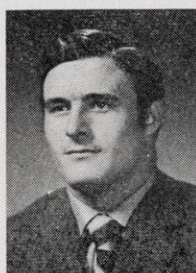

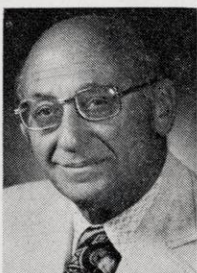

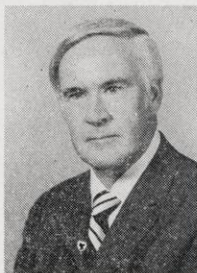

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is dynamic, enthusiastic, direct, forceful, and a practical leader.

Now in his fourth year as Athletic Director he is the seventh man to serve in that capacity in the school's history.

Elroy accepted the athletic directorship on February 28, 1969, and was the overwhelming choice of Badger alumni and fans for the job.

In his first year he launched a program called "Operation Turn-Around," a program which took him into every area of the state of Wisconsin and the nation meeting with high school coaches, administrators, athletes, fans and followers on their home grounds. "Operation Turn-Around" carried the Badger leader into over 60 communities encompassing over 80 high schools which he personally visited.

As far as Elroy Hirsch is concerned, "Operation Turn-Around" is now complete. It reached its zenith last season in football as 408,885 fans turned out for six Badger home games at Camp Randall, ranking Wisconsin third in the nation in attendance.

The new slogan under Elroy Hirsch is "The Badgers ARE Back."

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

How did Elroy Hirsch receive the nickname "Crazylegs"?

It happened in the Wisconsin-Great Lakes game at Chicago in October, 1942 as Hirsch reeled off a 61 yard scoring run. Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News coined the phrase — which was to remain with him throughout his career — in the press box that afternoon.

As Hirsch recalls, "One of my feet was going one way, the other one in another direction on that run. I must have been a sight running down the sidelines."

And now that Elroy Hirsch is Wisconsin athletic director, does he prefer to be called Elroy or "Crazylegs"?

He answered that question easily

for a reporter at a press conference when accepting the job: "Any name is better than Elroy."

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Sea-hawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets — 1946-48 — were not happy ones. Hirsch suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his

injury-weakened right knee, Clark Shaughnessy, then Rams' head coach, put Hirsch on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect Hirsch from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and Hirsch's talents insured his place in that development.

In 1951, Hirsch displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and Hirsch had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like Mitchell!

That same season Hirsch caught 17 touchdowns passes to tie the league record set by Don Hutson of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

"Crazylegs" also proved himself a talented actor — he made three movies: Zero Hour, Unchained, and the famed Crazy Legs, released in 1953, in which Hirsch played himself.

Hirsch joined the Union Oil Company in 1957 as director of sports and special events. He left Union Oil to accept the position of general manager of the Los Angeles Rams in 1960. When the club was sold to Daniel F. Reeves in 1963, Hirsch became his assistant.

As general manager, Hirsch was responsible for budget, negotiation of all contracts with players and coaches, supervision of the scouting system and college draft, and all other club business.

Elroy was married to the former Ruth Stahmer on June 27, 1946. The couple has two children — Win Stephen, 22, and Patricia Caroline, 14.

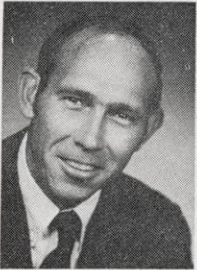
BOB BELL

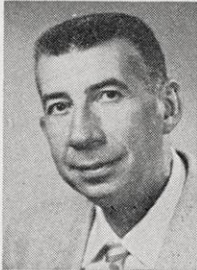

He served as president of the National Association of Basketball coaches and was a member of the Basketball Rules Committee from 1957 to 1966.

He's a Hall of Fame member as well — National Basketball, Wisconsin State, Madison Sports, and Helms Athletic Foundation.

JIM MOTT

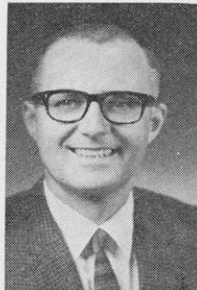
Sports Information Director

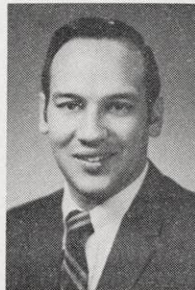

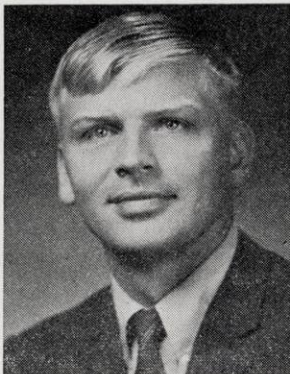

Assistant Coach **Dave VanderMeulen** was a highly successful Rhinelander High School basketball coach before he joined John Powless' coaching staff on Sept. 1, 1969.

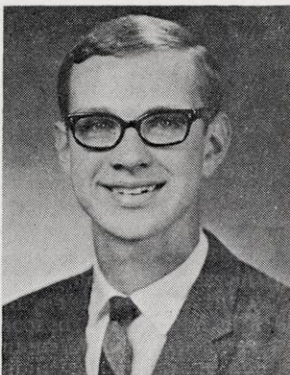

Ted earned three varsity letters at Wisconsin, two under John Erickson and the third

under John Powless. Although he was never a regular, Ted started many games, played in 49 and scored 177 points as a 6'8" forward-center swingman. Ted is a positive example of John Powless's abilities to develop the big man in college basketball.

Ted's first season as a Badger coach was spotless, as his freshman cagers went through an undefeated season posting 12 victories in a row. This fine inaugural campaign reflects Ted's excellent ability as a basketball tactician and strategist. His presence on the Badger coaching staff will undoubtedly long be appreciated.

Team leader will be 6-5 senior forward and captain **Leon Howard**, the top scorer in 1971-72 with an average of 16.4 points per game and with a two-year total of 734 points in 46 games and 374 rebounds. He was a second team All-Big Ten choice as a junior.

Two other starters returning are 6-5 junior **Gary Anderson**—a probable starting guard this year after a sophomore year as a forward—and 6-11 junior center **Kim Hughes**, who paced the board work for the Badgers as a sophomore with 239 rebound and averaged 11.7 points per game to rank third in scoring on the team last year. **Anderson** missed six games due to a foot fracture and averaged 7.3 points per game.

Both **Kerry Hughes**, the 6-11 twin of **Kim**, and **Lamont Weaver**, a 6-1 guard, saw considerable action as sophomores last season with **Kerry** tallying 7.1 points per game and **Weaver** 5.9.

