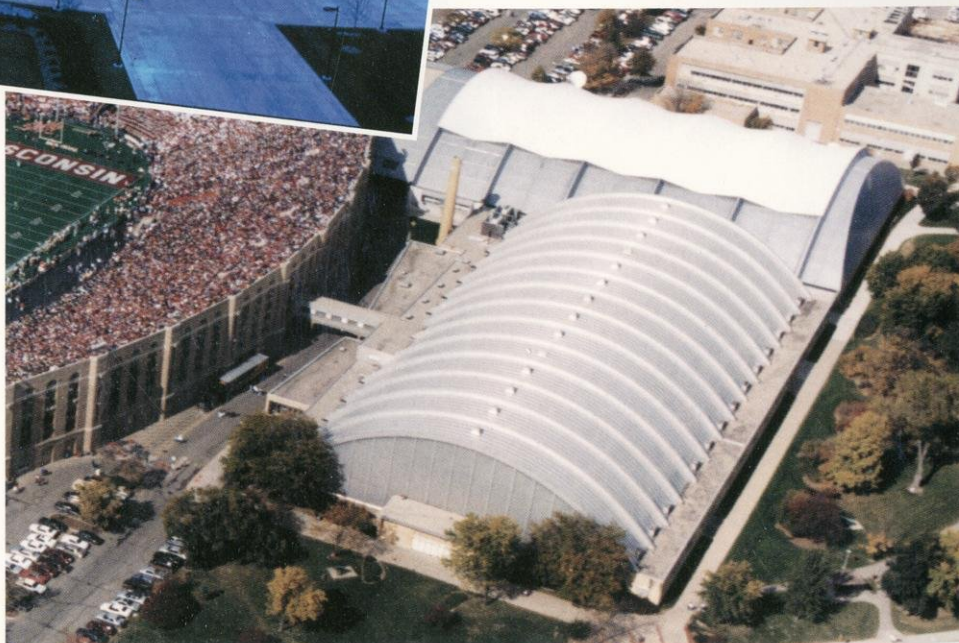

national ranking. Their 15-4-3 record during the 1998-99 season, good for second in the ECAC, earned Bourget American Women's Hockey Coaches Association Coach of the Year runner-up honors.

Before her tenure at Sacred Heart, Bourget spent two years as assistant coach of Lincoln Sudbury Regional High School girls' hockey team in Sudbury, Mass., and held a similar position with the field hockey team at Shrewsbury High School in Shrewsbury, Mass. Her first college coaching experience came when she served as an assistant club-team coach of women's hockey at Holy Cross College located in Worcester, Mass., during the 1994-95 campaign. That same year, Bourget also served as head coach of a boys' team in the Shrewsbury Youth Hockey Association.

Bourget's most recent coaching experience came this past summer when she joined the coaching ranks of USA Hockey. She served as co-coach of the USA Hockey Junior Olympic Development Camp in Lake Placid, N.Y.

A 1994 graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Bourget owns a bachelor of science degree in family and consumer studies. While at UNH, Bourget competed as a forward and defenseman for the women's hockey team where she helped the Wildcats to the ECAC Division I Championship in 1991, and runner-up finishes 1992 and 1993.

A former referee, Bourget brings a great understanding of all aspects of the

Trina Bourget takes over the reigns for the second-year Badgers as interim head coach after spending the UW's inaugural campaign as the team's top assistant.

With other prominent head coaching positions calling for Bourget's services, the Shrewsbury, Mass., native decided to stay in Madison and accept the challenge of building the Badger hockey program.

Bourget arrived in Madison in the summer of 1999 after a successful two-year stay as head coach of Division III Sacred Heart University. Named the 1998-99 Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference/Koho Coach of the Year, she led the Pioneers, in their third year of existence, to a No. 8

game. She spent over 11 years in the official's stripes and received her "B" Pool license from the International Ice Hockey Federation. She also achieved the status of a USA Hockey Level 4 official. Bourget worked games involving the U.S. National Team, the Norwegian Women's National Team as well as three U.S. Girls' and Women's National Tournaments from 1997-99. At the 1996 Women's Select Officials Camp held in Lake Placid, N.Y., Bourget earned Most Dedicated Official as voted on by her peers.

Ashton, Ontario, native Tracey Cornell begins her second season at Wisconsin after helping the Badgers to a 19-14-2 campaign in their inaugural campaign.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as head girl's hockey coach at Cushing Academy in Ashburnham, Mass.

Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season earning Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995-96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell Rookie of the Year also earned team honors as most inspirational player during her sophomore and senior campaigns.

Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997-98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team.



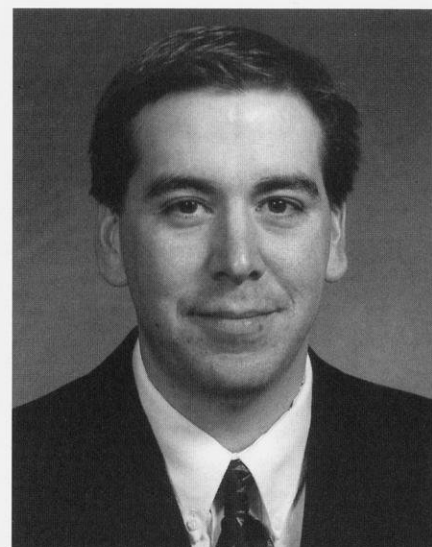
Jeff Vizenor

New to the Badger coaching staff is Jeff Vizenor, who joins the UW after two years as the head coach at St. Mary's University in Winona, Minn. Vizenor coached the Cardinals to a 34-13-5 mark and two consecutive Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference regular season co-titles. The 1998-99 MIAC Coach of the Year also served as an American Women's

Hockey Coaches Association Division III Western Representative. In 1990-00, Vizenor had his St. Mary's squad ranked as high as No. 2 nationally, finishing the season rated sixth.

Prior to his time with St. Mary's, the Rogers, Minn., native coached the St. Cloud Icebreakers to an 18-4-0 inaugural season. Vizenor has been coaching hockey since 1990 when he served St. Cloud Apollo High School in St. Cloud, Minn., as an assistant boys' hockey coach until 1993. During his three-year stint as an assistant at Mora High School in Mora, Minn., Vizenor was voted the 1995-96 Section 2 Assistant Coach of the Year, helping that year's team to a berth in the state tournament. For the 1996-97 season, he assisted in coaching Technical High School, also in St. Cloud, Minn.

Earning a bachelor of science degree in social studies education from St. Cloud State in 1992, Vizenor also earned his coaching certificate. Vizenor and his wife Amy live in Madison.

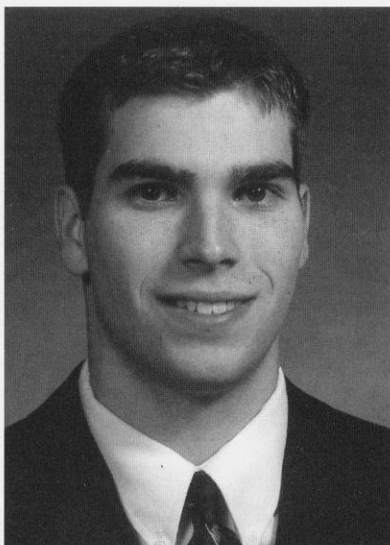
Volunteer Assistant Matt Schindler

Eley earned her associate of arts degree from Fullerton College in Fullerton, Calif., after graduating from Monona Grove (WI) High School.

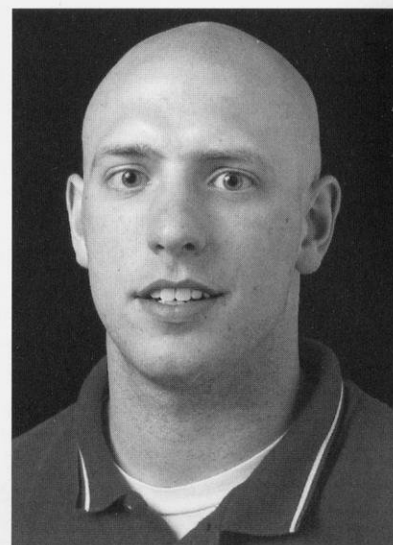
Eley and her husband Dennis have two children.

