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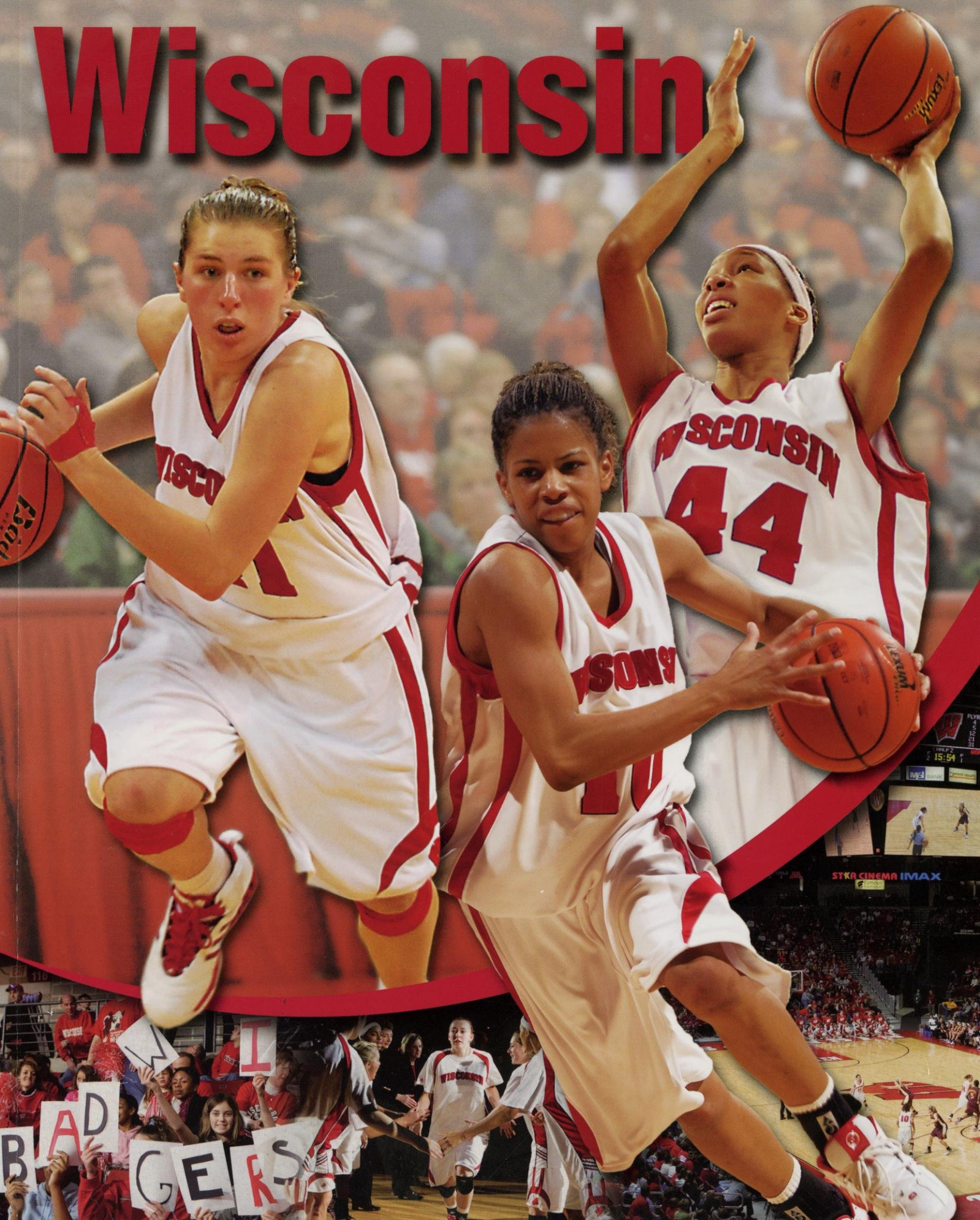

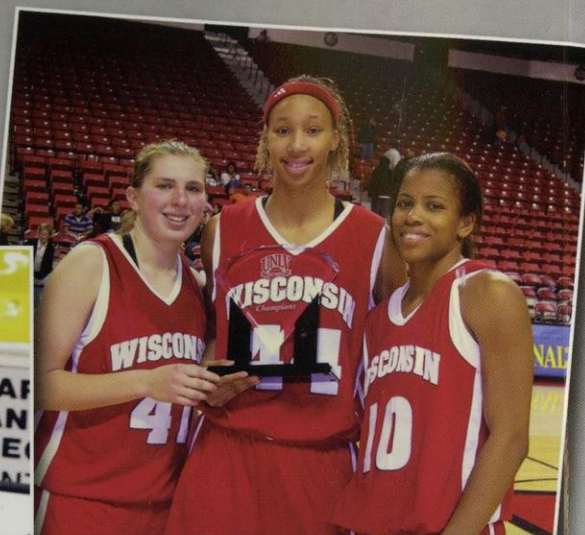
2006-07: A RECORD-SETTING SEASON

- ▶ Program Record 23 wins (23-13)
- ▶ Record 17 home wins (17-3)
- ▶ WNIT Runner-up Champions
- ▶ Badgers tied for the 11th most improved team in the nation
- ▶ Jolene Anderson became UW's first Big Ten scoring champion with a 19.3 points per game Big Ten average. She also set the UW single-season scoring record with 714 points, 113 points more than the previous record set in 1995.
- ▶ Anderson earned All-Big Ten first team honors and was UW's sixth WBCA/Kodak District IV All-American.
- ▶ Anderson made her third-straight USA Basketball team and won a third gold medal in international play with the USA U21 team competing in Moscow, Russia.

Women's collegiate basketball attendance has risen every year over the past 20 years and Wisconsin is one of the reasons. UW has ranked among the Top 20 in attendance nationally since 1995.

The 1997-98 Badgers set cumulative and conference-only games attendance marks with a record-average 12,474 in eight Big Ten games. UW set its first five-figure average with 10,455 per game also in 1998.

But numbers are one thing, experiencing a loud, vibrant crowd is another. Once inside the Kohl Center, you'll be happy to see how close the crowd is to the court. Emulating the tight feeling of the former playing facility, the UW Field House, the architects kept the seats close and the balconies cantilevered so the sound is reflected back into the bowl.

Courtside seats are reserved for season ticket holders. The end zones are a popular place for families to get up-close-and-personal with the players and Bucky Badger.

Once the Badgers take the court and the band starts playing, the crowd enthusiasm starts building. The introductions are made in a darkened arena with the spotlight focused on the Badgers at center court. When the lights come on, it's game time!

At halftime, many people don't even leave their seats. The game day promotions are exceptional whether it's musical chairs, trike races, a gymnastics troop, the hilarious 'Battle of the Mascots,' or the Red Panda, there's plenty of entertainment to keep everyone involved.

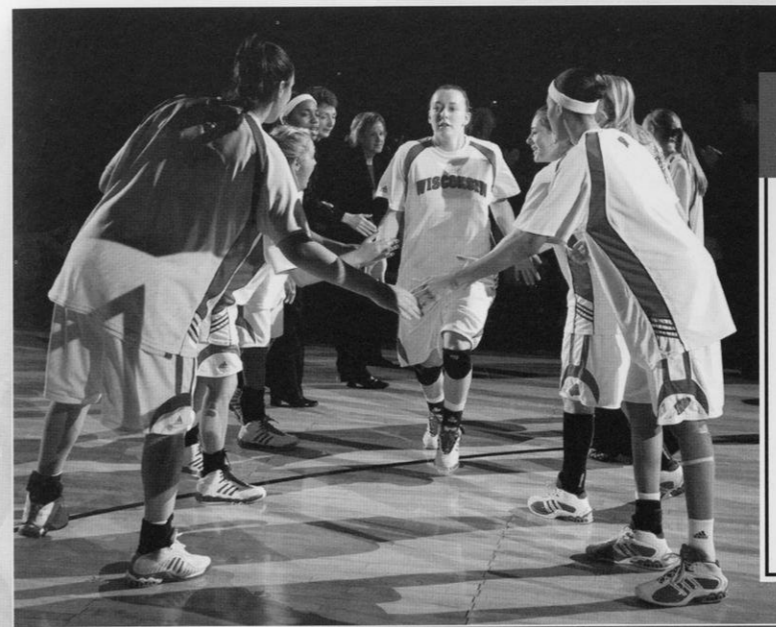

The Badgers have 12 letterwinners including all five starters returning from their record-setting season a year ago. Fifth-year coach Lisa Stone also welcomes three talented newcomers to what should be Wisconsin's strongest and deepest team in five years.

Wearing the uniform for the first time is guard Alyssa Karel of St. Paul, Minn. Karel's fellow AAU teammate, Tara Steinbauer, also joins the Badgers at forward. Steinbauer is from Bloomington, Minn.

Local fans will be familiar with newcomer Lin Zastrow, a 6-4 forward from Jefferson, Wis., who played all five positions in high school. Zastrow was a teammate of junior Caitlin Gibson when their team won the division 2 WIAA State High School Championship held at the Kohl Center in 2005.

The Badgers return two three-year starters in All-American and Player of the Year candidate Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.), and Janese Banks (Indianapolis). Those seniors along with Danielle Ward (Milwaukee) form the nucleus of what has been the primary scoring and rebounding corps the last two years.

Anderson led Wisconsin for a third season in scoring and concluded her junior year as the fastest UW male or female player to score 1,500 points. She won her fourth international gold medal with the USA Basketball U21 team.

Banks is another three-year starter who led the team in offensive rebounding and was second in scoring. The 6-4 Ward has the best field goal percentage on the team and became a regular starter at post at the end of the season.

The returning junior class is composed of 6-4 center Caitlin Gibson (Jefferson, Wis.) and 6-1 guard Chris Spencer (Traverse City, Mich.). Gibson, who started 13 games as a true freshman, was a regular in the lineup last season averaging 5.3 points and 4.0 rebounds. Spencer is ready to play after hip surgery sidelined her last season.