Gary Watson, a 6-7 forward, returns for his senior year after missing the second half of last year's campaign due to scholastic difficulties. He was Wisconsin's top scorer when he departed and on 1½ season of play tallied 478 points in 37 games and pulled down 295 rebounds.

The other lettermen returning are 6-7 senior **Pat Rohan** at center and **Steve Wilhelm**, a 6-6 junior forward, both of

whom made valuable contributions to the team last year though not seeing a great amount of action.

Sophomores moving up to the varsity from last year's unbeaten (12-0) freshman team include **Kessem Grimes**, 6-9 center from Gary, Indiana; **Marcus McCoy**, a 6-6 forward from Chicago Heights, Ill. (Bloom Township); 6-5 forward **Rick Piacenza** from Highland Park, Ill.; and guards **Tim Paterick**, Janesville (Craig); **Bob Luchsinger**, Janesville (Parker); and **Bruce McCauley**, Sun Prairie, all 6-3 and highly capable backcourt performers.

Freshmen on the varsity roster and eligible for play during their first year in school include Wisconsin All-State star **Dale Koehler**, 6-8 forward from Kewaunee; Illinois star **Mark Lotzer**, 5-11, from Rockford, Ill.; and **Bob Hinga**, a 7-0 center from Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Juniors **Russ Pollnow**, a 6-1 guard from Neenah and **Rick Mathison**, a 6-3 forward from Madison (Memorial)—both of whom were on last year's squad, complete the roster.

Wisconsin's freshman team went through a 12-game schedule unbeaten last season with **Grimes** the scoring and rebounding leader at center with a 23.9 scoring mark and a 15.4 rebound average.

The Badgers lost four lettermen from last year's team—starting guards **Bob Frasier**, team captain and playmaker, and **Lee Oler**, plus reserve guard **Rodney Uphoff** and reserve forward **Craig Manwaring**.

Last year's team averaged .436 from the floor—including a school record .447 against Big Ten competition—and out-rebounded the opposition in 17 of the 24 games played.

The Badgers posted their first winning campaign in four years in 1971-72 with a 13-11 mark—7-3 against non-league foes—and it marked only the fifth winning season for a Wisconsin basketball team in the past 18 years.

The schedule lists road games at UCLA, Oral Roberts, Pittsburgh, and Ohio University, plus competition in the 11th annual Milwaukee Classic against Yale and Marquette.

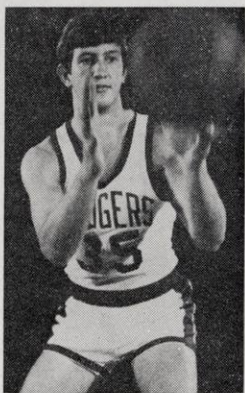

He began his coaching career at the high school level at Paducah, Kentucky, Tilgham High school in 1957 as cross country and basketball coach.

He joined the late **Bud Kennedy** as an assistant in basketball at Florida State the following year—he also served two seasons as the school's tennis coach—before moving on to Cincinnati in 1960 as freshman basketball coach.

His freshman teams at Cincinnati compiled a three year record of 36-9 including a 15-0 record during the 1962-63 season.

Powless worked with **Ed Jucker**, then the head coach and **Tay Baker**, an assistant coach who guided Cincinnati's fortunes through last season, during his stay in the Queen City.

The Bearcats posted a 78-6 record over the three seasons John was a member of the staff and won two NCAA titles—defeating Ohio State in the finals in both 1961 and 1962—and placing second to Loyola of Chicago in 1963; that's a record that had not been equalled in tournament play until the Lew Alcindor teams came along.

He came to Wisconsin as an assistant to **John Erickson** in May, 1963, and also served as Wisconsin's head tennis coach for five seasons. His tennis teams posted 52-39 dual meet records and finished in the Big Ten's first division three times and on two occasions—1911 and 1967—Wisconsin had the conference individual singles titlist.

John served six seasons as captain and coach of the United States Junior Davis Cup team.

He was appointed head coach of the Badgers on April 27, 1968, to succeed John Erickson who had resigned earlier in the month to become general manager of the Milwaukee franchise in the NBA.

His style of coaching calls for 'physical' basketball. "We plan to play the game at both ends of the court. I like to keep the other team honest."

HALL OF FAME LISTS 3 BADGERS

Three of the greatest names in Wisconsin basketball are in the National Basketball Hall of Fame at Springfield College, Springfield, Massachusetts.

Included are former coaches **Walter E. Meanwell**, who directed the Badgers to an overall 254-99 record in twenty seasons (1911-12 to 1916-17 and 1920-21 through 1933-34), and **Harold E. 'Bud' Foster**, who compiled a 265-267 record over 25 years of coaching including three Big Ten titles and the 1941 NCAA championship.

The third member of the Hall of Fame is Christian Steinmetz, often

WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

In the six years **Bob Johnson** has been head hockey coach at Wisconsin the Badger hockey program has grown beyond anyone's wildest dreams. During Coach Johnson's tenure the Badgers have won 129 games, never had a losing season, have won twenty or more games for the past five years and led the nation in attendance for the past three straight years.

After three years as an "independent" in college hockey, Johnson's Badgers joined the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA). Their first year in the league, 1969-70, the Badgers surprised the hockey world by finishing fourth (all other first year teams finished last) and took third place in the NCAA Tournament at Lake Placid, N. Y. In the 1970-71 season Wisconsin placed even higher in the final WCHA standings by taking third place, and this past season, 1971-72 Johnson led his Badgers to their highest finish, second place, the best won-lost percentage in the entire league and for the second time in three years to the NCAA Tournament where again the Badgers finished third.

Johnson's teams have been exciting to watch and the fans have responded in record numbers. In the 1969-70 season Wisconsin drew 86,465 in 13 home games. In 1970-71 the attendance jumped to 109,940 in 16 home games, and last season the exciting Badgers set an all-time collegiate attendance record by drawing 157,142 in 20 home games during the 1971-72 season.

Johnson, 42, is a native of Minneapolis, Minn where he was an all-star hockey player at Minneapolis Central High School and captain in his senior year. He also excelled in football and baseball.

He played collegiate hockey at North Dakota in 1950-51 and at the University of Minnesota in 1952-53 and 1953-54. The Gophers won the WCHA title both years Johnson played. He also lettered in football and baseball at Minnesota.

Following Army duty in Korea and a short fling in minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox organization, Johnson turned to coaching and began his career at Warroad, Minnesota High School in 1956. A year later, he became head coach at Minneapolis Roosevelt High School where his hockey teams won 51 of 60 conference games in 6 seasons through 1962-63.