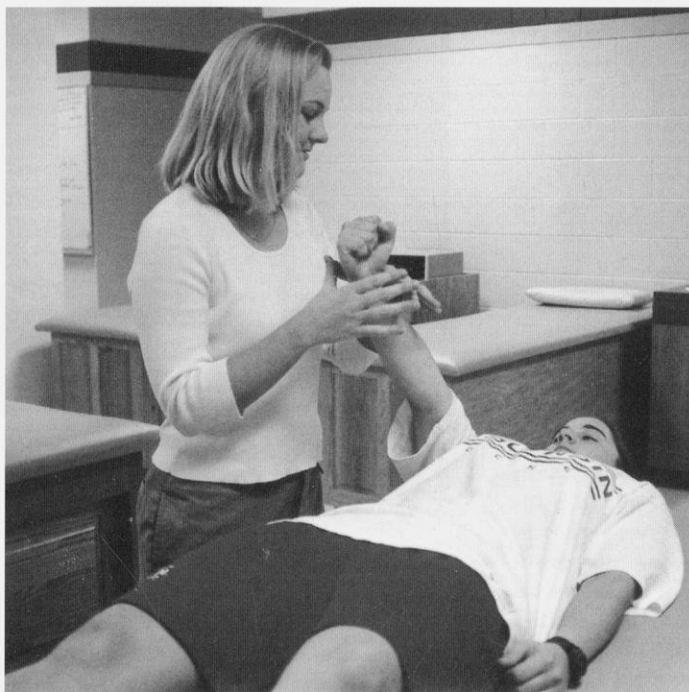
Athletic Trainer Laura Walluk

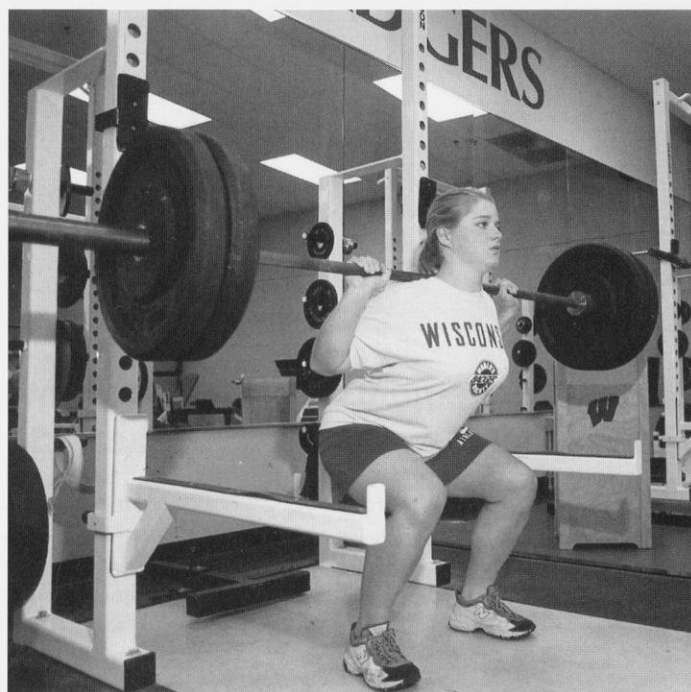
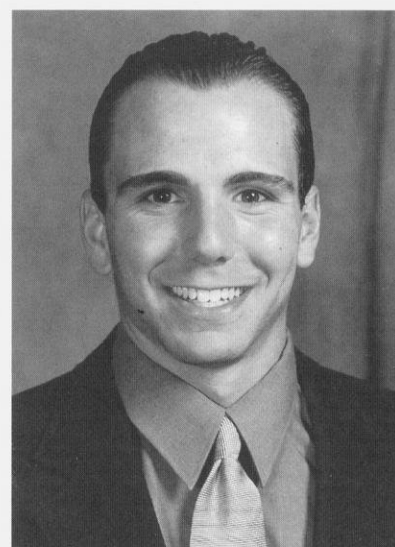
Strength Coach Paul Goodman

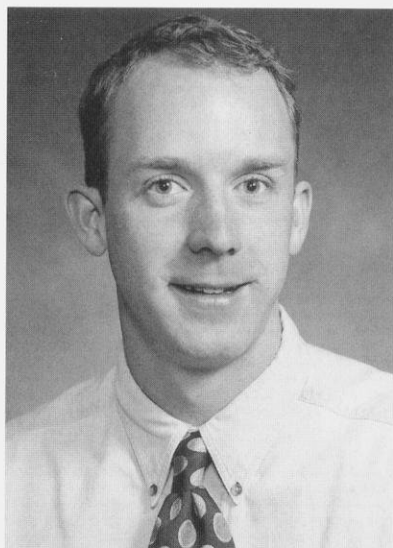

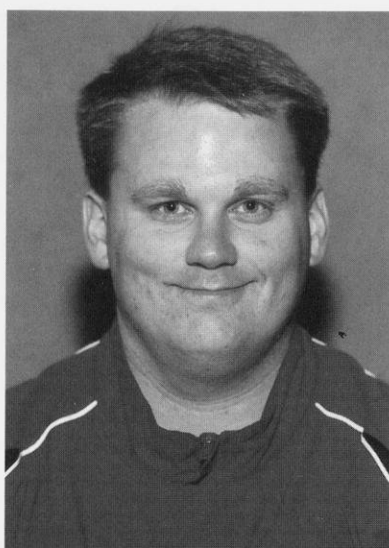

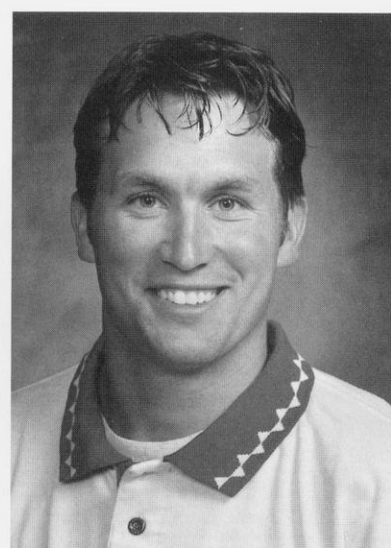
Sophomore Jen Mead squats in the Kohl Center weight room as part of the women's hockey off-ice training program.

Q&A with Coach Trina Bourget



The Wisconsin women's hockey program has a very successful year under its belt. Would you say the program is where you would like it to be?

In terms of development, I believe our program is moving along right on track. The coaching staff was very pleased with the growth and progress of the team last season. The vision for our team is to compete for a national championship within four years in addition to competing with the top teams year after year. To make our vision a reality, we recruited a nucleus of players that are committed to the program. They have provided a solid foundation on which to build the bright future of Wisconsin women's hockey.

How do you think people outside the program view Wisconsin hockey?

People in the hockey world have taken notice of the Wisconsin women's hockey program as the polls indicated during our 1999-2000 inaugural season. We were ranked as high as eighth in the nation, but rankings aside, fans took notice at how much our team progressed throughout the season. They saw us do battle with traditionally strong teams. Our team made a tremendous impact by posting a 19-14-2 record in its first season of competition.

What kind of student-athletes are you looking for to continue building the program and keep the excitement?

Our staff considers a number of qualities when recruiting prospective student-athletes. We seek players who are strong in personal character, who have a passion for the game, and who have talent, drive and determination necessary to succeed at the national level. We also look for young women who have demonstrated that they can also succeed in the academic arena.

You had offers to become the head coach of other women's hockey programs. Why did you decide to stay at Wisconsin?

My decision to stay at Wisconsin was quite simple—I love this town! Even though I have only been here a year, Madison feels like home to me. It's no wonder that *Money* magazine and various other publications has rated Madison one of the best places to live in the country. Wisconsin and the city of Madison are unique places to be. The people in this town are friendly and so supportive of Badger Athletics. The city is not just the state capital, it is home to a world-class institution.

What makes Wisconsin different than other hockey programs?

It is the people at Wisconsin that make the difference; whether it's the players, the coaches, the support staff, the faculty or the fans. Wisconsin is a school that takes

pride in its academic and athletic programs.

The amount of resources that the university has provided for the women's hockey program is phenomenal. With our full-time staff of five and a great supporting staff, we have the opportunity to be successful. Now it is up to us.

Here, the fans are like no other. We were excited about the turnout at our inaugural game, recording the highest attendance in the country last season. We also have a strong following with our Bucky's Blueline Club for young girls. Not only do we want to have a great program and great athletes, but we also want to contribute back to the community and help the growth of girls' and women's hockey in the United States.

Last year was an impressive start to the program. The Badgers finished third in the WCHA, tied established hockey power and then-No. 10 Princeton, and put a scare in a few other teams including defending national champion Harvard, national semifinalist Minnesota-Duluth, national runner-up Brown and national champion Minnesota. What are the teams' goals this season?

We want to build upon our success; our terrific start. We wanted to build a strong

foundation and indeed we have. We are very well conditioned thanks to our strength and conditioning coach. That is a goal each year to be in top shape physically as well as mentally. We established a positive attitude and mental toughness. We are excited for our second season, because we all didn't know quite what to expect last year and now we do. We look forward to competing in the WCHA playoffs and the possibility of taking part in the first NCAA Women's Frozen Four.

What was the biggest surprise of last season?

That we took a group of 24 women from different hockey backgrounds and regions of the United States and Canada and got them to work as one cohesive unit in such a short time. That is a big factor in what made us successful last year.

For a young team, they displayed a lot of maturity and character. There is a great amount of leadership on the team.

Michelle Sikich and Sis Paulsen will serve as co-captains. What will they do for the team?

Both Michelle and Sis bring leadership to the team. They each have their own personalities and special talents, but they really serve as terrific role models. They lead by example with their work ethic and their performance on and off the ice.

What do you see as the strengths of this team?

It's how well they react to situations and stick together. That is an important ingredient for a national-contending program. You will always face adversity, but it is how you deal with it that is crucial. We battled in some games and we never gave up. Our team showed great character. We have the chance to start another winning tradition at Wisconsin. We want character, excellence, hard work, and dedication. We want that to be the earmark of our program.

Last year the WCHA was in its first year of existence and now boasts the defending national champions. It also had two of the four national semifinalists. Talk about the strength of the conference.

The success of the teams that comprise the WCHA says it all. In its first year, two of the seven teams battled for the national title. It is really no different than the men's side, which has been a national power for

years. The league got off on the right foot. It is a well-run, well-managed league that has the necessary resources. Even though it is new to the women's side, it started with a bang and I expect it will continue where it left off.

This season will be the first year women's hockey will have an NCAA Championship. What does that mean to you and women's hockey in general?

It changes the landscape and puts women's hockey on the map. The NCAA Championship raises the bar. It says to the rest of the nation that women's hockey has arrived and is here to stay. It has given our sport the credibility it deserves, but most important, it provides our players and future generations of women's hockey players the opportunity to turn NCAA Championship dreams into reality. I played college hockey and there was no national title at the time. It is amazing how girls' and women's hockey has grown here and around the world. The NCAA Championship signifies the sport's acceptance. It is great to see the opportunities to compete in a college environment and the goal to be a part of an NCAA Championship team.

What will people see this year when they come to watch the Badgers?

Fans will see a different look with the team for the 2000-01 season. Even though we have a solid core of 13 players returning from our inaugural season, we have added nine freshmen to our lineup.

