In formally accepting the gifts made by the will of the late John M. Olin, of Madison, the Regents of the University of Wisconsin place on record the following minute:

Mr. Olin was a citizen of Madison for fifty years, coming to this city in 1874 as a member of the University faculty. For nearly half of that period he was active as a teacher, chiefly in the faculty of law, where his character, learning, and tireless energy made a notable impression upon his colleagues and upon many college generations of students. He construed his duties to his profession and to the public with singular generatity and breadth, and gave himself unsparingly to their performance.

He has crowned his career and that of his wife, Helen Remington Olin - a distinguished member of a talinted family - by his bequests to the University and to the City of Madison, and has thus erected another memorial his influence upon the institutions which commanded so much of his labor and affection. the University was read by President Kronshage.