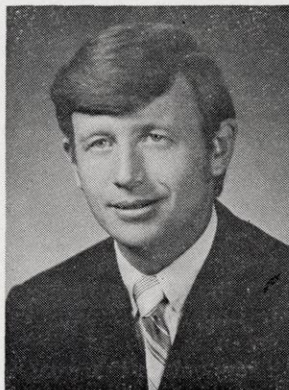
In 1963 Johnson started a three year stint as both hockey and baseball coach at Colorado College. His hockey teams had a combined record of 29-51-3. In baseball he was named "Coach of the Year" for the NCAA College Division Rocky Mountain District in 1964 and 1965.

Johnson received his Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota in 1954 with a double major in Physical Education and Social Studies. He gained his Masters in 1961 and his Ph.D. in 1963 both from Minnesota in Physical Education. He is currently a full professor of Physical Education at Wisconsin. He is the author of two books, **Coaching High School Hockey** and **Ice Hockey**. His unbounding enthusiasm for the game of hockey and his gregarious personality have helped win fans for Wisconsin hockey throughout the state.

Bob and his wife, Martha, are the parents of five children.

ASSISTANT WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

Bill Rothwell was named assistant Wisconsin hockey coach on May 21, 1971, replacing former assistant Jeff Sauer, who accepted the job of head hockey coach at Colorado College.

Rothwell, 33, was assistant hockey coach at Ohio State University for three years prior to accepting the Wisconsin job. He has a varied hockey background which included four years of competition at the University of New Hampshire, 1964-68, eight years of play in amateur hockey leagues in New England, Canada and the Midwest, two years of competition with the U.S. Army hockey team in Europe and four years of high school hockey in New Hampshire.

An accomplished tennis player, Rothwell played for the First U.S. Army team in 1956 and for the University of New Hampshire tennis team in 1965-68, serving as captain in 1968. He also served as tennis professional at Rye Beach, New Hampshire Country Club from 1964-71 and was assistant tennis coach at Ohio State University during the 1971 season. Rothwell also played baseball for the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne Division team in 1957 and 58 and soccer at the University of New Hampshire in 1965-68.

Rothwell received a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education from the University of New Hampshire in 1968, a Master of Arts degree from Ohio State University in 1969 and a Doctorate degree from Ohio State in 1971.

He was married on June 12, 1971.

Badger Hockey Team Hopes for Another Successful Season

Even though 1971-72 was the greatest year ever in Wisconsin hockey, 1972-73 appears to have the earmarks of being just as great.

The two leading goaltenders in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, **Jim Makey**, Dunville, Ont., and **Dick Perkins**, St. Paul Park, Minn., will return. **Makey** will be a junior and **Perkins** a sophomore this coming season. **Makey** led the WCHA in goaltending with 70 goals allowed in 21.3 games for a 3.3 goals against average. **Perkins** actually had a better average, 16 goals in 7 games for a 2.3 goals against average, but he played in only 7 WCHA games due to an eye injury suffered against North Dakota. It was after **Perkins** suffered the eye injury that **Makey** came on to lead the Badgers to a school record 10-game winning streak, 8 of those in WCHA competition. With both **Makey** and **Perkins** back, the Badgers are strong in the goaltending department. **Makey** was named to the second All-WCHA team by the Denver Post.

The Badgers will also be strong again with 4 of the top 5 scorers returning. Leading scorer **Gary Winchester**, center from Calgary, Alberta, will be only a junior this coming season. Last season he led the Badgers with 25 goals and 27 assists for 52 points. **Winchester** was named to the All-NCAA tournament team as he scored three goals and an assist in the consolation game against Denver.

The team's third leading scorer, center **Dean Talafous**, Hastings, Minn., also returns and will be only a sophomore this season. As a freshman last year, **Talafous**, who is 6-4, had 10 goals and 24 assists for 34 points and gained valuable experience by playing in 37 games.

Experience at the wings will center around senior **Jim Johnston**, St. James, Manitoba, and senior **Tim Dool**, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. **Dool** will captain the Badgers this coming season. **Johnston** last season scored 31 points on 13 goals and 18 assists to rank fourth in team scoring, while **Dool** was fifth with 16 goals and 13 assists for 29 points. **Dool** is one of the outstanding diggers in the corners in all of collegiate hockey.

Wisconsin had the best defensive team in the WCHA in 1971-72, allowing only 3.1 goals per game. Defense, however, will be the rebuilding area on the Wisconsin team this year, as three of the four starting defensemen are gone. The only returning defenseman is **Bob Lundeen**, Minneapolis, Minn., who will be a sophomore this year.

As a freshman last season, **Lundeen** set a Wisconsin record for most goals by a defenseman in one season with 13, the old record was 3. Overall, **Lundeen** had 13 goals and 12 assists for 25 points, so he will give the Badgers a good scoring threat from the blue line.

Gone from the Wisconsin team are left wing **Jim Young**, last season's most valuable player and leading goal scorer in WCHA play for the Badgers, along with starting defensemen, **Jeff Rotsch**, **Al Folk** and **Brian Erickson**.

Filling in the gaps at defense should be sophomore **Tom Machowski**, Chicago, Ill., and **Dave Arundel**, junior from Minneapolis.

Wisconsin had the best winning percentage in the WCHA last season with a 20-8 record for .714 and also had won more games than any other team in the conference, but, due to the point standings used to determine the standings, the Badgers finished second to Denver. It was the highest finish ever for the Badgers since joining the WCHA three years ago, and in those three years Wisconsin has steadily climbed from 4th to 3rd to 2nd this past year. Wisconsin also led the nation for the third straight year in attendance with 157,142 fans in 20 home games, and the indication is that fan interest will be just as high if not higher this coming season.

