIDELINES

Interview Requests

All Badger practices, including Friday walk-throughs, are closed to the media. Interviews are conducted as follows:

Alvarez Interviews

Barry Alvarez holds a weekly media conference Mondays at 1 p.m. in the "W" Club Room at Camp Randall Stadium. Alvarez' comments are available on the university's website late Monday afternoon. Alvarez is available for interviews after practice Tuesday through Thursday.

Additionally, Alvarez is available every Tuesday from 11:50-noon CT on the Big Ten Teleconference.

Assistant Coach Interviews

Wisconsin assistant coaches are available after practice on Tuesdays and Wednesdays in the basement of the McClain Center. If you wish to arrange a special interview with an assistant coach during the week, contact the Sports Information Office at (608) 262-1811.

Player Interviews

Badger players can be interviewed during the week on Tuesdays and Wednesdays after practice (approximately 6 p.m.) in the lower level of the McClain Center outside of the Wisconsin locker room area.

Phone calls by players to out-of-town media are made at the players' convenience between 7:30-10 p.m. CT on Tuesdays and Wednesdays only. Interviews should be arranged through Brian Lucas (608/262-1811) of the Sports Information Office. Home numbers will not be made available to the media, and players have been instructed not to conduct interviews when contacted without prior approval from the SID staff.

Additionally, 3-4 players attend the weekly Monday media conference with Coach Alvarez.

Ordering Phone Lines

Several courtesy phone lines (credit card and collect calls only) on level four of the

press box are available on a first-come, first-served basis for the news media. News organizations requiring their own phones should call Jamie Buchanan at (608) 265-8546 or email him at JB2@athletics.wisc.edu to order lines.

Credential Guidelines

Press Box & Sideline Passes

Requests for credentials to cover Wisconsin football should be sent on company letterhead to: Sports Information Office, University of Wisconsin, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. The fax number is (608) 262-8184. Requests should be received at least 10 days in advance of the game.

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and reporters on assignment. You must display both a credential and an armband prominently to be on the field level. Your media credential alone will not give you access to the sidelines. Armbands can be picked up in the Reinke Room (north end) of the Field House. Media members cannot work between the 25-yard lines as recommended by the NCAA in its game management manual.

Credentials will be mailed if time permits. Those passes which cannot be mailed will be left with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at the entrance of Lot 17 on Engineering Drive (north end of the Stadium).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priorities: 1) TV and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 2) national publications, newspapers filing for the following day's publication and news outlets designated by the visiting SID; 3) TV and radio stations covering for nightly news; and 4) other requests, which will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media areas as dictated by the NCAA. Anyone violating these standards will be denied credentials to future games.

All practices are closed to the media. Players will be available for interviews through Wednesday's practice. Player interview requests will not be granted on Thursday or Friday of game week.


With the exception of post-game, Badger football players are not permitted to participate in live radio interviews. Players will be available for taped interviews, when schedules permit.




Driving Directions ...

From Dane County Regional Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Ave. (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Ave., which changes to Pennsylvania Ave., Johnson St., Gorham St. and then University Ave. Stay on University Ave. through campus until Randall Ave. (look for Milan's Sub Shop on the left side). Turn left on Randall Ave. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe St.). The Stadium is located on the right side on Monroe St.

From west via I-90/94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90/94 to Highway 151 South (Washington Ave.). Continue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right on Webster Street and complete half a square around the Capitol (Webster to Dayton to Fairchild). Turn right on W. Washington Avenue and follow it to Regent Street. Turn right onto Regent St. Follow Regent to Camp Randall Stadium.



From east via I-94 (from Milwaukee)

Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers / Pennsylvania Ave. Continue on Packers / Pennsylvania Ave., which changes to Johnson St., Gorham St. and then University Ave. Stay on University Ave. through cam-

Radio coverage

For the eighth year in a row, exclusive radio coverage of Badger football can be heard on the 43-city Wisconsin Radio Network. The Department of Athletics and Learfield Communications / Badger Sports Properties entered into an agreement for radio broadcast rights for football and basketball in 1994.

WIBA-AM (1310 AM) and WIBA-FM (101.5 FM) are the rights holders in the Madison market, and WTMJ (620 AM) carries the games in Milwaukee.