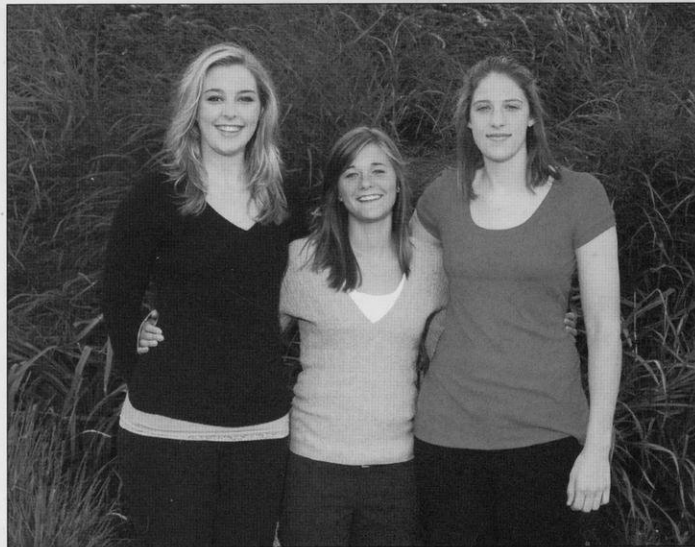

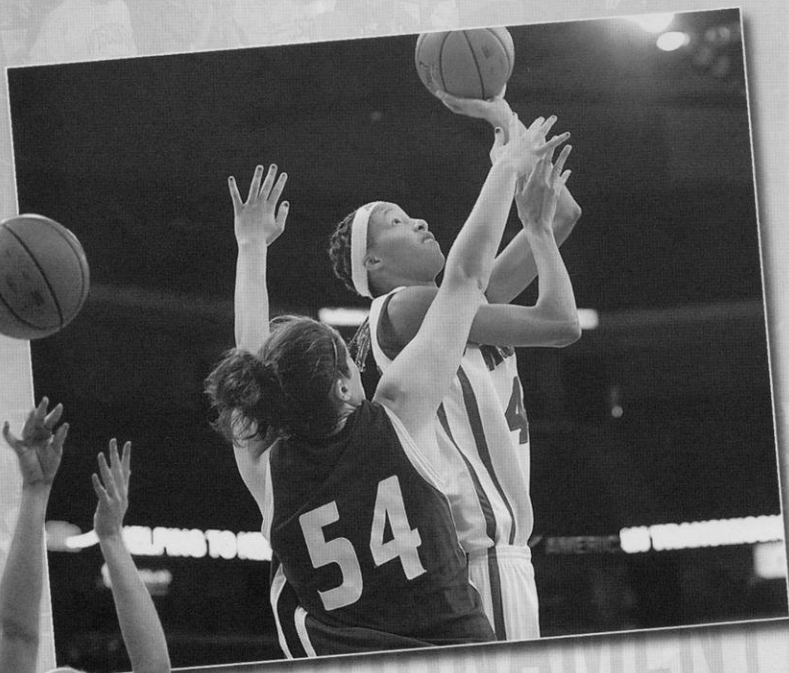

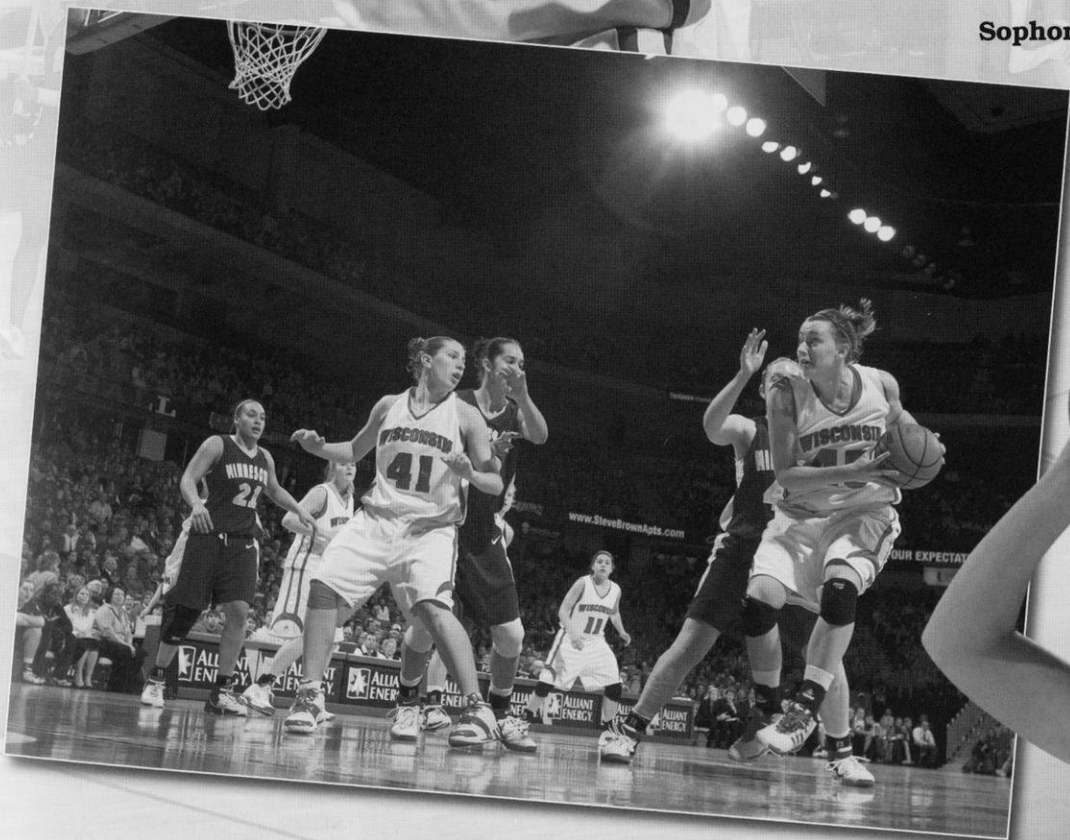

Wisconsin Basketball Attracts National Attention

With the launch Aug. 30 of the Big Ten Network, more UW games than ever before will be broadcast nationally and regionally.

With the promise of gender equity by 2011, the Big Ten Network has given conference women's sports a big lift in the amount and type of television coverage they can expect.

In its first year alone, 40 percent of the Big Ten Network programming will feature conference women's sports. The network will boast a programming lineup unparalleled in college sports television today, featuring between 350 and 400 live events including football, men's and women's basketball, Olympic sports, available conference championships and more original high-definition programming than any new network in television history. In addition to the Big Ten Network the Badgers will appear on ESPN2 this season, and have appeared in the past on ESPN, ESPN2 and CBS.

Wisconsin also has the opportunity for a number of their games to be delayed broadcast around the state by Wisconsin Public Television. Wisconsin Public Television is entering its 16th year of broadcasting Badger Women's Basketball on its statewide network. The WPT announce team features veteran announcer Ken Syke, and former UW player Karie Cattanach. Syke has been calling play-by-play on television for more than two decades at the high school and collegiate level.

When the Badger home games are not televised, they will be live video streamed on uwbaggers.com, the official Web site for Wisconsin Athletics. The games will also be archived on the site for later viewing by fans.

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

The Big Ten Network

In June 2006, the Big Ten announced the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. Available to all cable and satellite providers nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television (HDTV), the network allows fans to see their home teams, regardless of where they live.

The Big Ten Network launched its inaugural season on Aug. 30, 2007 with football, men's and women's basketball, a nightly studio show, classics and coaches shows, along with more Olympic sporting events and exposure for women's sports than has ever been aired on any other network.

Original campus programming produced by Big Ten member universities showcasing their academic excellence, talented students and award-winning programs will also be broadcast on the Big Ten Network.

In addition to airing more coverage of Big Ten sports than ever before, the Big Ten Network will also provide numerous benefits to communities around the Big Ten. Those include increased exposure for women's sports, providing positive role models for girls; a greater economic impact to the communities from added sporting event production, with the potential to generate higher attendance; and greater national exposure for the excellence that surrounds the academic endeavors of Big Ten universities, some of the most highly regarded in the nation. Also, an internship program at each of the 11 universities will offer students training for careers in sports, television and entertainment.

Badgers Give Back

As part of the overall experience at the University of Wisconsin, student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through volunteer activities. The Madison area is truly supportive of UW athletics and the department returns that support via outreach programs. Whether it's working with other UW students or getting out in the community, the Badgers strive to make Madison and Dane County a better place to live.

The Badger women's basketball program has received national recognition for its community service projects. The entire team has helped by contributing their time and efforts for Habitat for Humanity, Hoops for Hope, or by dishing out food at the Salvation Army soup kitchen. Many other team and individual service projects are arranged by the basketball players and staff.

Coach Lisa Stone also lends her name and time to a number of projects including events with Special Olympics, Junior Achievement, Sunshine Food Pantry, Susan G. Kommen Breast Cancer Foundation events with Hospice, United Way, the Tellurian UCAN, Inc., and the YMCA.

The variety of service projects in which UW players participate include visiting sick children in area hospitals, reading with Bookin' with Bucky, and participating in the Big Sister program. In addition, the team also regularly puts on several free basketball clinics for grade school children.

The basketball coaching staff annually recognizes the athlete or athletes who have shown a great interest and invested the most time in community service.

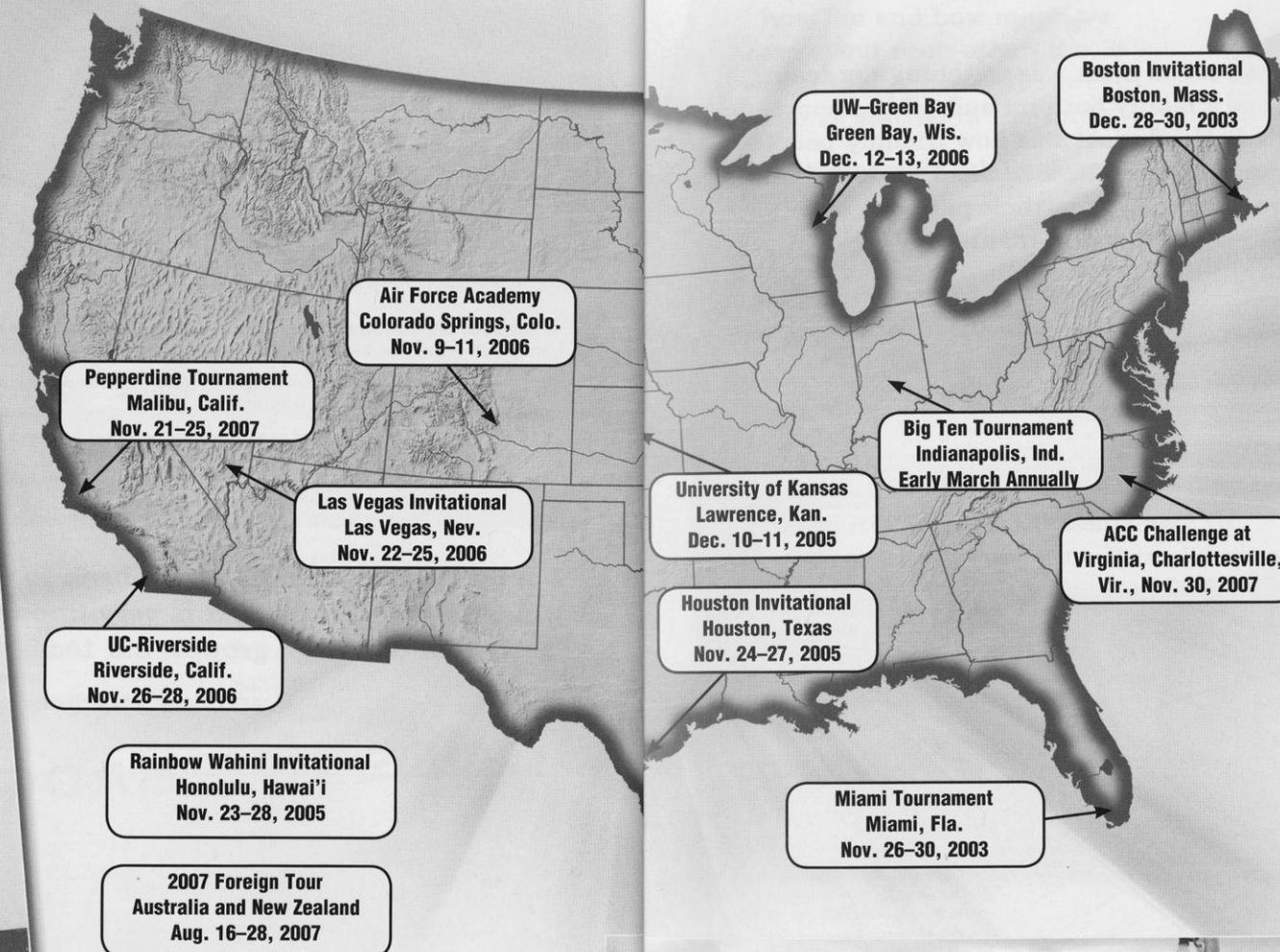
Badgers on the Road

The Wisconsin basketball team regularly travels across the country for numerous non-conference tournaments and postseason play. And in 2007, UW took its first foreign tour under Coach Lisa Stone. The Badgers played four games against Olympic-level competition while touring Australia and New Zealand.

In addition to all of the college towns and facilities around the Big Ten Conference, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with exciting road trips to all regions of the country. Within the past few seasons, the UW has made trips to Boston, Colorado, Florida, Hawaii, Kansas, Las Vegas, Malibu, and Texas for tournaments. Coming up on the Badgers' schedule for this season is an ACC Challenge in Virginia, and the Pepperdine tournament in beautiful Malibu, Calif.

In 2005, the UW football team and women's basketball team chartered together to Honolulu, Hawaii, where the Badger women participated in the Rainbow Wahini Invitational while the football team played the University of Hawaii in a regular-season game over Thanksgiving. The teams plan to make a return trip to the Islands over Thanksgiving of 2009.

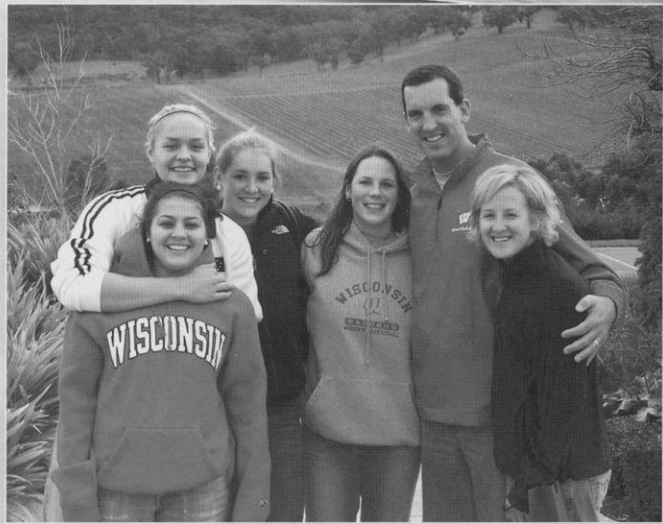

Event Travel

Wisconsin travels to games by air and sometimes bus, but charts most plane trips within the Big Ten Conference. The 18-game Big Ten schedule begins just after the December holidays, and extends until the Big Ten Conference Tournament in early March.