We've got a solid foundation in our goaltender Jackie MacMillan, who just came back from the Under-22 National Team. Sis Paulsen along with Kerry Weiland are backboning our defensive corps. In addition, we have Nicole Uliasz, who is one of the best up-and-coming defenseman in the country.

Giving us scoring punch is Michelle Sikich along with Kelly Kegley and Kendra Antony, who shared the team scoring lead last year. We are very excited to add

Meghan Hunter, who will be one of the top offensive threats in our league and the nation. We also have Karen Rickard and Steph Millar to help with the scoring load. We have two solid lines and continue to add depth and improve on individual skills while we reach our team goals. We have also added enthusiasm. We had a whole new team last year, coaching staff and players alike. We think we are going to be in the hunt at the WCHA Playoffs and we are very excited to have the opportunity to take part in the first women's NCAA Championship. These women that came on board, along with the coaching staff, are pioneers in hockey in Wisconsin. We were part of history last year as the first women's hockey team in Wisconsin and we would like to have another year of firsts: first WCHA Championship and first national championship.

The second recruiting class has joined the Badgers. What do you expect from them?

They will complement our existing core. We brought in some offensive punch to our lineup with Meghan Hunter, Steph Millar and Karen Rickard. We didn't bring in as many defensemen, but what we have is a national-caliber defender in Nicole Uliasz. She will make a great impact on the blue line for us.

Do you have a coaching philosophy?

Our coaching staff aims to develop each individual to their highest potential while reaching our team goals. We try to tap into each players' strengths and create a synergistic effect for the team. We work on player weaknesses to help them and us reach the next level, whether it is winning a national championship or moving on to Olympic programs.

What is the team's relationship with the men's team?

They have been very supportive. They are like no other men's program in the country. Jackie MacMillan was a key factor in developing the relationship between the women's and men's programs. Equally important was coach Jeff Sauer for letting her practice with the men's team the year before our team was ready to play. We are just happy to have more hockey at Wisconsin. It is a great day for hockey no matter whether it is women's or men's hockey.

Badgers Ready for Second-Year Challenge

With a roster that included 16 walk-ons, the first team to don the Wisconsin women's ice hockey sweater far exceeded expectations. An eight-game winning streak, a final top-10 ranking in U.S. College Hockey's Pairwise Ranking, a third-place WCHA finish and a 19-win season all support those sentiments.

The Badgers went 19-14-2 (.571), playing 14 contests against top-10 opponents, and 15-8-1 (.646) against WCHA competition. It will not get any easier for the UW in 2000-01 however, with the Badgers facing perennial powers Harvard, Brown and Providence away from Madison, upstart Minnesota-Duluth and defending national champion Minnesota.

Opening night for Badger women's hockey was an event with 3,892 fans crowding the Kohl Center, including Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye, and Governor Tommy Thompson. The second-largest women's ice hockey crowd ever watched the Badgers take an early lead on their first shot, but the Badger faithful would have to wait until Oct. 15 and a game at Ohio State for the program's first win.

The second year for the Badgers may prove an even greater challenge as the teams in the WCHA improve. The UW was one of three first-year squads in 1999-2000, and only one of the league teams had been around for more than two seasons. The Badgers will look to build on their first season in 2000-01 and continue the climb into the ranks of the women's college hockey elite.

Two members of the inaugural squad were lost to graduation and six others left for various reasons. But the UW will welcome four new scholarship student-athletes and at least two walk-ons to the second year of its program.

Returning for the Badgers will be three all-WCHA players including goaltender Jackie MacMillan and defender Sis Paulsen from the first team, and defender Kerry Weiland from the second team. Also returning are Badger and WCHA Tournament scoring leader Kelly Kegley, and 2000-01 co-captain Michelle Sikich.

The Badgers' second recruiting class of four will join the returnees giving the team improved depth. Forwards Meghan Hunter, Stephanie Millar and Karen Rickard, and defender Nicole Uliasz make up the new group.

Forwards

Sophomores Kendra Antony and Kegley shared the team lead in scoring last season both totalling 45 points. The two cen-

tered the top two lines and saw time together on what became an effective power play (21.0%). Kegley, who missed the first six games of last season, led the team with 26 goals, including four hat tricks, and earned WCHA Rookie of the Week honors once. She also tallied eight points at the WCHA Tournament, pacing all tournament scorers. Antony scored the first four goals in program history, leading the team in scoring most of the season. She played her best hockey against the best teams with 16 points in 14 games against ranked opponents.

Junior captain Sikich also returns for her second season after putting up 38 points in 29 games. Sikich began last season on the blue line but moved to offense

and flourished, leading the team with two short-handed goals.

Walk-ons played a vital role in the offense last season, and will again as Melanie Schmitt's 13 points and Natascha Sherman's 11 points will find a place in the line-up. Julia Ortenzio, Liz Jankowski, Jen Mead and Sarah Repp complete the returning crew.

Canadians Meghan Hunter and Karen Rickard, along with Wisconsinite Stephanie Millar, bring added depth to the Badger scoring attack. Hunter served as assistant captain of the provincial-champion Bluewater Hawks last year after seeing time on Team Ontario and the London

Deviltes in 1998 and 1999. Rickard comes from the highly respected North York Junior Aeros program while Millar's roots stem from the Minnesota Thoroughbreds, the former team of current Badger goaltender Jackie MacMillan.

Defense

The Badgers return two stars from the 1999-2000 season in all-WCHA defenders Paulsen and Weiland. Paulsen will serve as the other co-captain after leading all WCHA defenders in conference scoring. She finished third in the nation in power-play scoring and fourth in defense scoring. She also ranked third on the Badgers with 17 goals and 27 assists for 44 points. Weiland, perhaps the UW's most exciting player, totaled 10 goals and 25 assists while wowing Madison crowds with her stick-handling.

Also returning is sophomore Gretchen Anderson, who walked-on to the Badgers and steadied the defense. She registered six assists with three of the six setting up game-winning goals.

Newcomer Nicole Uliasz will solidify the defensive corps joining Wisconsin after captaining The Taft School in Connecticut. During the 1998-99 season, the frosh tallied 46 points on 26 goals and 20 assists in 24 games after scoring 59 as a forward in the 1997-98 campaign. Also a member of the Connecticut Polar Bears, Uliasz helped the squad to the 1999 national title.

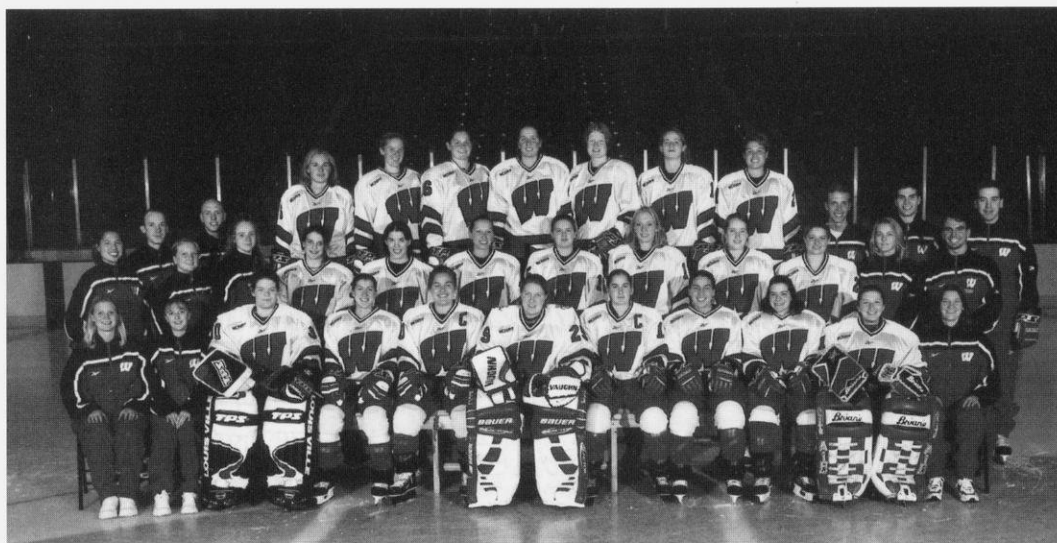
Goaltenders

Wisconsin returns the first-team all-WCHA goaltender in MacMillan as well as sophomore Jen Neary, who recorded the first solo shutout in school history. MacMillan, who was selected to the 2000 Under-22 U.S. National Team, was outstanding, going 13-6-1 with a 2.94 goals against and .901 save percentage. The sophomore had a personal 11-game winning streak and 12-game unbeaten string despite fighting through injury the entire season. She earned back-to-back conference honors with WCHA Player and Rookie of the Week accolades in successive weeks in February.

Jen Neary jumped out to a 3-0-0 record, but finished the season at 3-5-0 after ending the season against seven-straight ranked opponents. The Dallas, Texas native proved her worth with a stellar 44-save loss at No. 5 Minnesota-Duluth and solid play during the MacMillan injury. She will once again see action in a back-up role.

1999-00 Season Highlights



SUCCESSFUL INAUGURAL SEASON CONCLUDES: The University of Wisconsin completed its inaugural campaign with a 19-14-2 overall record and 15-8-1 mark in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. The Badgers finished third in the WCHA regular season and fourth at the WCHA Championship.

The season was highlighted by a 4-4 tie at No. 10 Princeton and Badger rankings in the *American Hockey* and the US College Hockey Online Polls. Wisconsin was rated as high as ninth in the *American Hockey* poll and 10th in the U.S. College Hockey Online Poll. The Badgers also finished their season ninth in the USCHO Pairwise Rankings.

HISTORIC NIGHT: The Wisconsin women's ice hockey team opened its inaugural season on Oct. 8 against Minnesota-Duluth. Governor Tommy Thompson, Olympic Gold Medalists Cammi Granato and Karyn Bye, U.S. National Team Coach Ben Smith and other VIPs attended. The event drew the second-largest women's collegiate ice hockey crowd with 3,892 people at the Kohl Center.

