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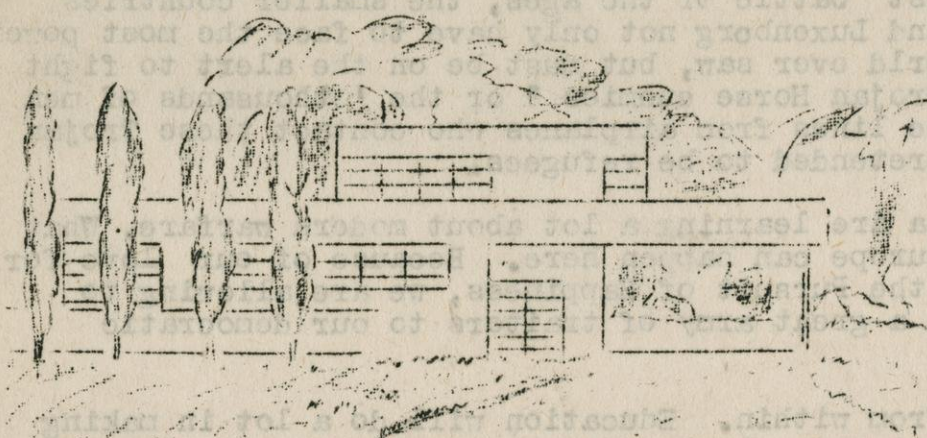

Now in the greatest battle of the ages, the smaller countries Holland, Belgium and Luxemborg not only have to face the most powerful enemy the world ever saw, but must be on the alert to fight or capture the "Trojan Horse enemies" or the thousands of men dropped behind the lines from airplanes who contact these Trojan spies, who had pretended to be refugees.

We here in America are learning a lot about modern warfare. What has happened in Europe can happen here. Because of our love for Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness, we are allowing to grow in our midst a great army of traitors to our democratic principles.

There is danger from within. Education will do a lot in making loyal Americans, but that alone will not do it. The new "I am an American" day is a great step forward. But what we need more than anything else is a better human interest in the foreigner in our midst.

Every possible effort should be put forth to really know him and get him to see what a great heritage he has under our Constitution. If he does not respond he can be listed as a public enemy and placed on the list of those who need be watched in case we might become entangled in this World War.

God forbid that we ever again use our military, naval or air forces for other than the defense of our Country and those whom we are sworn by tradition to protect under the Monroe Doctrine.

HOW TO GREASE YOUR CAR?

- ① Put on your dirtiest clothes so you can crawl under the car.
- ② Buy a supply of transmission and differential, universal joint, water pump, wheel, bearing, chassis lubricants, and steering column greases, sufficient grease guns, a spray gun, and some penetrating oil.

- ⑤ Fill your spray gun full of penetrating oil to spray on the springs. Be sure not to breathe for about ten minutes while spraying the springs or you may oil-plate the inside of your lungs, which is very bad.
- ⑥ Be sure not to miss any place that should be lubricated as it may cost you the price of 20 grease jobs for repairs.

"Flying Cadet" Dave Van Epps, Williams Bay, completed the first twelve weeks in the Army Air Corps Training School at Tulsa, Oklahoma, on Monday this week, and is now at Randolph Field, San Antonio, Texas, for the second twelve weeks of training, from there he will go to Kelly Field, Texas, for the last twelve weeks, after which he will receive a commission as second lieutenant. He enjoys the training course in the ground school as much as the flying.

Here is a day in the Army Air Corps Training School-

Rise at 5:30 A.M., dress, exercise for 15 minutes. Make their bed. March to breakfast. Seven o'clock start ground school or else fly. At 11 A.M. march to lunch. at Mess Hall. Afternoon - fly or have ground school. At 4 o'clock the flag ceremony, then march to dinner. Between 4:30 and 7:30, play ball or study or inspect the lower classmen. Study from 7:30 to 9:30, then into bed by 9:45.

The Army Air Corps has found in the country as a whole that only 20 to 25 per cent of those applying for training in the pilot training program pass the physical examination.

Even though you may have a home on the lake, stop by there some day and look "Knollwood " over.

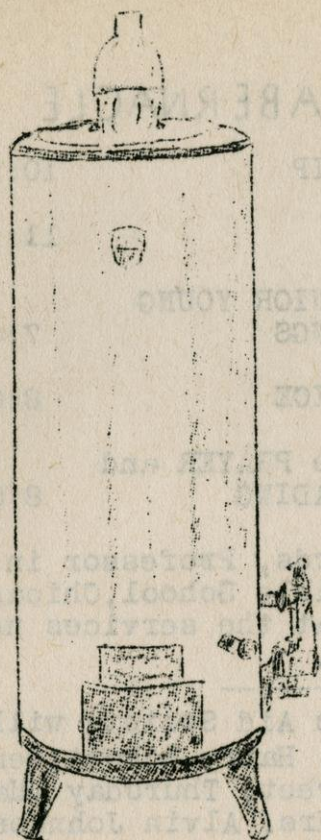

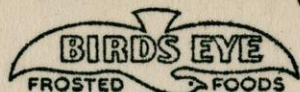