On the road, the team stays in hotels convenient to the competitive venues. The Badgers are served catered meals at the hotel. Travel arrangements are made so that the players miss a minimum amount of class time.



The UW team travels by charter for most flights, which means players can return home immediately after games and be ready for classes the next day.

The charters provide plenty of room for team members to do homework, visit or sleep.

The bus meets the team out on the tarmac at the airport for loading and unloading.

The Kohl Center

UW's Basketball, Hockey and Convocation Center

Wisconsin will celebrate the 10th anniversary of opening the Kohl Center in January of 2008. From its opening in 1998, the Kohl Center has become the happy home for the UW basketball and hockey programs. From comfortable spectator accommodations to the facilities for the sports, the Kohl Center has become a venerable venue from which the Badgers have derived considerable competitive advantage.

New Additions

An enlarged strength and conditioning area was finished in August of 2006. A second "Kohl Fetzer Academic Center" opened in October of 2006. This fully-staffed learning lab has computers, study areas and academic advisors for all of the sports which operate out of the Kohl Center, as well as those student-athletes who live close by. The newly finished Kellner Club, located on the second concourse, overlooks the Wisconsin State Capitol and serves as the dining facility for student-athletes.

Seating Capacity

The Kohl Center seats 17,142 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility seats approximately 14,000 for hockey, and between 15,000 and 17,000 for concerts.

Practice Pavilion

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion houses three full-size basketball courts to be used for basketball practice sessions when the Kohl Center main floor is booked for other events.

The area is naturally lit, and has its own restrooms and loading dock. It can be set with a stage and often is utilized for pre-event functions, luncheons, and other large-group gatherings.

Basketball Offices

The UW women's basketball offices are located on the second floor of the Kohl Center in a suite with the men's basketball and hockey offices.

The offices offer an excellent view of campus west and are conveniently located so that players can drop in at any time to meet with the coaches or to watch game tape.

The assistant coaches and head coach meet as a staff almost daily to discuss players, strategies, travel, and the myriad of other details involved with operating a Division I basketball program.

The assistant coaches have duties involving budgets, scheduling, team travel, recruiting, community service, and scouting. Some are liaisons with support services such as sports medicine, strength and conditioning or equipment.

The office features a large reception area that includes photos of athletes in action and beautiful scenes of Madison and the campus. The basketball offices are the base of operations for the staff, offering a central locale for the coaches to break down film and construct game plans.

Together with the director of basketball operations and head coach Lisa Stone, the staff forms the directional center of the UW women's program.

Basketball Locker Room

The Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey. Four other locker rooms are also available for multiple teams attending events such as the WIAA state tournaments, also held here.

The 2,200-square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind, including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.



A large back-lit W greets you as you enter the 2,200-square-foot Badger women's basketball locker room. The space is comprised of five areas including a lounge and adjacent study area; locker room, team meeting room, and a coaches lounge and locker. The area is a home away from home for student-athletes and is equipped with the latest in sound, television, and video equipment.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high-quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

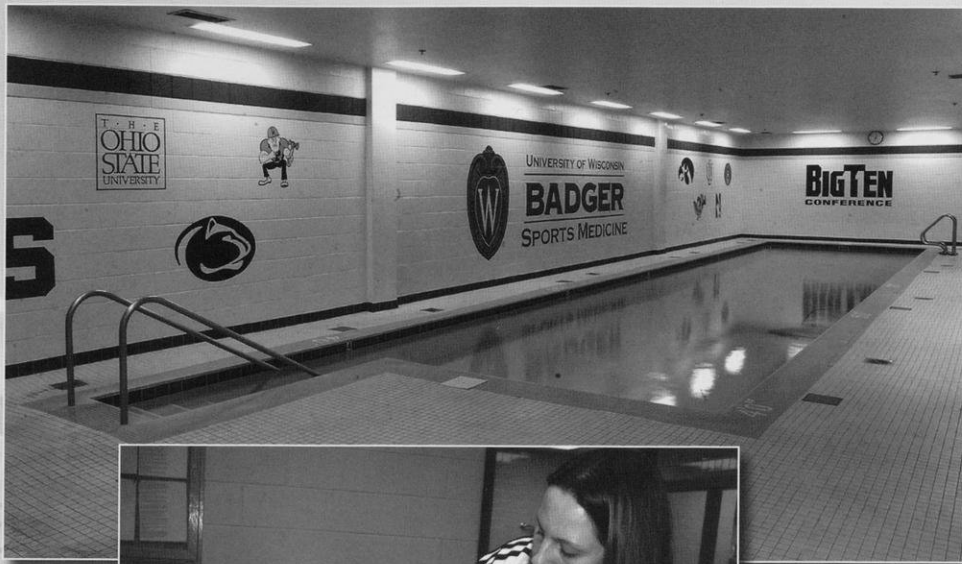
The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Karen Bloch is the full-time trainer who works with women's basketball. The training staff measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

There are several Sports Medicine facilities including the McClain Center, which features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, a Bod Pod for measuring body mass, and an on-site X-ray facility. The Kohl Center sports medicine area also has therapeutic equipment and rehabilitative apparatus, and is conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.



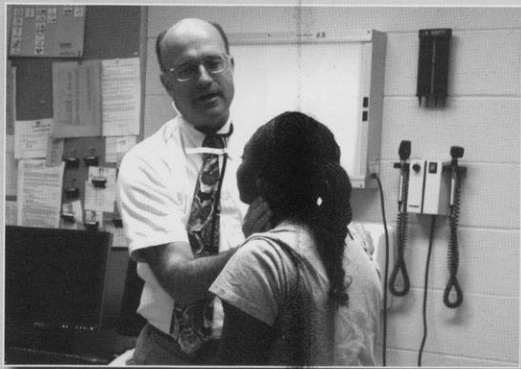

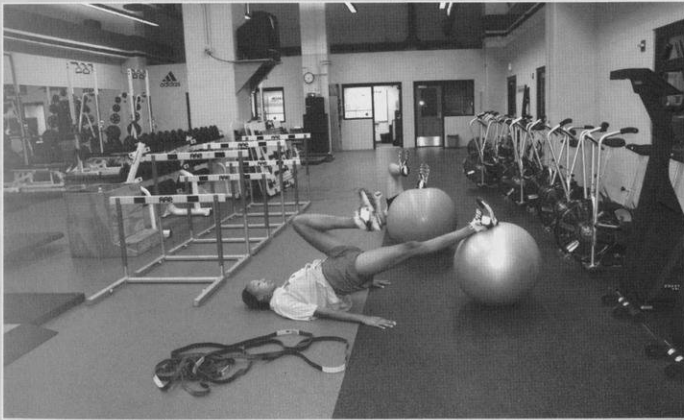


Strength and Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coach Greg Young is the dedicated advisor for women's basketball. "We train our athletes year-round. In-season, typically, we will train two times a week based off game and travel schedule, off-season it is usually four days a week," says Young.

"The college athletic season is both physically and mentally demanding so it's important that our athletes have the strength and stamina to be as strong at the end of the year as they were at the beginning of the season. The focus of most of our training programs is the Olympic lifts: the clean, the jerk, and the snatch, which develop explosive strength, starting strength to help our athletes out on the field and out on the court. The result is a pretty well-rounded program that caters to the individual strengths and weaknesses of all our athletes."

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center located in the McClain Athletic Facility provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access the online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The center features a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and

progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

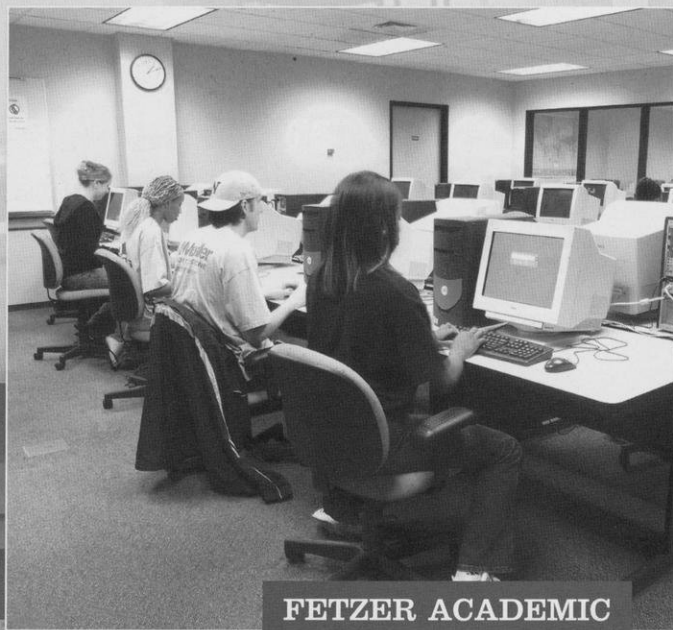
Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff, tutors and learning specialists render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/ Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach. The staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Opening in October of 2007 will be a similarly fashioned academic facility at the Kohl Center. This fully-staffed area will contain computers, advisors and learning specialists and will cater to those student-athletes who operate out of the Kohl Center, or who live in proximity to that arena.

Student-athletes can drop in to either

facility before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-on-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring over 200 athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.

