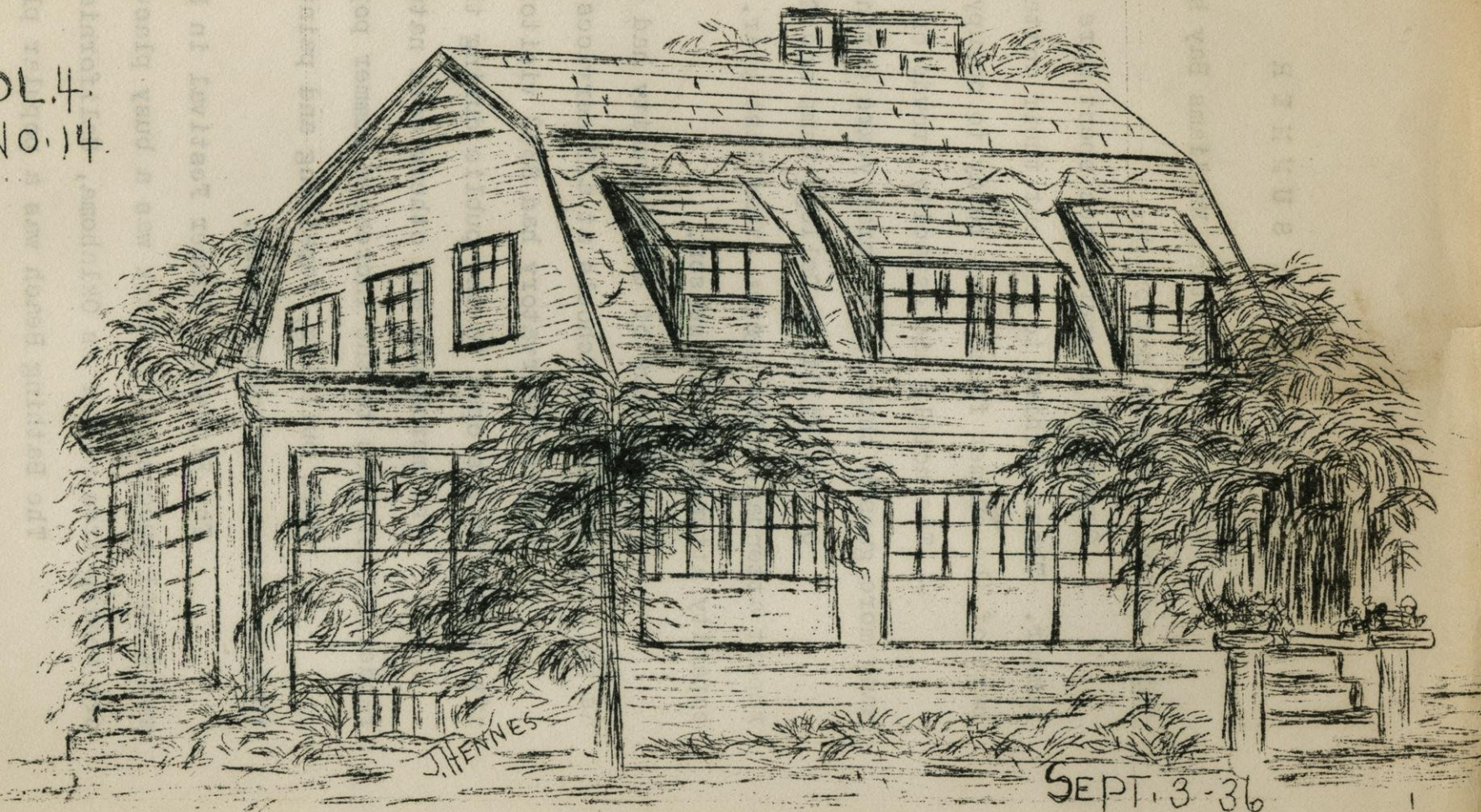

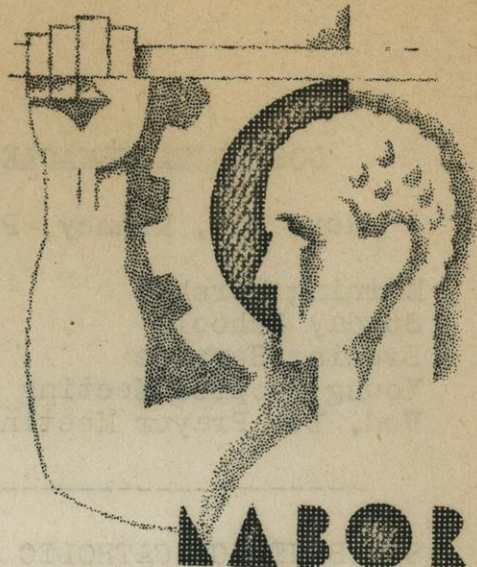

WHEN MOST AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS OCCUR

From five to six o'clock in the evening is the most dangerous hour, not for deaths, but for accidents.- when pedestrians are eager to leave their work and are in a hurry.

Most deaths occur from seven and nine in the evening rush hours. The effect of fatigue is obvious.

For the driver-- the most dangerous time in a car is between one and six o'clock in the morning. Most serious accidents occur then. Your chance of meeting death in an automobile is one-third greater at this time than at any other time you are driving.

One third of all the deaths on rural highways involve pedestrians.

Cross streets only at intersections and not between blocks. In towns and cities one fourth of all the deaths and accidents to pedestrians took place between street corners.

Never cut diagonally across any intersection. This is the most dangerous route of all. It is against the law in many localities.

Pedestrians should redouble their caution at night, because the motorist cannot see them so well, and the pedestrian often confused by many lights, cannot judge distances and speed of moving vehicles.

When walking on open highways, A- always walk on the left side of the highway, facing oncoming traffic.

After dark carry a flashlight or lantern or a piece of light metal against which headlights will reflect. If when wearing dark colored clothing at night you have no light or reflector of any kind, carry in your hand a loose white handkerchief.

Over 10,000 people were injured and nearly 2,700 killed last year while walking on rural highways.
