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LOCATION.

EVANSVILLE, Wis., is a beautiful village of about 1100 inhabitants, on the Madison Branch of the North Western R. R., 22 miles south of Madison—26 North of Beloit—18 west of Janesville—28 north & east of Monroe.

No Drinking or Billiard sa'oon is allowed in the town, and all who open any such place are vigorously prosecuted when detected. With five good church buildings, and the consequent high moral and religious tone, it is believed that no place in the state offers greater incitements to virtue, and less temptations to vice.

All acknowledge that Evansville is one of the prettiest places in the state, the Seminary being located on a rise of ground overlooking the entire village.

The seminary park of five acres presents a pleasing variety of shrubbery, the building itself being of brick, three stories in height, and well arranged for school purposes.

Students coming on the Western Union R. R., will change cars at Beloit for Evansville.

Course of Studg.

CLASSICAL.

PREPARATORY—ONE YEAR.

JUNIOR YEAR.

Fall Term — El. Algebra; H. Arithmetic; Rhetoric & Composition; Latin Reader & Grammar.

Winter Term—El. Algebra; Physical Geography; Rhetoric & Composition; Caesar.

Spring Term—H. Algebra; Book-keeping; Caesar; Greek Grammar.

MIDDLE YEAR.

Fall Term—H. Algebra; Nat. Philosophy; Virgil; Greek.

Winter Term—Geometry; Nat. Philosophy; Virgil; Greek.

Spring Term—Geometry; U. S. History; Anabasis; Cicero's Orations.

Fall Term—Trigonometry; Political Economy; Astronomy;

Winter Term—Trigonometry; Chemistry; Physiology; *Elective*, French, German, or Zoology.

Winter Term—Trigonometry; Chemistry; Zoology; Universal History.

Spring Term—Astronomy; Ev dences of Christianity; Mental Philosophy; Botany.

GENERAL REMARKS.

This Institution, having for many years been before the public, and having accomplished a large work in the educational field, still prospers, and affords good facilities in the preparation for the practical duties of life.

The design of the Trustees is to make the school first class in all its departments.

Two courses of study have been laid down, the completion of either entitling to a Diploma.

There being no boarding house connected with the Institution, students will find accommodations

in private families.

The discipline will be mild, yet firm. No student will be tolerated in the school who manifests a persistent disposition to disregard the regulations of the school.

Written examinations in all studies pursued will be held the first of each month, students being marked according to their standing. These reports can be inspected at any time by parents or guardians.

Literary Societies.

There are two **Literary Societies** connected with the Institution, the gentlemen having one—**THE PHILALATHEAN**;—the ladies: one, —**THE EUMATHEAN**..

Both are well patronized.

LECTURES.

Lectures with experiments are delivered from time to time, making a pleasing and profitable diversion from the regular routine of study.

GENERAL RULES.


Punctuality in attendance upon all school duties—attendance at Church on Sabbath morning, and daily morning prayers at Seminary Chapel—obtaining permission beforehand, if practicable, for the neglect of any requirement.

PROHIBITIONS.

All communications between students during recitation or other exercise—absence from private room during study hours, except for school duties—absence from town, or sleeping out of one's room—receiving or making calls, riding or walking for recreation, with one of the opposite sex—attending all parties or dances, except through the written request of parents or guardians, and permission of Principal, —holding any public meetings, or forming any societies, without permission of the Faculty—taking private lessons outside of the school—clamorous noise, scuffling, running, jumping, in the Seminary, or in their private rooms—the use of tobacco—the use of gunpowder—obscene or profane language, books, or communications; intoxicating drinks; the frequenting of bar-rooms or saloons; engaging in games of skill or chance. (This rule does not include base ball or quoits.)

A disregard of the Sabbath, by general visiting, &c.

Special Rules.

1. Students seen loitering about town during study hours will be required to remain in the Seminary to study during the day.
 2. Students are expected to return immediately to their private rooms after recitation.
 3. Students boarding themselves are required to do their marketing out of study hours.
 4. Students are not ordinarily expected to study out of their own private rooms.