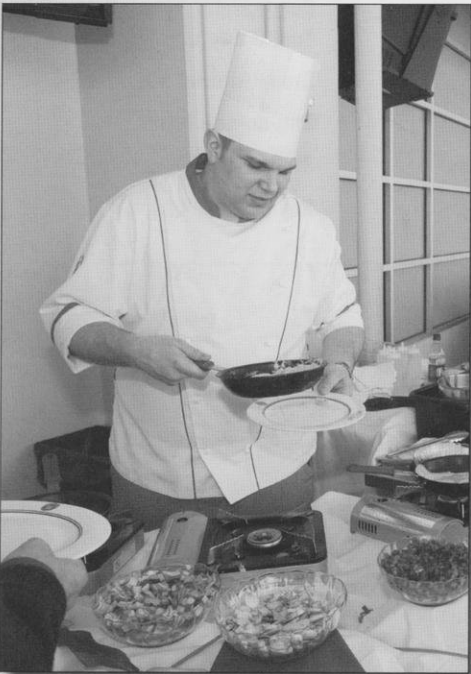

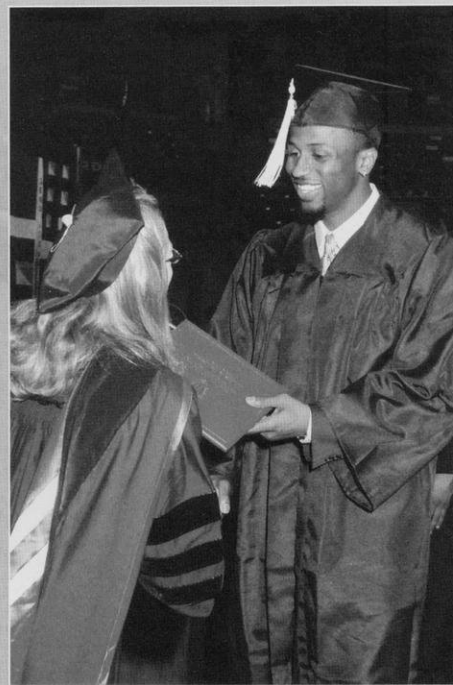

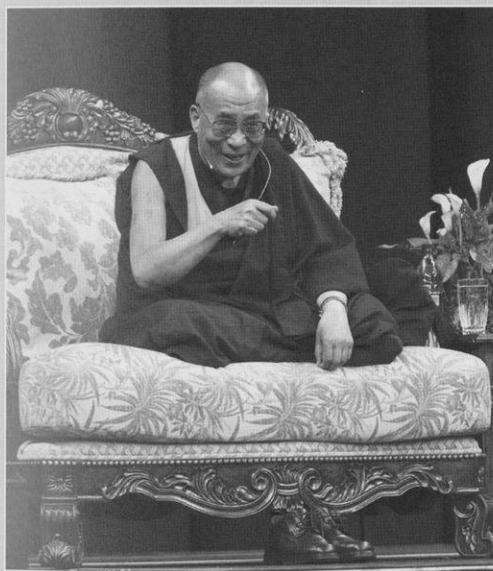
Student Life

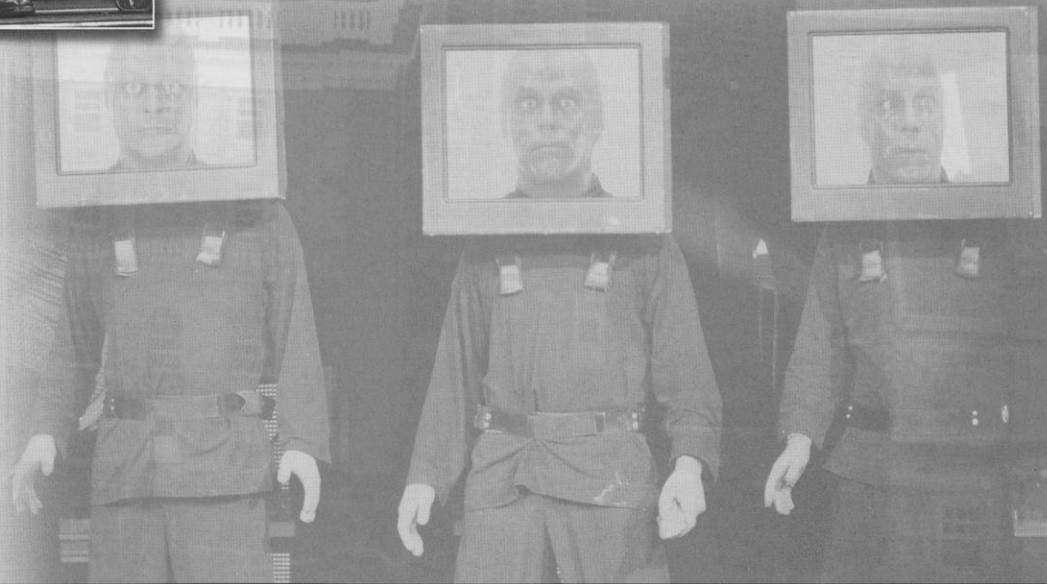

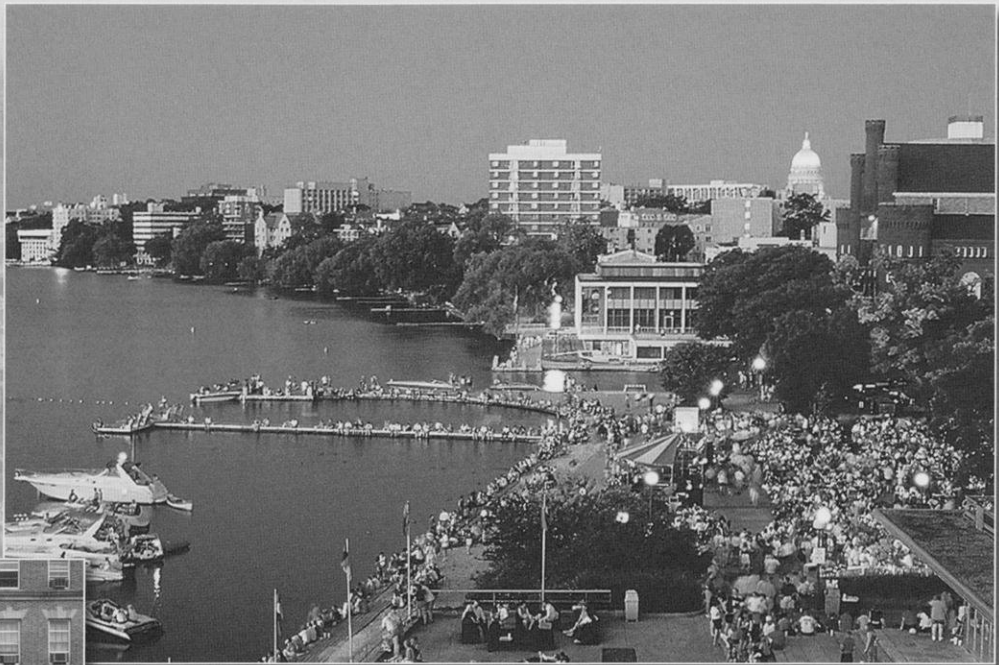

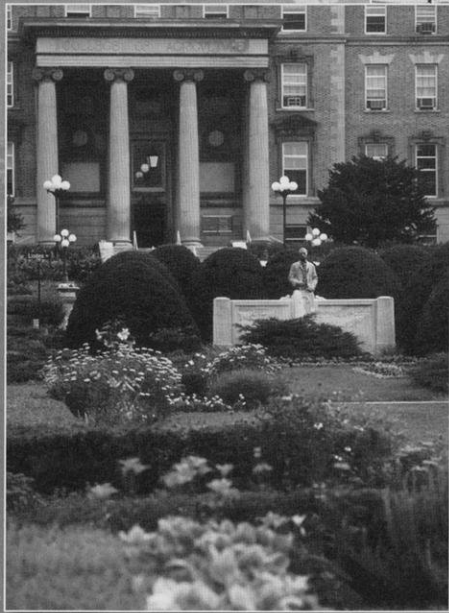

John D. Wiley is the 27th chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He assumed office Jan. 1, 2001.

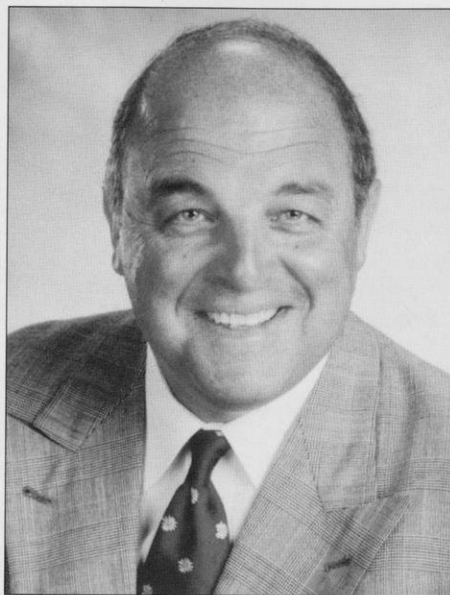
Wiley has served the university community in a variety of roles, including as associate dean in engineering, dean of the graduate school and the university's senior research officer, and most recently, the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs.

In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field.

Wiley currently serves as the president of the Big Ten Conference Council of Presidents/Chancellors.

Barry Alvarez**

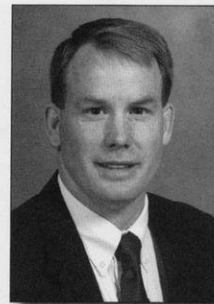
Barry Alvarez is in his fourth year as UW Director of Athletics and his second without the additional title of head football coach.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won eight national titles, including five NCAA championships. The Badgers have also had record-setting seasons academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the recently completed Camp Randall renovation and several additions to the Kohl Center as well as record-setting ticket sales.

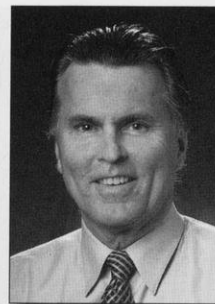
From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record). Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. He was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

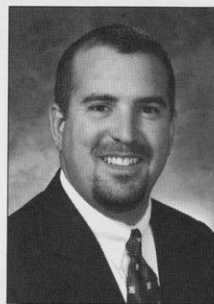

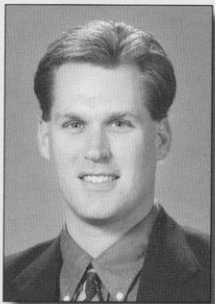

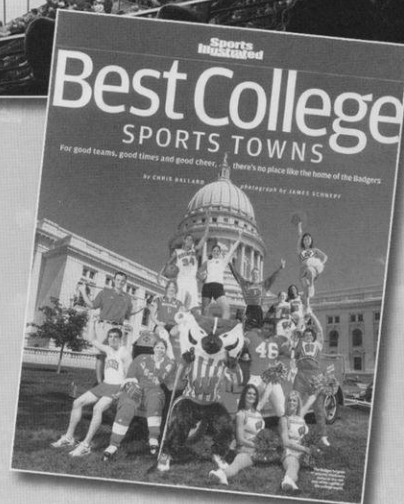

The UW has earned much national recognition for its college spirit including being named the "Best College Sports Town" by *Sports Illustrated* on Campus.

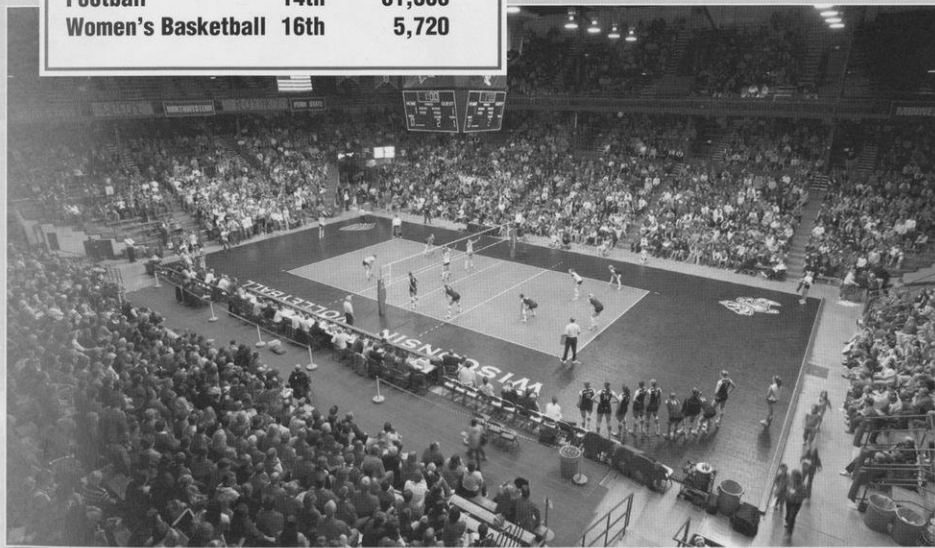


Above: UW men's and women's hockey both lead the nation in attendance.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HOSTS



Since 1993, the UW has hosted six NCAA championships and one NCAA men's basketball regional. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Frozen Four in 1993, 1997 and 2006. All three events were sell-outs including the 2006 crowd that saw Wisconsin win the national title.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at

University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

A Winning Athletic Program

In 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

Five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19).

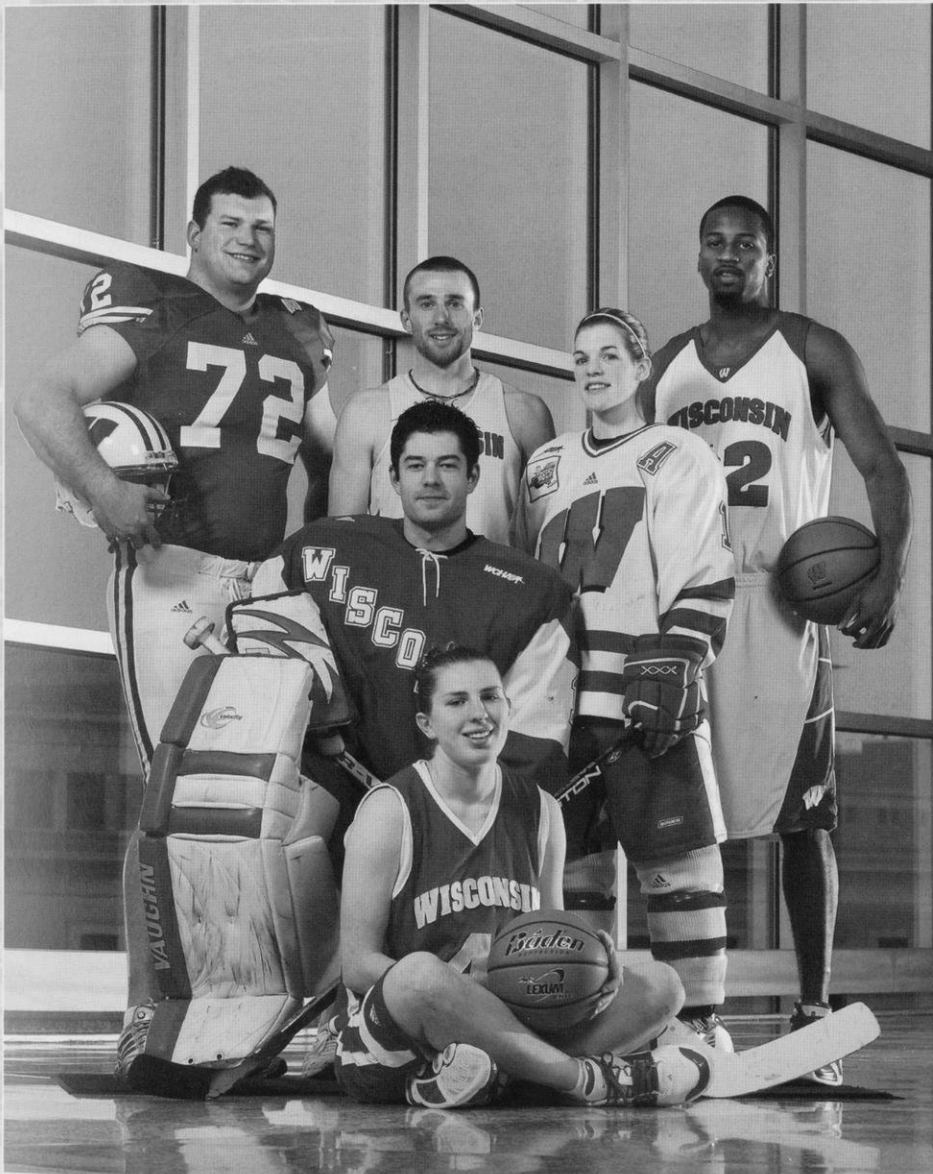

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

MEET THE COACHES

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Head Coach Lisa Stone



A Wisconsin native from nearby Oregon, Lisa Stone began her career with the Badger program in April, 2003. She came to Wisconsin from Drake University where she served as head coach three years, taking the Bulldogs to the 2002 NCAA Sweet 16.

