REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the President's Office

Saturday, August 9, 1952, 10 A.M.

Vice President Werner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Jones, Kleczka, Laird, Rennebohm, Watson,

Werner.

ABSENT: Regent Renk.

Vice President Werner announced that it was his sad duty to report that the office of the President of the Board was vacant due to the death of President Sensenbrenner.

Regent Arveson nominated Regent A. Matt. Werner for the office of President for the balance of the term. The nomination was seconded by Regent Gelatt. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the nominations for the office of President be closed. A unanimous ballat was cast for Regent A. Matt. Werner for President for the balance of the term.

President Werner stated that it was a high honor to serve as a member of the Board of Regents and he considered it to be a high honor to serve as President of the Board.

The President declared that nominations were in order for the office of Vice President for the balance of the present term. Regent Gelatt nominated Regent Oscar Rennebohm for the office of Vice President for the balance of the term and the nomination was seconded by Regent Watson.

Regent Jones, commenting on the sixteen years of outstanding service of Regent Kleczka as a member of the Board, nominated Regent Leonard J. Kleczka for the office of Vice President for the balance of the term. The nomination was seconded by Regent Rennebohm.

Regent Laird nominated Regent Charles D. Gelatt for the office of Vice President for the balance of the term and the nomination was seconded by Regent Watson.

The nominations for the office of Vice President were closed and a ballot was cast by each Regent. The Regents agreed that in the event one of the candidates did not receive a majority of the votes on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the smallest number of votes would be dropped from the second ballot. The ballots were counted and the Secretary reported that the vote was Regent Gelatt 2, Regent Kleczka 3, and Regent Rennebohm 3. There being no nominee receiving a majority of the votes cast, a second ballot was cast by each Regent for the office of Vice President. The ballots were counted and the Secretary reported that the vote was Regent Kleczka 3, Regent Rennebohm 5. President Werner declared Regent Rennebohm elected Vice President for the balance of the present term. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That a unanimous ballot be cast for the election of Regent Oscar

Rennebolm for Vice President of the Board for the balance of the term.

Regent Rennebohm suggested that a standing tribute be paid to "F. J.". The Regents and all other persons present arose and stood in silent tribute in memory of the late Frank J. Sensenbrenner.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That a resolution in memory of Frank J. Sensenbrenner be prepared and presented for adoption at the next meeting of the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on July 12, 1952, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

- That Henry B. Hill, professor of history, Extension Division, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the academic year 1952-53, in order that he may accept a Ford Foundation Fellowship.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics be authorized to sign a renewal agreement for 1952-53 with the National "W" Club for the handling of refreshment concessions and printed programs for home athletic contests on the same basis as the agreements which have been in effect since 1949.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the plans for remodelling the old Art Education - Electrical Engineering Building be approved, and that authority be granted to advertise for bids.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That \$5000 be appropriated from Unbudgeted 1-E Receipts to the School of Education to provide funds for the moving and re-installation of Art Education Department equipment.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was NOTED, That the north half of the basement and the north half of the first floor of the Old Chemical Engineering Building be assigned as a laboratory for television, and that \$105,750 be appropriated from Unbudgeted 1—E balances to provide funds for the purchase and installation of equipment for a closed circuit television laboratory and for remodelling the space assigned for this purpose, in accordance with the following detailed budget:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That \$22,500 be appropriated from the 1-E Library Reserve to the General Library to provide funds for supplies, binding, etc., required in connection with moving the University library into the new Memorial Library Building.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the razing of the building at 620 North Lake Street.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the sale of the undivided 3/8ths interest of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin in the Harriet J. Sawyer Estate vacant land, located in Blue Island, Illinois, for a consideration of \$600 be approved. (Elsa A. Sawyer Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers of the University be directed to consult with the Legislative Council regarding the advisability of establishing a contributory plan of group life insurance for the University faculty.

Regent Arveson voted "No".

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the President of the University, the State Building Commission be requested to appropriate funds from the State Building Trust Fund for the construction of permanent buildings which will permit the removal of temporary structures and provide facilities for Commerce, Pharmacy, the Extension Division, and other departments. The detailed projects to be submitted separately are as follows:

a. Commerce unit of Social Studies Building, to replace eleven temporary buildings now used for classrooms and laboratories, and the quonsets on the lower campus

Regent Rennebohm called attention to the use of Chadbourne Hall for housing being discontinued at the end of the 1952 summer session and suggested that a decision should be made as to its use or disposition. The possibilities of razing Chadbourne Hall or using only the lower four floors for housing for a year or so until a final decision is reached as to the use of the site were discussed. The extreme fire hazard in connection with the use of Chadbourne Hall for housing was emphasized and mention was made of the previous decision by the Regents to raze Chadbourne Hall and to construct a new dormitory for about six hundred women on that site. It was suggested that further discussion be had with the State Administration as to the possibility of razing Chadbourne Hall and constructing a new dormitory on that site.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RIGHTS

Introductory Statement

The Committee on Human Rights has presented the attached report to President E. B. Fred. In approving Document 933 (revised October 2, 1950), the Faculty has already accepted some of the items in our report. In order to make all of our report an established part of current University policy, we are requesting the Faculty to formally accept the following report. In reality only the items listed below need Faculty action since the other items concern either university administration or have been approved in earlier Faculty actions.

