





BOOK BANTER

Wisconsin Writings, 1931 (Mohawk Press) is a collection of supposedly representative pieces of literary work from the pens of students and one faculty member of the university. Of the thirteen authors whose work is printed in the anthology, only two were known to the reviewer—Prof. Paul Fulcher and Hoyt Trowbridge, former editorial writer for the Daily Cardinal. Perhaps this does not mean anything, but it would at least seem to indicate a certain hesitation in calling them representative.

"What Chance Has the College Writer", by Prof. Fulcher is a straightforward statement of the facts, lightened by the vague flashes of Fulcherian wit which characterize all of his work. It is worthy of inclusion in such a collection.

Three poems, "Panis Angelicus", "By the Shore of a Frozen Lake in the Falling Snow", and "Fantasy" by Stuart Lyman are fairly good examples of free verse. The first a commentary on modern life, and the second a somewhat rambling address to a person called *Jérome*.

"Fantasy" we quote herewith-

"The earth is a jungle of grass That I part with my hands To hear the stars

Singing through the skies."

If you, dear reader, can understand this, you are better than the reviewer. Mr. Lyman also has two more poems, "On the Death of a Friend", and "As I Here Draw My Finger Through the Sand". Sufficient to state the titles.

"Thrice to the Mirror" by Sue Masters is a well written slice of raw life done in the "train of thought" manner and is just short enough to be effective.

"Definitions" a poem by William Lumpkin is excellent and reminds one of Dorothy Parker. He pokes fun at the definition of poetry—" . . . sliver of the moon, lost in the belly of a gold frog."

Edward Harris Heth's "Party for Ginevra" is a pointless mixture of Paris night clubs for Americans only and grotesque imaginative names for Chicago and other places. It proves (Continued on page 25)

Hoyt Trowbridge's work is well written, convincing, and means something. The fiction is light but steady and his "Democracy and the Press", which won the 1931 Vilas prize is a penetrating discussion.

A pleasant departure from the type of work in the rest of the book is "Cully Awakes" by Arthur Jacobs. It is a College Humor story, only not quite as smoothly written, and with not quite as well worded similes but is fresh and interesting. The author will undoubtedly improve as he goes further in his work. The theme is an old one-love for the first time. The environment, Wisconsin, which is not mentioned except indirectly through the names of dormitories, etc., helps the interest.