A proven winner in four different programs, Stone's 22-year career collegiate record of 431-182 (.703) ranks among the top 25 in overall winning percentage among active Division I coaches.

Stone's Badgers turned the corner in 2006-07 setting a program record 23

wins (23-13) and heading to UW's first post-season appearance since 2002. The Badgers posted a 4-1 record and were the runner-up champions of the WNIT losing at Wyoming, 72-56, in the championship.

Stone faced a major refurbishing project when she took over at UW. She had the first losing season of her career in 2003-04, as she took a team that finished 7-21 in 2003, to a 10-17 record in 2004. Armed with five new recruits, insatiable energy and the desire to succeed, her second season with the Badgers showed a team that improved by leaps and bounds. The Badgers had more wins, and better statistics across the board while finishing with a 12-16 mark including their first win at the Big Ten Basketball Tournament since 2002.

The 2005-06 team suffered through an injury-laden season to an 11-18 record and a ninth place Big Ten finish, but in 2006-07, the Badgers improved to a tie for fifth in the conference (7-9) and posted the first winning season since 2002

Just as important to Stone as a winning record is having student-athletes who are accomplished in the classroom. Stone's 2006-07 Badger team had the third best fall grade point average of all 23 Badger teams with a gpa of 3.239 and finished with a record cumulative gpa of 3.1 in the spring. Ten individuals have garnered 18 Academic All-Big Ten honors during her tenure.

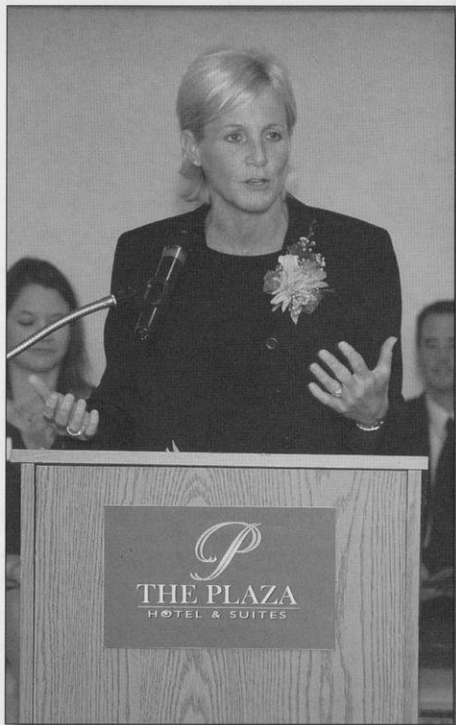
While at Drake University, her 2001 team ranked sixth nationally, and her 2002 team ranked 15th nationally in the

Women's Basketball Coaches Association's Academic Top 25.

Stone's basketball record at Drake was also successful, posting a 64-27 (.703) record in three years. With a 25-8 record, her 2002 team had the best record and the highest national ranking (20th) at the school in 20 years. Drake was 23-7 in Stone's first season before bowing out in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

She was recognized for her coaching success in 2002 with an invitation to join Team USA as an assistant coach to Marsha Sharp of Texas Tech. Team USA won the gold medal at the 2002 World Championships for Young Women Qualifying Tournament in Ribeirao Preto, Brazil.

Prior to Drake, Stone built one of the top NCAA Division III programs in the nation at UW-Eau Claire. The two-time Division III national coach of the year and five-time Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) coach of the year, took a program that had only one winning season in its history, and guided 11 squads to 20-win seasons and 11 appearances in the NCAA Division III tournament. She

compiled a 277-59 (.824) record in her 12 seasons, which ranks second all-time for most wins in the league's history.

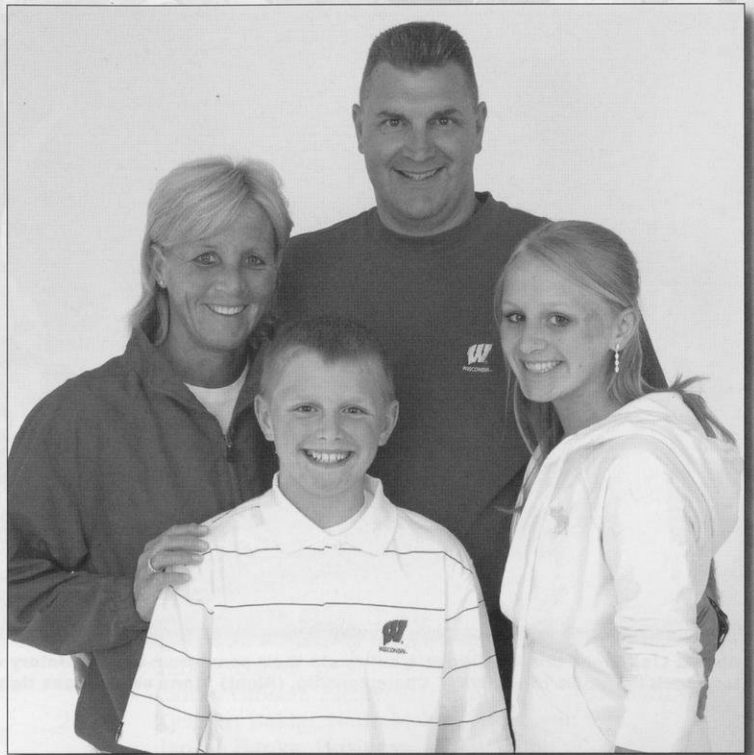
In each of Stone's last nine seasons at UW-Eau Claire, the Blugolds won at least 22 games and never lost more than six. UW-Eau Claire completed its best season in 1999-2000, winning its first 28 games before falling in the Division III NCAA Sweet 16 to the eventual national champion.

Stone began her coaching career at Cornell College (Mount Vernon, Iowa) where she had a 34-32 record in three years as head coach from 1985-88. At 23, she was the youngest four-year college coach in the nation when she led the Rams to three consecutive Southern Division titles in the Midwest Conference.

As a player, Stone (then Lisa Anderson) earned four letters each in ten-

nis, basketball and track during her high school career. She led the Class A Oregon Panthers to the Wisconsin state basketball tournament in 1979 and 1980, earning first-team all-state honors as a senior and second-team recognition as a junior.

She played her collegiate ball at the University of Iowa from 1980-84, where she earned her bachelor's degree in 1984. She added a master's degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1986. At Iowa, Stone played for one of the country's outstanding coaches in C. Vivian Stringer. She was a four-year standout at point guard, scoring 1,129 points, which ranks 17th in Iowa history. She also ranks seventh in assists (322) and eighth in steals (177). Three times Stone served as Iowa's captain and twice



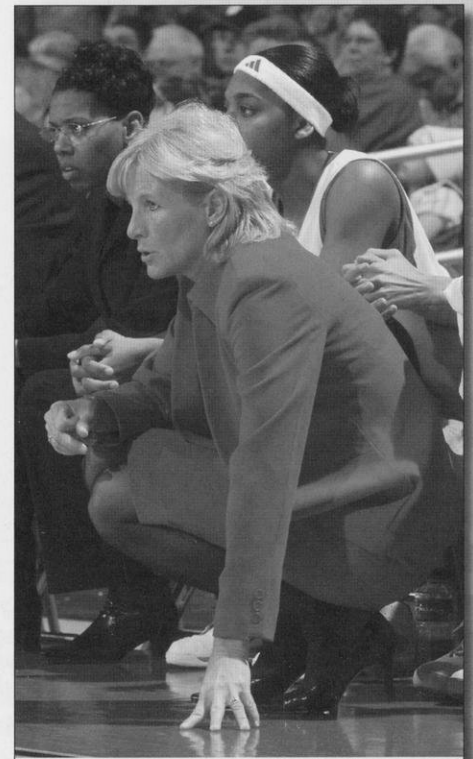

was the Hawkeyes' MVP. She won the 1984 Big Ten Medal of Honor recognizing her as one of the top scholar-athletes in the conference.

Stone and her husband Ed, a certified public accountant, are the parents of Allison (14) and Tyler (11).

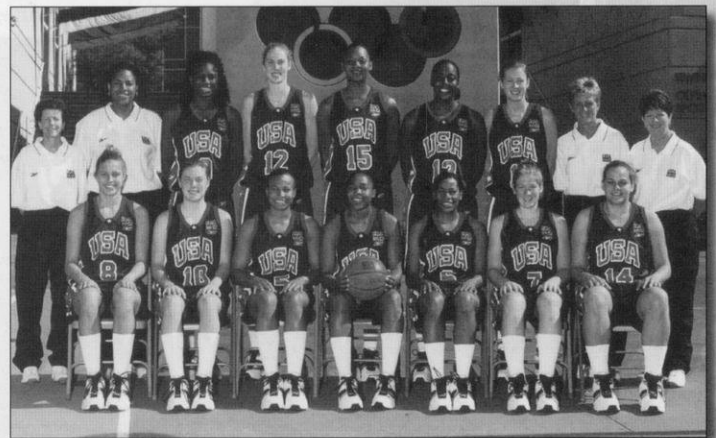

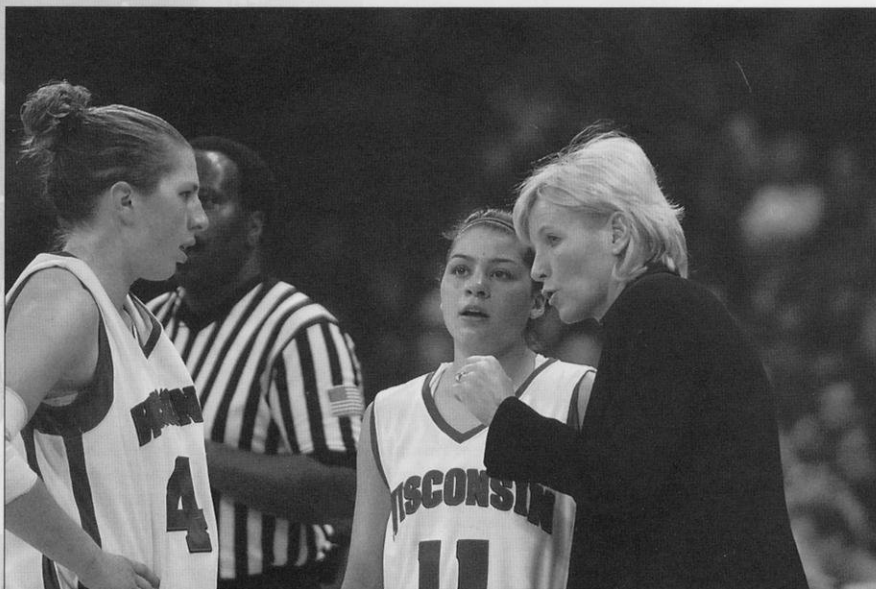

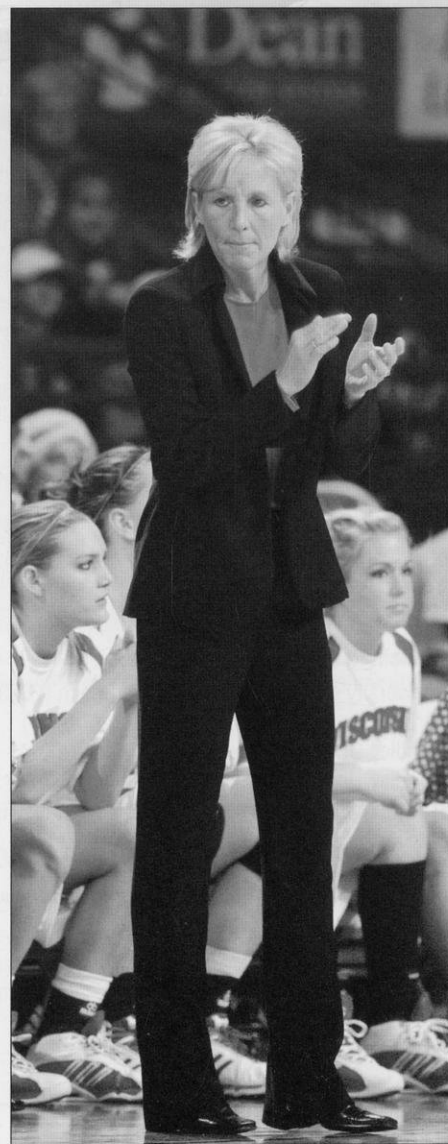

Assistant coach Donna Freitag joined Coach Stone as an assistant coach in 2000, after coaching positions at Bradley University and Drake University and Wisconsin. A native of Oregon, Wis., and lifelong friend of head coach Lisa Stone, Freitag has returned to Madison where she began her basketball coaching career at the University of Wisconsin serving as an assistant women's coach from 1986-94. She followed Stone to Wisconsin after three years as the associate head coach at Drake University.