The largest crowd to attend a women's collegiate ice hockey game was 6,854 when Minnesota held its inaugural game on Nov. 2, 1997, against Augsburg at Mariucci Arena in Minneapolis.

U-S-A! U-S-A!: The Badgers had the privilege of playing the U.S. National Team in Fond du Lac, Wis., on Jan. 8. The two teams played to a standing-room only crowd of 2,209 at the Blue Line Ice Center.

ON THE AIR: The Badgers received their share of television coverage, having two contests broadcast by Wisconsin Public Television. WPT aired the inaugural contest against then-No. 5 Minnesota-Duluth and a game later in the season against then-No. 3 Minnesota.

The Badgers could also be seen in a television public service announcement as part of a no smoking campaign on cable channels like MTV and Comedy Central throughout the area.

POINT-PER-GAME CLUB: The 1999-00 Badgers finished with five players averaging at least a point per game. Kelly Kegley led the team with 45 points in 29 games (1.55). Sis Paulsen ranked second with 44 points in 32 games (1.38). Michelle Sikich, with 38 points in 29 games (1.31), Kendra Antony, with 45 points in 35 games (1.29), and Kerry Weiland, with 35 points in 33 games (1.06), completed the quintet.

SETTING THE STANDARD: The inaugural Badgers set a high standard for future UW teams to equal. Wisconsin jumped out of the blocks with a third-place finish in the WCHA and had some impressive individual efforts. Kelly Kegley notched three hat tricks and put together an eight-game goal scoring string. She also set the mark for fastest goals with two in a 10-second span against Ohio State and led the WCHA Tournament with eight points.

MORE POWER: Badger special teams finished off the season on a roll. Wisconsin scored power-play goals in nine of its last 10 games, and went through a three-game stretch in which it scored three power-play goals in each contest. Wisconsin had 21 goals in 64 chances with the man advantage during the streak (32.8%). For the season, the UW clicked on 20.9 percent of its opportunities, which ranked third in the conference and sixth in the nation.

IRONWOMEN: Six Badgers played in all 35 games of the Wisconsin women's hockey inaugural season. Gretchen Anderson, Kendra Antony, Bridget Buchholz, Liz Jankowski, Julia Ortenzio and Melanie Schmitt make up the iron group.

TONIGHT'S ATTENDANCE: The Madison area is known for its great support of women's athletics, and it was no different for women's hockey as the Badgers averaged the third-highest attendance in the country for the 1999-00 season. Wisconsin attracted 808 fans per game, putting them behind only Minnesota and Minnesota-Duluth.

WCHA HONOREES: Six Badgers earned conference awards at the WCHA banquet held at Planet Hollywood at the Mall of America in Bloomington, Minn. Wisconsin was led by freshman defenseman Sis Paulsen and freshman goaltender Jackie MacMillan, who made the All-WCHA First Team. Freshman defenseman Kerry Weiland earned All-WCHA Second Team honors. The Badgers were one of only three teams to have players on the All-WCHA squads.

On the WCHA All-Academic Team were Badgers Bridget Buchholz, Michelle Sikich and Leslie Toner.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK: The Badgers had six student-athletes earn recognition by the WCHA during their inaugural season. That was enough to tie the Badgers for the most honors. Sis Paulsen earned the team's first award on Nov. 1, and would add a second in February. Michelle Sikich and Jackie MacMillan would also earn player of the week honors while MacMillan and Kelly Kegley would each win rookie of the week honors once.

TEAM HONORS: The Badgers honored six players at their first annual awards banquet. Sis Paulsen garnered the most valuable player award and was also named a team co-captain for the 2000-01 season. Kerry Weiland was awarded the most inspirational player award while Kendra Antony and Kelly Kegley shared rookie of the year honors. Bridget Buchholz won the student-athlete of the year award while Gretchen Anderson took home the most improved player award. Michelle Sikich was named the other co-captain for the 2000-01 season.

UW Hockey Highlights



Current men's assistant coach and Madison native Mark Johnson led the gold-medal winning 1980 Olympic Team in scoring. Johnson also played for five different NHL teams during his 11-year career, including the New Jersey Devils.

NCAA Championships

In winning five NCAA Championships, the Wisconsin men's ice hockey program has proved itself to be one of the elite in college hockey. The UW ranks third in the collegiate hockey community along with Denver for most national titles. The Badgers won their first national crown in 1973 and followed with titles in 1977, 1981, 1983 and 1990.

NCAA Appearances

The Badgers have appeared in 18 NCAA Championships and have been in the NCAA Frozen Four 10 times. In its first national championship appearance in 1970, Wisconsin finished third at the NCAA Championship.

All-Americans

Badger players have earned 32 all-American honors since 1970, the most of any school in the WCHA. John Jagger was the first all-American at UW, earning the honor in 1970. Three players in Wisconsin history have two first-team all-America accolades in Craig Norwich, Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson.

Attendance Leaders

Fans of Wisconsin ice hockey continually show their support in mass. The Badgers have led the nation in attendance for nearly 25 years averaging close to 8,500 spectators per game at the Dane County Coliseum. That average has skyrocketed the past three seasons as the men made the move to the Kohl Center, which seats 14,385 people for hockey.

Legendary Coaches

Wisconsin men's ice hockey has been fortunate enough to have two legendary coaches in its ranks.

Bob Johnson coached at Wisconsin for 15 years and compiled a 367-175-23 record. He is the winningest coach in UW history with a .670 winning percentage. Johnson also coached the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team in Innsbruck, Austria, as well as coaching the 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1981 U.S. National Teams. In honor of his lifelong service to hockey, USA Hockey has dedicated "Bob Johnson Drive" in Colorado Springs.

Jeff Sauer, the current coach of the Badger men's team, is considered by many in the hockey community to be one of the greatest mentors of all time. Sauer is the winningest coach in WCHA history with 586 career wins and ranks fifth on the NCAA's all-time win list. Sauer, in his 30th year as a collegiate coach and 19th with UW, has guided his team's to a pair of NCAA titles (1983, 1990), 11 NCAA appearances, two WCHA titles in 1990 and 2000, and five WCHA Playoff Titles.

Badgers in the Pros

The Badgers have had 29 players go on to play in the National Hockey League, and 12 that are currently on a NHL roster. Chris Chelios, one of the most notable former Badgers, has had great success in the NHL as a nine-time All-Star and three-time Norris Trophy Winner. Curtis Joseph is one of the NHL's top goaltenders. He guided the Edmonton Oilers into the Stanley Cup playoffs in 1997-98.

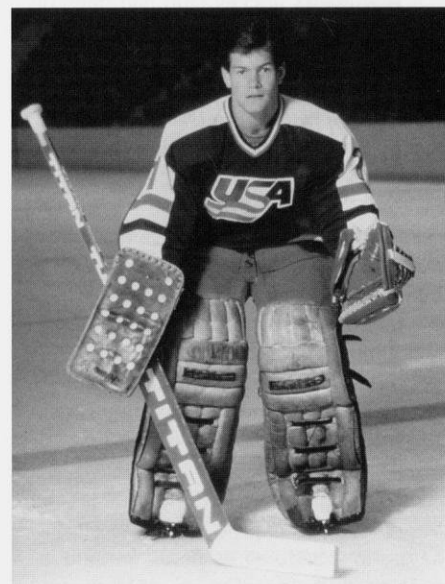

Women's History

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program. Ice Hockey, brand new to the athletic department, already had a longstanding history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women: Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz, the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice throughout the years.

The three founders of the club organized a women's scrimmage hour at 10:15 p.m., on Sunday nights at the new campus skating rink dubbed "The Shell." The trio put up signs throughout campus and recruited players by word of mouth. In the spring of 1975, once they had enough "regulars", they applied for Club Sport status through the UW's Recreation Sports division. During the early years, they recruited players by putting up tables during spring and fall registration. In 1976, the group scheduled its first competitive game against the University of Minnesota club team.

By 1981, the number of club members had reach such a height that the club split into two separate squads. The following year, the club became a charter mem-

ber of the Minnesota Women's Hockey Association, now called the Minnesota Girls' and Women's Hockey Association.

One important source on campus provided the critical encouragement and support to the club: men's head coach Bob Johnson. Johnson was instrumental in getting the club interviewed during radio broadcasts of the men's games. With his support, they also arranged to play some games at the Dane Country Coliseum immediately after the men's team played.

A concerted effort led to a second club expansion for the 1992-93 season. The club split into three teams after putting up posters, having a description of the team in a university recreational sports pamphlet and sitting at tables during annual sports recruiting days at the union each fall.

In 1991, Prior to the expansion, pee-wee girls from throughout Madison then skating with boys' teams. All that changed when a new team of girls formed, the Wisconsin Challengers. Members of the UW Club assisted in the formation of the new organization in an effort to generate more

interest in hockey in young girls of Madison. The team soon formed a midget squad as well.

Interest continues to explode each season and the Wisconsin Recreation Department now sponsors three club teams. The A team travels throughout the Midwest competing against other club programs. The current club teams, A, B, and C, continue to play even with the establishment of the varsity program. In fact, three members of the Badgers' inaugural team made the squad from the ranks of the UW Club.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998 when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media. A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years.

The Badgers officially opened its history on October 8, 1999 when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota-Duluth at the Kohl Center. With Olympic Gold Medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Governor Tommy Thompson in attendance, and the game televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television, the Badgers finally hit the ice.

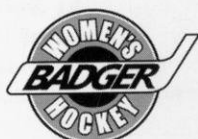
The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey.

WCHA History

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, or WCHA, is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA. It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League.

The Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League, the first version of the WCHA, was founded in 1951 by Colorado College, Denver, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota and North Dakota. The league changed its name to the WIHL in 1953 to better reflect the location of its members.