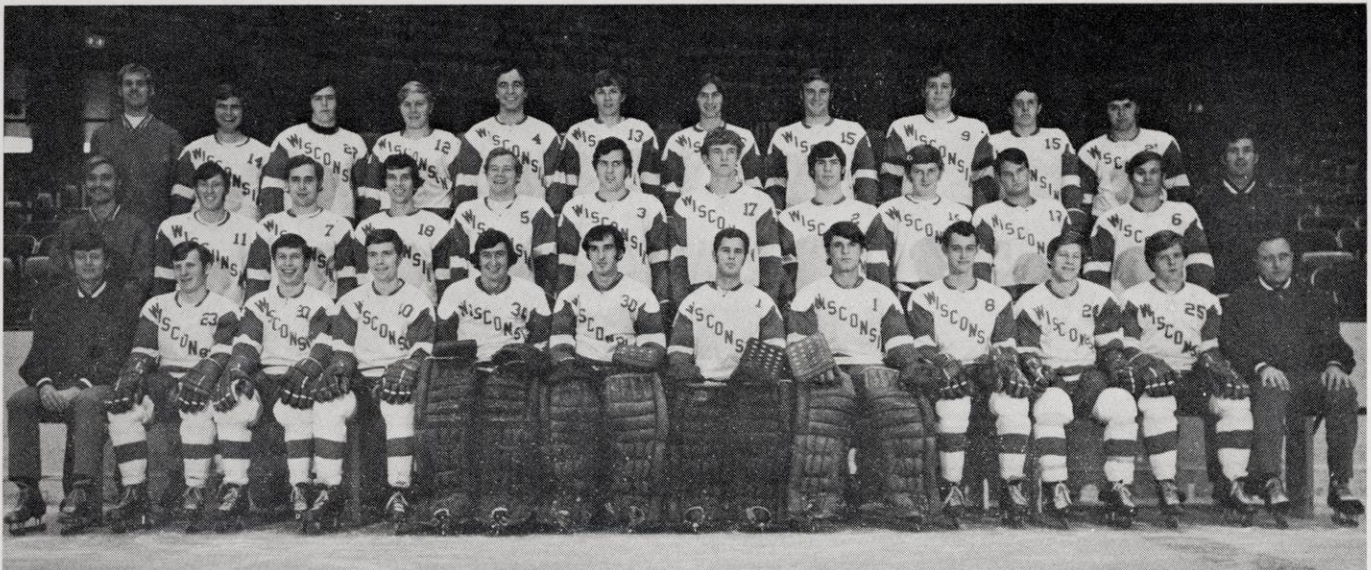

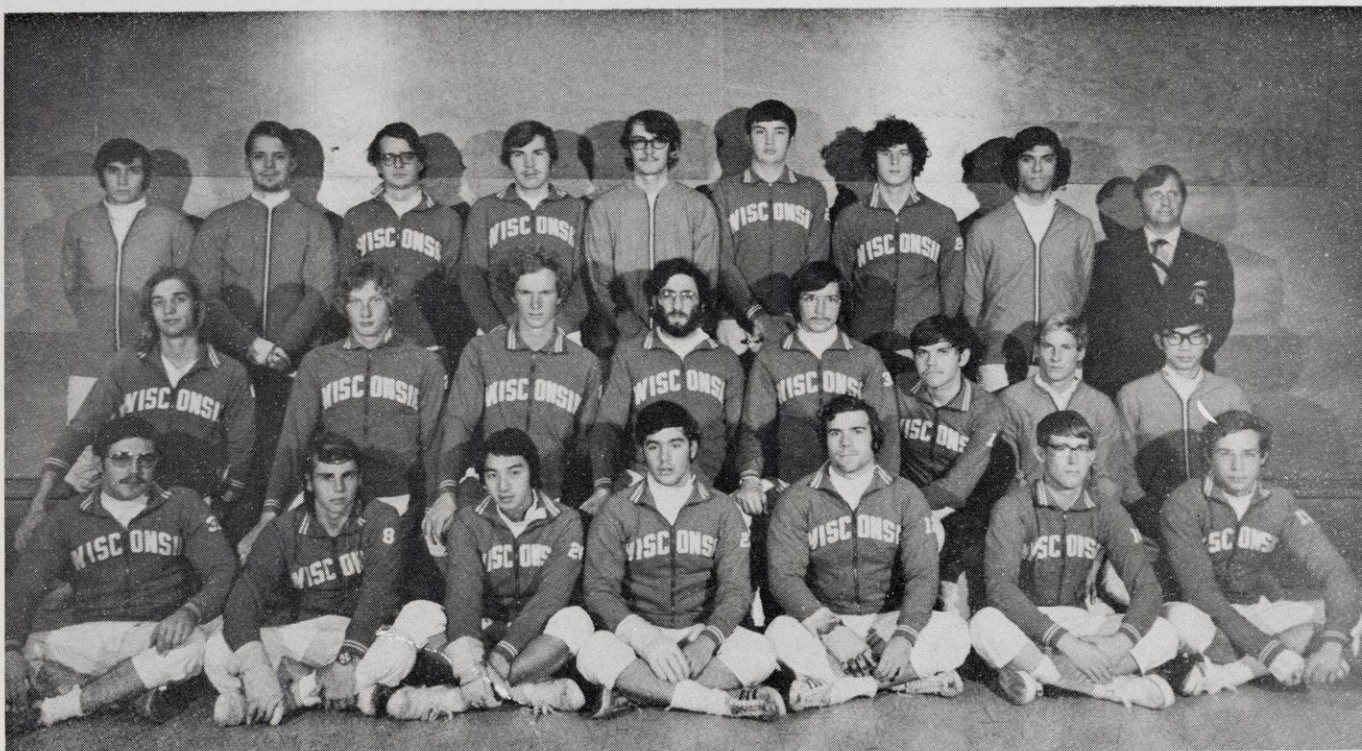

ANTHONY JOHN GILLHAM Head Fencing Coach

On August 31, 1972, **John Gillham** became the seventh head fencing coach in Wisconsin history, succeeding **Archie Simonson** who resigned after 21 years of coaching.



Gillham

The new coach received his Ordinary National Certificate in Mechanical Engineering in 1954 from Bournemouth College and was a design draughtsman for Vickers England, Limited, doing sub-contract work for the Atomic Energy Authority.

Gillham emigrated to Canada with his family from London, England, in 1965 and then came to the United States and Beloit, Wisconsin, in 1967 as a design draughtsman with the Beloit Corporation.

The 37-year-old coach has won several fencing titles since taking up the sport in 1952 in England, and is proficient in teaching all three weapons — foil, epee and sabre — in the sport. He won the 1972 Wisconsin Open sabre title and has represented the state in the Mid-West Fencing Championship meet the past three years.

RAYMOND PETE BAUER Head Gymnastics Coach

Pete Bauer is in his second season as Wisconsin's gymnastics coach, succeeding his father, **George Bauer**, who coached the Badgers for eleven seasons. In his first season he posted a 1-8 record.

George Bauer ranks as Wisconsin's most successful gymnastics coach, posting a 75-62 dual meet record. The "Golden" years of his tenure were in the 1963, 1964 and 1965 seasons when the Badgers compiled a 31-10 dual meet record.

Pete Bauer lettered in each of those three seasons and is one of the outstanding trampolinists in Badger history.

After his graduation from Wisconsin in 1965, the younger **Bauer** served with the Air Force for five years, two of which were in Southeast Asia. He still spends weekends flying with the Air Force Reserves. Flying seems to be very much a part of **Bauer**, for even his wife Marian was a stewardess when he met her.