The former head coach and assistant coach at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., Freitag serves as the recruiting coordinator and top assistant. Taking over the Braves program after two years as an assistant coach, Freitag compiled a 37-69 record during four seasons as Bradley's head coach. In her initial campaign in 1996-97, the Braves won seven consecutive games, finished fourth in the MVC and won the school's first-ever MVC Tournament game by upsetting host Southwest Missouri State.

"Donna is a highly respected Division I coach," said head coach Lisa Stone. "Her vast experience as a player, assistant and head coach at the Division I level are extremely valuable to me and to the Wisconsin program. She is very knowledgeable, honest and trustworthy. These qualities coupled with her experience and her familiarity with the State of Wisconsin, make her an outstanding recruiting coordinator."

As an assistant at Wisconsin (1986-94), Freitag was an integral part of a rebuilding process that turned a struggling Badger

program into a nationally recognized team that received its first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament in 1992.

Freitag grew up in the same neighborhood as Stone, and the two played high school and college basketball together. Stone was a standout point guard at the University of Iowa, and Freitag joined her for her final two seasons after earning MVP honors in two years at UW-Platteville.

At Iowa, Freitag was named the Hawkeye's team captain and most valuable player during her senior season in 1982-83. She went on to play two seasons of professional basketball for Team Tivoli in Dublin, Ireland, from 1983-85.

"Returning to Wisconsin with (head coach) Lisa Stone is a dream come true," said Freitag. "The opportunity to work with Lisa and build on the basketball tradition already established at Wisconsin is outstanding."

A Midwest native, Tasha McDowell joined the Badgers as an assistant women's basketball coach after a four-year stint at UC-Santa Barbara where she served as an assistant from 2001-05.

McDowell served as the Gauchos' recruiting coordinator for three years. She was also responsible for coaching the UCSB defense, and helped coordinate the offense in her final season. In addition, she served as the team's community outreach coordinator and was in charge of guard development.

Coming off an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2004, the Gauchos finished the 2004-05 campaign with a 21-9 record, and made the NCAA Tournament for the ninth consecutive year and 11th time in program history. The Big West Conference champion for the 10th year, UCSB garnered a No. 13 seed in the Tempe Regional, and lost 61-51 to Notre Dame in the first round.

By coming to Wisconsin, McDowell is returning to her Midwestern roots where she was a 1997 graduate of St. Ambrose University in Davenport, Iowa, with a degree in mathematics. Prior to her job at Santa Barbara, she was the second assistant at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., where she aided in the Braves' recruiting efforts. She also spent two seasons at the University of Dayton, helping the Flyers record their first winning campaign in six years and advance to the 2000 postseason WNIT. McDowell began her coaching career as an assistant at St. Ambrose in 1997.

From Rock Island, Ill., McDowell played four years of collegiate basketball, the first two of which were spent at Illinois Central College. After graduating from ICC, McDowell attended Southwest Missouri State before transferring to St. Ambrose. In her lone season with the Queen Bees, the team posted a 27-7 record and advanced to the NAIA National Tournament. A point guard, McDowell averaged 13.4 points, 5.1 assists and 3.6 steals as a senior, all team highs.

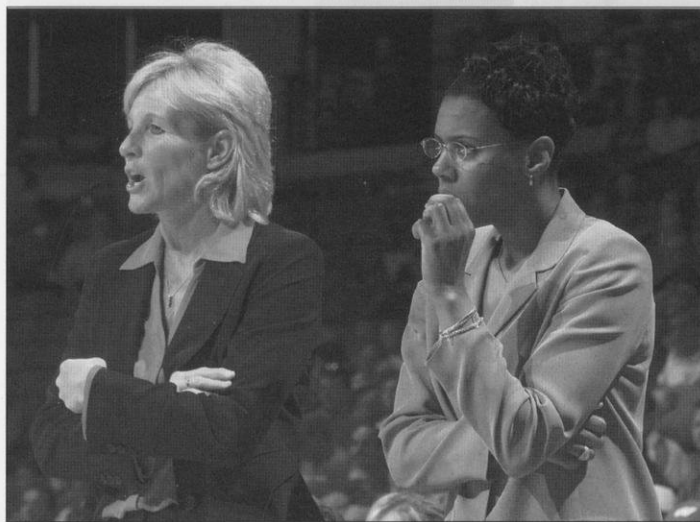

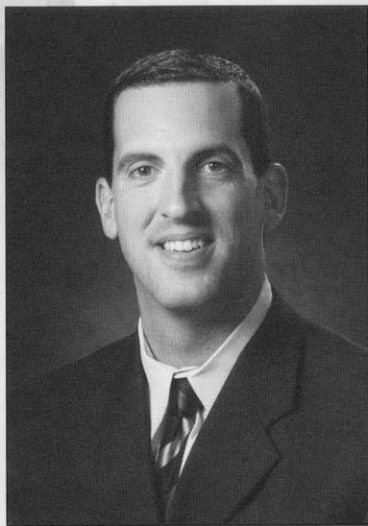

Ty Margenthaler became an assistant at Wisconsin in July, 2006, after six years with the women's basketball program at Bradley University.

A 1997 graduate of Southern Illinois at Edwardsville, Margenthaler played a role in the Braves success, both from a recruiting standpoint as well as on the court. Margenthaler developed a pair of Bradley centers into Missouri Valley All-Conference players. Dena Williams (2002) and Ashley Chelleen (2003) both earned spots on the Valley's All-Freshman squad. Williams earned first-team All-Missouri Valley Conference honors after leading the team in scoring, rebounding and blocked shots, and later signed a contract to play professionally in Europe. Stephanie Schmitz took over the Director of Women's Basketball Operations position in 2006 after serving three years as an assistant basketball coach for Stone at Wisconsin from 2003-06.

A former Drake University standout player, Schmitz served also as a student assistant for Lisa Stone at her alma mater in 2002-03.

A 2003 graduate of Drake University, Schmitz was the feisty point guard who, in 2002, led Drake to its first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 20 years. The Fond du Lac, Wis. native completed her playing career ranked third in career assists with 546 for a 4.0 assists per game average. She was also fourth in steals with 220 and fifth in three-point field goals made with 135.

A two-time first-team All-Missouri Valley Conference performer, Schmitz averaged 13.2 points and 4.6 assists as a senior while helping the Bulldogs to a final USA Today/ESPN ranking of No. 20. Schmitz, who scored a career-high 36 points in a semifinal round victory against Bradley in the 2002 MVC Tournament, was also invited to participate in the 2002 WNBA Draft Camp.

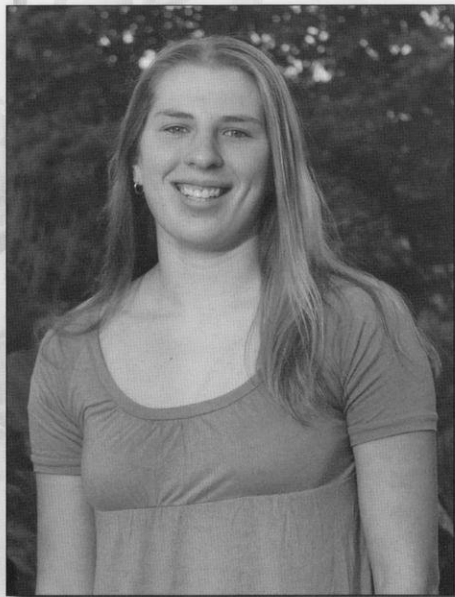

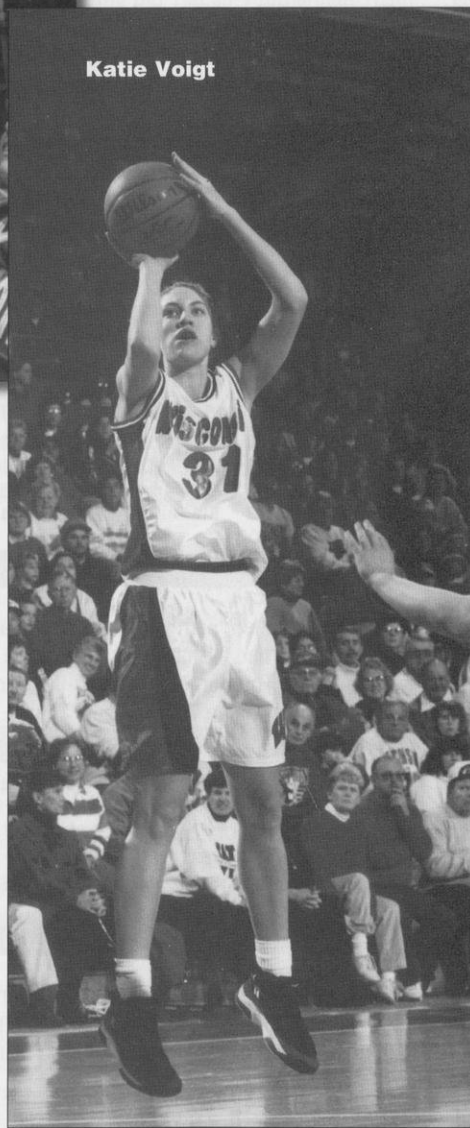
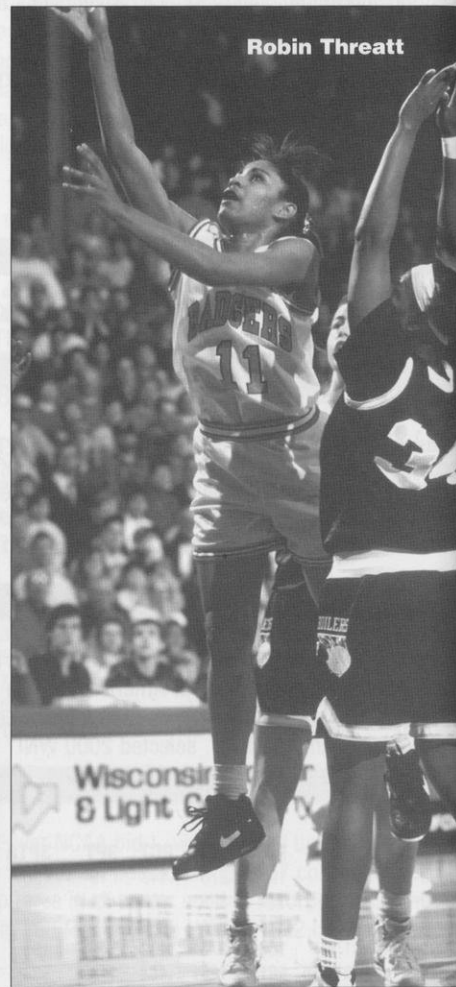
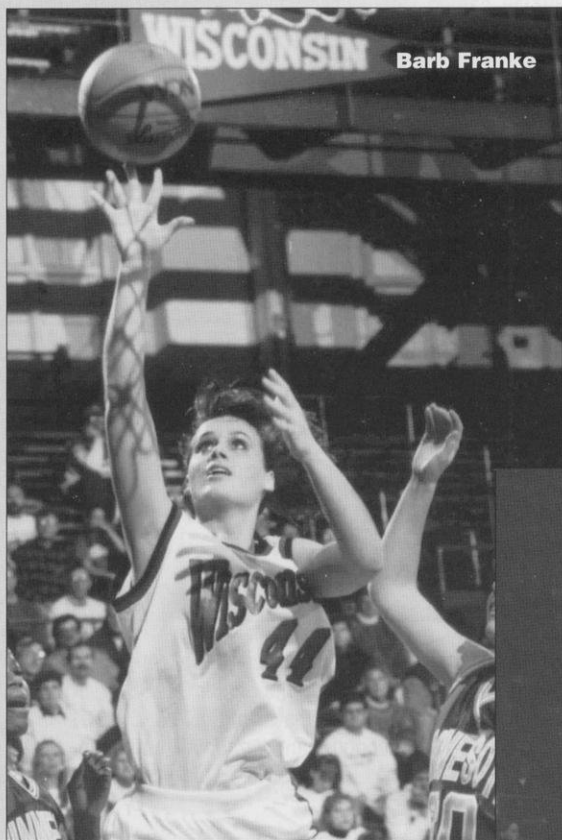
Huff's Number 21 Is Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979-83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

Robin Threatt broke Huff's 11-year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But no one has ever reached Huff's incredible 1,201 rebounding mark.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarterfinals of the 1982 AIAW National Championship. She was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981-82. Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first female American chosen to play professionally in Spain in 1983-84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998.