Throughout the 1950s, the WIHL was very successful in winning NCAA championships. Except for 1949 and 1954, all of the NCAA crowns were won by the WIHL teams. Michigan alone won six titles.

There was no conference play during the 1958-59 season, but the league began play again in 1959 with the WCHA moniker.

In 1966, Minnesota-Duluth became the first team to be added to the league, followed by the addition of Wisconsin in 1969 and Notre Dame in 1971.

WCHA members captured most of the national hockey championships during the 1960s and 1970s. Except for 1967, 1971-72 and 1978, the national champion trophy remained in the display case of a WCHA team.

In 1981, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech and Notre Dame resigned and joined the more compact Central Collegiate Hockey Association. In 1984, the WCHA reclaimed Michigan Tech and welcomed Northern Michigan from the CCHA.

The 1986-87 season saw the University of North Dakota won the NCAA title. In 1989-90, the Wisconsin Badgers put the WCHA back on top by sweeping to the WCHA and NCAA Championships with a 36-9-1 record.

With the 1990-91 campaign, the league added a new member in St. Cloud State. In 1992, the membership voted to accept the University of Alaska Anchorage as a full-time member beginning with the 1993-94 season.

After ten distinguished years as the guiding force behind the success of the WCHA, Otto Breitenbach retired as commissioner at the end of the 1993-94 season. Named as his successor was Bruce McLeod, a major contributor to the league over the years, and a former UMD Bulldog hockey player.

North Dakota won the 1996-97 national championship for the WCHA with a 6-4 win over Boston University in Milwaukee. The championships gave the conference its 30th national team championship.

Following the 1996-97 season, Northern Michigan left the WCHA to rejoin the CCHA. Minnesota State University, Mankato filled the void beginning with the 1999-2000 season. The same season, North Dakota won the national title with a 4-2 win over Boston College in Providence, R.I.

The 1999-2000 season also marked the first year for the WCHA-Women's League. Bemidji State, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, MSU-Mankato, Ohio State, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin made up the charter membership. Sara Martin was hired in June of 1999 to serve the league as the Associate Commissioner. Martin, who earned college degrees from Wisconsin and MSU-Mankato, served the WCHA as tournament director for the 1994, 1996 and 1998 WCHA Final Five Playoff Championship, and was tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Div. I Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

After just one season, the women's league has quickly established itself as a force, sending two teams to the four-team national championship and having conference runner-up Minnesota take home the national title. In addition, the top three teams in average attendance, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth and Wisconsin, all claim the WCHA as its conference.

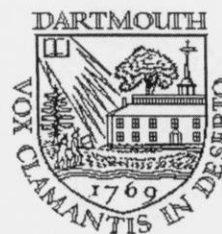

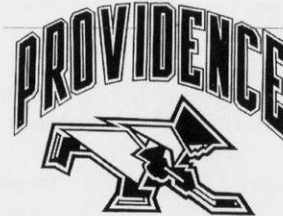

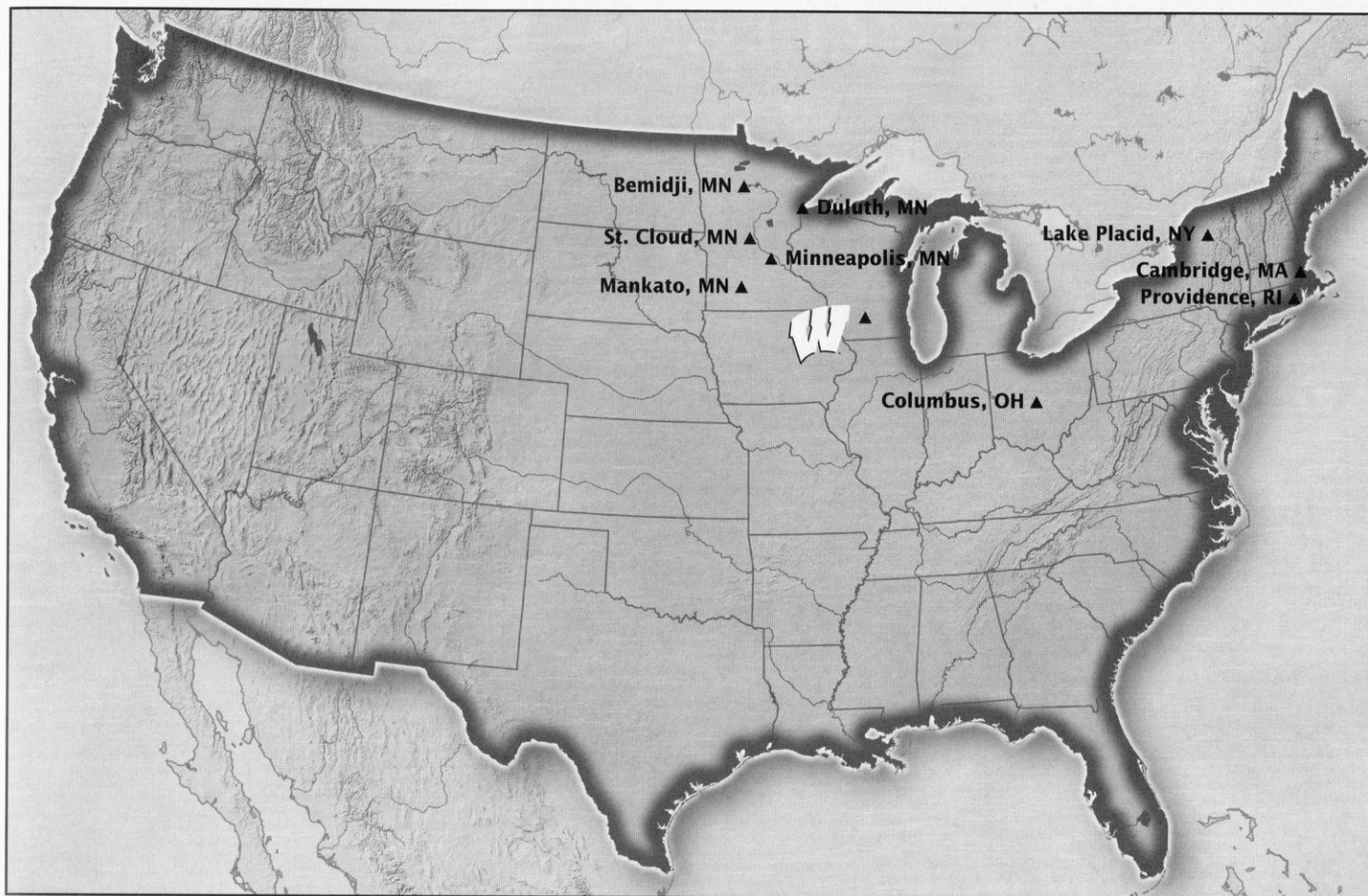

Facilities

The Dane County Coliseum, Capitol Ice Arena and the Kohl Center will be the homes for the Wisconsin women's hockey team during the 2000–2001 season.

The Coliseum is known as one of college hockey's finest facilities by fans, coaches, and players alike. The Coliseum is furnished with theater-style seating for more than 8,000.

With the addition of the Kohl Center, Wisconsin now boasts the second and fifth largest collegiate ice facilities in the country. The Kohl Center tops all other collegiate facilities, seating over 14,000 a game, while the Coliseum ranks fourth in spectator capacity. The Coliseum ice surface is at NHL dimensions (200' by 85'). Eight luxury suites are located in the south end of the rink. These suites, with room for 12, feature buffet bars, private restrooms, dimmable lights, TV monitors, and private entrances.

The Kohl Center will play host to two Badger home games this season, including the season-opening weekend series with Mercyhurst on October 14 and 15. The building is named after U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW–Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

