MADISON--The handsome "Parliamentary Room" in Vilas Communication Hall, furnished in part by contributions from the University of Wisconsin Class of 1921, will be formally dedicated at 8 p.m. March 29.

An oval room that can be adapted to seminar discussions, lectures, films, or panel presentations, it features panelled and carpeted walls and 125 comfortable seats upholstered in purple.

The ceremonies will begin with presentation of the room to the University by Dr. Frank L. Weston, Madison, 1921 class president, and acceptance by Madison Chancellor Edwin Young.

Pres. John C. Weaver next presents the speaker of the evening, Dr. James W. Cleary, since 1969 president of California State University, Northridge, to deliver the annual Andrew T. Weaver Lecture, named for Pres. Weaver's late father. Dr. Cleary, former UW-Madison vice chancellor for academic affairs, will discuss "Controversy in Higher Education: The Source of Some Critical Parliamentary Issues."

Andrew Weaver was for 43 years a member of the UW department of speech, for 28 of those years chairman of the department. He helped found the Speech Association of America and served as president in 1927 and editor of its journal from 1930 to 1933. The textbooks he wrote are used in many speech departments.

The dedication is open to the public.

MADISON--Prof. S. E. Finer, head of the department of government at the University of Manchester, England, will give a public lecture on "Israel: Governing in Perpetual Crisis" at the University of Wisconsin March 18.

He will speak at 8 p.m. in 1111 Humanities Building under auspices of the UW department of political science, basing his discussion on wide knowledge of affairs in the troubled Middle East. For the past two years he has spent most of his time lecturing at Hebrew University in Jerusalem and studying the explosive situation in the area.

One of the most distinguished political scientists in Britain, Prof. Finer has written books on such topics as the role of pressure groups in British politics and the attitudes of ordinary members of the British Parliament.

Here is biographical information concerning Professor Howell: He was born in 1904 in a small town in upstate New York. He received his B. A. in 1924 from Cornell University, where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received his M. A. in 1928 and his Ph. D. in 1931, both from Cornell. His dissertation on Dante was completed under the direction of Professor Land Cooper.

In 1928-29 he studied at the University of Paris; in 1948-49 he was a Guggenheim Memorial Fellow in London; in 1951-52 he was a Huntington Library Fellow in Pasadena; in 1957-58 he held another Guggenheim Fellowship.

These are the dates and the institutions where he taught: 1924-25, Iowa State College; 1925-27, Washington University; 1930-33, Harvard University; 1933-34, Dartmouth College; 1934 to date, Princeton University.

Attached are pages listing the writings of Professor Howell.

MADISON, Wis.--Dr. W.S. Howell, professor of rhetoric and oratory at Princeton University, will deliver the Andrew T. Weaver Lecture at the University of Wisconsin on Tuesday (March 8) at 7:30 p.m.

He will speak in Wisconsin Center auditorium on "John Locke and the New Rhetoric" under the auspices of the department of speech, which the late Prof. Weaver served as teacher and administrator for many years.

A graduate and Phi Beta Kappa of Cornell University, Prof. Howell continued at Cornell to earn his master's degree in 1928 and his Ph.D. in 1931. In 1928-29 he studied at the University of Paris; in 1948-49 he was a Guggenheim Memorial Fellow in London; in 1951-52 he was a Huntington Library Fellow in Pasadena; and in 1957-58 he held another Guggenheim Fellowship. He taught at Iowa State College, Washington University, Harvard, and Dartmouth College before joining the Princeton faculty.

Among his many publications are "The Rhetoric of Alcuin and Charlemagne," "Fenelon's Dialogues on Eloquence," and "Logic and Rhetoric in England, 1500-1700," all published by the Princeton University Press, and many articles in scholarly journals.
