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#### REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Wednesday, March 7, 1928

Meeting called to order at 11 A. M., following an EXECUTIVE SESSION.

Vice President Faast presiding.

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Berger, Callahan, Cashman, Faast, Gundersen, Mead, Nelson, Olbrich, Richardson, Runge,

Schmidtmann, Waters, Wild.

ABSENT: Regents Bachman, Gale, Grady.

Regent Grady was present at the committee meetings on Tuesday and a communication was received from Regent Gale from New York in explanation of her absence.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Cashman, the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on January 18, 1928, were approved as sent out to the regents.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER

- 1. That upon the recommendation of Dean Snell an additional \$200 be appropriated to the University Extension Division for field work; to cover items of salary, expenses and publicity in connection with the Summer Session courses for workers in industry. Chargeable to 20.41 (1)(a) Regents' Unassigned. (\$1,800 was made available December 7, 1927)
- 2. That upon the recommendation of Dean Sellery, the present free balances in the College of Letters and Science departmental budgets for 20.41 (1) (a) Salaries and Wages be transferred to Letters and Science 20.41 (1)(a) Unassigned.

  Adopted.
- 3. That the Business Manager be authorized to sign a petition in behalf of the Wisconsin University Building Corporation, owners of Lots 16, 17, and 18, Block 6, University Heights, to permit the construction of a filling station on Lot 1, Block 6, University Heights, by the Wadham's Oil Company.

  Adopted.

4. That the United States Government be reimbursed in the amount of \$34.06 for the loss of War Department property, chargeable to Regents' Unassigned. Adopted.

5. That the Business Manager be authorized to negotiate for mch 9/28 the purchase by the Wisconsin University Building Corporation of the Kappa Kappa Gamma property on Park Street and Irving Place. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Wild,

VOTED, That recommendations 1 to 5 of the Business Manager be approved, and that the minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee held on January 18 and Tebruary 24, 1928, be approved, ratified and confirmed.

# RECOM ENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

#### -Letters and Science-

- 1. That Grace Putnam be employed as junior clerk stenographer in the department of chemistry for the months of February to June, inclusive; salary not to exceed \$25 per month; to be charged to 31 Letters and Science unassigned. Adopted.
- 2. That S. A. Leonard, associate professor in the teaching of English, be granted leave of absence with pay for six weeks beginning March 7, 1928, for the purpose of making fundamental in-136 vestigations in the teaching of English in other institutions. Adopted.

#### -Agriculture-

- 1. That Myrtle E. Jones be appointed assistant in agricultural economics from March 1 to June 30, 1928; salary at the rate of \$150 a month; to be charged to contingent 1-A.

- 2. That the resignation of W. A. Hartmon, instructor in agricultural economics and agricultural engineering, be accepted; to take effect April 15, 1928.

  Adopted.
- 3. That Jeannette Kendall be appointed half-time assistant in horticulture from March 6 to the end of the fiscal year; compensation to be at the rate of \$60 per month. Charge to item \$1000 for assistant, vice Bradbury, page 80 of the budget.

  Adopted.
  - 4. That the following recommendations relating to the organization for the cooperative work for the Federal Forestry Station be approved:
    - (a) That Dr. Raphael Zon, now director of the Lake States Station at St. Paul, be placed in general charge of the experimental work and responsible for the development of the projects to be selected.
    - (b) That in order that Dr. Zon may have an official status in the University of Wisconsin he be designated non-resident professor in forestry, without compensation. He has been given a similar position in the University of Minnesota, where he also has charge of forest research.
    - (c) That the Business Manager of the University be authorized to execute the necessary memorandum agreements between the University and the United States Forest Service, also between the University and the State Conservation Commission, under which cooperative research work in this field is to be undertaken.

That the regents authorize the purchase, for the sum of \$3000, of the Southwest quarter of the Northwest quarter, the Northwest quarter of the Southwest quarter, less area in the Southwest corner occupied by the Hancock Cemetery, and a part of the Northeast quarter of the Southwest quarter lying west of U. Section 15, Township 19 North, Range 8 East, Waushara County, containing  $78\frac{1}{2}$  acres, more or less, according to government survey; to be charged to Section 20.41(3)M, Construction and Land, with the understanding that if the Hancock Cemetery Association desires to purchase an area mutually agreed upon, that this be authorized at a figure not less than the average price per acre See Recen. 15- apr. note of Bd- p. (Do not copy) for the entire farm. Adopted.

6. That the industrial fellowship offered by the BrookHill Farm Company on pasture improvement and investigations, of \$600,-\$500 for salary and \$100 for expenses, be accepted.

BE IT RESOLVED, that a request be made to the Governor for a release of the available funds for the construction of such unit of said library building; that the president of the University, the president of the Board of Regents, and the Chairman of the Constructional Development Committee be requested to present the matter to the Governor.