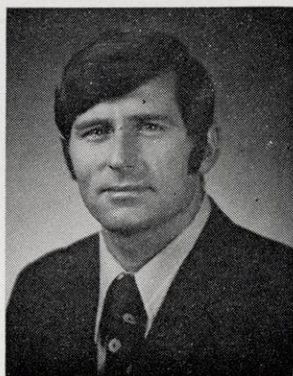

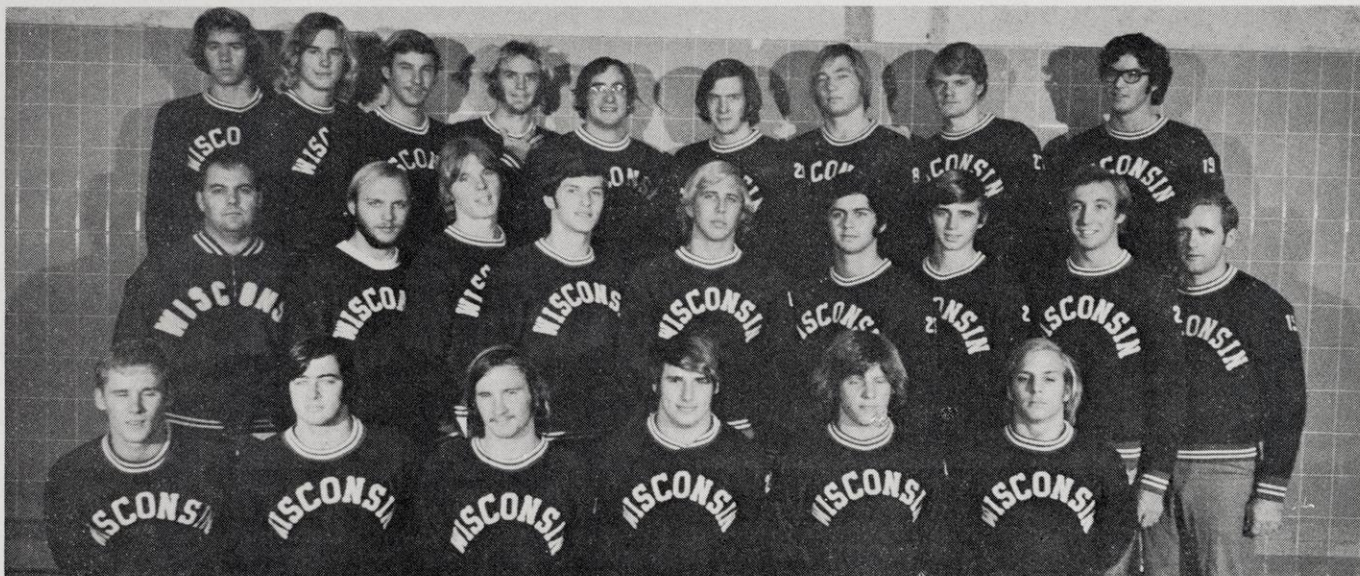

Sophomore **Nigel Cluer** placed 10th in the 200 yard individual medley. His qualifying time of 2:00.25 set a Wisconsin varsity record. **Cluer** was also 3rd in the 200 yard breaststroke.

Four Badgers performed well in the 400 yard individual medley: freshman **Murphy Reinschreiber** was 3rd; **Roxborough**, 4th; **Cluer**, 7th; and freshman **Dan Striebel** was 11th.

Reinschreiber also placed 9th in the 200 yard butterfly and he set a new school record in his qualifying heat of the 200 yard backstroke with a 1:59.4 clocking, ultimately placing 12th in that event.

Junior **Roger Ridenour** placed 9th in the 100 yard butterfly with Sophomore **Dale Wiseley** 12th. **Wiseley** also placed 11th in the 200 yard butterfly.

In one-meter diving, senior **Tony Rueff** was 10th and Junior **David Bush** was 12th. In three-meter diving, **Bush** placed 5th and **Rueff** again 10th.

Wisconsin's medley relay team (**Reinschreiber**, **Cluer**, **Ridenour**, **Striebel**) placed 6th, while the freestyle relay

team (**Striebel**, **Ridenour**, **Lynch**, **Preston**) placed 8th.

Mar. 23-25 — West Point, N. Y. — 49th Annual NCAA Swimming Championships — Wisconsin finished in a tie for 23rd place with LSU, Pennsylvania, Texas and Villanova with four points behind champion Indiana who won their fifth consecutive title with 390 points.

Murphy Reinschreiber set three all-time school records and gained three points with a tenth place finish in the 400 yard individual medley. His records came in that event with a time of 4:08.88 and in the 200 yard backstroke and butterfly events with times of 1:57.23 and 1:53.45, respectively, neither of which was good enough to place.

Nigel Cluer managed a twelfth place finish in 200 yard breaststroke for the Badgers' only other point and set a record for that event in the process by posting a time of 2:08.64. **Dave Bush** and **Jeff Huber** finished 25th and 26th respectively in the 3 meter diving.

JACK PETTINGER Head Swimming Coach

Jack Pettinger was appointed the Wisconsin head swimming coach in 1969. In his first season he guided the Badger tankmen to an 8-4 season and a fifth place finish in the Big Ten Championships. Last season the Badgers were also 8-4 and finished fifth in the Big Ten Meet. In the NCAA meet the Tankmen picked up four points and a tie for 23rd.

Coach Pettinger is a graduate of the University of Michigan where he was a member of the Wolverines' 1959 and 1961 NCAA championship teams in the butterfly and distance freestyle events. He graduated with an A.B. degree in history and since has received an M.S. degree in physical education from Indiana.

Before coming to Wisconsin Pettinger served as an assistant coach under the renowned James "Doc" Counsilman at Indiana which has won 12 straight Big Ten championships and four straight NCAA crowns. While at Indiana Pettinger also participated in much study and research on the mechanics, physiology, and psychology of competitive swimming.

Pettinger and his wife Jane are the parents of three sons and a daughter.

Jerry Darda came to Wisconsin in 1964 as diving coach on head coach John Hickman's swimming staff.

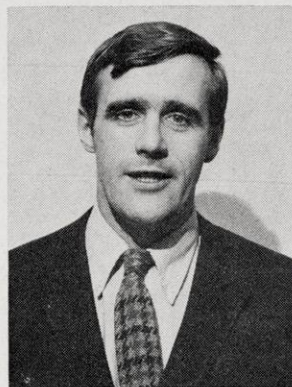
The 32-year-old Chicago native graduated from Purdue in 1960 with a degree in metallurgical engineering. Following a year in industry, he earned his master's degree in physical education while teaching at Niles North High School and Evanston High School in Illinois.

Before coming to Wisconsin Darda worked on a volunteer basis at his former high school, Fenwick of Oak Park, Illinois, where he developed Ken Stitzberger, the 1964 Olympic diving champion.