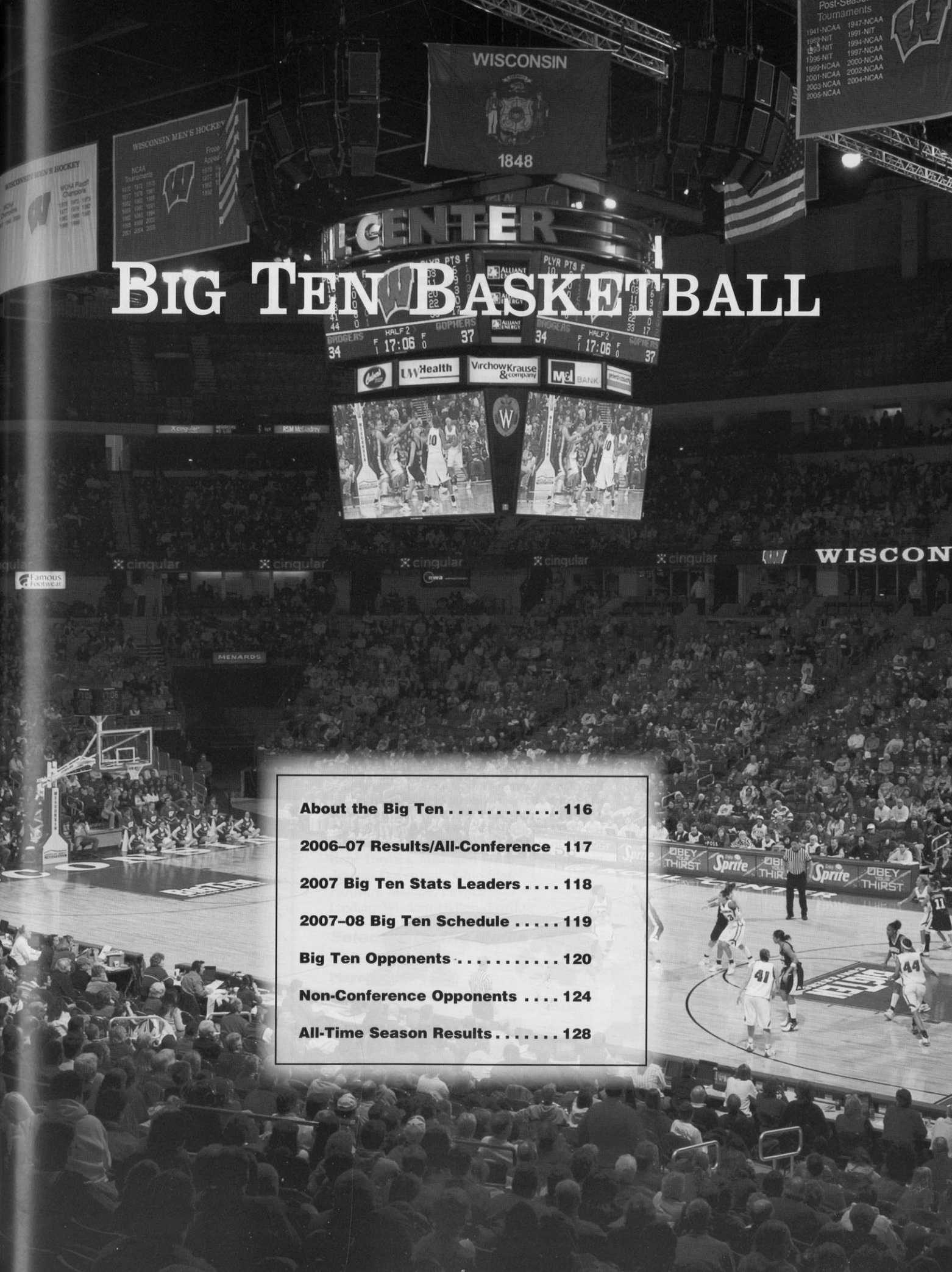

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Big Ten Conference Basketball

One of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the arena of athletics. With the 2006-07 season marking the 25th anniversary of conference women's championships, the Big Ten looks forward to the continuing tradition.

Big Ten women's athletics programs have led the nation in both women's basketball and volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 500 conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

The Big Ten Conference began its conference basketball tournament to decide the automatic qualifier for the NCAA championship in 1995. Purdue has won six of the last nine titles and became the Big Ten's first NCAA champion in 1999. The Boilermakers were the NCAA runners-up in 2001 and also took part in the Final Four in 1994. Ohio State and Iowa advanced to the Final Four in 1993. Penn State was a Final Four team in 2000, while Minnesota was a national semifinalist in 2004.

Purdue, who won the Big Ten tournament in 2006, continued its run in the postseason, and advanced all the way to the NCAA Regional finals, but fell to North Carolina, 84-72. A Big Ten team has been to the Final Four five of the past nine years.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 18 games. Schools play eight teams twice and two teams once.

The 2008 Big Ten Conference tournament is set for March 6-9 at Consecro Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds, determined by standings, receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarter-final round on Friday. The winner will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.



The Big Ten Network

Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs.

The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

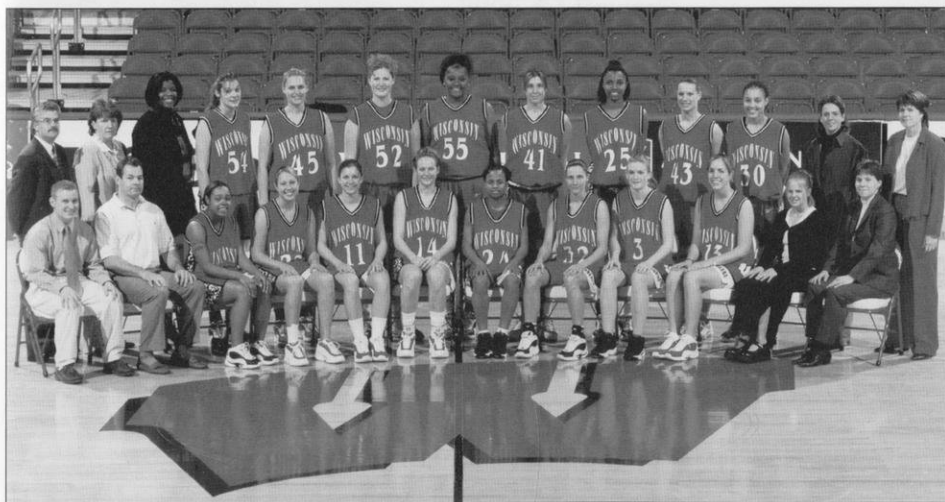

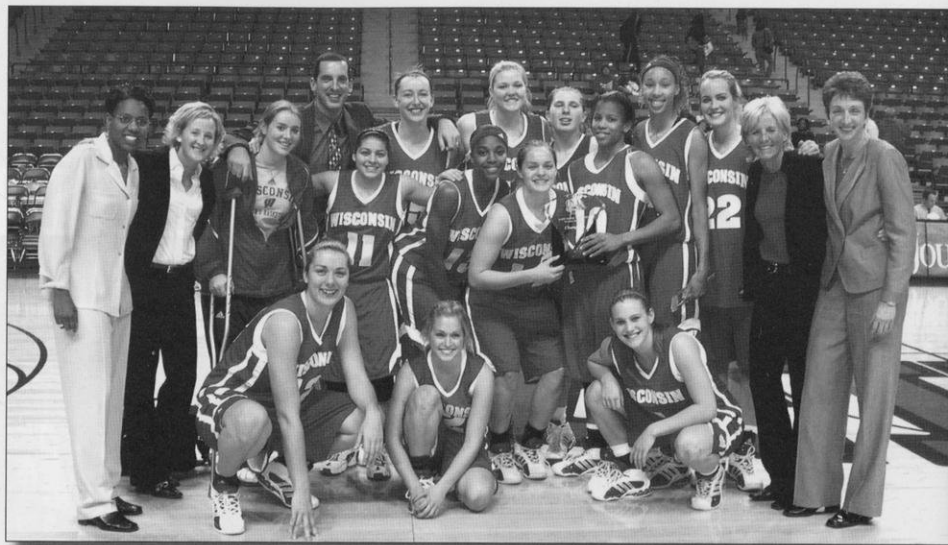

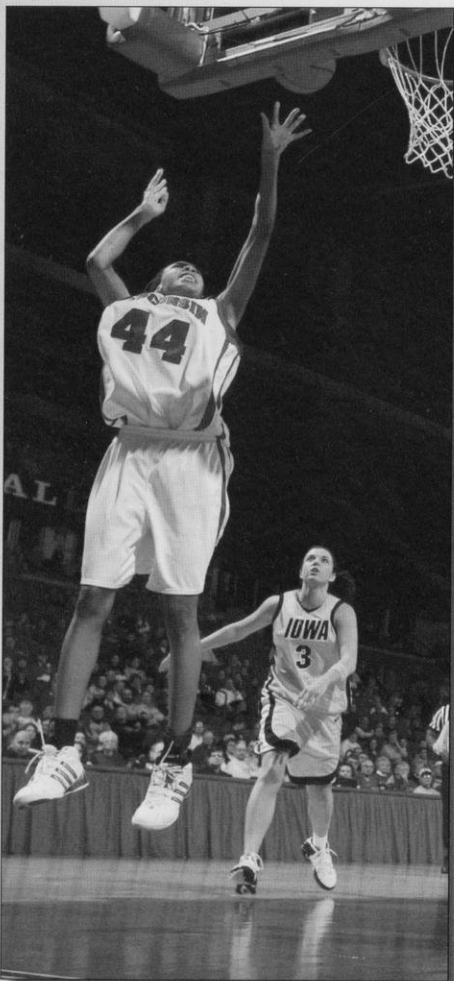
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Looking Back at Last Season

- With a 23-13 mark, the Badgers concluded the 2006-07 season with a program record 23 wins, and the most games ever played by a Badger team with 36. Wisconsin's 17 home wins last season are also the most victories at home in program history.
- The women's basketball team joined the Wisconsin football (13), men's basketball (30) and women's hockey (36) teams as programs who set school records for most wins in a season in 2006-07.
- The Badgers competed in post-season play for the first time since 2002 finishing second in the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT). Wisconsin was not able to overcome the injury to point guard Rae Lin D'Alie in the opening half of the WNIT Championship final and lost to Wyoming 72-56 in front of a record 15,462 in Laramie, Wyo.



The Badgers won the Rebel Shootout tournament over Thanksgiving in Las Vegas. Jolene Anderson was the MVP and Danille Ward and Janese Banks joined her on the all-tournament team.



Danielle Ward returns for her final season. The 6-4 post player has led the team in blocks the past two years and ranks third in career blocks with 116 to start the season.