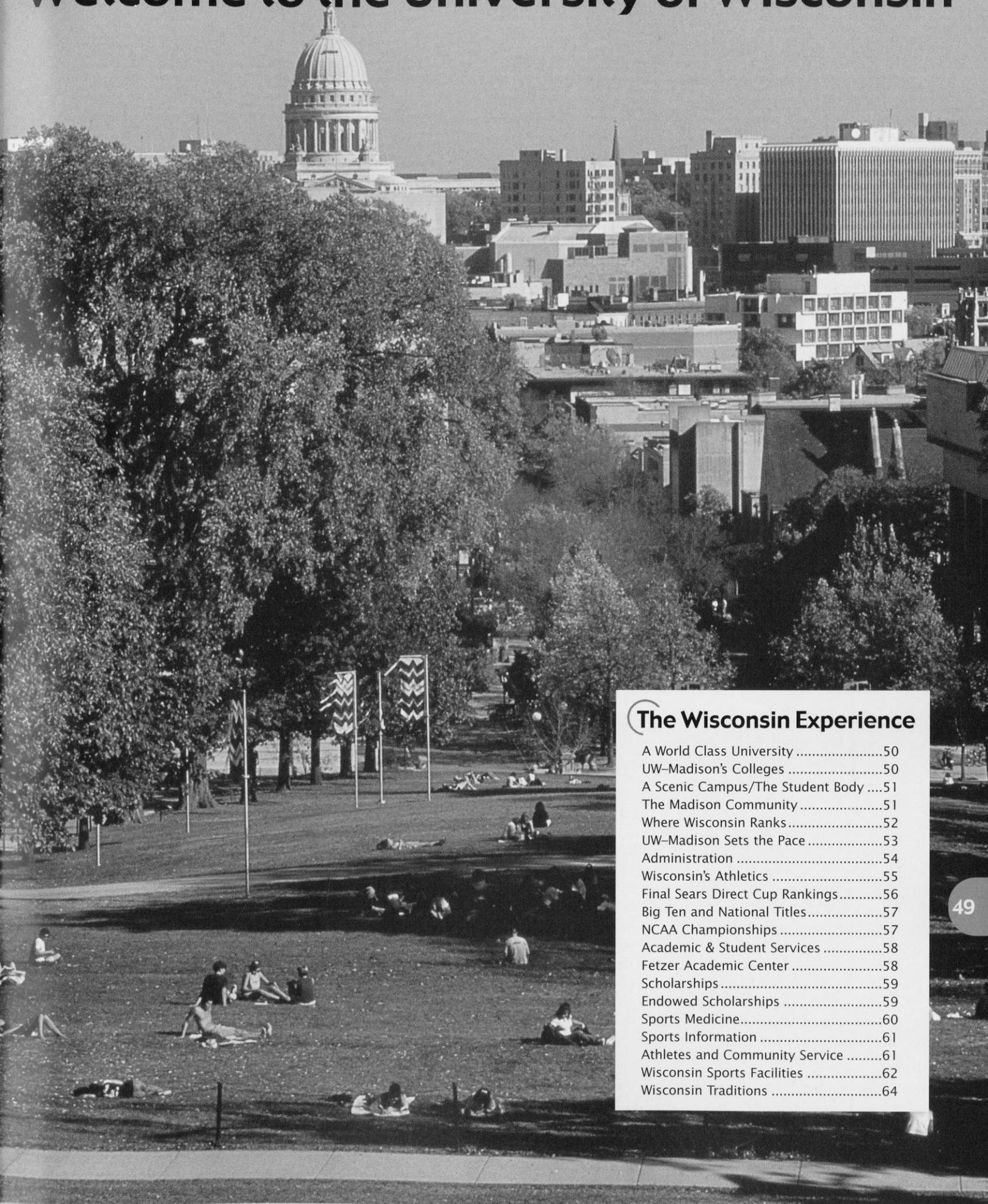

A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Founded in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW-Madison ranks as the nation's seventh largest university with 40,740 students. It is one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher learning, and the student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state. Wisconsin also ranks sixth in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,500 courses and 13,000 sections are offered in UW-Madison's 12 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 143 undergraduate, 153 master's, and 115 doctoral degree programs.

Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines has earned UW-Madison a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in many scholarly reputational studies since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

UW-Madison was named the eighth best national public university in 1999 according to *U.S. News & World Report*. Twenty-four Wisconsin programs ranked among the 20 universities including No. 1 rank-

ings for women's history, sociology and speech pathology.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have won 15 Nobel Prizes and 22 Pulitzer Prizes. Sixteen faculty members have been awarded the National Science Foundation's

Presidential Early Career Development awards, nine have won the National Medal of Science, and five are Searles scholars. Fifty-two professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 17 are

members of the National Academy of Engineering, five are in the National Academy of Education and 48 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" ensuring "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 933 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the Capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, which lies at the end of a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus. Camp Randall Stadium is a fun place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW men's and women's basketball and men's ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lake-side terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Madison's largest lake, Mendota.

The Student Body

More than 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,500 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 117 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks sixth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

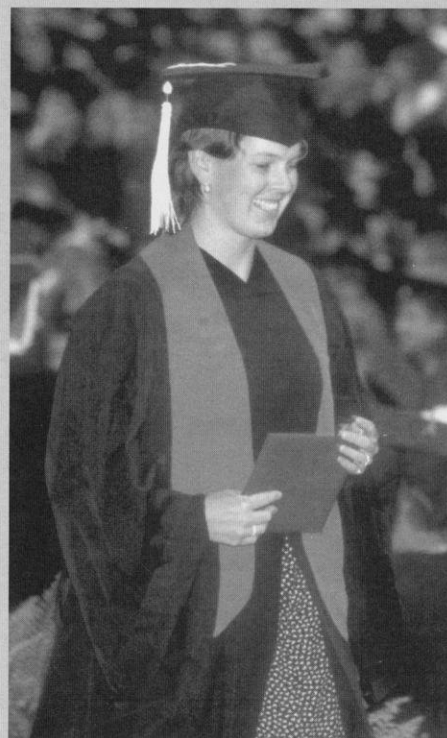
A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1999, African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than 9.5 percent of the student body.

The Community

Madison, located in southern Wisconsin, is not only pretty to look at but fun to be in. Draped around five lakes, "Mad City" is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

With a diverse population of 203,211, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by *Money* magazine. Again, in 1998 *Money* magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town." The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.



WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

In 1999, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as eighth among public universities and 34th among all universities. The UW also rated in the top five for academic reputation among public universities.

Wisconsin was also ranked sixth in *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* Magazine Top 100 values in state universities in 1999.

The 1998 *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating.



Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** In 1998, UW-Madison received over \$261 million in federal awards.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked fourth in the country for research and development expenditures in 1997, with \$514 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for Big Ten schools ranking second-lowest for resident tuition and third-lowest nonresident tuition of the public institutions.

► **Private Support:** With private gifts totalling \$250 million in 1999, Wisconsin ranks first among all public institutions and sixth among all institutions.

► **Alumni:** The Wisconsin Alumni Association has a network of chapters in 125 cities around the world helping to serve some 300,000 alumni. The chapters have raised \$4 million in scholarships.

► **Peace Corps Volunteers:** UW-Madison has the largest number of currently serving Peace Corps volunteers in the nation and has produced the second most total number of volunteers since the program's founding.

Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1996 survey lists Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in producing bachelor's degree winners who go on to become corporate executives.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in doctoral degrees awarded ranking second in 1998. Between the school's founding and 1998, the UW-Madison awarded 34,772 doctoral degrees.

Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1999, *U.S. News & World Report* cited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked library science, eighth; education, ninth; social work, ninth; economics, 10th; history, 11th; psychology, 12th; political science, 14th; English, 17th; fine arts, 19th; and music, 20th.

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in 1999, seven UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 20: speech pathology, first; audiology, fifth; computer science, ninth; veterinary medicine, ninth; chemistry, 10th; biology, 12th; math, 14th; geology, 17th; physics, 18th; and nursing, 18th.

► **Engineering:** In 1999, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked Wisconsin's College of Engineering tied for 11th in the nation. Three specialties ranked among the top

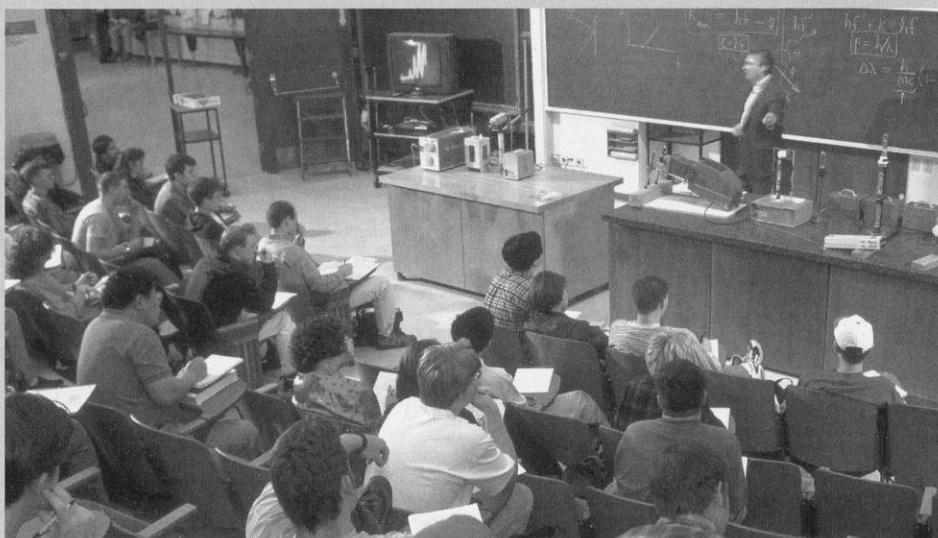
five in the country: nuclear, fourth; chemical, fifth; and industrial, eighth.

► **Business:** *Computerworld* ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of the top 25 in the nation.

According to *U.S. News and World Report* in 1999, the business school is tied for 10th. The real estate program ranks second, insurance third, marketing seventh, general management eighth and accounting 14th.

► **Professional Schools:** *U.S. News and World Report* ranked four UW-Madison Schools or Colleges among the top 20 in the country: veterinary medicine, ninth; engineering, 12th; pharmacy, 16th; and nursing, 18th.

► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.8 million books in 45 libraries across campus.



UW-Madison Sets the Pace

▶ with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States

▶ in establishing the nation's first magnetic observatory (1876)

▶ in discovering Vitamins A (1913) and B (1916)

▶ with the oldest educational radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917

▶ as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer (1933)

▶ in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year

▶ in the synthesizing of genes, molecular biologist Har Gobind Khorana synthesizes the first gene, receiving the 1968 Nobel Prize in medicine for his work in genetic coding.