At Wisconsin Darda has developed several outstanding divers, including Julian Krug, Steve McCoy, Donald Dunfield and Dave Bush. In 1971

all of Wisconsin's 23 NCAA points came from the diving events.

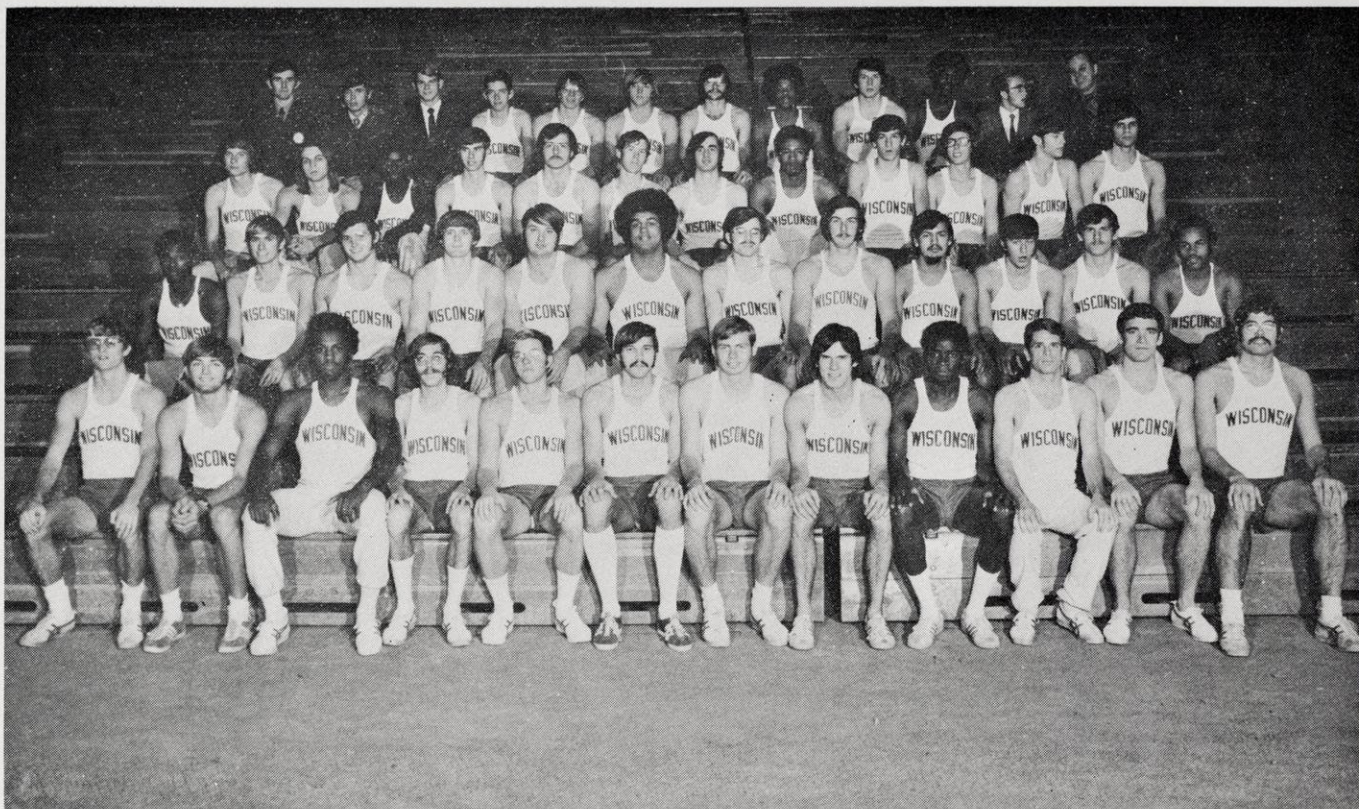

Apr. 22 — Bloomington, Ind. — Wisconsin nosed out Indiana 75-74 in a thrilling dual meet that saw **Patrick Onyango** win the long jump at 22-7½ and the triple jump at 48-2½. **Mark Larson** won the mile run in 4:10.0 with **Chuck Baker** second in 4:11.5. The Badgers also finished one-two in the 440 yard dash with **Chuck Curtis** winning in 47.8 and **James Gordon** right behind in 49.1. **Skip Kent** won the 880 in 1:52.4, **Andy Stallworth** captured first in the 220 in 21.7 and **Glenn Herold** took the three-mile run in 13:49.2. The Wisconsin mile relay team also took a first with the combination of **James Gordon**, **Rich Reinhart**, **Skip Kent** and **Chuck Curtis** turning in a 3:13.0 to win the event.

Apr. 29 — Des Moines, Ia. — The Badgers set three school records at the Drake Relays. **Patrick Onyango** leaped 51-11¾ for the best jump ever by a Big Ten athlete. **Glenn Herold** set a school record in the 6-mile run with a clocking of 28:32.1 and the 4-mile relay team of **Jim Fleming**, **Glenn Herold**, **Chuck Baker** and **Mark Larson** established a school record of 16:30.6. In that race **Herold** ran the fastest mile of his career 4:05.1 while **Fleming** was timed in 4:09, **Baker** in 4:09.9 and **Larson** in 4:06.6. **Pat Matzdorf** twice cleared the 7-0 mark winning the individual high jump and finishing second in the collegiate high jump.

May 6 — Minneapolis, Minn. — The Badgers continued their unblemished mark in dual meets with an 81-72 victory over the Gophers of Minnesota. The mile relay team of **Jim Gordon**, **Rich Reinhart**, **Skip Kent** and **Chuck Curtis** once again provided the margin of victory by winning the final event of the meet. The winning time was clocked in 3:18.3 while Minnesota finished in 3:19.5. **Patrick Onyango** was a double winner for the Badgers placing first in the long jump at 22-2¾ and his speciality the triple jump, at 48-4½. **Mark Larson** and **Glenn Herold** came up with new school records in the 3000 meter steeplechase and three-mile run. **Larson** won the steeplechase in 8:47.6 and **Herold** finished second in the three-mile with the record time of 13:38.7. **Jim Fleming** won the mile in his fastest time as a collegian in 4:10.3, while **John Cordes** took the 880 in 1:53.3, **Skip Kent** captured the 660 in a time of 1:19.8 and **Chuck Curtis** won the 440 in 48.2.

May 20 — Madison — Badger pole vaulter **Gordon Crail** leaped to a record of 16-1¼ in breaking his own school record, as the Wisconsin Trackmen battled the Chicago Track Club. No Team score was kept for the meet. **Chuck**

Baker turned in his best mile when he finished second in 4:07.7 and **Glenn Herold's** 8:56.7 in the two-mile was also his best for the year.