- The 2007 tournament marked UW's third WNIT championship appearance. The Badgers beat Florida to win the WNIT championship in 2000, and were the runners-up to Arkansas in 1999, and now Wyoming in 2007. UW is 13-2 in WNIT tournament participation including a 13-0 record in WNIT games at home.
- Junior guard Jolene Anderson took her game to another level during the WNIT tournament putting up two career-best 30-point performances against Arkansas State and Virginia. She shot 45 percent from the field and averaged 25.8 points per game. Her 129 points set a new WNIT scoring record replacing the mark of 116 points set by Jenny Lingor of then-Southwest Missouri State (now Missouri State) during the 2005 event.
- Anderson became UW's first Big Ten scoring champion with a 19.3 points per game average in Big Ten games this season. She also became the fastest UW player to score 1,500 career points. Anderson broke the UW single-season scoring record of 601 points set in 1995-96, setting a new

record with 714 points. She earned her first All-Big Ten first team honors and was UW's sixth WBCA/Kodak District IV All-American.

- The Badgers tied for fifth in the Big Ten with a 7-9 record, their best finish since a tie for fifth in 2002. At 23-13, UW had its first 20-win season since 2000, its first postseason appearance and its best season under fourth-year coach Lisa Stone.
- Head coach Lisa Stone concluded her fourth season at Wisconsin with a 56-64 (.467) school record. In her 22nd season of coaching, Stone is 431-182 overall (.703 winning percentage). She achieved career victory No. 400 with a win over Idaho State on Nov. 25, 2005, and ranks 22nd in all-time career win percentage among active Division I coaches.
- Stone coached her 600th career game at Indiana on Feb. 2, 2007, and coached in her 100th game at Wisconsin vs. Minnesota on Jan. 7, 2007.

WISCONSIN'S RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin led the Big Ten in cumulative attendance four years, and has ranked among the top 20 in the nation in attendance since 1995. Wisconsin is home to several Big Ten Conference attendance records including the all-time best average with 10,455/game in 1998. UW set a league record with an average of 12,274 attending Big Ten games that same year.

2006-07, A Record-Setting Adventure

BADGERS BY THE NUMBERS

1,500 Jolene Anderson became the fastest to 1,500 points in her 85th career game on Feb. 18. She is just the second UW player in program history to record 1,500 points, 500 rebounds, 250 assists and 150 steals. The other was Tamara Moore (1998-2002).

1,000 Janese Banks became UW's 19th 1,000 point scorer Feb. 25.

714 Jolene Anderson surpassed the 11 year-old UW single season scoring mark of 601 with a personal-best 30 points vs. Arkansas State on March 18, and set the new record with 714.

309 Jolene Anderson became UW's first Big Ten Conference scoring leader with 309 points and a 19.3 points per game average in 2007.

51 The 88-37 win over Southern Mississippi was the largest margin of victory under fourth year coach Lisa Stone.

35 Jolene Anderson's double-figure scoring streak of 35 games, the longest in the Big Ten, was stopped with her five points at UC-Riverside Nov. 18. Her new streak now stands at 29.

23 UW's 23 wins sets a school record for most wins in a season and far surpasses the total number of wins in 2005-06 (11-18) and the most wins (12) in a single season in Lisa Stone's UW career. The 23-13 record is the best since the 1999-2000 team finished 21-12.

17 The 17 home victories sets a record for most wins at home. It is the most since 1998-99 team was 15-3. The 9-0 home record to begin the season was the longest home win streak under UW coach Lisa Stone.

10 This UW team reached 10 wins faster than any other squad coached by fourth-year coach Lisa Stone, and the third fastest in school history after the 1982-83 (13-1) and 2001-02 (16-1) teams.

7 The Badgers set a Kohl Center record and tied the school record for fewest turnovers in a game with seven versus Minnesota on Jan. 28.

3.239 The UW women's basketball team had a fall term GPA of 3.239, second highest among the women's teams and third highest among all 23 UW men's and women's teams.

.25 UW Coach Lisa Stone gave \$.25 times a sellout (17,142) for the 15,269 fans who attended the UW vs. Minnesota game Jan. 28. The money was matched by other groups and over \$10,000 was donated to Gilda's Club Madison, a community center for cancer patients and family.

- **REBOUNDS:** UW out-rebounded 32 of 36 opponents (not Michigan State, Purdue or Minnesota twice) and was fourth in the conference averaging 39.8 rebounds per game (ranked second in offensive boards with 15.64 per game).

- **DEFENSE:** Wisconsin allowed opponents an average of 62.9 points per game this season (fifth in the Big Ten).

- **POINT PRODUCTION:** The Badgers scored 93 points against Northwestern (12/28) and Iowa (2/25) and 91 points in their first game at Air Force (11/10). UW averaged 70.4 points per game (second in the Big Ten). UW averaged 7.4 points more than its opponents (third in the Big Ten).

- **TURNOVERS:** The Badgers ranked third in the Big Ten in turnover margin, forcing opponents into 18.56 turnovers per game while averaging 17.17 for a plus margin of +1.39. UW tied its own school record for fewest turnovers with

seven vs. Minnesota on Jan. 28, 2007.

- **SUCCESS AT HOME:** Wisconsin had the best start at home under Lisa Stone at 9-0 matching the start of the 2001-02 team that finished 10-3. At 17-3, UW set the record for the most home wins and best home mark since the 1998-99 team was 15-3.

- **RECORD NUMBER OF WINS:** UW's 23 wins set a school record for wins in a season and the six-straight wins to start the season was the longest win streak for fourth-year coach Lisa Stone. The 23-13 mark is UW's best since the 1999-2000 team finished 21-12. The seven Big Ten wins is the most under Stone and best since since an 8-8 finish in 2001-02.

- **RECORD WATCH:** The Badgers set several season records including the best free throw shooting team and the team with the fewest turnovers in Badger history. UW set the school Big Ten free throw record, hitting .752 (249-331). The old mark was 74.9 percent in 1991. Overall UW 74.2 percent (old charity mark was 71.9 set 16 years ago in 1990-91).

In turnovers, UW just missed the school Big Ten record, but in overall games, UW averaged 17.17, replacing the old record of 17.84 average/game set in 1997-98.

Ready for the National Stage

The Badgers return all but one from a record-setting 23-win season (23-13) and WNIT runner-up championship appearance. UW is led by three senior starters: Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.), Janese Banks (Indianapolis) and Danielle Ward (Milwaukee, Wis.) form the nucleus of what should be an upwardly-mobile new season for the Badgers.

A three-time USA Basketball participant and first team All-Big Ten player, Anderson has led Wisconsin in scoring for three-straight seasons last season averaging 19.8 points per game and secured the Big Ten scoring title with a 19.3 point average in conference games. She has led UW in rebounding the past two years last year averaging 7.1 per game. She was the fastest UW male or female player to score 1,000 and 1,500 points. She was a gold medalist with the USA Basketball U19, U20 and U21 teams.

Collecting 714 points in her junior season, Anderson set UW's single season scoring record by over 100 points (the old mark was 601 set in 1995-96 by UW all-time scoring leader Barb Franke). She has played and started in every game in her career, and has scored in double figures in 89 of her 93 career games.

Banks joins Anderson as a three-year starter. She has been second in scoring the past two seasons, last year averaging a career-best 14.6 points per game. She moved from the point guard duties she had as a sophomore and was second in rebounding with 6.3 per game. Banks has led UW in free throw shooting three-straight years, hitting 166-of-200 last year for 83.0 percent.

Along with Anderson, Banks was named to the 2006 Rebel Shootout and 2007 WNIT all-tournament teams. She also earned her second Academic All-Big Ten honor and was named honorable mention All-Big Ten.

The 6-4 Ward became a regular starter at post at the end of her sophomore season and started 25 games as a junior. She averaged 7.9 points and was the third-leading rebounder with 5.3 per game. She had the best field goal shooting

percentage on the team for a second year hitting 45.1 percent.

The Badgers return junior 6-4 center Caitlin Gibson (Jefferson, Wis.), who started 25 of 36 games and contributed 5.3 points and 4.0 rebounds per game. Her junior classmate, 6-1 guard Chris Spencer (Traverse City, Mich.), sat out most of her sophomore season after hip surgery in December, but is ready to return to action this fall.

Last year UW welcomed eight newcomers including seven freshmen and community college transfer, Ivana Mijalcevic (pronounced me-AL-cha-vich), from Colby Community College in Colby, Kan. The 6-3 native of Serbia played sparingly in the post in 17 games averaging 1.6 points per game.

Three other freshmen found themselves starting led by Rae Lin D'Alie (Waterford, Wis.) at point guard. D'Alie (pronounced duh-LEE-ah) led the conference in assists with 5.0 per game and contributed 7.0 points per game. She started all 36 games, but broke her hand in the last game of the season. She returns ready to play this fall.

Also starting 14 games and becoming the third-leading scorer was Mariah Dunham, a 6-1 guard from Watertown, Wis. Dunham, who played all five positions in high school, averaged 8.0 points and 5.1 rebounds per game. Help in the post also came from 6-2 Brittany Heins of Postville, Iowa. Heins started eight

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Since the award was initiated in 1986, Wisconsin has garnered 82 Academic All-Big Ten honors, which ranks first among Big Ten basketball teams for the most academic honorees in the history of the conference. The Badgers had two Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2007.

games and averaged 2.9 points and 2.4 rebounds.

UW's first year backcourt included Teah Gant, a 5-10 guard from Oswego,

Ill. and Sarah Ingison a 5-7 guard from Roseville, Minn. Gant really came on at the end of the season averaging 16.3 minutes and contributing 3.6 points per game. Ingison backed up D'Alie all season contributing 1.0 points and 8.3 minutes per game. Also in the backcourt was walk-on Annie Crangle, a 5-7 guard from Piedmont High School in Piedmont, Calif. Crangle was injured much of the year with a stress fracture in her leg.

With their sights on improving greatly in the conference and nationally, the Badgers welcome three newcomers: 6-4 forward Lin Zastrow (Jefferson, Wis./Jefferson); 5-7 guard Alyssa Karel (St. Paul, Minn./Cretin-Derham Hall) and 6-1 forward Tara Steinbauer (Bloomington, Minn./Kennedy).

Zastrow, who played with UW junior Caitlin Gibson the year Jefferson won the state basketball title, was the 2007 AP Player of the Year and Wisconsin Miss Basketball. She earned first team all-state honors while averaging 20.4 points, 11.0 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.1 steals per game.

Steinbauer is a physical post player who averaged 20.0 points and 8.0 rebounds and five assists per game. She

had 11 double-doubles as a senior.

Karel was a three-sport standout at Cretin-Derham Hall High School. As a senior she averaged 19.2 points, 6.3 rebounds, 7.8 assists and 5.6 steals.

With expectations high this season, the final piece of the puzzle might be the foreign tour everyone but the freshmen took in August of 2007. Playing the top teams in Australia and New Zealand, Badger Coach Lisa Stone felt the trip has set the tone for the kind of season she has anticipated since coming in 2004.

"Our Wisconsin women's basketball team had to raise the bar and try to get better each game. I really saw our team grow off the court, and then on the court. The record (1-3) is less important than the experience. This experience has been absolutely wonderful, and we are looking forward to this being a spring board for next year.

"I'm excited for what this does for a very young team that returns everybody. Expectations are high, and we've really grown together. It's just been a fabulous experience to travel abroad, play great teams and really sit back and watch our players develop, mature and get hungry for next season."

Many UW games will be televised this season. The Badgers will appear nationally on the Big Ten Network and on ESPN2.

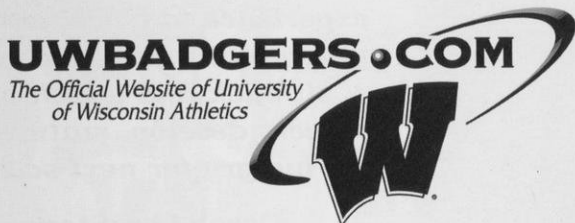

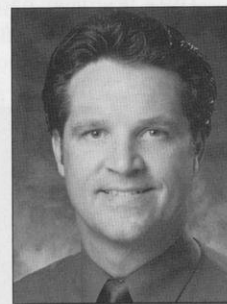

Parking

Parking for media during Wisconsin basketball games is reserved on a limited basis near the Kohl Center. Special arrangements must be made in advance. Please contact the Athletic Communications Office for parking credentials at least one week in advance of the event.

Media Services

Working facilities for all media are located courtside at the Kohl Center. Electrical outlets are available at every seat. Event programs, media guides, event notes and computerized statistics will be available in the interview/ work room adjacent to the main floor at the Kohl Center. Photographers

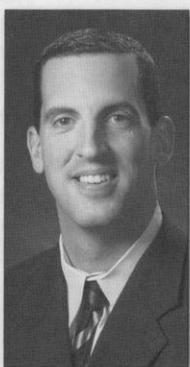
