EXTREMES IN WEATHER

The summer of 1934 has truly been an unusual one. In this region it has broken records for the early date of the beginning of the hot weather, for the duration of the heat, for the intensity of the heat and for the great shortage of rainfall. The average temperature for the summer has been higher than in any year since the Observatory records were started in 1903. The hot weather began early in May, and on nine days during that month temperatures of 90 degrees or higher were recorded. June followed with twelve days of 90 degrees or warmer; July brought fifteen and August eight. So during these four months we have had forty-four 90 degree days. The average number of 90 degree days in a summer (from the records of 17 years) is fourteen. The greatest number in any previous year was in 1931, when there were thirty-two.

Not only have there been many hot days, but the intensity of the heat has been unprecedented. On only four occasions previous to this year have temperatures as high as 100 degrees been recorded at the Observatory. This year we had ten such days-- one in May, two in June, six in July and one in August. The maximum readings on these dates were-- May 31, 104 degree; June 1, 105°; June 23, 102°; July 20, 103°; 21, 107°; 22, 105°; 23, 108°; 24, 108°; 25, 104°; Aug. 9, 100°.

What made the heat a tragic thing for the farmer was the very great shortage of rain. The small rainfall in May made it the driest May in the Observatory records. There have been other times when June, July and August have had less rainfall, but never before have these dry months occurred in the same year. If June was dry, July would bring extra rain, or if July was dry, June and August would help make up the deficit. But taking the season as a whole we can say that 1934 has been the driest summer we have had since 1903. And the story is longer than that, for during the

last fifteen consecutive months this region has had a shortage of rainfall amounting to 50 per cent.

Probably temperatures experienced in 1901 were comparable with some of those of this year, but the Observatory records were not begun until 1903.

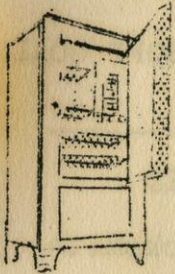
The Fair will have Governor Albert G. Schmedeman as it's guest Thursday., he will deliver an address in front of the amphitheater that afternoon.
