## SAFETY CONTEST.

The Wisconsin State Highway Commission is sponsoring a safety campaign through out the State. Rewards of merit will be given for excellence in maintaining safety records for 1939.

There is a well rounded program for all who participate to carry on. I. Fatalities Record. II. Accident Reduction Per cent. III. Education: School Safety, School's Study Courses, Safety Patrol, Bicycle Safety, Safety Organizations of Students. IV. Enforcement: Traffic Department, Uniform Ordinances, Accident Records, Training courses, etc. V. Engineering, Checking Physical Hazards, Parking, Sidewalks, etc. VI. Participation with Safety Council.

Williams Bay is asked to join in the contest for 1939. Many of the items do not apply to small communities, but the program is elastic enough to cover large cities and villages alike.

We should start in now, before traffic gets heavy, to check up on ourselves. Our most dangerous corner at Geneva and Walworth needs attention. A full stop should be made by all vehicles approaching from North or South at that corner. The warning signs should be more prominent.

The Speed Limit Signs on Geneva Street should be very prominent and enforced. First of all we who live here should live up to them.

A proposed ordinance for the regulation of Bicycles was presented to the Village Board by the Veterans of Foreign Wars for consideration. This should be studied and something like it adopted.

Let's make a good record in this campaign.

May 21st is Citizenship Day in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. Some 1500 young men and women who have attained their 21st birthday will be given special recognition and certificates will be handed to them by Governor Heil. It is hoped that the Citizenship Day idea will become a National Holiday.

You will note that recognition of the young voter is one of the aims of the Knights of America. At the Men's Community Club in April the young men who voted for the first time were guests of honor and addressed by Mr. M. T. Peterson.

An appropriation of \$300 was made by our Walworth County Board for Citizenship program in this County.