May 26-27 — Champaign, Ill. — 72nd Annual Big Ten Championship Meet — The Badgers finished fifth with 60 points as Michigan State won the meet with 105 points. **Mark Larson** finished second in the 300-meter steeplechase in a time of 8:42.9. **John Cordes** captured a fourth in the 660-yard run in 1:18.3, while freshman **Jim Fleming** placed second in the mile with the best time by a Badger for that event this year. He was clocked in 4:04.2, and in the same event **Chuck Baker** ran a 4:06.9 while finishing fourth. **Skip Kent** picked up more points for Wisconsin by finishing third in the 880 in a time of 1:50.5. Another third was grabbed by **Rob Bishop** in the pole vault, as he vaulted 15-0. The brightest spotlight of the meet focused on **Patrick Onyango** and **Glenn Herold**. **Onyango** set a new meet record in the triple jump with a leap of 51-10, and **Herold** took a first in the three-mile, beating Minnesota's **Gary Bjorkman** in a time of 13:28.4. World record holder **Pat Matzdorf** was injured in the high jump and forced to withdraw from competition.

June 1-2-3 — Eugene, Ore. — The Badgers tied for 21st in the 51st Annual NCAA meet. They finished with 8 points as winner UCLA collected 82. **Glenn Herold** was fourth in the 5,000 meter run, as he finished in a time of 13:45.8. His time set a school record for the event. Coach **Bill Perrin** secured his time at the three-mile mark and the 13:21.0 also set a school record. **Mark Larson** was fourth in the 3,000 meter steeplechase as his time of 8:35.0 set a new school record. **Bob Schranke** was 13th in the 10,000 meter run in 29:57.7. **Patrick Onyango** leaped 51-2 but failed to qualify for the finals. **Pat Matzdorf** did not compete because of injuries.

WILLIAM PERRIN Head Track Coach

Bill Perrin is in his second year as the Wisconsin head track coach after serving two years as an assistant to Bob Brennan, who succeeded Charles "Rut" Walker in 1969 in building Wisconsin to a national track power.

The 40-year-old native of Wood River, Illinois, served for seven years as assistant track coach at Indiana before coming to Wisconsin. He worked with the Hoosier field event men, and during his stay there his athletes set school records in five of the six field events.

Perrin is a 1956 graduate of Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Mo. where he starred in football as a single wing tailback and in track as a pole vaulter, while earning a bachelor's degree in education.

Following graduation, he served for two years in the U.S. Army, beginning his coaching career as head of the Camp Yokohama track and field team while serving in Japan in 1957.

Bill returned to college to obtain his master's degree in 1959 from Northeast Missouri Teachers College; and as a graduate assistant there, he served as field events coach for the school.

Coach Perrin then moved to Alton, Ill., where he coached cross country and track. In three years his teams finished second, fourth and third in the state high school meets.

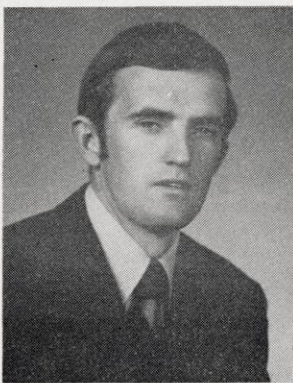
In only three years at Wisconsin Perrin has coached ten Big Ten champions in field events, including Big Ten indoor and outdoor triple-jump champion Patrick Onyango, and current world record holder in the high jump Pat Matzdorf.

Perrin is well known among the track and field world, especially for his published writings on training devices and for his invention of a trainer which is in wide use by pole vaulters who favor the fiberglass pole. This past summer Coach Perrin accompanied the "Track and Field News" tour to the 1972 Summer Olympics in Munich, West Germany.

Bill is married and the father of four children.

DANIEL R. McCLIMON Head Cross Country Coach Assistant Track Coach

Dan McClimon was named to the Wisconsin coaching staff in 1971 to serve as head cross country coach and to assist Head Coach Bill Perrin in track. In his first year as head cross country coach his team was 4-3 in dual meets and finished fourth in the Big Ten.

McClimon is a 1964 graduate of St. Ambrose College in Davenport, Ia., with a B.A. in physical education and biology, and earned his M.S. degree in physical education from Washington State in 1965.

Dan began his coaching career at Blackhawk Junior College in Moline, Ill., in 1965 and in three years there guided the school to the Illinois Junior College cross country championships in 1965 and 1967 and to the outdoor track title three years in a row — 1966, 1967, and 1968.

The 30-year-old native of La Claire, Iowa then accepted

Wisconsin Cross Country captain Glenn Herold won the Big Ten championship with a time of 29:46 for the six mile course at Iowa this year.

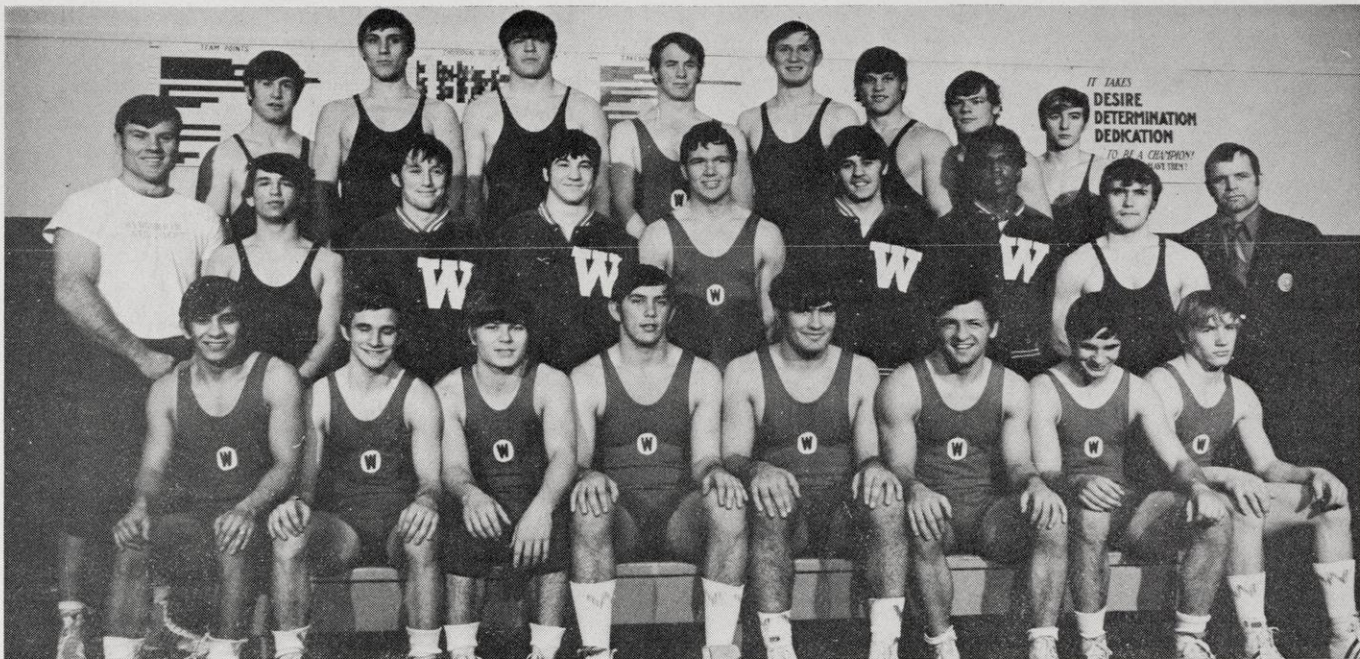

DUANE KLEVEN Head Wrestling Coach

Duane Kleven became Wisconsin head wrestling coach in 1970, and in his first season he guided the Badgers to a 13-4 record, tying the school record for most wins in a single season. Last season the injury riddled grapplers were 6-10.