The items concerned are:

Item 1, p. 2 of Report:

That no new organization with charter provisions discriminating against candidates for membership because of race or color be approved by the University.

Item 2, p. 3 of Report: (the part underscored)

That organizations now on the campus which have such a provision be required to counsel annually with the Committee on Human Rights. That continued approval of such organizations be conditioned upon a determined effort on their part to secure amendments to their respective constitutions eliminating such restrictions.

Item 3, p. 3 of Report:

That no such organization which has in its national or local constitution or pledge instructions a discriminatory clause shall be approved by the University after July 1, 1960.

Report

Since the adoption of Document 982 by the Regents, approval by the Faculty and subsequent formation of the Committee on Human Rights, the Committee has functioned under the directives outlined in Document 982. The Committee has been influenced by principles outlined in Document 933 (revised) in so far as these principles were in agreement with the directives included in Document 982.

The Committee recognizes a problem which seriously limits the regular improvement and campus—wide application of healthy principles of human relations. This problem stems from the fact that the composition of the University community is in a continual state of change. This means that any attempt to establish principles or policies and any attempt to educate members of the community in matters related to human relations will be ineffective unless some means is provided to insure a regular restatement of these principles and policies.

It is because of this problem raised by continual change in the University community that the Committee recommends that the Regent's statement of policy (see excerpt from Document 982) be presented to the University community each year through the medium of (a) letters to fraternities, sororities and rooming houses, (b) the Daily Cardinal, (c) and the Freshman booklet.

Excerpt from Document 982:

"The Regents are unanimous in their belief that the faculty and officers of the University of Wisconsin, throughout the long years of its history have made an outstanding record in the safeguarding of human rights. Our University has historically served, regardless of race or creed, all who have sought its instruction. Its students now include members of all groups and segments of society, accepting each other and learning together. The Regents are proud of the ability of any student on our campus to gain recognition upon his or her individual merits, and are pleased with the growth in understanding upon our campus—an understanding so sorely needed in America and in the world.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the University of Wisconsin shall in all its branches and activities maintain the fullest respect and protection of the Constitutional rights of all citizens and students regardless of race, color, sect, or creed; and any violation thereof shall immediately be reported to the administration and the Regents for appropriate action to the end that any such violation of Constitutional rights shall be promptly and fully corrected, and future violation prevented."

Implementation:

In order to implement the Regent's statement of policy, the Committee recommends the following:

Dormitories

It is recognized that the Dormitory authorities have made rapid progress in the improvement of human relations as related to the occupancy of the university dormitories. We commend the staff members for their efforts and urge them to continue working in this direction. To this end, we recommend that a statement of policy on human relations be given to dormitory residents and staff members at the beginning of each academic year.

Social and Professional Fraternities and Sororities

Several chapters on the campus have adopted policies and developed points of view designed to improve human relations among their members and between the chapters and students on the campus. However, some of the chapters have constitutions or pledge instructions which contain discriminatory clauses relating to race, color or creed. With regard to such chapters as well as new organizations which seek approval by the University, the Committee on Human Rights recommends:

(1) That no new organization with charter provisions discriminating against candidates because of race, or color be approved by the University.

- (2) That organizations now on the campus which have such a provision be required to counsel annually with the Committee on Human Rights. That continued approval of such organizations be conditioned upon a determined effort on their part to secure amendments to their respective constitutions eliminating such restrictions.
- (3) That no such organization which has in its national or local constitution or pledge instructions a discriminatory clause shall be approved by the University after July 1, 1960.
- (4) That organizations having a restrictive clause in their respective constitutions shall make their policy, with regard to it, known to prospective pledges.
- (5) That the chapters be advised that no action herein recommended in any way abridges the chapter's freedom to select individual members on their individual merits.

Private Housing

At the suggestion of students as well as of the administration, the Housing Bureau has modified its policy. Neither the room application blanks nor t of rooms contain any reference to race, color or creed. The Committee is p to note that many new application blanks used by private houses contain no requests for information relating to race, color or creed.

We recommend that the Housing Bureau make clear to all people who list vacancies with the Bureau that the University is opposed to discrimination and that cases of alleged discrimination will be reviewed by the Committee on Human Rights.

Employment

We commend the Student Employment Bureau for its opposition to discrimination in the employment of students. We recommend that this Bureau make this policy clear to prospective employers, and to note particularly that any alleged case of discrimination will be reviewed by the Committee on Human Rights.