▶ in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer (1941)

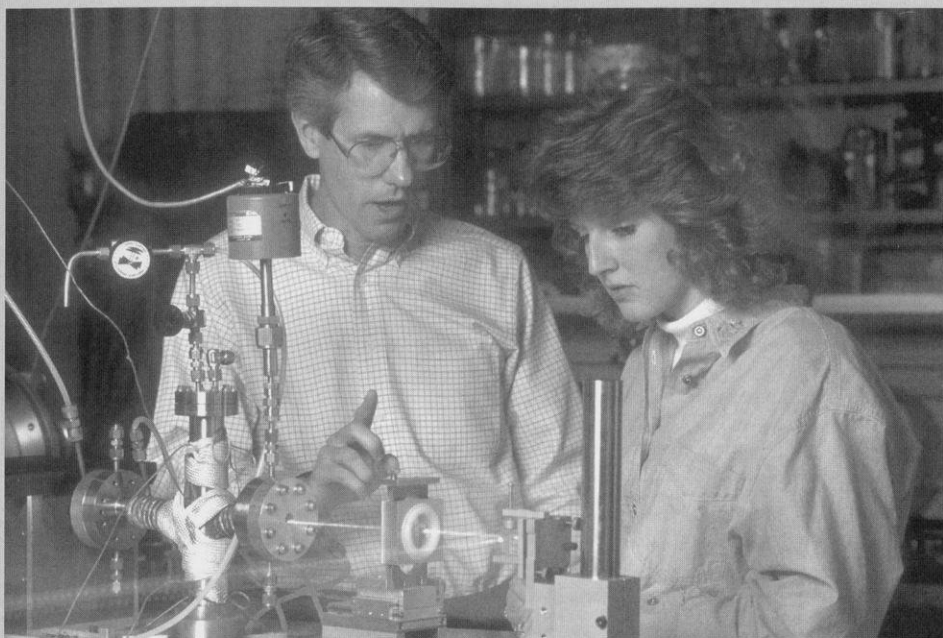

▶ in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound urea during brain surgery on a human (1957)

▶ in laying the foundation for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration adoption of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) on sunscreens (1960s)

▶ when the National Organization for Women (NOW) was first housed in Kathryn Clarenbach's faculty office on campus

▶ in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously (1980s)



▶ in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis

▶ with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes

▶ with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. A UW team also discovers how to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes.

▶ in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates

▶ as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories

▶ with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school

▶ with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees

▶ in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, surgeon Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreased the need for emergency transplantation, increased the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improved organ sharing among transplant centers



▶ as a UW-Madison researcher describes the atomic structure of a common cold virus

▶ with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)

▶ in improved world map projection developed by professor Arthur H. Robinson.

▶ as Hector F. DeLuca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, developed techniques for synthesizing the compound

Administration



David Ward

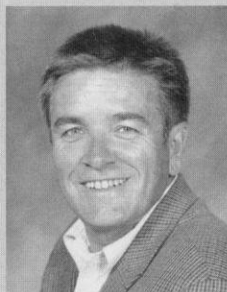
David Ward was named chancellor of Wisconsin in June 1993, and will be one of the longest serving administrators when he resigns Jan. 1.

He has provided strong leadership to improve the quality of education. Changes inspired by Ward include enhanced student advising for undergraduates; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

Ward serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and chaired the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors.

The chancellor was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

A former chair of the geography department, he will return as a professor in 2001. Ward has also served as the associate dean of the Graduate School, vice chancellor for academic affairs, provost, and chief deputy to the chancellor.



David M. McDonald

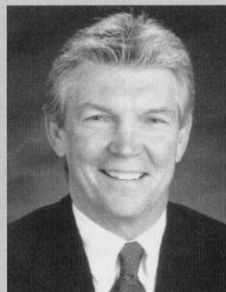
David McDonald, a professor in the History department, became chair of the UW Athletic Board July 1, 2000.

In close cooperation with the athletic department administration, McDonald and the 21-member Board, comprised of faculty, staff and UW students, set policy and oversee the running of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics.

McDonald has been a member of the Athletic Board since 1994, serving on various committees including compliance, University Ridge, and chairing the personnel committee.

A UW professor since 1988, McDonald offers courses in the history of pre-revolutionary Russia, as well as modern Europe. His research and publications cover a variety of topics including: bureaucratic politics in the early twentieth century, nineteenth century Russian thought, and the social history of the eighteenth century nobility.

A native of Saskatchewan, Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.



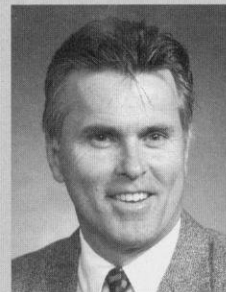
Pat Richter

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic all-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to moving to the athletic department.



Vince Sweeney

Now in his 10th year at Wisconsin, Vince Sweeney is associate athletic director for external relations and is the deputy AD responsible for daily operations in the absence of Pat Richter.

In addition to overseeing the marketing, promotions, sports information, special events and fundraising areas, he also supervises the Athletic Ticket Office. He continues to serve as the department liaison to the UW Athletic Board, Wisconsin Alumni Association, UW Foundation and National W Club.

Sweeney serves as a member of the chancellor's University Relations Team, and has been on the board of directors of the NACMA and the Madison Convention and Visitors Bureau. He also served on the NCAA's Basketball Marketing Committee.

Prior to joining the UW, Sweeney worked for 13 years in sports journalism, earning several awards as a reporter and editor at several Madison and Milwaukee papers and the Los Angeles Times. Sweeney is a 1978 UW-Madison graduate in journalism and mass communication.



Cheryl Marra

Joining the division in 1990, Associate Athletic Director Cheryl Marra supervises all 22 men's and women's programs except football. She oversees two assistant athletics directors who are responsible for 18 sports, while Marra is the primary evaluator for men's and women's basketball and hockey. She also serves as the primary women's administrator to the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA, and oversees the assistant AD's for academic affairs and compliance.

Marra came to Wisconsin from Denison University where she served as the women's athletic director from 1983-90. She was an assistant professor in the physical education department, and the women's soccer and track and field coach.

Marra is actively involved in a number of NCAA and Big Ten committees. She was the primary impetus for UW to host two NCAA Volleyball Championships, and the 1998 NCAA Women's golf championship.

A 1977 graduate of Slippery Rock State College with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health, Marra received her master's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983.

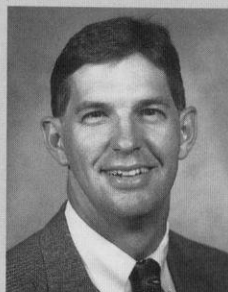


Jamie Pollard

Jamie Pollard came to Wisconsin in 1998 as the associate athletic director and chief financial officer responsible for the department's ticket operations and business services. In August of 2000 he was promoted to associate AD for finance and administration adding the responsibilities of facilities and events, sports medicine, equipment, strength and conditioning and technical services.

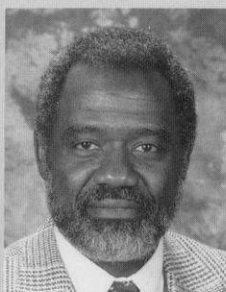
Al Fish

Al Fish joined the division in 1989 and has served as an associated athletic director in many facets of administration including facility planning, event management, technical services, equipment services, overseeing rowing and football, and the award-winning University Ridge Golf Course.

His current title as head of capital projects emphasizes his talents as he oversees over \$100 million in future athletics capital projects which include an extensive renovation of Camp Randall Stadium including new coach and administrative offices, a new swimming facility, and expanded rowing facilities. His past projects include the Kohl Center, Fetzer Academic Center and Goodman Softball Complex.

Mike Moss

Associate Athletic Director Mike Moss has taken over the newly-created Student Services and Activities area for UW Athletics. Moss came to Wisconsin in 1997, after serving as a Director of Sports Operations for the Atlanta Olympic Games Committee from 1993-96.

Key initiatives under his direction include the Champs Life Skills program for student-athletes, and the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. He will serve as the liaison to campus functions that impact student-athletes and be involved in Plan 2008, a major institutional program promoting campus-wide diversity.

Moss is a 1961 graduate of Ohio University with a bachelor's degree in journalism. He received his master's in science and physical education from California State University-Hayward. He is a retired lieutenant commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

Prior to his work with the Olympics, Moss served as the associate athletic director for business and student services at the University of California for 13 years.



Terry Gawlik

Assistant athletic director Terry Gawlik begins her third year as a sports administrator overseeing men's and women's track and cross country, golf, and tennis programs, as well as volleyball and wrestling. She also supervises the varsity sports program assistants.

Prior to becoming an AD, Gawlik served as an administrative assistant and event coordinator from 1994-98, supervising game-day operations, post-season tournaments and booster club events for men's and women's basketball and volleyball, as well as assisting with the marketing and promotions. She was also an assistant director in the Division of Recreational Sports during that time.

Gawlik is a former coach of women's basketball, women's track, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball at the NAIA level 11 years, and the NCAA Division III level two years.

A 1981 graduate of Southwestern University with a bachelor's degree in physical education and education, Gawlik earned her master's in physical education and educational administration from Southwest Texas State University in 1983.



John Jentz

John Jentz, a former assistant athletic director at Cal State Fullerton, joined the Badger program in November of 2000 as a sports administrator in charge of softball, men's and women's rowing, soccer, swimming/diving, and the spirit squad.

The Green Bay native was at Cal State Fullerton four years where he supervised eight sports and oversaw the athletic business office and ticket office staffs for the 17-sport program, a member of the Division IA Big West Conference.

Prior to the move to Fullerton, he was at UC-Riverside serving as an accountant in the business office. He later managed the development funds including budget development, purchasing and reporting. He also coordinated several athletic events including the NCAA Div. II Track and Field Championship.

He began his administrative career at East Stroudsburg University where he supervised the ticket operations and event staffing for home events while earning his master's degree in 1992-93. He is a 1992 graduate of Brigham Young University.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

Celebrating over 100 years of competition in some men's sports, Wisconsin's men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, Ice hockey, lightweight rowing, openweight rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs for the past five years. Wisconsin ushered in the millennium with one of its best years in school history ranking 17th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Thirteen of Wisconsin's 24 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 1999-00. The men's cross country team finished second at the NCAA Championship while the women's team was fourth. The football team was the first Big Ten school to repeat as Rose Bowl champions, and ended the season ranked

fourth while the men's basketball team made its first NCAA Final Four appearance since winning the title in 1941. The women's basketball team won the WNIT national trophy and the men's hockey team won the WCHA regular season championship and was ranked No. 1 much of the season. Individually, Wisconsin had two NCAA champions in Erica Palmer, who won the women's cross country title, and Dan Pritzlaff, who won the wrestling title at 165 pounds.