The 32-year-old Stoughton native was an outstanding high school wrestler, and he was a member of varsity wrestling teams at Wisconsin where he received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1961 and master's degree in physical education in 1963.

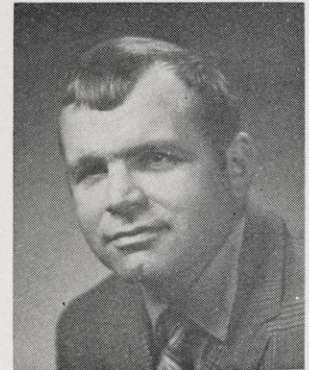
After a year of coaching at Madison's Wisconsin High School, military service followed for Kleven; but he still found time for coaching baseball and football while serving with the First Cavalry Division in Korea in 1963.

He resumed his wrestling coaching career at Racine Park High School in 1964, and in five years there, his teams compiled a 39-5-2 dual meet record and captured two state titles. In those five years, five individual performers won state titles under his guidance.

Kleven joined the college coaching ranks in 1969 at Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh, and the Titan wrestlers had their finest season ever in the one season he was coach: a 10-7 dual meet record, a second place finish in the state collegiate meet, a third place finish in the Wisconsin State University meet, and a 13th place finish in the NAIA national meet.

During the course of his career, Kleven has been a featured speaker and instructor on wrestling clinic staffs throughout the state, including the Badger Wrestling Clinic in Madison and his own "Titan Takedown School" at WSU-Oshkosh.

He is married to the former Mona Jacobson of Stoughton and they are the parents of a daughter and a son.

WISCONSIN WRESTLING 1972-73

The University of Wisconsin wrestling team has tried to prepare itself for one of the toughest home wrestling schedules in the school's long history which began on November 10 against the Alumni. The Badgers' schedule at home includes National Champion, Iowa State University and their 450 lb. Olympic Bronze Medalist, Chris Taylor. Taylor who is also the NCAA Heavyweight Champion and his Cyclone teammates will be in Madison on Monday, January 8, 1973. The grapplers also take on national runner-up Michigan State as well as Michigan and Indiana with their new coach, Doug Blubaugh winner of a Gold medal in the 1960 Olympics. The Spartans from East Lansing have won the Big Ten Wrestling Championship the last seven years in succession.

The Badgers have twelve lettermen returning from their 1971-72 squad and of this group only 134 pounder, **Dale Spies** and Heavyweight, **Jerry Guth** are seniors. The Badgers will be led by Big Ten 150-lb. place-winner, Junior, **Rich Lawinger** (33 wins, 7 losses) from Mineral Point, Wisconsin, and Sophomore, **Ed Vatch** (23 wins, 6 losses) from Addison, Illinois. **Vatch** suffered a knee injury at the end of last season and did not compete in the Tournaments, however, the Addison, Illinois, freshman went on to finish second behind Olympic Silver Medalist, John Peterson in the Final Olympic Trials at Anoka, Minnesota. State University Conference Champion **James Abbott** (126 lbs.) from Oshkosh has transferred to the Madison campus and will be eligible the second semester. **Abbott** also qualified for the final Olympic Camp and placed fourth. Help is also expected from 134-lb. Sophomore **Steven Evans** (14 wins and 6 losses), 190-lb. Junior **Joe Wade** (13 wins and 9 losses), sophomore **Laurent Soucie** (fourth place in the Big 10 with 6 wins and 5 losses), **Spies**, **Guth** and **Randy Frokjer**.

The recruiting effort was successful with eight State High School Champions and two runner ups enrolling at the University this fall. The State Champions include 185-lb. **Bill Benskin** from Iowa, Heavyweight, **Jim Franz** from Illinois and 167-lb. **Gordie Aschebrook** (Stratford), 126-lb. **Rich Beem** (Monroe), 105-lb. **Herb Cruz** (Milwaukee), 105-lb. **Jim Haines** (Arcadia), 155-lb. **Bob Daemmrich** (Stoughton) and 134-lb. **Phil Graham** (Milwaukee) from Wisconsin.

Barring such unforeseen problems as injuries and eligibility the season could very well prove to be one of the most interesting in Wisconsin history.

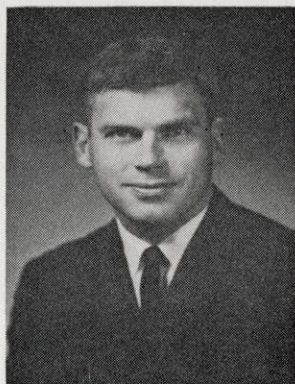

Andrew O'Dea, older brother of the fabled Pat, was Wisconsin's crew coach from 1895-1898 and he rowed as an amateur in Melbourne, Australia, with the famous Yarra Yarra Boat Club.

Wisconsin's first race against collegiate competition was in 1896 when the Badger oarsmen traveled to New Haven, Connecticut, to gain a twelve-length victory over Yale's freshman boat on Lake Saltonsall.

—W-W-W—

Wisconsin's 1899 varsity crew lost the IRA title at Poughkeepsie when a "berry" crate floated into the course of the Badger boat and Pennsylvania rallied to nip Wisconsin by a margin of five feet.

The 1972 Wisconsin Crew Team won its first Jim Ten Eyck Trophy for best overall performance at the IRA held in Syracuse, New York on Lake Onondaga.

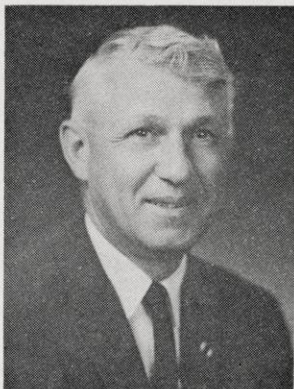