Entering his eighth season handling play-by-play duties for Wisconsin football is Matt Lepay, named the state's Broadcaster of the Year for 2000. Lepay has also called Badger basketball the past 13 seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay was Sports Director at WTSO in Madison before joining WIBA in 1994. He previously served as Sports Director at WNCI in Columbus, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio. Lepay also provides frequent sports reports for WISC-TV. Lepay is host of the Barry Alvarez Show, both on WIBA Radio and WISC-TV.

Color commentary on radio broadcasts is provided by Mike Lucas, long-time sports columnist at the Capital Times. Lucas, who worked previously on the broadcast team for the Badgers' delay television package on the Wisconsin Public Television Network, also provides daily sports commentaries on WIBA. Lucas and Lepay are co-hosts of the popular WIBA Sports Review and Lucas also hosts "Sidelines", a talk-show on TVW. He has reported on Badger sporting events for the Capital Times since 1971. Lucas has been a color analyst (radio and TV) for Badger football, men's basketball and men's hockey during his career.

The Barry Alvarez TV Show



The Athletic Department site is the most visited one on the UW-Madison campus, averaging more than 1.4 million page views monthly.







More than 41,000 students populate the UW campus with almost 29,000 undergraduates, over 8,000 graduate students and over 2,000 professional students in numerous fields.

The University maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies. Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 115 foreign countries. Wisconsin ranks ninth in the nation for total international student enrollment.

Student life at UW-Madison is more than books, term papers, and exams. Some of the most important lessons learned at Wisconsin occur far from any lecture hall or lab.

The hub of student life on campus is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Madison's largest lake, Mendota.

STUDENT HOUSING

The University Residence Halls provide you with a comfortable, smoke-free living environment and many resources to help you succeed academically at the university.

Each UW-Madison residence hall has unique qualities based on its architecture, size, and location. But much of your living experience is ultimately shaped by the residents who live there. Each hall's "personality" changes every year based on the residents' contributions to their community.

The undergraduate residence halls are divided into smaller units called "houses" where 50 to 80 residents live and form a community. The tradition of the "house" as the nucleus of the community is a unique feature of the university residence halls. Since the earliest days of on-campus housing, student peer advisors called House Fellows have lived among the students, fostering a sense of community and self-government. Most students share a double room with one other student. All students share same-gender bathroom facilities conveniently located on each residence hall floor.




JOHN WILEY

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001 becoming the university's 27th leader.


Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor working in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at Wisconsin as an NSF fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.




PAT RICHTER

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An All-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic All-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to joining the athletic department staff.



DAVID MCDONALD

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his second year as the Special Assistant to the Chancellor for Athletics.

McDonald, a professor in the history department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the personnel committee for one year.

A UW professor since 1988, McDonald offers courses in the history of pre-revolutionary Russia, as well as modern Europe. His research and publications cover a variety of topics including: bureaucratic politics in the early twentieth century, nineteenth century Russian thought, and the social history of the eighteenth century nobility.

A native of Saskatoon, Sask., in Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.


A WINNING ATHLETIC PROGRAM






Top: Danny Westerman wrapped up his UW career with the men's tennis team as a three-time All-Big Ten player.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP



In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.



BADGER NICKNAME

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

BUCKY BADGER

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a paper mache head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

BUD SONG

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

FIFTH QUARTER

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

ON WISCONSIN

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison dedicates itself to the mission of providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals. Wisconsin student-athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available.

A staff of five advisors and three learning specialists which conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Mary Ellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic All-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

FETZER STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is designed to aid Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different

shapes and sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PCs while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, Ian Wood, and Chad Gabbard utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.


The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach, Kerri Ariens, and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight room located in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features over 45,000 pounds of free weights and over 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat pull machines as well as seated row machines. The Stadium weight room also has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds up to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics as well as for alternative leg exercises.




Top: The weight room in the McClain Center has over 45,000 pounds of free weights and over 50 weight machines.

Bottom: The Badger Den in Camp Randall Stadium has all free weight equipment.





The Natatorium contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic timing system and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter boards. The Southeast Recreational Facility (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads.