Big Ten Conference composite rankings are not sanctioned by the conference office. Points are awarded for each school's finish in 12 men's and 11 women's conference championships. The first-place team receives 11 points while the 11th-place team receives one point. The total points are divided by the number of sports in which each school participates.



The women's cross country team defended its title at the 1999 Big Ten Conference Championship and ended its season with a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championship.



Mike Kelley celebrates the UW men's NCAA West Regional Championship. The men's team defied the odds qualifying for its first Final Four since 1941. The Wisconsin women's basketball team had an unprecedented sixth-consecutive winning season finishing 21-12 and winning the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT) title.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's hockey, men's and women's rowing, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

The Badgers crowned five Big Ten team champions in men's and women's cross country, men's indoor and outdoor track, and football.

As a conference, the Big Ten had one of its finest national showings with six programs ranking among the top 25 in the Sears Cup Standings. Michigan led the Big Ten in the No. 3 position followed by Penn State at No. 4.

Ohio State was 14th, and Wisconsin tied its second-best national ranking at 17th. Minnesota was No. 19, and Michigan State rounds out the Big Ten institutions among the top 25 at No. 22.

1999-00 marks the most Big Ten teams (6) in the top 25 since the inception of the Sears Cup in 1993-94. The previous bests were five schools in 1993-94, 1995-96, 1996-97 and 1998-99.

NCAA Championships

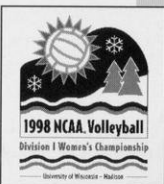
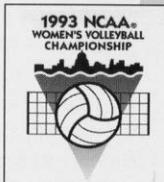
In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has played host to five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell-out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing University Ridge.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament will come to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers play host to a regional in the Kohl Center.



One of Wisconsin's newest sports, softball qualified for its first Big Ten Tournament in 2000, led by its record-setting pitcher, Andrea Kircherg. The freshman was honored as the Badgers' first All-American softball player.

Student-Athlete Support Network

Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, Liane Kosaki** and **Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

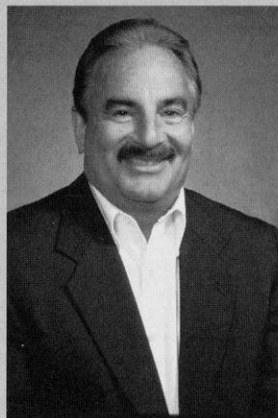
The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different shapes and

sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.

Scholarships

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 10 full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Andy Rhodey, Heidi Stettler, Laura Walluck,** and **Andy Winterstein** utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general med-

ical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

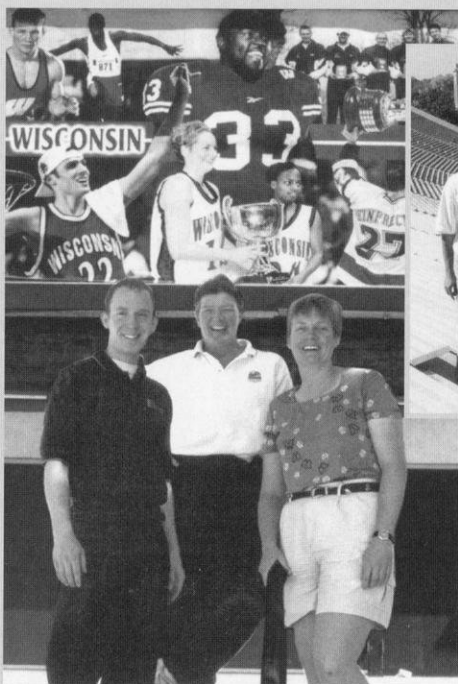
Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 23 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Offices.

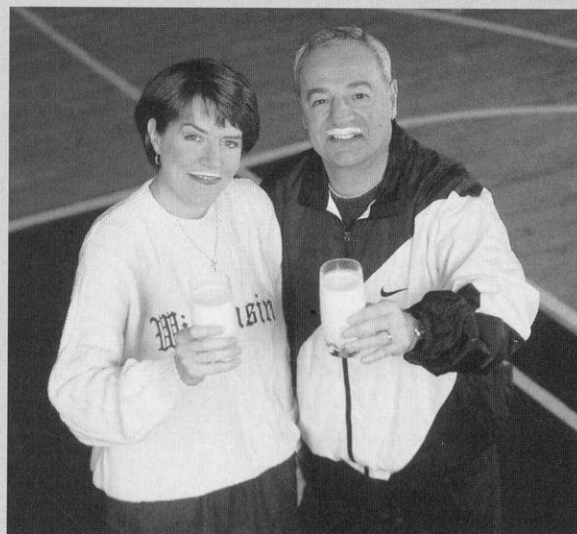
Community Service

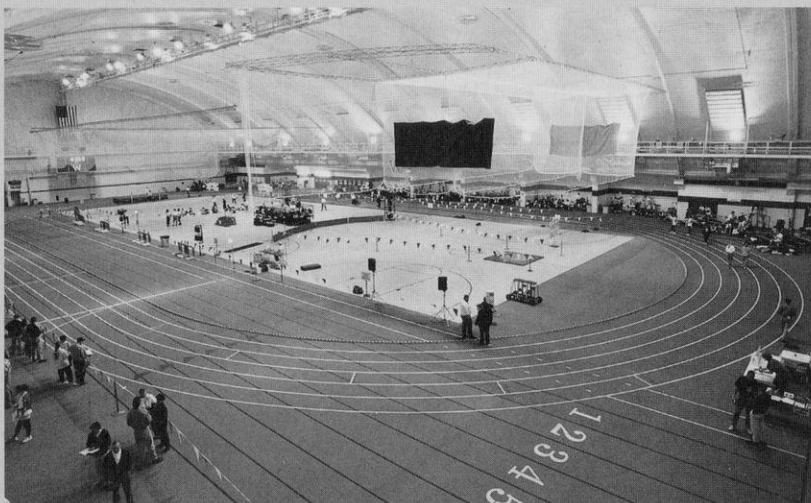
Wisconsin Facilities



The McClain Athletic Facility offers indoor practice facilities for football, soccer and track and field. A 90-yard newly resurfaced artificial turf practice area is contained in the 76,380-square foot main floor. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, men's and women's track, softball, and men's and women's soccer.



Top: The Goodman Brothers Softball Complex on the west end of the UW campus opened during the spring of 1999. The facility has an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 220 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility includes dugouts, locker areas, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.



Left: The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell features a 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounding four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. The Shell, which has a seating capacity of 2,500, was the site of the 1999 Big Ten Conference Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship.

Bottom Left: The Kohl Center, which opened in January of 1998, is the home of the Badger basketball and men's hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 10,600, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad. It features four locker rooms, and an athletic training area.



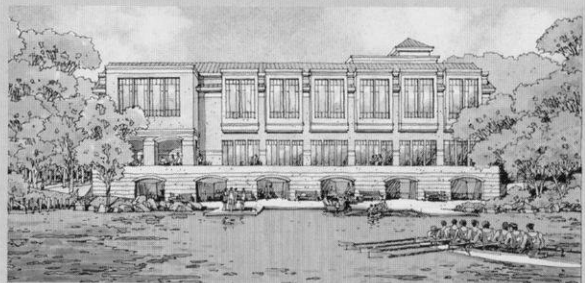
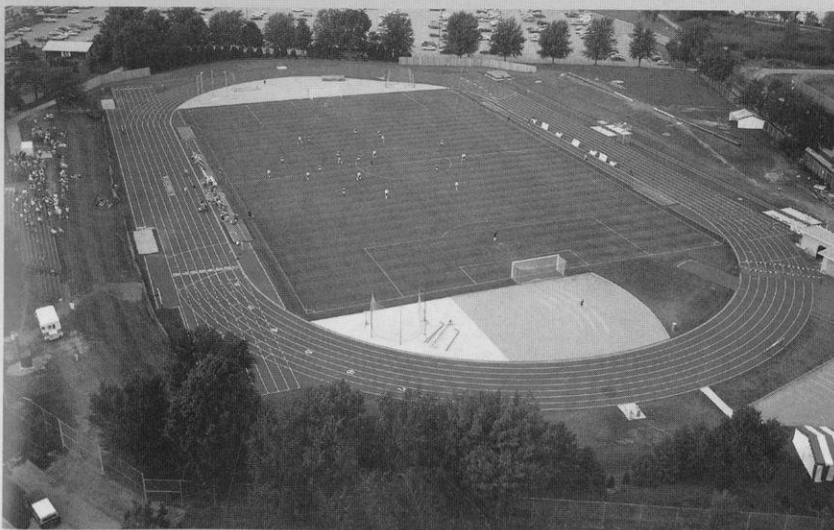
The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The “Nat” contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.



The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



UW golfers have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest courses in the Midwest—University Ridge. The facility features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and a 5,000-square foot chipping green. It was the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship.

Badger Nickname

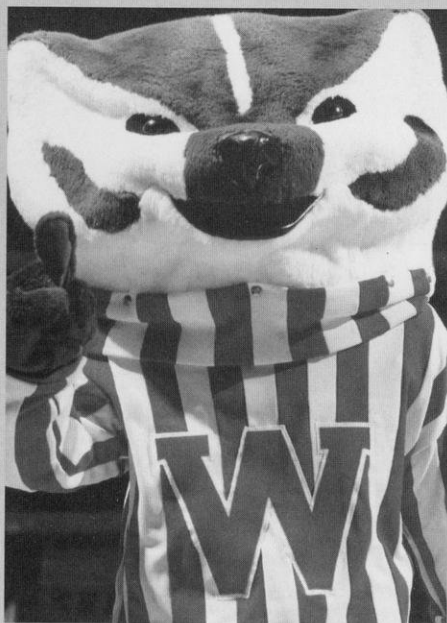
The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original live badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said

by some to have originated in a line from the school song, "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW gridiron heroes to "buck right through that line."

"On Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they

play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"
